

Pyun Yung Tai told newspapermen South Korea also is prepared to use its army to block any landing of troops from five neutral countries to guard Red prisoners of war who refuse to go home.

"In order to block these attempts . . . we are ready to use our armed forces and we would even be willing to shed blood in fighting them," Pyun


