Jurist Gives Three-Year Term To Robinson For Wife's Death

Sentences Wind Up Spring Assize Cases

A three-year prison term was imposed yesterday by Mr. Justice J. M. Coady on 31-year-old Charles Robinson, convicted of manslaughter by an assize court jury last Thursday.

Robinson was found guilty in the death of his common-law wife following a drinking party last February 12. Crown charged that Robinson pushed Violet Sampare down a flight of stairs, her fall inflicting injuries that caused her death.

The sentences came at the end of the spring criminal assizes, which opened here April 12, tried three manslaughter cases and one of indecent assault.

Logger Acquitted

On Wednesday, 28-year-old logger Anton Wolosuk of Houston was acquitted of a manslaughter charge on direction from the bench on grounds that the evidence did not warrant a conviction.

A fourth manslaughter charge on the docket—against George Robertson of Terrace—was granted a stay of proceedings, on request of Crown Prosecutor T. W. Brown, Q.C. Robertson had been charged in connection with a car crash last Labor Day in which Glen Jackson was fatally injured.

Fined \$300

Lack of a police record and a good reputation worked in the favor of Sylvester William of Moricetown who was fined \$300 after conviction of reckless driving. His licence to drive was revoked for one year.

William had been tried of manslaughter in connection with the death of his sister-in-law Cecilia Holland after a truck he was driving left the road last March 8.

Defence Counsel Lawrence Perry asked for leniency for William, saying he had personally known accused for two years and could report a high reputation of him. He asked for a fine instead of prison sentence as accused had a large family to support.

Mr. Justice Coady said he was taking these factors into consideration in issuing the sentence.

No Verdict

A 12-man jury was unable to reach a verdict in the case in which Mervyn Edward Schultz, 33-year-old carpenter, was accused of assaulting a two-year-old girl in Kamano last New Year's Day.

Mr. Justice Coady ordered a new trial for Schultz, date of which has been tentatively set for Oct. 4. Unable to provide \$5,000 bail, accused was scheduled to leave for Oakalla prison farm today.

Boys, Girls Stage Show To Aid Fund

A group of happy and healthy Prince Rupert youngsters, thoughtful of not so fortunate children, staged a miniature carnival yesterday afternoon and raised a total of \$8.26 for the B.C. Kinsmen's Polio Fund.

The 12 boys and girls from the Graham and Atlin Avenue area, all under 11 years of age, conceived the idea and planned and produced the carnival themselves, after hearing adults talk of youngsters crippled by polio.

The carnival, staged at the McBride home on Graham Avenue, included songs, recitations and novelty dance numbers in a brief program, plus a mid-way of booths for sale of coffee, cold drinks, candy, popcorn, comics and toys. Adults and older boys and girls of the neighborhood cheered the youngsters on.

Taking part in the program were Anne Harding, Dolyn McMeekin, Dorothy Meighen, Linda Anderson, Karen McBride, Valerie Wicks, Susan Harding, John Marchant and Tom Harding.

The youngsters have turned over the \$8.26 proceeds to the Prince Rupert Kinsmen Club.

CNR and CPR Trains, Ships Get Liquor

VICTORIA (C)—The granting of liquor licences to CPR and CNR trains and steamships in British Columbia was announced today by liquor control board.

Licences for dining room, dining lounges and cocktail bars in the Vancouver area were also announced.

The CPR was awarded 16 cocktail bars and 12 dining room licences for trains. Thirteen cocktail bars and eight dining room licences went to CNR. A total of 19 lounge and dining room licences were issued to CNR and CPR coastal boats.

Dining room licences were granted to 20 restaurants in Vancouver, all in the downtown area. Four hotels and two nightclubs also received new licences for sale of hard liquor.

Second Body Off Tug Found

VANCOUVER (C)—A second body from the Vancouver tug Chelan, which sank last week off the Alaskan panhandle with 14 men aboard, has been recovered by the U.S. coast guard.

The body was identified as that of Brook Haines of Vancouver, chief engineer aboard the ill-fated craft.

Captain E. W. Suffield, marine superintendent of Union Steamships Limited, owners of the Chelan, said the body was found on the beach, about one-half mile from where a lifeboat from the Chelan was found the day after the sinking.

A fishing boat earlier picked up the body of Frank Hykaway, also of Vancouver.

The Chelan sank during a gale off Cape Decision, some 95 miles north of Prince Rupert, April 15.

Chilliwack Vote Set

CHILLIWACK (C)—Voters in Chilliwack will go to the polls early next month in a plebiscite under B.C.'s new liquor law. City Council's request for a vote on extension of liquor outlets was granted this week by the liquor control board. The exact date for the vote has not yet been set.

Vietminh Step Up Attacks

Rebels, French In Mortar Duel

HANOI, (CP)—Viet-Minh divisions battling to break through into the heart of Dien Bien Phu stepped up fire Thursday against weary French union defenders at the north-west corner of the fortress.

Masses of the Communist-led rebels, pressing steadily closer to the French lines, hammered French positions with heavy machine guns and mortars. The guns apparently were mounted smack up against or under the first line of barbed wire barricades surrounding the stronghold.

A French high command spokesman said the rebels had not yet launched any infantry attacks on the corner.

French guns thundered an echoing answer to the Viet-Minh fire. The bastion's defenders also rushed a building of defenses in the long string of winding trenches barring the rebels path to the heart of the fortress. The French poured tons of ammunition and supplies into the shrinking defence lines.

The Viet-Minh now holds trenches on the main Dien Bien Phu air strip and are within grenade-throwing distance of some French positions. Masses of rebel infantry moved into the two northern outposts captured from the French.

As the embattled defenders braced for the next all-out Viet-Minh assault—expected at any time—help was on its way. American C124's carrying French parachute troops were enroute to Indo-China from France.

SEA OF MUD

The task of holding the fortress against expected mass rebel attacks looked more and more as if it would be completely up to the foot soldier. Heavy rainstorms last night turned the Dien Bien Phu plain into a sea of mud, bogging down French armor and forcing cancellation of scheduled air attacks on rebel positions.

Tenders Slated

VICTORIA (C)—Tenders will be called before May 31 for British Columbia's first government-owned toll bridge, at Agassiz in the Fraser Valley.

The giant span will provide a cement and steel link across the Fraser between Rosedale, near Chilliwack, on the south bank, and Agassiz on the north shore.

MVD Officer on Mission To Kill Surrenders to West

BONN (Reuters)—A Soviet secret police captain with orders to assassinate an anti-Communist Russian in West Germany with poison bullets has surrendered to the West, American authorities announced today.

The U.S. high commission produced MVD Capt. Nikolai E. Khoklov at an elaborate press conference. Two East Germans, Hans Kukowicz and Kurt Weber, who were also assigned to the assassination mission, were with him.

Khoklov told the press conference he had surrendered because his wife threatened to quit him if he became an assassin.

"It was impossible to stay in the East any longer," he said.

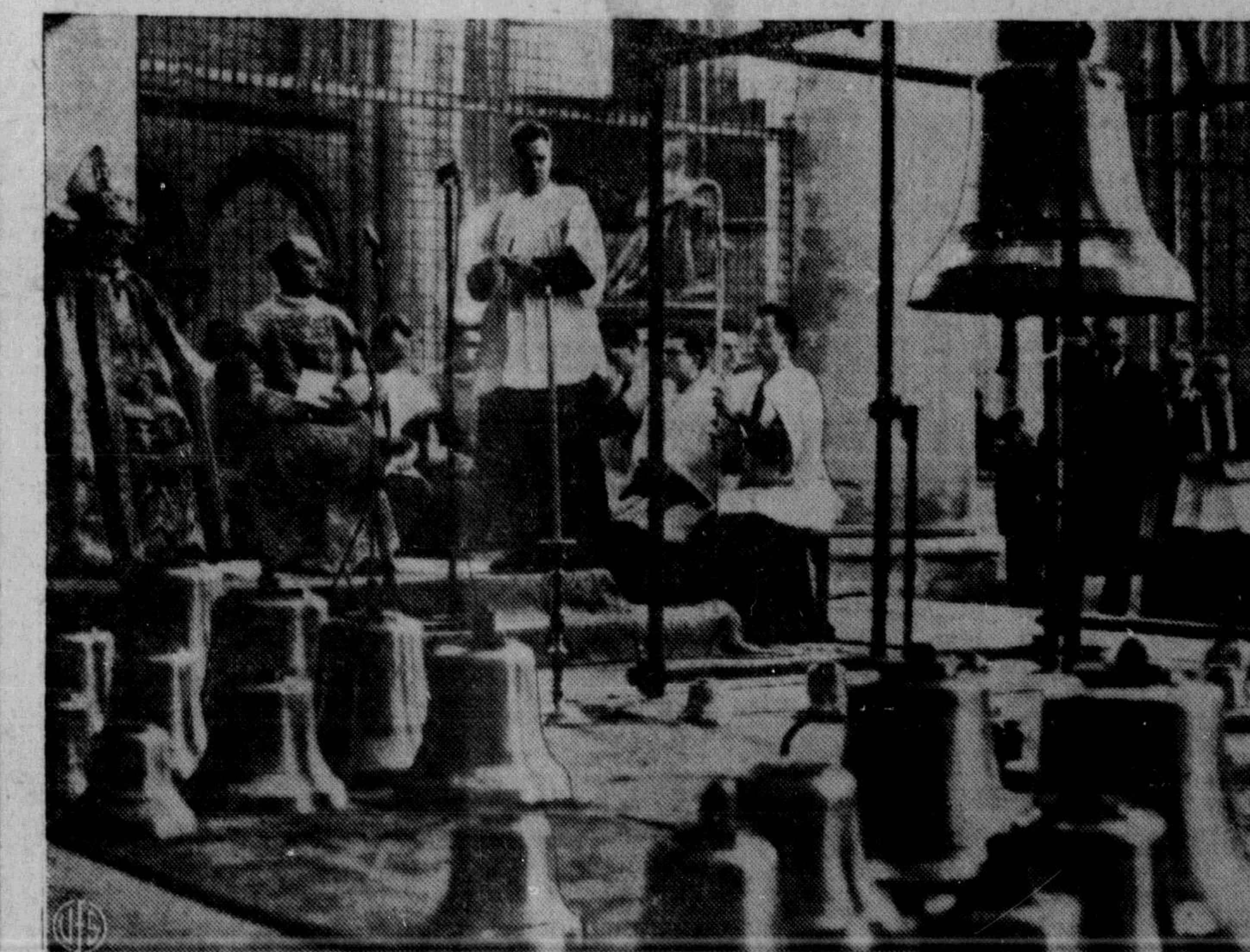
He gave American security officers details about changes in the Soviet secret police (MVD) and Russia after the death of Stalin and the execution last year of Lavrenti Beria, former minister of the interior. His evidence also included details of the assassination of Leon Trotsky in Mexico.

Khoklov said the MVD team sent to Frankfurt to assassinate an anti-Communist Russian named Okolovitch had specially silenced and electrically fired pistols which discharged leaden bullets containing deadly poison. The whole weapon was disguised as a cigarette case.

When the case, which is covered in leather, is opened it shows the ends of 23 cigarettes. Under a false bottom is the firing apparatus and a 1.5-volt battery.

The bullets, shaped in dum-dum fashion to flatten out on impact, contains a mixture of potassium cyanide and soluble rubber. Each dose of cyanide is more than 100 times strong enough to kill.

A U.S. high commission official, J. Macdermott, told the press conference that after surrendering the three men gave a "comprehensive" report on their activities as well as general information on the activities of the MVD—the corps of secret police within the Soviet interior ministry.

Pleasant Dreams

SOMETHING new and sorely needed in passenger travel between Prince Rupert and Jasper has just been added to CNR rolling stock. It is a modern type of sleeping car which promises to eliminate that resigned feeling one used to have in preparing for an overnight trip on this northern line.

Pleasant pastel shades, well cushioned seats and mattresses, up-to-date washing facilities and special springing devices to soften the wheel action should effect a radical change in this formerly uneasy journey.

It is true, of course, that comfortable sleeping quarters alone cannot entirely change things. Until other equipment is improved and some sure way is found to lick a tricky road-bed problem, rail travel through central B.C. will not rate top marks in enjoyment.

But a forward step like this gives reason to hope that others will follow. That dressy looking car with its coat of green, gold and black was obviously not intended to ride out its life in second-rate conditions. Something more is needed, and this country is ready for it.

Monorail For B.C.

A NEW wrinkle in fast transportation over difficult terrain is understood to be under study for this part of B.C. It is the monorail train which is fastened to a single overhead track and rides free of the ground.

This type of transportation is apparently under consideration for providing access to the Grandeur Mines development north of Stewart. Enormous difficulties have been encountered in moving crew and supplies to this mountain-side project and, if the ore findings there are found to warrant full operations, some better means of reaching the mine will have to be devised than landing aircraft on a nearby glacier.

The proposed Frobisher smelter near Taku is another instance where monorail might prove to be the most feasible method of travel.

Although new to North America, the monorail has provided passenger service in Germany since 1900. It is said to be satisfactory there and has had the distinction of eliminating all level-crossing accidents.

OTTAWA DIARY By NORMAN M. MacLEOD

Are low consumer prices for manufactured goods an unmixed economic blessing? Or should they be viewed with a large and healthy element of distrust?

That issue is getting quite a going over these days from some of the more active minds in Parliament. It is being raised mainly by retailers in the large population centres. They say that far too many bargains are being offered to the buying public at the present time to make for healthy economic conditions for anyone — including the people who get the bargains.

Here are a few of the bargains selected at random from Toronto and Montreal stores about which the retailers are complaining:

A well known brand table model TV set designed by its maker to sell at \$259 can be bought in some stores for \$169. Actually costs the dealer \$159. Console set of the same make with a normal price tag of \$439 can be had for \$279. It costs the dealer \$242. A \$64.50 floor polisher, which costs the dealer \$41, marked down by competition to \$43. Electric kettles can be picked up at their cost to the dealer of \$9.25, instead of at the regular price of \$13.50. A \$64.95 food mixer—dealer cost \$41—is being sold for \$43.

In the food chain stores an even greater problem is being faced for the independent retailer. A number of them have adopted the practice of offering minimum merchandise of a miscellaneous character. Such merchandise is sold below actual cost to attract customers into the stores.

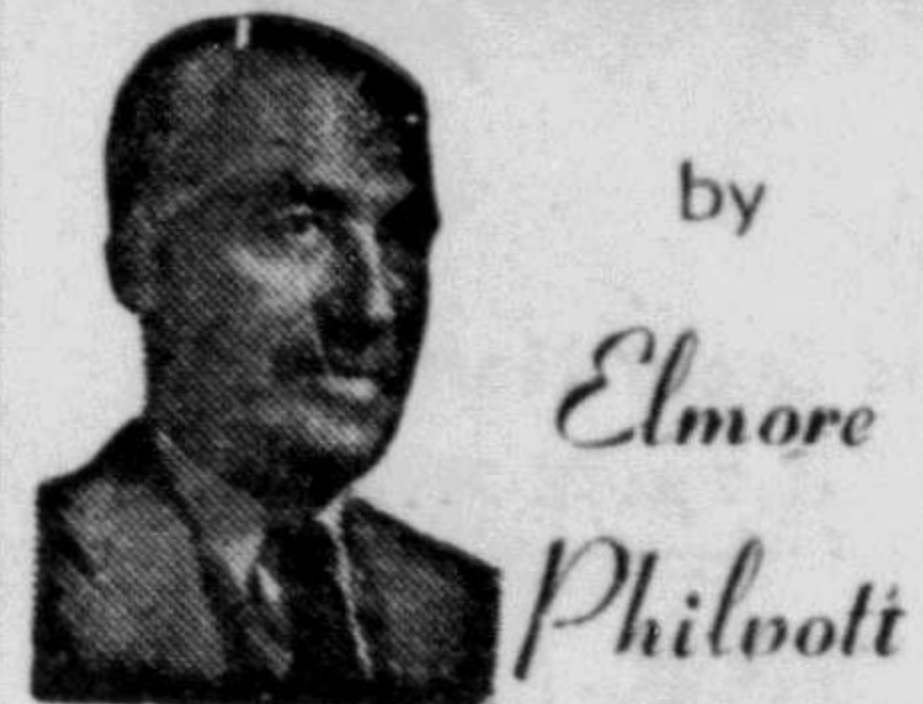

Nixon's New Line

THE statement by U.S. Vice-President Nixon, that American troops might be sent to Indo-China as a "last resort" is heavy laden with historic importance.

To me, it seems to be about the worst of all the bad omens of these tragic times.

For what the U.S. Vice-President said, in effect, was that the U.S. now claims the right to intervene by force in any colonial war in any country where "Communists" are engaged.

IF YOU compare the Nixon doctrine with the earlier Truman declarations you see how far the world has moved toward total war.

Truman promulgated the doctrine that the U.S. had the right to intervene in the internal affairs of key countries, like Greece, where a victory for hostile revolutionary forces would change the balance of world power. But Truman never had to face up to a decision which involved the use of American troops. Greece was, in fact, not kept in the western orbit of power because of the fact that the U.S.A. poured in vast supplies and military advisers to help the anti-Communist government of Greece. The real turning point in the civil war in Greece was the falling out between Yugoslavia and Russia. Yugoslavia's defection from the camp of Moscow-run Communism deprived the "rebels" of their hide-out base and their supply depot.

THERE is no similarity whatsoever between the late war in Korea and the colonial war in Indo-China.

The armies of North Korea committed an open, flagrant and direct aggression. They attacked across a border which was so clearly recognized in advance as one of the world's worst danger spots. The attack was a crystal clear violation of the UN charter.

Had President Truman not accepted the challenge, instantaneously, as he did it is almost certain that the leaders of the world Communist force would have repeated the process all around the borders of China and Russia. Yugoslavia and Germany would have been the final victims, had Korea been allowed to go by default in the test attack.

BUT THE war in Indo-China is not an international war of a kind that comes clearly within the UN charter. Indeed France has always sternly resisted any attempt to have the Indo-China war referred to UN. France has taken the line that this was entirely of her own affair—though she has been glad to accept U.S. financial and economic support for her war in Indo-China.

Now the U.S. says, in effect, to France: We will not stand by and see your forces defeated in Indo-China. But the U.S. also says, in effect: We will not consent to a compromise peace in Indo-China, if in our opinion it endangers the future status of that country.

THE DANGER that I see is this: If the U.S.A. can intervene openly and legally in the civil war in Indo-China so can Red China.

We have come very very close to world war three as a result of the state of world affairs which the Nixon declaration reveals.

LETTERBOX

The Editor,
The Daily News:

I have a faint recollection of having made some remarks about the possibility of the farmers east of Telkwa being able to secure power, providing the line was laid out to catch those only who would be large consumers. This would have to be figured out by some one familiar with this district.

I believe there is a cheap way of damming water at the lake at the head of Deep Creek, and that there are places along the creek where it would be possible to build a dam which would hold a further supply of water. It might pay to investigate the conditions along Deep Creek with a view of securing cheap power.

I have made various remarks before about the need for farmers in the Bulkley valley, and in fact all of this part of B.C. to form a processing and marketing business. I am not aware that my remarks, or the efforts of the C. of C. has produced much result to date. As there are seedling problems to consider, as well as marketing problems, it would seem that some action was demanded at an early date. Owing to the fact that gas has taken over the power question in practically all of farm and transportation requirements of the country we do not have the former market for hay and oats that we had a few years ago. The question then arises as to what is to be done with hay and oats, as well as practically all other farm products.

I believe that we have two problems on our hands instead of merely the one that has been taken for granted in our casual approach to the marketing problem, and I would like to suggest some important matters for consideration at this time. I believe the time has come when these matters should receive serious consideration—not to mention the needed action.

I shall endeavor to make this as short as possible and allow others to use their imaginations to fill in the details. If we go to any of our local stores what do we find? Large quantities of flour, bran and various feeds imported. Even carcasses of beef, hogs, sheep and poultry—not to mention the many articles that are made out of these meats, and produced by these animals. Hams, bacon, lard, bologna, sausage and leather are manufactured articles. While we have a market for milk and butter in excess of our production at present, this valley is capable of supporting many more settlers and handling their produce—if properly made and marketed. The amount of canned milk, butter, cheese and eggs which are imported is very large—and this competes with local production.

These are a few instances of local conditions that should receive prompt investigation. Naturally it would be impossible for

the farmers to handle all of these many kinds of businesses and manufacturing, but every one of them should be put into operation without further delay.

The time is already here and with the possibility of more farmers taking up land it is a must. To ship all our products out to Edmonton or Vancouver requires a high freight, the grading, weighing and price is out of our control. The labor involved and taxes collected goes to other places and then we have to pay the high freight back.

It is either a matter of shipping all these items outside for processing, paying all the costs involved, and paying freight for their return—or doing this business ourselves, and building up our own country for a change. Now don't say that it is impossible to build packing houses, cheese factories, creameries, flour and feed mills, etc. Private enterprise should be glad to start some, or all, of these needed plants. Until we get these we shall not progress much farther than we have today. Then what will our children do for a living? They cannot all get government jobs nor can they keep taking in the neighbor's washing—building houses, etc. Of course there is always the armed forces to absorb our best boys and girls. Now that I have done my part I hope others will carry on from here. I am too old myself.

Take notice that the Liquor Control Board of British Columbia, with the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, has designated the following area as a licensing area for the issuance of licences under the "Government Liquor Act, 1953":—

Licensing Area No. 64.

Description: Village of Stewart.

And further take notice that the Board will receive applications for licences within that area until the 25th day of May, 1954.

And further take notice that the Board will, at a meeting to be held at the Board's office, 525 Fort Street, in the City of Victoria, on the 26th day of May, 1954, commencing at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, proceed to deal with the applications for licences received prior to the 25th day of May, 1954, unless in the meantime:—

- The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Stewart requests the Lieutenant-Governor in Council to submit to a vote of the electors of the polling divisions within the licensing area any or all of the questions hereinafter set out; or
- The Lieutenant-Governor receives a petition in the form prescribed by these regulations or to a like effect signed by thirty-five per centum of the electors of the polling divisions within the licensing area requesting that any or all of the questions hereinafter set out be submitted to a vote of the electors of the polling divisions within the licensing area.

The questions that shall upon request as aforesaid be submitted to a vote of the electors in the licensing area are as follows:—

- Are you in favour of the sale of beer, ale, and stout only under a public-house licence for consumption on licensed premises?
(Note:—A public-house licence will be similar to the present beer-parlour licence.)
- Are you in favour of the sale of beer, ale, stout, and wine only under a dining-room licence for consumption with meals on licensed premises?
(Note:—Dining-room licences will be granted to hotels, restaurants, clubs, railway-cars, steamships, and resorts.)
- Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a dining-lounge licence for consumption with meals on licensed premises?
(Note:—Dining-lounge licences will be issued principally to what are commonly known as cabarets, and to clubs.)

1 tablespoon butter
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup sliced celery
6-8 slices salami
1 20-oz. can oven-baked beans in tomato sauce.

Heat the butter in a frying pan; add the onion and celery and fry, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are tender and golden.

Cut the slices of salami into star shapes; cut the remaining

bits of salami into small pieces. Turn the oven-baked beans into a casserole; add the vegetable mixture and bits of salami and combine lightly.

Cover and bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 20 minutes.

Uncover casserole and arrange stars of salami over the beans; return to oven and bake uncovered about 10 minutes longer.

Garnish with sliced stuffed olives. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

Big Automobile Concern Marks 46th Anniversary

By DAVID J. WILKIE

DETROIT (AP)—Forty-six years ago William C. Durant merged Buick Motor Car Co. and Oldsmobile to create General Motors Co. The company, dealing exclusively in automobiles, earned \$10,000,000 in its first year.

Last year General Motors Corp., its original two divisions grown to nearly two score, did a gross business of more than \$10,000,000,000 and earned more than \$585,000,000.

To most persons General Motors means automobiles. Last year it built approximately 46 per cent of all the motor vehicles produced in the United States. It turned out 3,279,440 Buick, Cadillac, Chevrolet, Oldsmobile and Pontiac cars and Chevrolet and GMC trucks.

But from its numerous other divisions came such things as

ice trays, automatic home heating equipment, clothes dryers, bicycle coaster brakes, electric ironers and dozens of other products.

Employment in GM plants last year averaged 551,095 persons. These workers received \$2,626,302,048 in wages. Hourly-rated workers averaged \$92.27 in weekly pay. The corporation paid \$1,250,000,000 in taxes.

CANADIAN GM FORMED

In 1912 General Motors of Canada was formed. In 1918 Chevrolet joined. The following year Fisher Body was absorbed and the corporation organized Frigidaire Corp.

Today the corporation has 121 plants in 57 communities in 19 states. It has five plants in Canada and manufacturing operations in 17 other countries.

McCarthy Adds Fresh Charges Public Hearings Set To Go

—The swirling controversy row has taken on the day of McCarthy's public hearings a high degree of drama. The Wisconsin Representative's charges of treason and espionage against the Army and Navy Secretary of Defense, G. Adams in trying to get the Senate to investigate the subcommittee McCarthy

Carthy saying that he was seeking to dodge investigation "for misconduct and possibly for law violations." He accused the senator of an "attempted smear... a diversionary move."

GUARANTEES LAW SUIT

Hensel also challenged McCarthy to repeat his accusations in some forum where he would not have the immunity which covered the formal statement to the subcommittee. If McCarthy does that, Hensel said, "I will guarantee a law suit."

McCarthy said "I wouldn't cooperate in any delay like that," and added:

"Hensel knows it would take years to do this in a trial. We will be under oath when the committee hears this case and the witnesses will be under oath. He can call any witnesses he wants to."

"After that's over... I can

see no reason why I shouldn't repeat this stuff... If at some future time he still wants a lawsuit—and I don't think he will—I see no reason why not."

The McCarthy statements said his investigators had established that Hensel drew at least \$56,526 in three war years from a private ship supply firm operating with government priorities. Hensel then was a high navy official.

Hensel replied: "The allegations that there has been anything illegal or even unethical in my financial or governmental history is both malicious and dishonest." Senator McCarthy knew he was lying.

Against this background, the investigations subcommittee agreed on rules for its hearings on the controversy and announced they will start on schedule today. Coverage is planned by major television networks.

The rules adopted by the subcommittee will permit McCarthy and army representatives to engage in direct cross-examination of witnesses. McCarthy had strongly urged the procedure.

McLeod told reporters he could not elaborate on the two cases of suspected espionage.

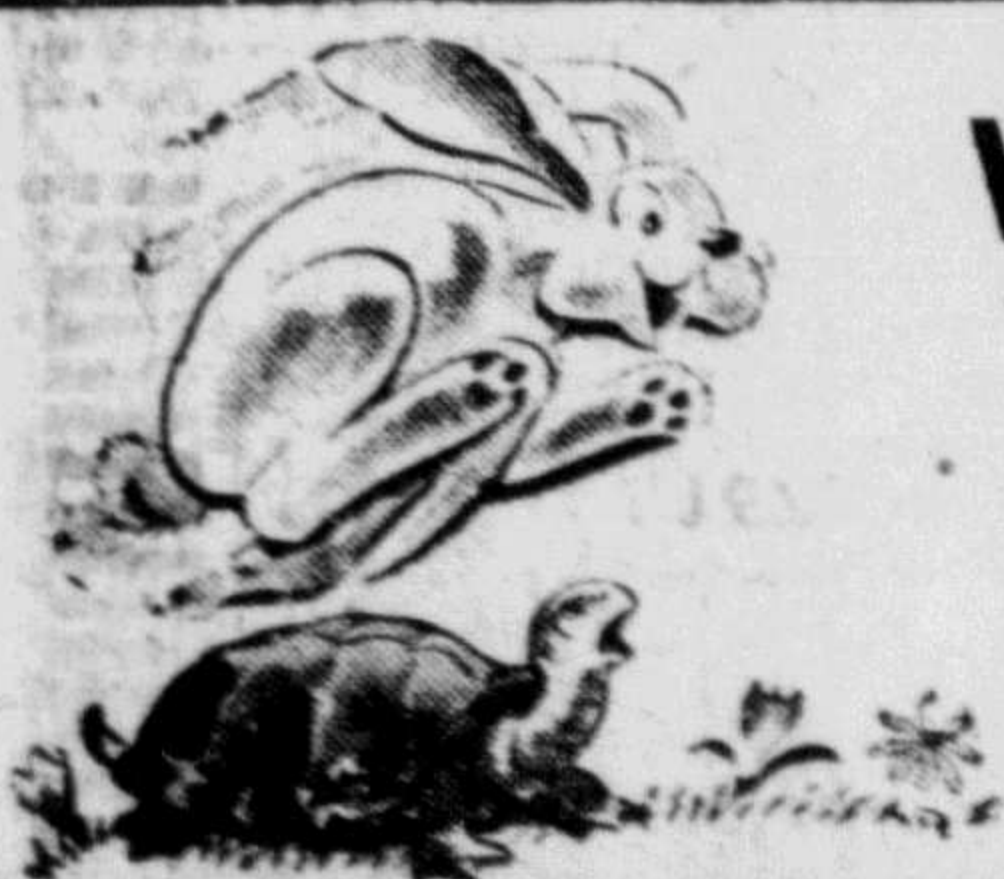

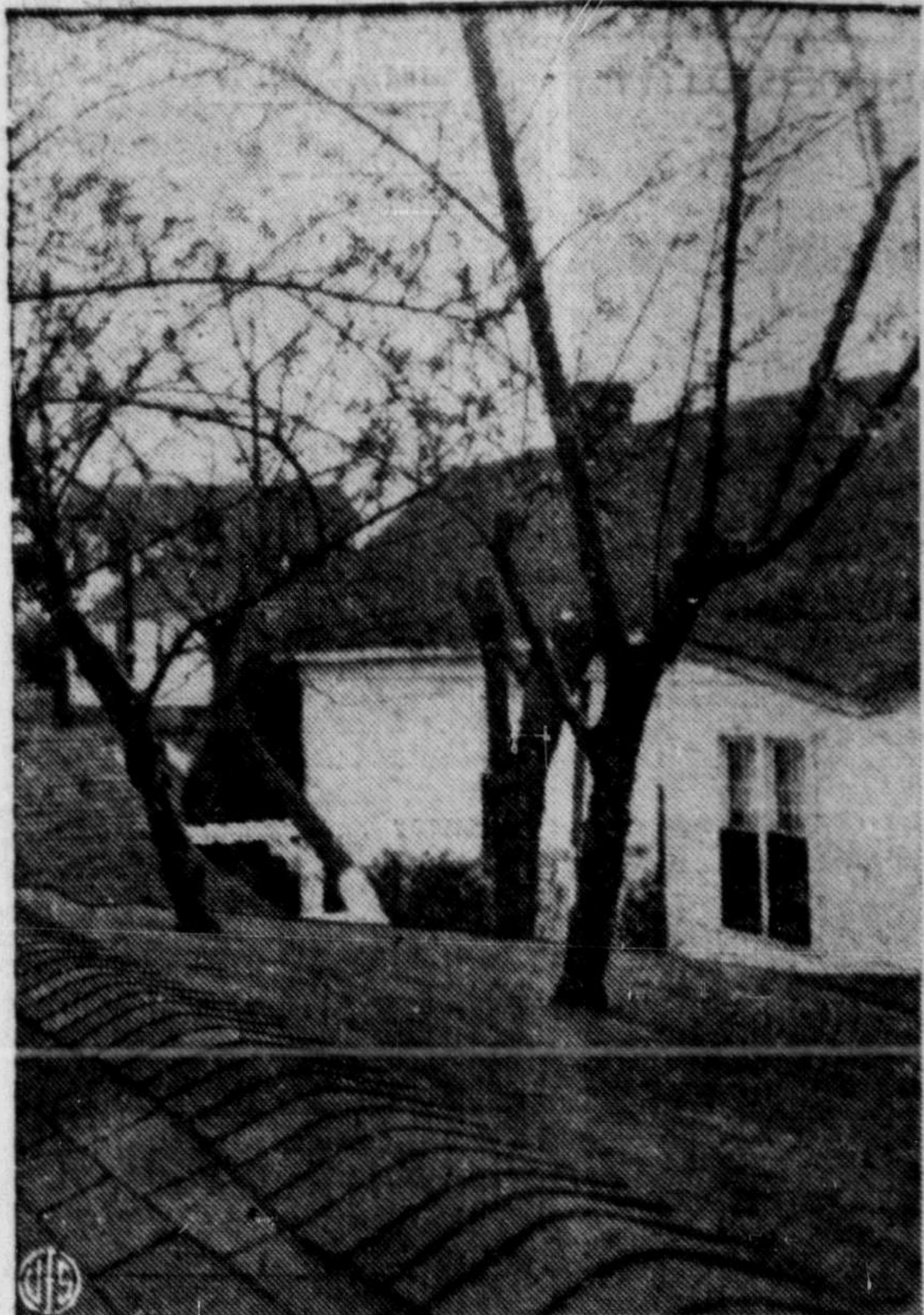

After a hand is played and the contract defeated by a brilliant and imaginative lead, anyone can see the logic of that lead. There is nothing complicated or difficult about it when you can see all 52 cards. You are inclined to say, "How could you lead anything else?"

The trick, of course, is to select the lead before you can see all the cards. This requires not only imagination and logic, but courage. I have a theory that thousands of players who never make a lead like Mr. Masters made today, are capable of doing so.

They fall either because of a sort of mental laziness or because of a mawkish and trance-like hero-worship of "the experts." The fact is, these players are better than they think. Advise them to stop mooning over the exploits of the top players and concentrate their

energies on improving their own capabilities.

In today's hand Mr. Masters led the jack of diamonds. When Mr. Abel saw the dummy he looked very happy. Obviously Mr. Masters had the ace of spades and apparently the only possible losers were a spade, a heart and a club.

He won with the king of diamonds and took the heart finesse. Mr. Masters won and returned the queen of spades.

Many would consider this a sensational lead but not, I think, if they took the trouble to reason as Mr. Masters did. His side could have only one possible winner in clubs, none in diamonds and certainly no more in hearts. Therefore two spade winners were necessary to beat the hand.

Now if Mr. Abel had only two spades, this was hopeless. The only hope was that he had three. The lead of the ace and another spade or the lead of a low spade would be fatal to the defense if Mr. Abel had the jack, three long.

But since the contract could not be beaten unless Mr. Dale held the king of clubs, there was no hurry about winning the made tricks. So Mr. Masters led the queen. Dummy's king won and Mr. Abel picked up the trumps and took the club finesse.

Mr. Dale won and returned a spade. Mr. Masters took the setting tricks.

Delegates to a Trades and Labor Congress meeting in Vancouver said it was deplorable that concession rights to the BEG should go to the United States while the union is attempting to deal with unemployment in B.C.

In a letter of explanation, the BEG committee told the TLC the contract to West Coast concession in San Francisco was awarded after tenders were called.

The letter said the concession company was opening a branch office in Vancouver and would buy Canadian products "if possible."

**British Learn
Packaging
Big Business**

LONDON (AP)—British manufacturers all seem to have awakened to the fact that it pays to package your products.

Packaging today is a \$500,000,000-a-year industry here. One estimate is that the cost amounts to 10 per cent on the average of what the customer pays for the product.

Anxiety about future supplies is felt by manufacturers who use paper and fibre-board. Supplies at present are just about enough to meet the demand. Many box-makers are unable to give immediate delivery.

Traditional materials such as jute are having no trouble in holding their own against newer materials. Dundee, where the Indian and Pakistan fibre is processed into jute cloth and sack- ing, is a boom town.

Timber, mostly imported, has been largely displaced by fibre-board for supplies delivered to retailers. Yet the wooden-box industry hasn't lost ground at all, because of the increased demand for wooden crates to hold exports.

The paper shortage has helped to bring along new synthetics and plastics. Take polythene. About 100 tons of this film-like material was produced last year, mostly for packaging. Production this year is expected to soar. Cellulose film is increasingly popular for packaging confectionery and bakery products.

**\$10,000 Bail
Set in Murder**

NEW WESTMINSTER (AP)—Bail of \$10,000 has been granted in Assize Court for Frederick Butler, 43, charged with murder in connection with the death of James Iverson, 26, following a fracas at Butler's home last Saturday.

Iverson died after being struck on the head with an air gun while allegedly trying to re-enter Butler's suburban Burnaby home after having been ejected during a party.

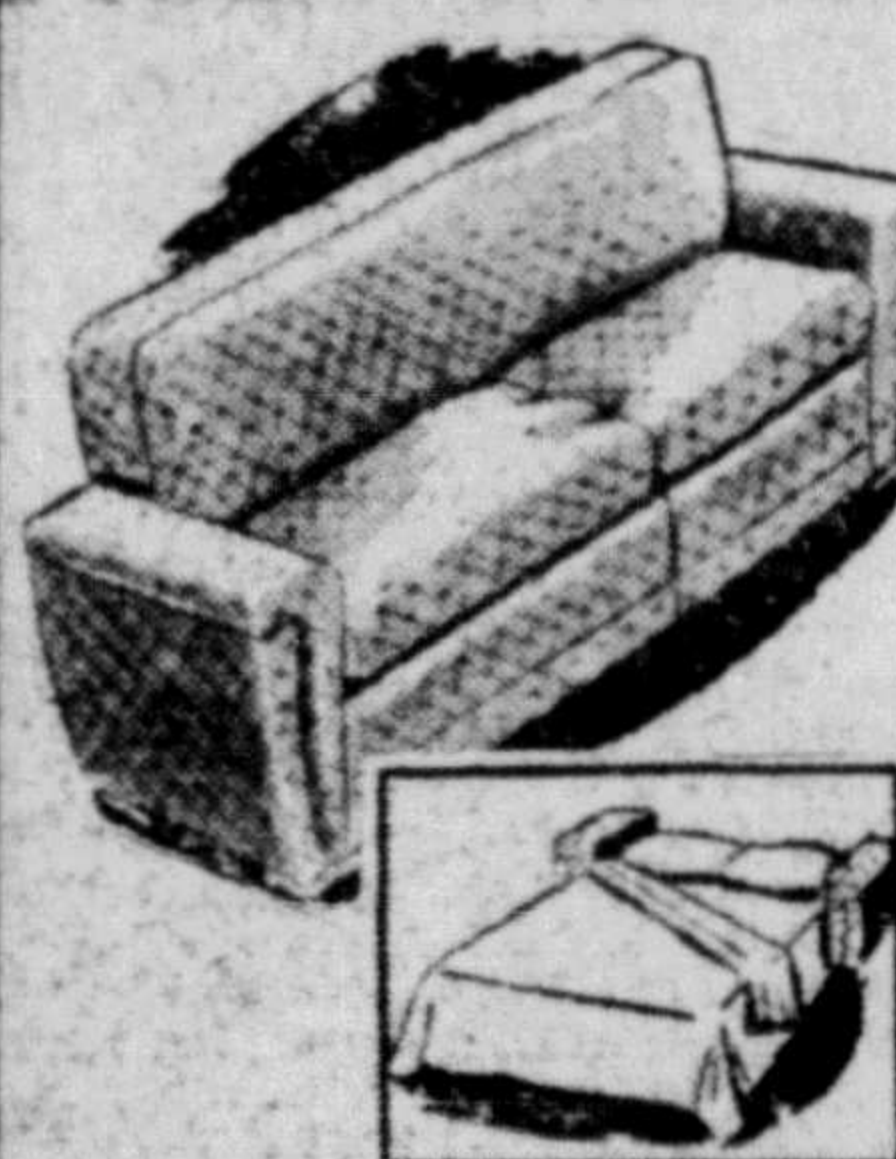
