

## Knowing Our Neighbors

RITING in the May issue of Esquire magazine, Richard Neuberger, well-known Oregon visitor to the Canadian west coast, relates a number of personal experiences to support his contention that Canadians know more about his country than Americans do about ours. One of these took place in Kitimat, which he visited in 1952.

"In their crude wooden barracks I talked with men building this prodigous power plant," he writes. "It was a Presidential year in the United States and they asked searching questions about General Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson, about the witch hunts of Joe McCarthy, about who might be Secretary of State if the Republicans won. Some quoted directly from American periodicals.

"I was astonished at this knowledge of American public affairs. I had heard less astute opinions on American politics from men toiling on construction projects within the United States A number of the Canadians discussed in detail specific personalities in the American Congress. Do any Americans know the names of Canadian M.P.'s?

"My wife attributed it to the fact trut these workers in the remote Canadian wilderness had no radio or TV reception and were forced to spend their ample spare time in reading. She also pointed out succinctly that three or four pretty nurses were too few in number to keep some thousands of men from their books and magazines.

"This could have been a partial explanation, but I am sure that the typical Canadian tries to find out everything he can about the United States and is reconciled to the sketchy acquaintanceship which the average American has with Canada."

To elaborate on Mr. Neuberger's remarks, we suggest another reason for the situation he describes is that American publicity is better than ours, or at least more voluminous. We read American magazines, see American movies and often listen to American radio. The remarkable part is that we have retained our own identity as well as we have.

A physician said x-rays were negative, indicating he suffered no fractures, and should be ready to play ball in Milwaukee against St. Louis tomorrow.


