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Housing Impasse

ISAPPOINTING indeed is the turn which has debunks one part of the assertions, and to the too-general section of the main street some- print is also established. The been taken in the new 50-unit rental housing project which we had so confidently counted upon to elieve, in some measure although not completely, the grim housing situation in the city.

We cannot give up without a struggle, however, ust because the government tells us that the tender igures for the houses are so much higher than the original estimates that we will have to pay average cents of \$75 (which is no "low rental" figure), the suggestion being made that the city might allow axation concessions to help reduce the rental rates or assume larger measure of responsibility for the losses on the actuated cost assignments and revenue

The government authorities have certainly decided to take no chances. The city council cannot be blamed for being unwilling to stick its neck out and mortgage the future particularly at this extremely inflationary time.

Impasse which appears now to exist notwithstanding, the housing shortage in Prince Rupert is ever becoming more stringent and is definitely holding progress back. Something certainly will have to be done about it although it is difficult to suggest something practical.

If rentals must be prohibitive and it is extremely doubtful that many people will be able to pay rental averages of \$75 per month indefinitely, even if they may be able to pay now because labor is so short (one reason being the very fact of housing shortage itself), possibly the way out will be some sort of a mass house for sale building project. If so much has to be paid for housing shelter, it would, doubtless, be more acceptable that high or higher payments would include some sort of purchase equity provision.

Housing is, indeed, an emergency in Prince Rupert and we cannot just dismiss the perplexing problem with an attitude that nothing can be done about it. In fact, something "must" be done about it and nothing is impossible if there is the will on the part of all concerned.

There must be some way out.

The first step would appear to be to press upon the government authorities for as generous and understanding treatment as possible. Indeed, Prince Rupert, in its peculiar position, might be justified in expecting special consideration in an emergency situation.

Not Sunshine Budget

F COURSE, nothing much had been expected In the way of tax relief so the latest federal budget is not disappointing although the most of people will think it might have been a little more generous.

Those lucky people with enough money to buy cigarettes, automobiles and some heavy electrical appliances will benefit from the reduction of taxes on those items although credit restrictions are not

The personal income tax for the average citizen is reduced by six per cent but that benefit is more than overcome by the new two per cent social security tax whereby we all pay for the new old age pensions which, of course, some one has to pay for. Here Mr. Abbott gives with one hand and takes away with the other. In the long run, most of us will probably be paying more taxes this year than



PRINCE GEORGE (CP) - The Pacific Great Eastern Railway will chug into Prince George this summer-40 years behind schedule.
