



Assize Court Jury Deliberates 44 Hours

QUESNEL, B.C. (CP)-Lawrence Brian Vincent, 28-year-old itinerant carnival worker, was convicted by an all-male Assize court jury here Thursday of the murder of a 13-year-old girl and was sentenced to be hanged Sept. 12.

The battered body of Donna 4 Lee Corbett was found in bushnorth of here last Sept. 18. TYILE FORCES six days after she was reported Wincent worked. She had been strangled with one of her own shoe laces.

Sentence was passed by Mr. For Attack Justice H. S. Wood. The jury deliberated 44 hours before reaching a verdict.

Vincent, also known as Aaron Corky Hinton, was arrested Sept. 18 at Terrace, B.C., 480 miles northwest of this Cariboo district town and charged with contributing to juvenile delinquency. The murder charge was laid when he was returned here.

The girl was last seen alive after she had been sent by Vincent from the Odyson Shows where he was employed to fetch him some cigarets.

Her body was found a week later by sawmill operator Bert Crick while he was bear-hunting three miles north of here. man" who made a fortune in war

The announcement said that as the rebels pressed in to attack, the government hastily reinforced the Chiquimula garrison with artillery, mortars and machine-guns. The communique also claimed the garrison commander had deserted to the

Castillo Armas said his rebel forces now hold 16 Guatemalan towns, seized since the invaders moved in from the Honduran border Friday in a bid to unseat President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman's regime. The exiles claim the Arbenz government is communist-dominated.


Canadian Jets Now in Europe

School's Out, Drive Carefully

WITH Annunciation school closing its doors CANADA has just had VV for the summer today, and hundreds of another sharp lesson in pupils from the other elementary schools already how not to get on with the on holiday, vacation time for the city's children is launched once more. To the smaller youngsters this means endless days of carefree play, with meal times the only worry and long evenings ahead with no thought of having to get up early to go to school.

To the motorist, however, it means that for two months the speed limit through school zones is nullified. No longer do drivers have to creep past schools at 141/2 miles per hour with a versatile eye cocked on the speedometer, school crossings and side streets. Some slight relief from the wear and tear of city driving is provided by this temporary easing of the speed laws, but not all.

With the emptying of the schools comes the crowding of the parks, play areas and some streets. Streets like Sixth Avenue East which were deserted, except for lunch time, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., will now have children running across, and possibly playing across the roadway. Parks that stood vacant during the spring will contain youngsters most of the daylight hours. For that reason the 15 miles-perhour limit will apply very forcibly where playground area signs are posted, and the speed limit is in effect from daylight to dusk.

McClymont Park, thanks to the co-operation of the city and the Provincial government, will be less of a hazard this year than previously, with the construction of the new sidewalks along Mc-Bride Street. But caution is urged for drivers all along McBride from Eighth to the top of the hill due to the crowds of both adults and children that attend four Little League baseball games a week.

However, the responsibility does not lie entirely with motorists by any means. Parents of youngsters old enough to go to nearby parks or even far afield, should be the time the children reach this age, have instilled in them a large measure of safety consciousness. Children should know to keep their eyes open and be alert to traffic dangers at all times. When walking on a street or road with no sidewalk they should walk on the left hand side of the road facing oncoming traffic. If in a group they should walk single file and not cause a motorist to swerve onto the wrong side of the road, thereby placing himself in a dangerous position. They should let a ball that bounces across the road come to a halt and not dash after it before they've ascertained whether there is any traffic or not. A ball can be replaced for half a dollar if lost, a broken limb or a life cannot. With co-operation between motorists, parents and the children themselves a summer unmarred by tragedy can be assured.



We recently passed a bill in the parliament at Ottawa which permits Texas natural gas to serve the Ontario market. It was distinctly understood that the Texas gas would only be used in Ontario until our own Canadian pipeline was built from Calgary to Toronto and Montreal. The idea was that as Texas gas is already serving the big U.S. cities south of the Great Lakes, it was only common sense to allow it into Ontario, pending arrival of the Alberta product. The Texas gas would meanwhile serve to build up the market. People would have stoves and gas furnaces already installed, even before completion of the long pipe line from the west.






HUME SEEKING RECOUNT ON AIRPORT SALE VOTE
