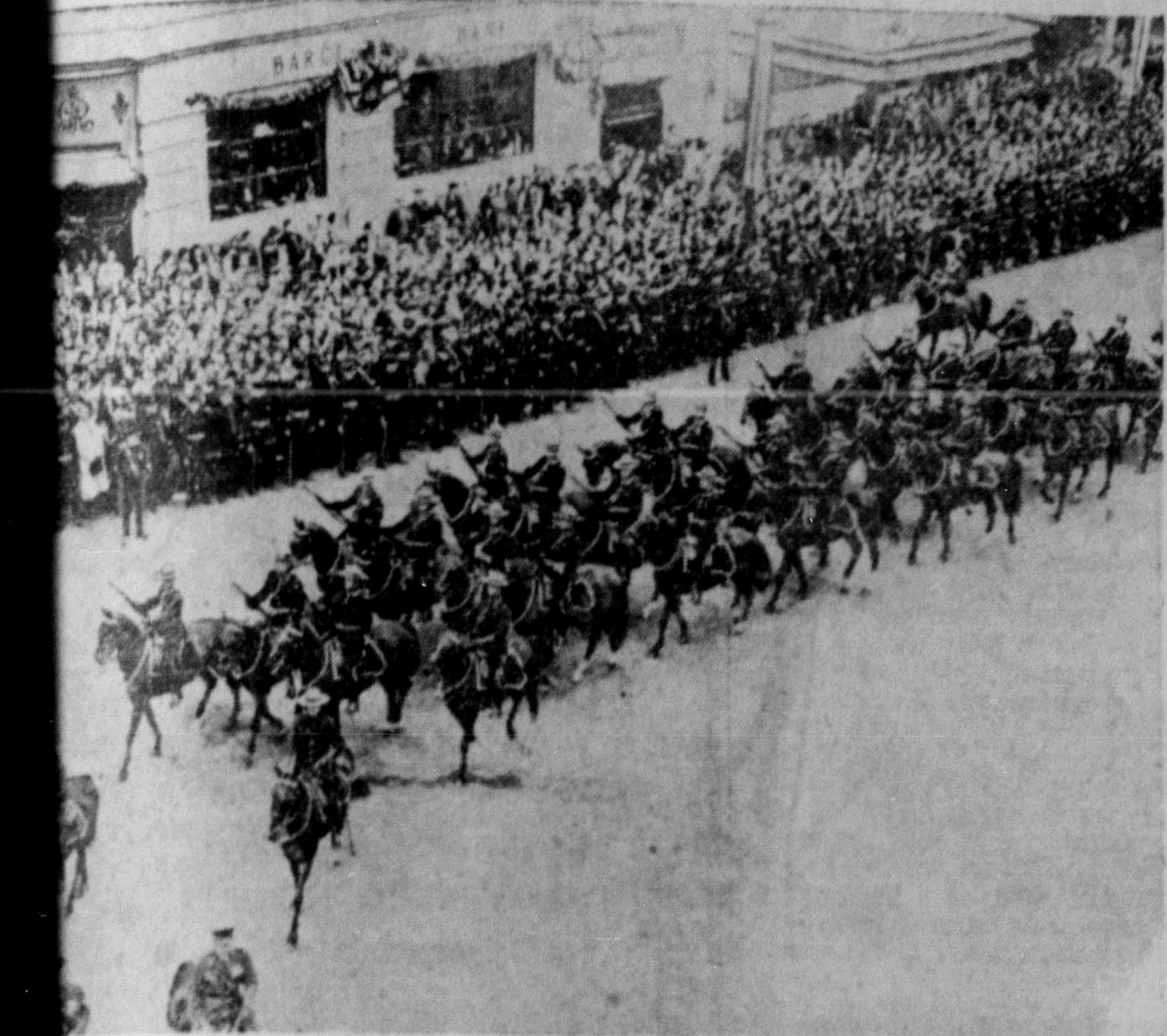

Police Meeting of Policemen Calls Life in Prison Camp

FREDERICK TAYLOR in a Japanese POW stockade for a year. It was the first time they had seen each other since October, 1943, when Constable Crouch was repatriated from the camp on a prisoner exchange deal between the American and Japanese governments. Taylor, being British, didn't get in on the exchange and endured the life of a POW until the end of the war in August, 1945. Less than six weeks ago, he, his wife and five-year-old daughter left Australia for Canada. Crouch and Taylor first became acquainted in 1940 while on the same Shanghai force but at different stations. Both had been drawn to the mystic, precarious and tumultuous Orient in search of adventure, "and I at least found lots of it," says Taylor. "But the world fell around our ears, as it did to everyone in the Orient when the Japanese launched their attack on Pearl Harbor. It was 4 a.m. on December 8, 1942, when the Nips came and hustled us to the camp. This was at Pootung, near Shanghai, and the two of us were there together for a year," recalled the 42-year-old, 225-pound former sub-inspector. "Phil and I even carried out an investigation together in the camp when one of the prisoners—a Russian—was found with his throat cut." Taylor, who speaks with a combined Australian and English accent, but uses American slang with familiarity, was a policeman in London when he decided to seek adventure further afield. He served as a detective for 15 years on the International Settlement force before the Japanese came. Recollections of his POW days at the war-famous Hungchow camp are predominantly of "terrible food and very little of that."

Thirty-Three Believed Killed In Two U.S. Air Force Crashes

Ten Bodies Found Near Burning Plane

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld.—Two United States military planes crashed in Newfoundland Wednesday and the death toll may reach 33.

It was announced today the second U.S. aircraft—a B-29 bomber—had plunged into St. George's Bay with 10 men aboard while on a routine flight. Fate of the occupants was not known. Meanwhile, searchers looked for survivors of the giant bomber which crashed on the east coast of Newfoundland with 23 persons aboard.

Ten bodies were found but there was no immediate trace of the other 13 persons.

Details of the B-29 crash were not available. Wreckage was found in the bay on the province's west coast but there was no sign of life.

On the other side of the island search parties hunted for the remaining 13 aboard the B-36 which went down north of here while en route from the Azores to its base at Rapid City.

The 10 bodies were found by woodsmen near the still burning wreckage on a heavily-wooded hilltop.

Workers Reject Proposal

VANCOUVER—A federal negotiator was told striking west coast grain handlers have voted unanimously to reject his six-point settlement proposal.

Operators told the negotiator three of six points were acceptable provided the employees return to work at once.

Copies of letters in which both sides gave answers to his proposals were released by Bernard Wilson, federal Labor Department conciliation officer.

Some 280 members of the Grand Handlers Union (CIO) went on strike against five Vancouver and New Westminster elevators February 16.

Settlement terms proposed by Mr. Wilson were:

1. A wage increase of three cents an hour, retroactive to December 1, 1952.
2. Two additional statutory holidays.
3. Increase of five cents an hour in the present graveyard shift differential.
4. Payment of double time for all work done on Sundays.
5. Shift rotation of cleaners in one elevator, where such arrangement has not already been made.
6. Incorporation of schedules of job classification in the collective agreement without prejudice to the right of management of each elevator to establish its own system of classification.

Tito Meets Churchill

LONDON—President Tito of Yugoslavia discussed with Prime Minister Churchill and other top-ranking British leaders today ways the anti-Soviet Communist state could ward off possible Russian aggression.

Subject of the talks was thought to be Yugoslav air defence against the Russian MiG-15 jet fighter.

Not only Russia, but most of the satellites surrounding Yugoslavia now are armed with the swift Red jet.

Missing CBCA Plane Safe

A Central B.C. Airlines plane, reported missing yesterday, is safe near Stewart.

Pilot Don McIvor reported to head office in Vancouver Wednesday that he had put his plane down to escape rough weather in the bleak northern mountains. McIvor and his engineer were the only persons aboard the plane.

Firms Support Proposal to Build Lumber Assembly Wharf at Kitimat

A proposal that a lumber assembly wharf be built at Kitimat which would stimulate the movement of lumber from this region by ship is receiving strong support from interested companies as far east as Prince George, Will Robinson, president of the Terrace board of trade, said today.

Mr. Robinson, on a visit here with Mrs. Robinson, said representations had been made for many years to obtain this industrial service at Prince Rupert, without success.

"For some considerable time, substantial amounts of lumber have been shipped rough from various Skeena and Bulkley points for re-manufacture at points east," Mr. Robinson explained.

"There is a strong possibility that an assembly wharf at Kitimat would result in a reversal of this flow. Such reversal would result in a stepping up of the amount of rough lumber re-manufactured in this area, with resultant increase in planer plant facilities."

To insure there would be a plentiful supply of lumber to be shipped under such a scheme, it might be advisable to form a company that would handle the overall arrangements, Mr. Robinson said. Stockholders would be the various lumber manufacturers as far east as Prince George, or whatever points were considered within range of the plan.

"This company could act as the clearing house for lumber shipped. It could make any arrangements possible with Alcan for the use of, or lease of, wharf facilities, and for the operation of such facilities."

Mr. Robinson said Alcan would also benefit by the scheme for three main reasons. First, there would be the availability of large stocks of lumber at Kitimat for the townsite's building and development. Second, it would increase traffic over the Terrace-Kitimat railway, thus assisting Alcan to meet its freight income.

Narriman, Farouk Decided To Separate Long Time Ago

GENEVA (Reuters)—Pretty ex-queen Narriman of Egypt said Wednesday she had walked out on Farouk simply because she could not stand him any longer.

The 19-year-old princess angrily denounced her husband's claim in Rome Friday night that her mother and Premier Mohammed Naguib had driven her marriage onto the rocks.

Narriman's special statement, issued through a secretary at her Geneva hotel, followed Naguib's permission for her return to Cairo.

"The separation has been decided on for a long time and is a personal affair—I repeat, a personal affair—without any intervention from my mother or the Egyptian authorities," the statement said.

"After long patience, I found that I must separate from my husband... I have been obliged to leave my son, infant Fuad II whom I adore, making a great sacrifice which I hope God will give me courage to bear."

"I hope to return to Egypt as soon as possible to find comfort and tranquility."

Her trip home will be the first since she went into exile in Italy with Farouk last July.

TONIGHT is Red Cross night in Prince Rupert. As canvassers spread through the city to ask for the support which will enable the Red Cross to carry on its work of mercy, it is pertinent to remember they are helping to further an idea which was conceived in suffering.

One day 94 years ago a young Swiss, Henri Dunant, was a neutral spectator at the terrible Battle of Solferino in Italy. At the day's end, the battleground was littered with some 40,000 dead and wounded victims of the conflict.

Horrified by the suffering of the unattended men, Dunant organized groups of volunteers to serve them, bought supplies for their use, and worked personally as attendant and nurse.

Still haunted by the memory three years later, Dunant published a pamphlet proposing that in every country voluntary aid societies be formed to render aid to the victims of war or peacetime disaster.

This was the birth of the Red Cross. The proposal was accepted by representatives of 12 nations meeting at Geneva. In honor of Dunant's nationality, a red cross on a white background—the Swiss flag with colors reversed—was chosen as the symbol of the new movement.

It is timely to recall this history because to this day the Red Cross, now appealing for help, has faithfully and courageously adhered to the precepts on which it was founded. The mercies which Dunant performed at Solferino are being repeated in Korea and at other scenes where death awaits.

In a world of hazards and adversities, the hand of the Red Cross is proffered to heal and guide. Disregarding all other reasons why we should support the Red Cross, we are left with the single implacable one that it is an organization we cannot do without.

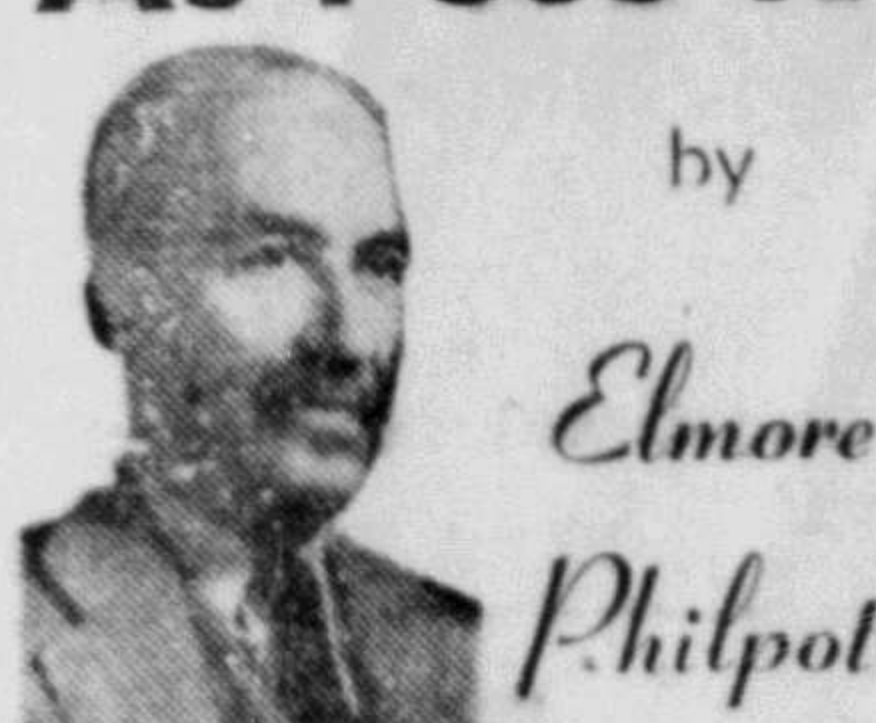

Money for Old Vets

I HAVE a rather anguished letter from the executors of the estate of the late Walter L. Payne who left a good sized chunk of money to certain needy veterans.

They say they are being deluged with letters from all sorts of people who have received badly garbled versions of how much money there is, and who is entitled to how much of it.

They say that a lot of people are bound to be sadly disappointed because some press and radio reports (not mine) gave people the wrong ideas. Old vets of the Boer war are sending in medals and faded discharge certificates. Lawyers have written for clients. There are even applications from war widows, and believe it or not, from Ex-WAACS of the second world war, who are now married!

HERE IS the latest information

as supplied by Eric H. Gilmer. The fund is for NEEDY (and only for NEEDY) ex-Imperialists who served in the British forces before 1915. It is also limited to men who served at or near the old "shilling per day" rate—that is in the ranks. Nobody who has received a pension or similar financial help through the Canadian government is eligible.

If all these conditions are met, applicants may receive grants up to \$250 per person. But each application will have to be passed by proper authorities.

THE EXECUTORS point out that the will of the man who left the money (Walter L. Payne) is still before the courts for final interpretation. They do not want a large number of old vets and their families and friends to get all worked up, only to be disappointed. They say they will do their level best to see that the terms of the will are carried out.

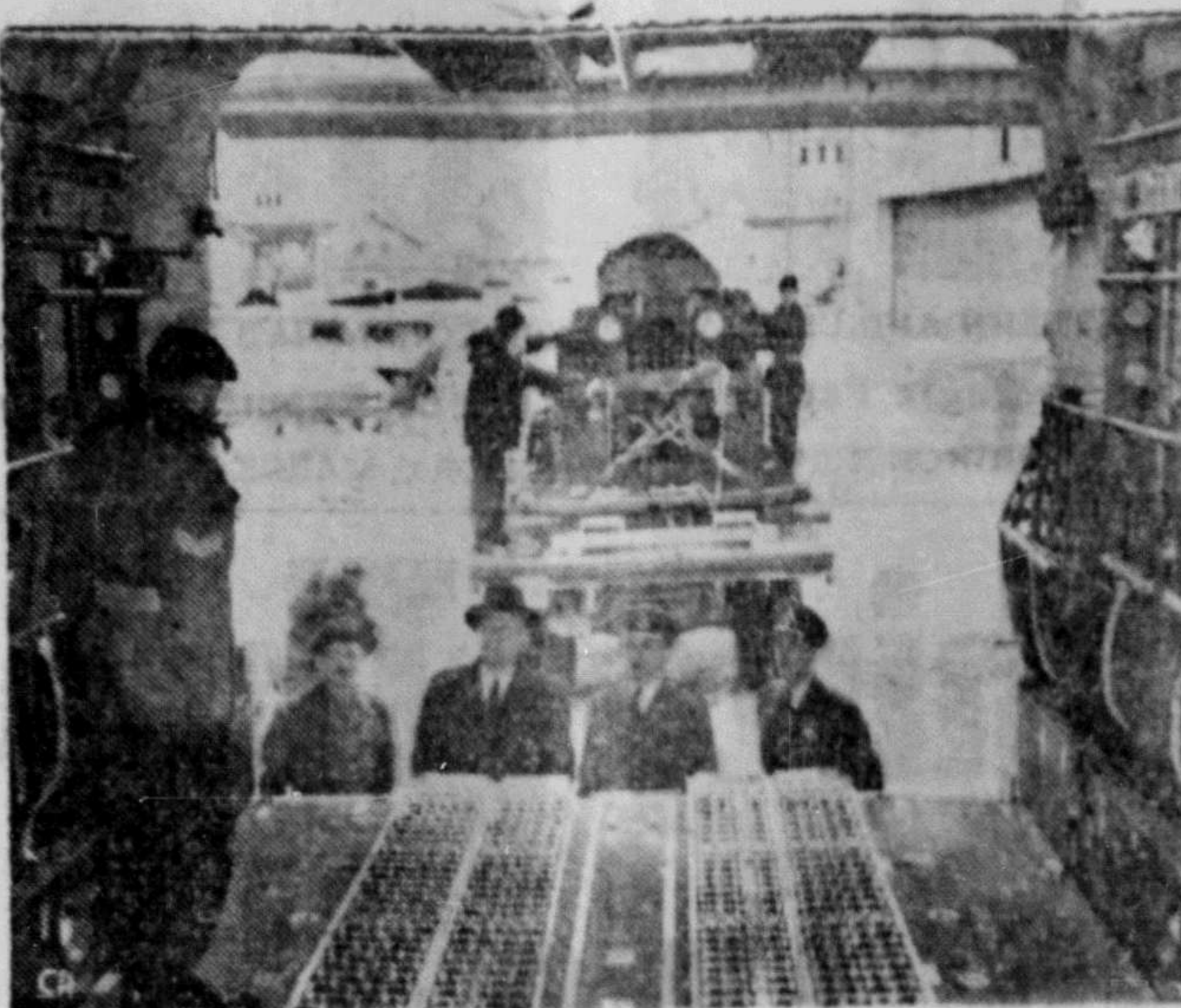
COME TO think of it, what a downright shame that any person should have to leave any money to help out "needy" old Imperial veterans—or for that matter needy older people of any kind.

We in Canada have made great strides toward setting up a really good old age security system. The universal pension plan, at age 70, was a good beginning.

Mark my words, it won't be too long now till we get what is now the \$40 at 70 scheme down to \$60 at 60. It is ridiculous to say where is the money coming from? It will come from exactly the same place that the \$40 at 70 comes from—namely from ourselves. Pension plans are simply universal, compulsory savings plans, put on a systematic national basis.

I THINK fairly highly of the present government at Ottawa. They are as good a federal lot as I remember, and when I compare them with governments in other countries—or even in some provinces (enough said) the Ottawa Liberals look not too bad.

But I would have a hard time forgiving them unless at this session they amend the WVA act to ease the lid on extra earnings for old vets trying to stay alive.

OTTAWA DIARY By NORMAN M. MacLEOD

The Prime Minister is painfully disappointed with the present session of Parliament. Characteristically, he is taking no pains to conceal his displeasure from his own political followers.

Behind the closed doors of the Liberal caucus Mr. St. Laurent has indicated plainly that he doesn't want to hold another session of Parliament as it is now constituted. Instead, he wants to hold a general election this fall so that the House which he will meet next time Parliament assemblies will be a new one.

His attitude is more than a little disconcerting to the Liberal MPs. These gentlemen were beginning to wonder if it wouldn't be possible to trade in their now disappointed hopes for an election this spring for an assurance of an election in the spring of 1954. So far Mr. St. Laurent has turned thumbs down on the proposition.

PARLIAMENT'S FAILURE

The Prime Minister's indictment of the present session is its failure in his eyes to recognize the importance of the Coronation as the outstanding event of the year. His own evaluation of the occasion is that its symbolic significance is so great that no event should be allowed to compete with it in public interest. It was mainly on these grounds that he ruled out a general election this spring. He believed that no diversionary interest should be allowed to compete for the public spotlight while it was focussed on the Coronation scene.

It followed logically that Mr. St. Laurent expected the present session to share his views to the point of transacting its business expeditiously and progressing early in April. That would leave the government time to complete its own Coronation arrangements comfortably and without any pressure of last-minute rush. But the Commons has failed notably to rise to the Prime Minister's level of urgency in respect to the Coronation. Instead, it has dragged its business even more slowly than is its normal custom. The prospect now is that prorogation, if it does come before the Coronation, will win the race only by the narrowest of margins.

The result is that Mr. St. Laurent is just plain disgrusted. His followers now would like the election to go over to 1954 so that another sunshine budget

Ancient Coach Parked in Banff Garage

CALGARY — Earl Gammon has a coach parked in his garage at Banff that's more than an heirloom. Its value has been estimated at \$25,000.

This is the coach that carried the Prince of Wales—later Edward VII—from Picton to Truro, N.S., in 1860. Many years later it carried Queen Elizabeth, then Princess Elizabeth, and the Duke of Edinburgh at the Calgary Stampede grounds.

At the time of King Edward's visit the coach had been put on the Pictou-Truro run by an American named Hiram Hyde. Earl Gammon's father, William, bought it from Hyde for his stage-coach line from Pictou to Amherst.

When the railway put the stagecoach line out of business in 1890 the elder Gammon arranged to have the old coach preserved. It was placed in a museum before it was shipped out west.

Gammon has always shown the coach in public at Banff with two horses, but it was designed for a team of four. Gammon says he has to get along with two because he can't find anyone who can properly drive a four-horse team.

Citizens Urged to Take More Interest in CBC

Assuming the role of a "corporation trustee talking to the shareholders," Gilmour Clark of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation last night urged citizens to show more interest, favorable or otherwise, in the national radio system which they own.

Address to members of the Canadian Club, Mr. Clark recalled the CBC was established in 1936 and the "retelling" of the CBC and the role of its listeners. He expressed his intention to confuse the operation with the principle of the CBC, he said, "it is based," he cautioned, "on the fact that you do not like the public ownership, write me if you do not like the CBC, write me."

Fishermen's Union Seeks Probe of Industry in B.C.

VANCOUVER (CP)—The United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union (UFAWU) will seek a royal commission investigation into all aspects of the B.C. fishing industry.

A resolution asking the federal government to launch the commission was endorsed at the ninth annual UFAWU convention here.

The resolution said the investigation should include the problems of overcrowding of fishing grounds, compensation coverage, unemployment insurance for fishermen, provision of adequate coast guard service, and improvement of navigational aids and anchorage.

The convention also decided to hold elections by ballot and George North, press officer, says a two-way fight for each of the three top posts has developed.

He said that the positions of president, business agent and secretary will be contested in a secret ballot to get under way shortly.

It is the first time the union has conducted a universal ballot in election of officers. Previously all officers were elected by delegates at the annual convention.

The union's policy during 1952 price negotiations which led to two strikes in the salmon fishery and closure of the fall herring season is believed to be a major cause for the placing of Kurt Larsen, Vancouver local to oppose the present leader.

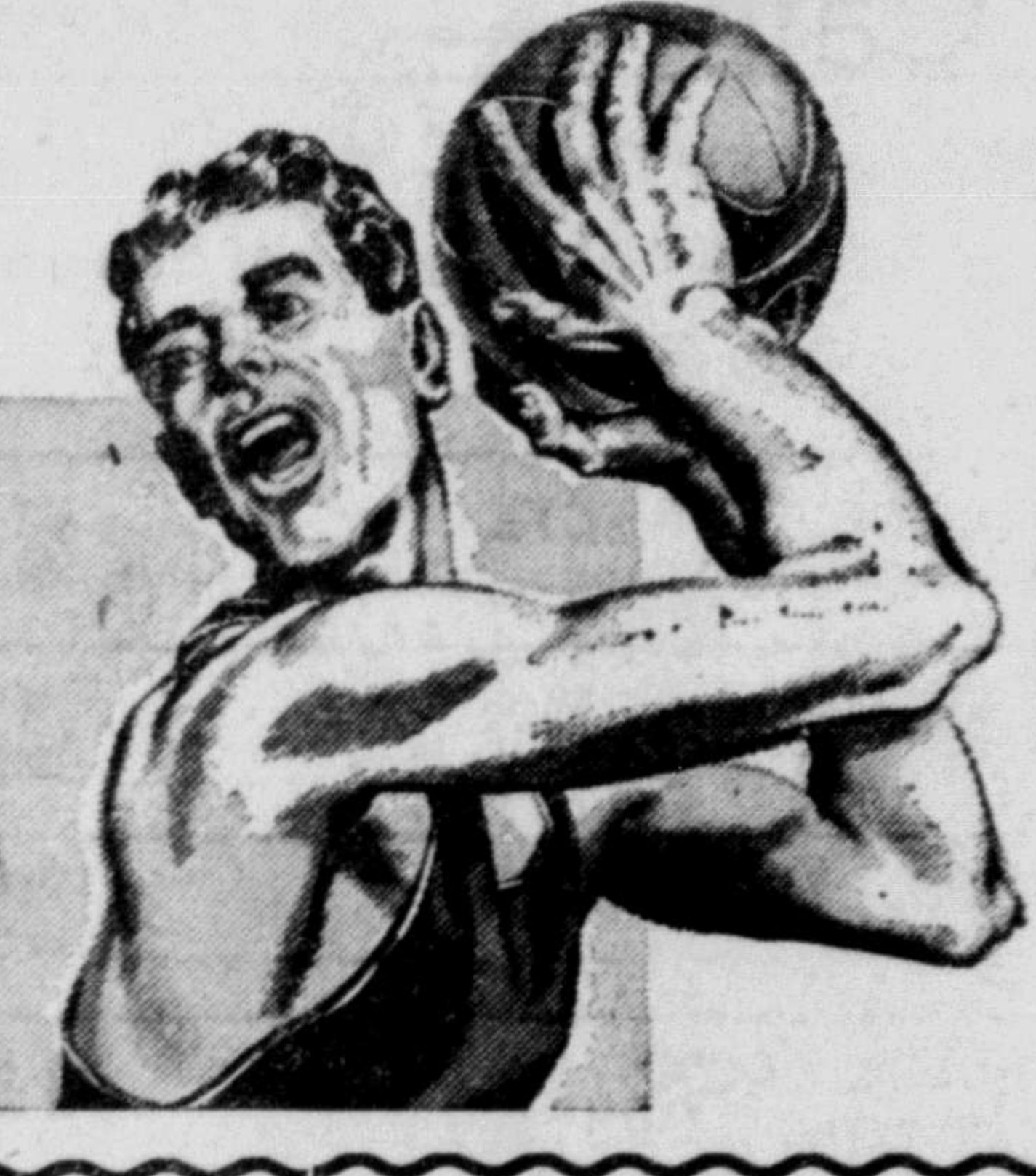

G. R. Brett was elected president of the Kaien Consumers Credit Union at the annual meeting.

Other officers of the board of directors are Fred Grimble, vice-president; Charlie Bellis, Walter Lahti, Jack Marchant, R. E. Edwards, G. E. Hills.

J. F. Williams was named treasurer-manager.

Supervisory committee consists of George Viereck, chairman; Angelo Astoria and Scott McLaren.

Credit committee is headed by Don Forward with W. H. Brett, Robert Rudderham, Alice Ritchie, Eric Faure, R. H. Davidson and Eileen Wright.

A two-per cent dividend to be paid to more than 450 members on share savings totalling \$110,949.56 was approved by the meeting. Other board recommendations accepted were:

- That five per cent of the interest paid on personal loans be returned to the borrower as a patronage refund and the balance to be returned to a reserve fund.

- That no patronage be refunded for less than \$1 and that all such interest, dividends and refunds to be placed to the credit of the members' share accounts. Interest on deposits is set at 1 1/2 per cent based on the lowest quarterly balance.

- Interest on loans under \$300 will be increased from six to 12 per cent annually but will remain at six per cent on higher loans, following a recommendation from the members.

Total assets of the Credit Union stand at \$155,964.92 at the end of its eighth year of operation, an increase of \$37,348 and 94 members in 1952, it was reported.

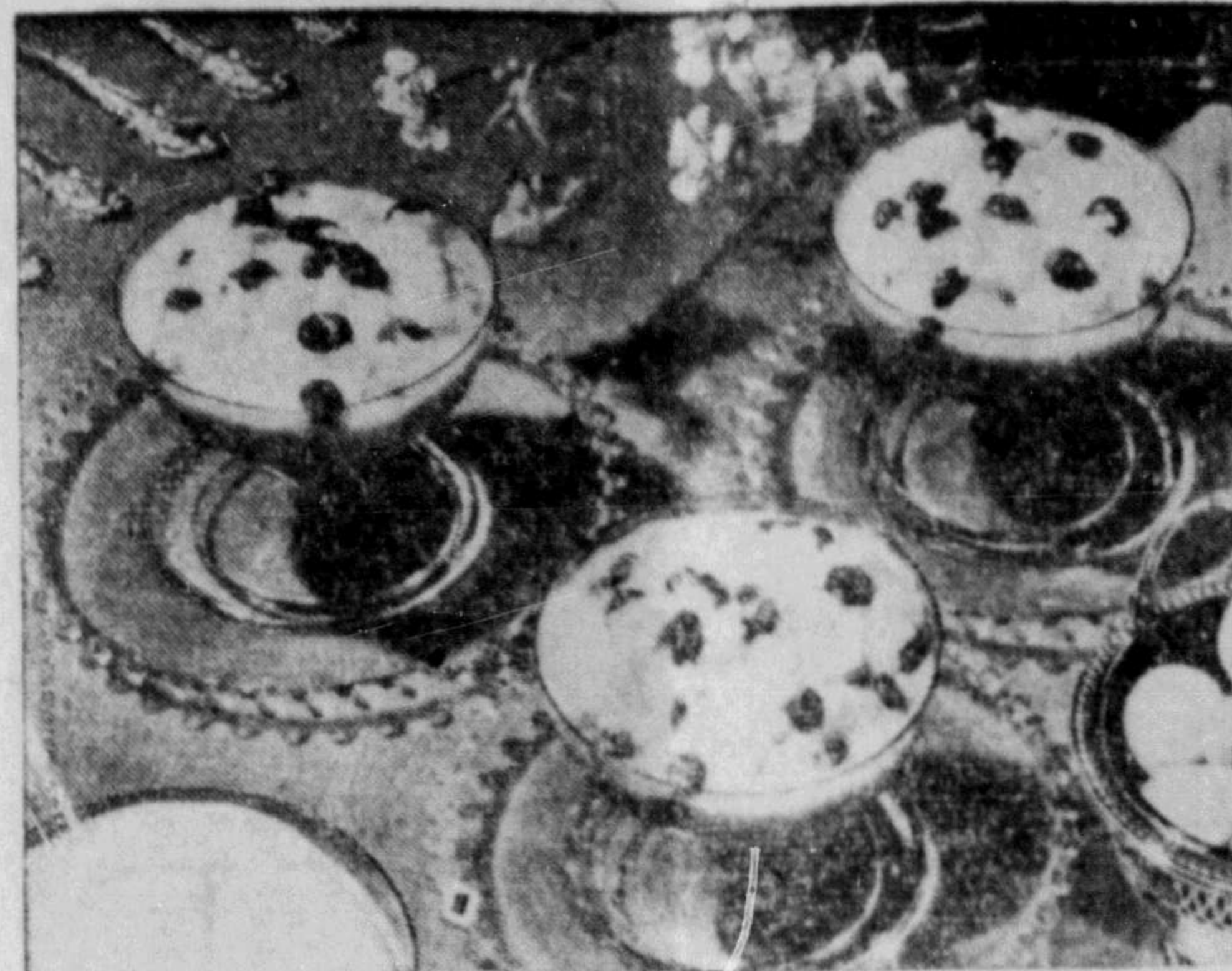
Loans totalling \$98,773.31 were issued to 169 members during the year.

Executive members expressed regret at the small attendance at the meeting.

Bid For Japan's Friendship Made by Communist China

TOKYO (Reuters)—Communist China has made a bid for Japan's friendship in the midst of a crisis within Premier Shigeru Yoshida's Liberal party.

Peiping radio broadcast the text of a letter from the Chinese Communist party to Japan's Communist party. It said:

"The Chinese people, who understand the present, painful and difficult situation of the Japanese people, fervently support the Japanese people's struggle for independence, democracy and peace."

"Peaceful and friendly relations between the Chinese and Japanese people is not only beneficial to the two countries, but is also of importance for the defence of peace in Asia and in the whole world."

The letter promised Chinese co-operation in the repatriation of 30,000 Japanese citizens

stranded on China's mainland since the war. Red Cross societies in Japan and China now are arranging repatriation.

Peiping's "peace" bid came just two days after the collapse of Yoshida's government which has advocated a solid pro-Western foreign policy since it first took office in 1948.

The split in Yoshida's Liberal party, which brought his government's downfall, has since widened. Fifteen more party rebels on Monday joined the splinter group headed by Ichiro Hatoyama, an old-style rightist politician who was purged in the early occupation days.

Hatoyama's dissidents now include 34 deputies of the Diet, lower house of Parliament, but he is believed to have many more followers who have not yet bolted.

The 74-year-old premier claims a parliamentary strength now of 207 seats. He needs 233 for an absolute majority.

Rather than accept a coalition, Yoshida dissolved Parliament and called a general election for April 19, only seven months after the last general election.

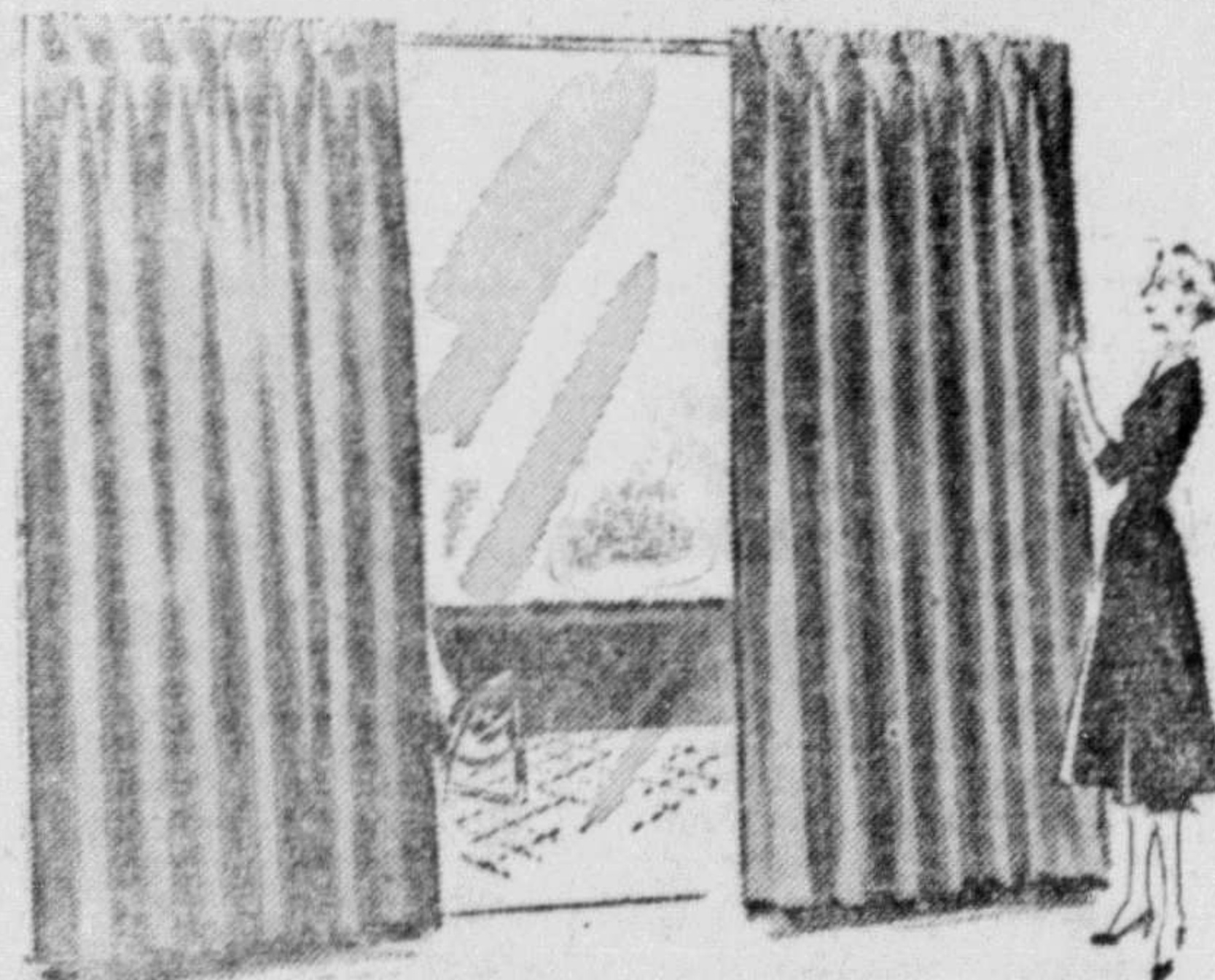

Edison to be Remembered At Vienna Celebrations

VIENNA, Ont. (CP)—The great inventor, Thomas Alva Edison, and his grandfather Sam will be remembered this summer when residents observe the town's cen-

tenary. It was named by Sam Edison who preferred Vienna to Shrewsbury, the original name.

Celebrations will be held, probably in August, and one of its features may be a parade along the route Sam and barefooted Tom walked on fine summer days.

Three cousins, Mrs. J. P. Coombe, Mrs. E. E. Jackson and Clara Edison, say that if Thomas Edison's father, John Edison, had not taken part in the Mackenzie Rebellion, the inventor might have been born a Canadian. John Edison fled across the border and Tom was born at Milan, Ohio, in 1847.

As a youth, Tom spent many summers in Vienna with his grandfather and his cousins tell of his learning to swim in a local creek. A shed on his grandfather's property became one of Tom's first laboratories, and he carried out some of his first experiments there.

Sam Edison, who died at 103, set out to change the name of the place from Shrewsbury to Vienna. There is apparently no explanation for his choosing the name Vienna, but what villagers have called his "iron will" won the day.

Vienna, centre of a tobacco production area about 20 miles east of St. Thomas, would have

Excessive Advertising Noted on Aussie Radio

SYDNEY, Australia (CP)—Australia's Broadcasting Control Board, a government watchdog over commercial radio programs and technical standards, says there is a trend here toward excessive advertising.

In its current report the board said there have been frequent complaints that advertising methods on radio are a source of irritation to listeners, and if not controlled could reduce commercial radio's value as an advertising medium.

The report noted that some station licences had been renewed subject to limitations on the length and number of advertisements.

The report said that in the year ending June 1952, advertisers paid about £3,600,000 to commercial stations, from which the stations made a total profit of £515,000. Australians had about 2,500,000 radio sets, or nearly one to every three per-

sons. Discussing programs, the report criticized "the lack of originality in the approach of many stations to development of new programs and a tendency to imitate, frequently without great success, a new idea introduced by a competitor." Examples were the many quiz sessions, the extension of the practice of giveaway prizes and the number of "thriller" sessions, whose desirability the board sometimes had occasion to question.

There had also been complaints that too many stations at the same time were broadcasting.

The ABC says that a third program is necessary because during federal parliament sessions one of its two networks has to broadcast proceedings and it was not possible to cater for different tastes with only one alternative network.

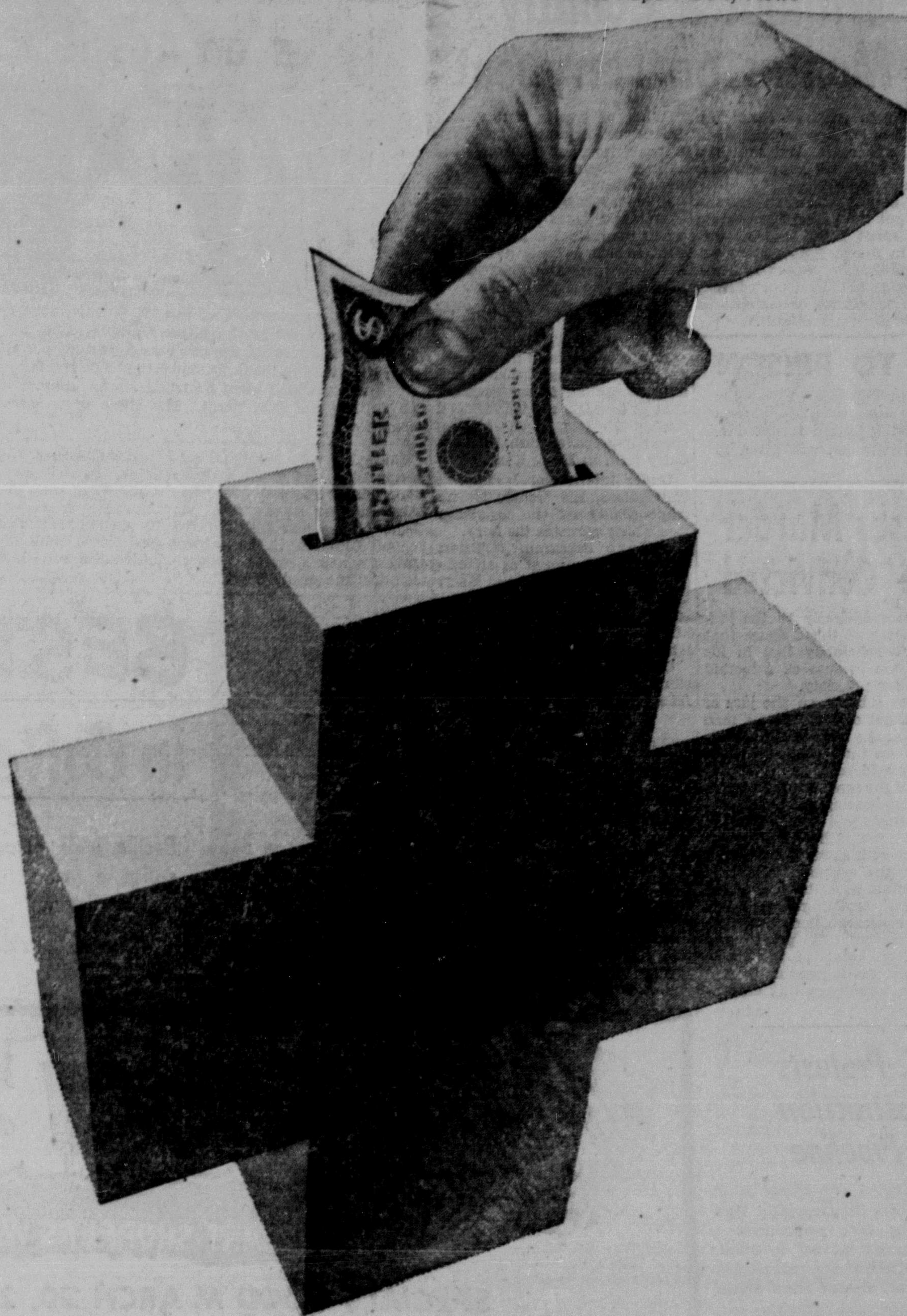

Penniless Man Without a Country Completes Six Months on Ferryboat

HONG KONG (Reuters)—Michael Patrick O'Brien, the man without a country, has completed six months of boredom as a prisoner of international red tape.

O'Brien has spent the last half-year shuttling endlessly between Hong Kong and Macau aboard the ferry Lee Hong.

Since he has no citizenship papers, he has been refused per-

mission to land at either the British or Portuguese ports along the China coast. And since the ferry doesn't call anywhere else, he can't get off.

He claims American citizenship, but the United States state department holds that he was born in Hungary, never took out U.S. citizenship papers and was once ordered to be deported from the U.S. because of convictions for burglary and assault.

What he wants is to get to Brazil or Argentina, but his appeals to the International Refugee Organization have so far been in vain.

O'Brien has been in the public eye several times since Sept. 13, when he made his first trip on the Lee Hong. Today he said he is discouraged and disillusioned and wants no more publicity.

He recently described his life as "100 per cent worse than prison life." At 47, his digestive system has begun to trouble him and he complains that he is unable to get sufficient exercise, though he walks around the deck mainly. He has begun ordering specially-prepared dishes from a dairy farm in Hong Kong.

Under international shipping conventions, his welfare is the responsibility of the steamship line which operates the ferry.

Before September, O'Brien worked in Shanghai as an engineer. He has a wife and a son there. He left Shanghai and stowed away aboard the ferry in Macau to seek work in this British colony.

O'Brien is penniless, but occasionally receives donations from friends and sympathizers.

MUTINEERS SENT TO PRISON

COPENHAGEN (Reuters)—Six Danish soldiers who mutinied last month against extension of military conscription from 12 to 18 months have been sentenced to prison terms. Pte. Johannes Andersen, named as the ringleader, was given 10 months, the longest sentence.

Man Who Confesses Murder Can, by Law, be Convicted

OTTAWA (C)—A man who confesses to murder can be convicted on that confession alone, the Supreme Court of Canada has ruled.

There is no law, it added, which says that a jury must be cautioned by the judge of the "danger" of convicting solely on the basis of the confession when there is no corroborating evidence.

It made the ruling in a six-to-one majority judgment rejecting the appeal of James Kelsey, 29, of Welland, Ont., sentenced to be hanged April 14 for the slaying of a Welland taxi-driver, Sam Delibashich.

The taxi-driver's body, stabbed and beaten, was found Dec. 17, 1949, on a lonely road near Welland. His empty cab was found in Toronto. Kelsey was picked up two years later when a friend to whom he allegedly confessed the crime tipped police.

Kelsey, in a written confession to police which he later retracted, involved his brother, Lloyd, in the crime. Lloyd Kelsey was tried and acquitted but James Kelsey was convicted.

James Maloney of Toronto, defence counsel, appealed to Canada's highest court on the grounds that the trial judge erred in law on two points:

● He allegedly failed to em-

phasize sufficiently to the jury the theory of the defence that Kelsey deliberately lied in his confession because of a morbid desire for notoriety.

● He didn't warn the jury of the danger of convicting a man solely on the basis of his confession when there was no corroborating evidence.

Six of the seven Supreme Court benchers hearing the appeal decided there was nothing in the evidence which showed any great conflict with Kelsey's admission. As for the argument the trial judge must warn the jury of the danger of convicting a man solely on his confession, "no authorities or precedents in point were quoted on behalf of the appellant, nor was it possible to find anyone to support this contention."

B.C. Protests Construction Of Pipeline

VICTORIA (C)—Mines Minister Robert Sommers said Tuesday the B.C. government is "preparing a protest" to Ottawa in an effort to stop construction of the oil pipeline from Sumas, B.C., to Ferndale, Wash.

Mr. Sommers said he was referring to the proposed spur line that will branch off Trans-Mountain Oil Company pipeline from Edmonton to Vancouver. A \$35,000,000 refinery is to be built at Ferndale.

Mr. Sommers said the provincial government can do nothing directly to stop construction of the spur line. The matter comes within the jurisdiction of the federal transport department.

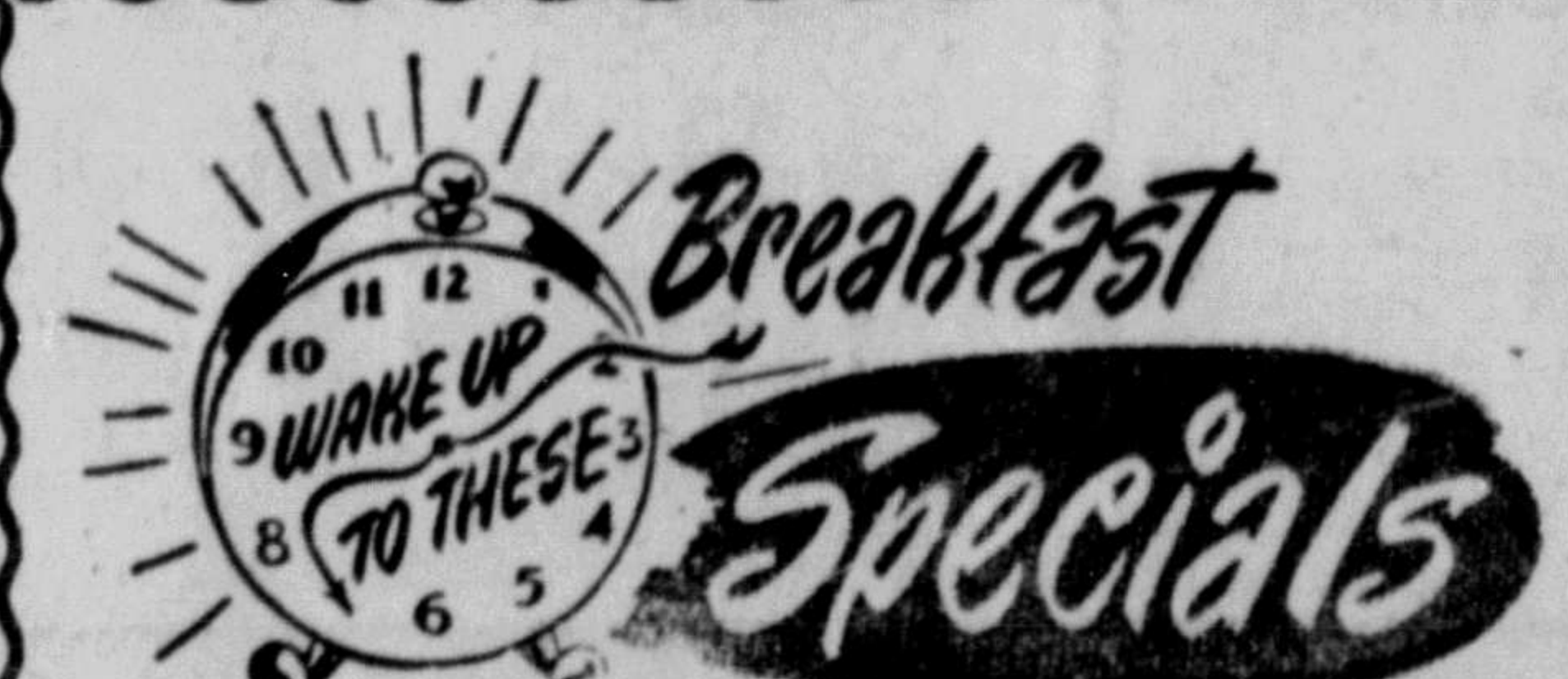
