

OTTAWA (P)--Commons voted 170-3 today to give approval to legislation providing pensions up to \$3,000 annual maximum for long service members of the House.

Under the bill, a member can qualify for a pension after being elected to Commons three times and serving at least 17 sessions in this contributory plan. Members of the government would be contributing to the pension fund.



A new parking and traffic bylaw is soon to be passed by city council and when it is in force, a few new rules will apply to the driver. One of them is slowing down or stopping at intersections for pedestrian traffic. It is a good time now to practice, so when the new law is passed, it will not be such a hardship to obey it.

Mutual courtesy between drivers would cut down traffic accidents. Give the other fellow a break.

Another plea that might be made to motorists, with special emphasis to those driving on our highway, is to keep the highways clean. The roadside from here to Port Edward is littered with trash. It is trimmed with bottles and cans and paper and boxes.

But if we were a little careful and cautious, it would go a long way toward maintaining cleanliness along the highways.

The exercise was designed to test men and standard military equipment in country where temperatures drop to 65 below zero at times. It also sized up the chances of utilizing the Arctic snow cap for potential military bases.

About 150 Canadian and U.S. soldiers from engineering units! wint to work last January at Kluane Lake, about 125 air miles west of Whitehorse, Y.T.


