Reduction of two cents on a package of 20 cigarettes of all popular brands was announced today by Prince Rupert dealers who said the price of 33 cents a pack is now in effect.

It was announced first by Imperial Tobacco Company manufacturers following a reduction in the 34-cent tax reduction about by the new federal law.

A pack of 20 cigarettes will sell for 34 cents, which is the three per cent sales tax against the pre-budget price of 40 cents.

Higher new prices are effective on shipments made to manufacturers, wholesalers said they are selling the stock to retailers "on level."

Retailers said this morning were selling smokes at the price, "even our old packages of 25 cigarettes for 42 cents."

Minister Abbott in his speech last Thursday announced a cut of four per cent duty of each 20-pack cigarette.

The new price did not, however, become effective generally in Prince Rupert because wholesalers were stocked with higher-priced cigarettes and decided to sell them at the same price.

While in Ottawa Mr. Abbott announced the reduction in the being made retroactive to Jan. 1, this, however, was not by wholesalers here but only to the manufacturer and not likely to be passed on to the retailer.

The surprise announcement still further cut by retailers themselves, who claimed manufacturers would raise prices by 10 per cent.

## Socred MLA Launches Attack On 'Sex Texts' In B.C. Schools

### Government Denies Immorality Charge

VICTORIA.—A Social Credit private member's attack on the British Columbia school system Monday kicked up the hottest furore in the Legislature in nearly a decade and brought from the Social Credit government disavowal of the member's remarks.

J. A. Reid (SC—Salmon Arm) charged that B.C. teachers are under socialist domination and that children's minds are being "poisoned" by immorality taught from "sex text books."

"That is a cry from the Dark Ages," shouted Robert Strachan (CCF—Cowichan—Newcastle). "It'll hang you."

Less than an hour after Reid finished his speech, Education Minister Mrs. Tilly Rolston said she and the Social Credit government disavowed Mr. Reid's statements, particularly the charge that teachers are socialist-dominated. She added that Mr. Reid had a right to express his own views.

Strachan, flushed and angry, said Reid's statements were "diabolical," "tripe" and "rubbish." He is the father of three children.

Reid, who once campaigned for the late William Abernethy, former Alberta Social Credit leader, has two teen-aged children.

As Mr. Strachan started speaking, taking his turn in the budget debate, Premier Bennett, Mrs. Rolston and Mr. Reid hurriedly left the House.

Strachan appeared so indignant that he lost his way in his notes and CCF opposition leader Harold Winch called out: "Take your time, Bob. They called my three kids immoral, too."

"When parents hear what their children have been called, the next government of B.C. will not be Social Credit—or heaven help B.C.," Strachan said.

Reid quoted at length from a document which he said was prepared by a retired school teacher now living at Salmon Arm and whom he identified as A. J. Clotworthy.

The document said Clotworthy had found some school text books describing sexual intercourse "in complete detail and written under the guise of teaching morality." The document said school children are becoming thieves, robbers, dope addicts and prostitutes.

Reid said "sinister forces are at work who are using the lives and minds and souls of our children for political expediency... the body of a child is more important than profits made from the sale of sex text books and the soul of a child infinitely more valuable than any educational theories."

A group of school girls from a Roman Catholic convent and a nun were sitting in the public gallery while Mr. Reid spoke.

Strachan said after Reid's attack on the school system and teachers he could believe anything he had ever heard about the Social Credit party.

### 8 Lives Lost In Tenement House Fire

HALIFAX (CP)—The death toll rose to eight today after an early morning fire had swept through a row of tenement houses in the north end of this port city of 100,000.

Firemen recovered the eighth body, believed to be that of a woman, as they probed through the blackened, ice-covered ruins of four wooden buildings.

The outbreak blazed for more than two hours before it was brought under control.

Water froze where it fell in bitter pre-dawn weather as firemen fought flames near the naval dockyard.

Still unidentified were the bodies, recovered earlier, of a man, another woman and five children.

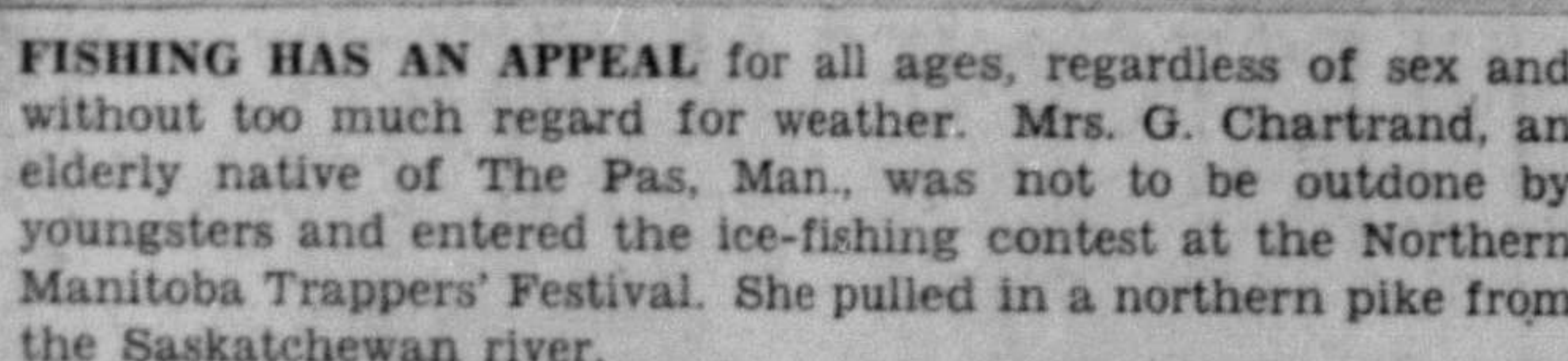
A dozen or more families fled when the blaze started shortly after 5 a.m.

City council feels the provincial government is "passing the buck" with its request that immediate action be taken to repair the Cow Bay fishermen's floats.

While the B.C. government has advised Prince Rupert MLA George Hills that the floats are being turned over to the Dominion government "we must press for immediate action for repairs right now," said Mayor Harold Whalen.

### Park Board Asks City For \$19,000

The biggest budget in Prince Rupert's parks board history was presented to city council last night, then referred to finance committee without comment.

A total of \$19,725 will be sought by park commissioners in their attempt to "do the necessary things we think must be done."

Last year the board was granted \$9,000.

Meanwhile, an interim budget of \$4,000 was granted to the board, mainly for continuing work on the Plaza Park playground.

Biggest chunk of the estimates—\$8,000—is allotted to development and maintenance of McClymont Park where commissioners plan to create a picturesque and scenic picnic ground on several acres surrounding Hays Creek.

Other expenses have been estimated as follows: to complete Plaza playground (Sixth Avenue East), \$2,500; repair service, Gibson and Totem Parks, \$3,000; paint benches, possible resurfacing, buying nets, etc. for the Rotary tennis courts, \$1,000; works supervisor, \$2,500; maintaining Roosevelt Park and removing refuse, \$700; swimming pool supervision, \$1,000, and Gyro Park maintenance, \$200.

The budget will be considered by the finance committee in preparation of its estimates for 1953.

### Lower Taxes Help Company To Cut Rates

VANCOUVER (CP)—The British Columbia Telephone Company will cut demands for rate increases because of benefits from the federal budget.

At a hearing before the Board of Transport Commissioners here Monday it disclosed tax cuts will save the company about \$350,000.

The company is seeking increases of about 12.2 per cent in long-distance rates and an average 14 per cent in exchange rates because of increased costs.

Senator J. W. Deb. Farris, company counsel, said the original application for a revenue boost of \$2,959,978 will be reduced because of tax benefits.

### Municipalities 'Lose' Under Socred Budget

VICTORIA (CP)—Progressive Conservative leader George Miller said in the legislature Monday he will vote against the Social Credit budget unless it is changed.

He said the municipalities would lose local autonomy under the Social Credit plan for assessment of land and improvements for education financing.

If this assessment plan is followed to its logical conclusion, he said in the budget debate, lawn mowers could be taxed.

He said that under the new education financing scheme, municipalities would get temporary relief, but in a year's time they would be in worse financial position than now.

## The Guessing Game

THE RUSSIANS have again touched off a guessing game at the United Nations by sending their first-string diplomats, headed by Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky, to the UN General Assembly.

While most other governments will rely on their permanent delegates at the session opening today, Vishinsky arrived Sunday with a staff of 20. The Soviet satellites—Poland and Czechoslovakia—also have sent their foreign ministers.

The question arises: What are the Russians up to now?

As usual, Soviet leaders are keeping quiet. They may or may not have surprise proposals. In sending their first team to the session, the Russians are following a practice they began when the UN started in 1946. So this, in itself, is not necessarily significant.

But it does show that the Russians expect to make the UN the main scene of their diplomatic activity during the coming weeks.

Diplomats have learned that the UN is the place to watch for Soviet policy changes when Vishinsky is attending sessions.

While there will be ample opportunity for Soviet policy declarations on such issues as the Korean conflict and disarmament, because these subjects already are on the agenda, Vishinsky will face a barrage of criticism on Russia's attitude towards the Jews.

There has been no evidence that Russia will come up with anything new on Korea.

• Axe for Sacred Tax

THE PROPOSED Social Credit ten-per-cent tax on mines and logging companies is so disastrous for all B.C. that it should be defeated at all costs.

Even if it means an immediate election, the motto of all other parties should be "It Shall Not Pass—Axe for the Sacred Tax."

The Social Credit tax is only superficially aimed at the owners and operators of mines and logging camps. The real sufferers will be the families of the men who work in the mines, logging camps, sawmills and plywood factories. It surely means wage cuts and lost jobs.

THIS extra tax on two of B.C.'s basic industries would be dangerous at any time. But in the present state of uncertainty in the world markets for metals and lumber it could be utterly disastrous. For months past the base metal mines of B.C. have been closing down, one by one.

The Sacred tax could, if passed, put the skids under B.C. mining for a long time to come. If the mines were having increasing difficulty carrying on in the face of a four per cent net profits tax, what chance will they have to carry on with a ten per cent levy?

Likewise with the logging operators—who are in fact even worse hit. The Sacred tax on mines is an increase from four to ten per cent. But the tax on loggers is a straight ten per cent on net profits—above the basic exemption to all of \$25,000 per year.

This, of course, is only one of the numerous municipal, provincial and federal taxes these companies must pay.

THE WORST feature about this whole disastrous proposal is that it was made in Alberta. B.C. has been reduced to colonial status. No wonder the Sacred MLAs have been gagged.

Weeks ago in this column I referred to the ominous speech made at Kingsville, Ontario, on December 5 last by the Sacred national leader, Solon Low.

The Windsor Star of December 6 reported Mr. Low thus: "KINGSVILLE.—The people of Alberta benefited 12 times more from a gross revenue of \$29 million from oil and gas than did the people of B.C. with a gross revenue of \$525 million."

This ridiculous statement indicated two things. First, the

axe was being sharpened for two B.C. major industries, not by the recent Tory careerists like Premier Bennett, but by scheming Alberta politicians who know nothing whatever of the facts of life in industry in B.C.

IT IS RIDICULOUS to talk of \$29 millions worth of oil revenue and compare it offhand with \$525 millions worth of lumber revenue.

To get at the logs, and to protect the forest, takes a vastly greater proportion of the gross income from the forest than it does for the province to handle the oil. Where in Alberta have they anything like the road construction problems or forest fire problem such as we have in B.C.?

UP TILL NOW too many people have been making too many allowances for the Sacred. Their bandying about of the Bible has fooled too many. This crippling tax against two main industries shows them in their true light—dangerous muddlers.

The time to beat this insane tax is now.

## OTTAWA DIARY

Week-end comment upon the latest Abbott budget in Parliament Hill circles has been centring to a considerable extent upon the element of motive attached to it.

Actually, the comment is negative. Observers have been struck at first glance by the apparent fact that economic motive for the first time in a number of years has played no great part in the framing of the Finance Minister's taxation program.

That's recognized as a major departure from the practice of almost the past two decades. Ever since the great depression of the thirties, successive Finance Ministers have planned their programs with the aim of affecting the current economic situation. The aim has been either to combat deflation or inflation, to encourage capital expenditure or to curtail consumer spending, to stimulate plant expansion or to syphon off excess purchasing power.

The fact that this year's budget isn't intended to promote any particular economic aim is regarded by most economic observers in the Capital as reassuring. The obvious inference which they draw is that the nation's economy is recognized as sound and in reasonable balance and as likely to stay that way for the balance of this year, at least.

With employment at a near-record level and with pay envelopes at an all-time high, that's about the most comforting message that Finance Minister "Doug" Abbott possibly could have delivered. It's especially so in view of the recent downward

## Parliament Hill

I have strongly endorsed the recommendation of the Burns Lake Parent-Teacher Association for the appointment of a public health nurse to work among the Indians of the Burns Lake area. No one will argue with me when I say that governments move—well, not too speedily, and so it may be some little time before we get action on this request, but I shall keep following it up.

Two happenings, each outside the usual pattern of events, and each having an entirely different bearing on stocks of salmon for reproduction purposes, occurred during the last year: First was the cessation of fishing during the negotiating tie-ups. The initial tie-up in July, extending over a six-day period at the peak of the sockeye migration along the northern coast, permitted an abnormally large escapement of that species for that part of the season in the Rivers Inlet, Smiths Inlet, Bella Coola, and Skeena areas.

The other unscheduled event was of converse character: low water in the streams of Vancouver Island and the southern coast during the pink, chum and coho runs. In so far as sockeye are concerned, Bella Coola and Nimpkish spawning areas were heavily seeded, and the supplies of spawners in the Naas were satisfactory. Skeena River spawning stocks again encountered major difficulty, due to the Babine slide; 376,947 fish got through to the spawning grounds but it is feared that effective spawning did not materialize from a number of these fish.

It was with the most profound regret that I read of the death of John Bulger of Prince Rupert. A quiet but persistent worker for his city and district, and a loyal and faithful friend, Mr. Bulger is going to be sorely missed by many, for a long time.

Prime Minister St. Laurent, on behalf of the whole House of Commons, welcomed Mr. M. J. Coldwell, CCF leader, back to

the House after a long absence, caused by a major operation. Mr. Coldwell now looks very well, and in a little chat with me, told me he was feeling one hundred per cent again.

The debate on external affairs was extremely interesting. But I was most disturbed when Rodney Adamson, Conservative from York West, urged that we encourage an attack on China. When we have been doing everything we can think of to prevent a third world war, I think it most unfortunate that anyone in the Canadian Parliament, even from the Opposition side, should openly advocate that we abandon, to quote him, "a policy of restricted action, of containment, of an isolated war" and proceed to "fight communism on the same terms as the Communists." I still believe the best way to fight communism is to provide something better.

Hon. L. B. Pearson in summing up the debate dealt with all points that had been raised in the course of the debate, which extended over some days. He referred to Mr. Adamson's contribution, and to Howard Green's, as suggesting the adoption as a principle for the conduct of diplomacy and international affairs what he might call tulip tramping or gate crashing. He deplored Adamson's apparently welcoming an extension of the war. He made it clear that no one on the government side of the house could support that kind of dynamic, unlimited, aggressive policy under the present circumstances.

When Dave Fulton, Conservative, of Kamloops, was speaking in the same debate he was asked what his own views were on these matters, and his reply—as it is reported at page 1988 of Hansard—which I suppose might serve as a guidepost for the views of members of the official opposition on foreign affairs, was as follows: "I have just said that I believe Canada, in concert with

other nations of the world, wealth and, in so far as possible, with the United States, should adopt a foreign policy which would not the hot war but the cold war to the communists, and them guessing for a change. That might be considered a vague as a direction in policy—but there was no approval of the new States policy.

## School Enrolment to Double in Canada Within 12 Years

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian Education Minister James D. Macpherson today said the need to prepare for the present secondary enrolment within 12 years. Week officials said that, March 1-7, will be the Dominion bureau's forecast of a secondary school population by 1964 of 611,475 compared with today's 305,200. The estimate is the total for all provinces except Quebec.

Biggest problems, officials said, are acquiring enough qualified teachers and accommodating the pupils. They said the teacher shortage, now serious, will be critical if plans are not laid now to meet the increase. The increased school population, now noticeable in the lower grades, will result from the higher post-war birth rate and the increasing proportion of students continuing their education in the higher grades because of higher family incomes, more attractive curricula and more rural high schools.

Emphasizing the slogan "Education is Everybody's Business," officials said the individual can act through home and school or parent-teacher associations as well as voting in provincial and school-board elections.

## CAC Not in Position to Ban Foods Made of Vegetable Oil

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Association of Consumers in a statement said it is willing to support legislation protecting the consumer from misrepresentation but it won't back regulations banning products simply because they provide competition from others.

At the annual board meeting directors said the CAC would endorse any steps necessary "to prevent any possible confusion between genuine dairy products and products similar to them but made with other than dairy fats."

But the board felt that "CAC is not in a position to support legislation which would ban the manufacture of products made of vegetable oil simply because they would compete with dairy products."

"If CAC supported such a ban, this would be contrary to the fundamental principles adopted by CAC three years ago," the statement concluded.

Mrs. Hugh Summers of Fitchburg, Ont., president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, said the only argument she had heard favoring ice cream and cheese produced synthetically was that it was cheaper.

"Repeatedly we have been shown that dairy foods are cheap foods compared to current wages and the cost of other commodities," she said. "We should then deal a body blow to one of our basic industries for what could be doubtful economy."

She said statisticians have calculated that the farmer's income has declined as much as 15 per cent in recent months. A direct result of this cut was curtailed spending on the part of the farmer.

## Outdoor ... with Marty

Perhaps the largest turnout of winter anglers was last week-end, and many husky grey-cod were taken at Fairview and the Yacht Club, while almost every possible fishing point was occupied by people of all ages.

It would seem that the value of our excellent all-year fishing is becoming more appreciated, and if there are those who now back believing that shore and dock fishing is difficult or expensive, then do so no longer, a single dollar will start you getting fish.

Any of the local hardware stores or Co-ops can supply fifty yards of hand-line, a four-ounce sinker, and a few hooks about 5/0. Put a one-inch cube of meat on the hook and sink it to the bottom in about 50 feet of water, (almost any wharf in town is on this depth) next slowly raise the sinker a few inches, then lower to feel bottom again; without much doubt you will soon have a fish take hold, when he does so, pause momentarily before you heave mightily to set the hook.

### BEST OF BAIT

No matter what kind of fish you haul up, you now have the best of bait to catch the next one with; and I miss my guess if most of you new starters fail to get the bug right there and become confirmed fisherfolks!

Generally speaking, fish bite more readily on a moving bait than a still one, and here is a simple trick in line with this point. Use a large bucktail hook (make your own if you like) and bait it with a piece of bullhead meat, attach it to about 18 inches of nylon leader of slightly less strength than the line, attach this in turn to your sinker, (the lighter the line, the smaller the sinker) which same sinker is fast to the line.

Make a good cast and let the rig go to the bottom, then slowly retrieve one foot at a time, the moving sinker kicks up a little cloud of mud and attracts fish which quickly spot the slowly moving bait; all the bottom fishes can be taken by this method, but a hand-liner will soon perceive the advantage of rod and reel with its added casting length and striking leverage.

In either case, the angler's hands quickly learn to feel and act upon a faint nibble, for not always do the big ones bite heavily.

### CUT THE FISH

No need to burden oneself with the whole cod carcass to carry home, most of the edible meat may be quickly obtained by placing the fish on his belly, then cutting down either side of the backbone from head to near the tail; the two pieces thus removed are boneless and delicious.

Remember this column seeks your reports on fishing, and stands ready to advise when requested. Nothing on steelheads at Clayoh yet.

Perhaps some of the trapshooters who are dissatisfied with their scores are handicapped by using a gun that does not fit, why not borrow around and see if maybe Joe's gun does not do better by you, quite frequently some slight difference in the build of a gun or gunner is the cause of missed clays.

By the way, I reckon that nowadays we all know that the dime in the barrel is NOT the way to measure shotgun gauge or choke, because there is up to seven one-thousandths of an inch difference in diameter of newly minted U.S. dimes in the past 20 years!

But with Prince Rupert as a centre for an annual tournament, other teams could be attracted from such growing places as Terrace and Kitimat, and from some of the B.C. native villages.

A big sports event annually in any city always is a big boost—it not only creates a lot of goodwill, a spirit of competition, but also develops an ideal opportunity for people of different locales to learn to know each other.

### COULD BE LEADER

Prince Rupert could well become a leader in this field, especially in basketball. The distance between here and the lower mainland, with added disadvantage of uncertain air transportation during the winter, has limited the city's participation in provincial competitions.

By establishing a sports circuit in the northern area, Prince Rupert could do much to improve the situation.

If this tournament is to be the start of such a feature, then the city should go "all-out" to make it a success, especially for the visitors.

### SEEK SPONSORS

The basketball association executive thinks it would be a good idea to provide a dinner for the teams taking part in

the tournament. They are looking for a sponsor who might stand the expense. One member said the city council might consider the sponsorship. (Aldermen, take note.)

Meanwhile, reservations should be made early by fans wanting to see the tournament. The main floor bleachers will be put up for the show giving an additional 100 or more seats right at the floor edge in the Civic Centre gym.

The Shrine Band conducted by Peter Lien will provide stirring music during rest periods.

While Prince Rupert Elks' Club boxers are settling down seriously to training for the March 8-7 Golden Gloves tournament, another small group is making a new use of the Civic Centre training room.

Principals of the amateur mat workouts are two husky, powerful-looking and big muscled young men who hope to start an amateur wrestling club.

All they need is an instructor and a few more members. Until there are six members in the group, the number thought necessary to form a successful club, no names will be mentioned.

"We don't want to be on record as giving birth to a hare-brained idea," they say. But both are much interested in amateur grunt-and-groan work and hope plans to prepare for the British Empire Games Trials in Vancouver next year will work out.

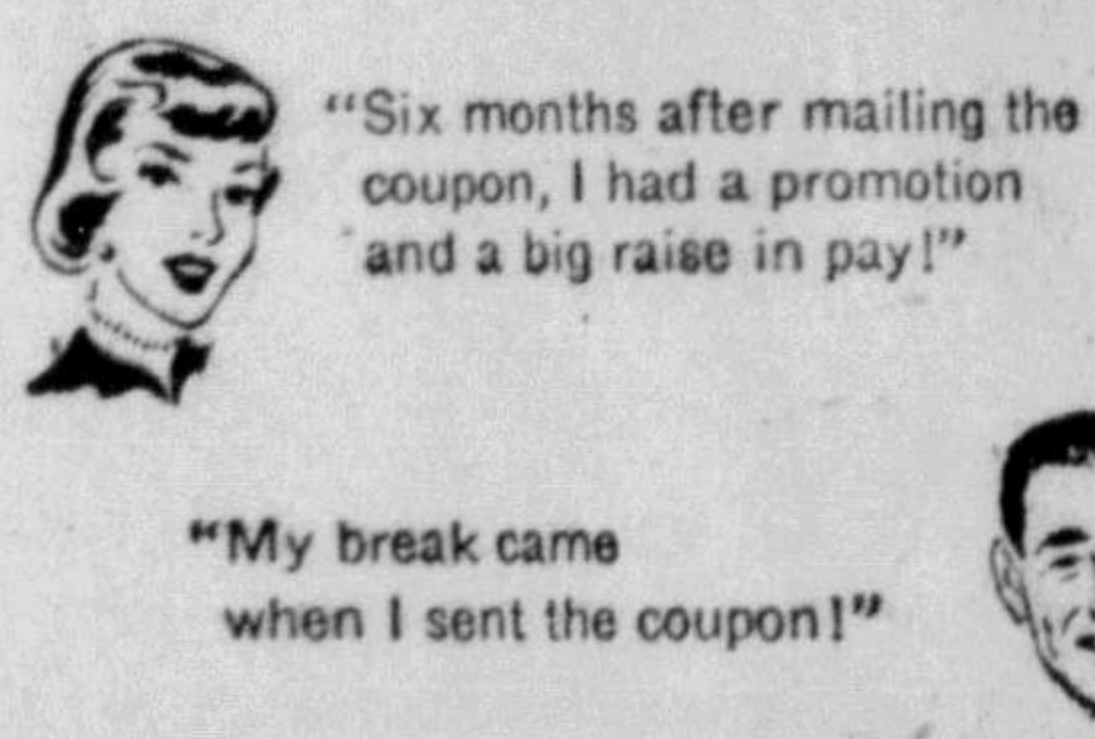

### Some Players Just Hate To Lose a Trick

Have you ever noticed players like Mr. Muzzy hate to lose a trick? If they have several certain losers on a hand, they will cash every one of their winners first—reserving until the very end the terrible moment when losers must be conceded to the enemy.

It is hard to understand this. It makes no difference on the score whether you lose trick one or trick seven or trick 12. On the other hand, if you give up your certain loser or losers at exactly the right time, it is often possible to eliminate a later loser entirely.

Here is how Mr. Muzzy handled his five club contract. The king of hearts was opened and he won with dummy's ace. He came to his hand with the ace of clubs, led the 10 of diamonds and let it ride. Mrs. Keen won and her spade return netted the defenders enough tricks to defeat the contract.

"All I needed was to find the ace of spades right," Mr. Muzzy remarked.

Mr. Champion did not agree. "All you needed was to play the hand right," he said. "Let me ask you something. Did you expect to win all 13 tricks?"

Grudgingly (for he felt the question was a trap of some kind), Mr. Muzzy admitted that he did not.

"Well, then," Mr. Champion continued, "you've got to lose the first trick. Just let the king of hearts hold."

Mr. Muzzy was shocked. "With a singleton heart in my hand?" he asked.

Of course, Mr. Champion was right. Mr. Muzzy had to lose one trick in the red suits. Why not lose it to the opponent who could NOT lead through the king of spades? No following lead by Mr. Dale could beat the hand. Say he shifted to a diamond at trick two. Mr. Muzzy could win with the ace, cash the ace of hearts and get rid of his last diamond.

Then he could lead a diamond

## Roy Wheeler Retiring in August

OTTAWA — Roy L. Wheeler, chief of the fruit and vegetable division, marketing service, department of agriculture, Ottawa, is retiring on superannuation in August, after 30 years' service with the department. He will be succeeded by E. G. Paige.

In 1937 he became assistant chief of that service. In 1947 he was promoted to assistant chief and in 1952, chief of the marketing and merchandising section.

## Fort Langley To Be Rebuilt

FORT LANGLEY, B.C. — (CP) — The Board of Trade plans to rebuild Fort Langley as it was when Sir James Douglas was sworn in as the first governor on November 19, 1858.

Alex C. Hope announced the \$150,000 program after his installation as board president.

He said Premier Bennett has assured him of government financial assistance and university authorities would co-operate with architectural plans.

The committee in charge hopes to complete the work for the provincial centennial in 1953.

## Indian Truce Resolution Before UN Assembly Again

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Assembly President L. B. Pearson says the Indian truce resolution rejected by the Communists in December is still the starting point for any further Korean move that might come before the United Nations session re-opening today.

Canada's external affairs minister referred in a recorded UN program broadcast by CBS to the Korean resolution adopted overwhelmingly by the UN assembly over Russian objections.

"It might well be that the assembly will decide that they have taken a very important step last autumn in the Indian resolution and that, insofar as Korea is concerned, no further step at this time is required," Mr. Pearson said.

"But I don't know about that because I don't know what the views of the various delegations are. I know they will all be anxious in some way to bring the fighting to an end."

Some western delegates have expressed belief it is up to Russia to come forward with any new proposal to solve the war-prisoners issue which has deadlocked the truce talks at Panmunjon.

Pearson said in talks of a possible blockade that the fact is sometimes forgotten that UN members still are bound by an embargo they voted in 1950 "to prevent arms and strategic materials from reaching those whom we have determined to be the aggressors."

Pearson defended that UN secretariat against charges it was "honeycombed" with subversive activities, charges that will be explored by the assembly in a debate on personnel expected to be a hot assembly issue.

"I have had a good deal to do with the secretariat over the years and I have found that, by and large, it was composed of a body of fine, loyal and efficient international civil servants," Pearson said.

Russia has sent Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky to head its delegation. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., will head the U.S. delegation, and Health Minister Paul Martin again heads Canada's delegation.

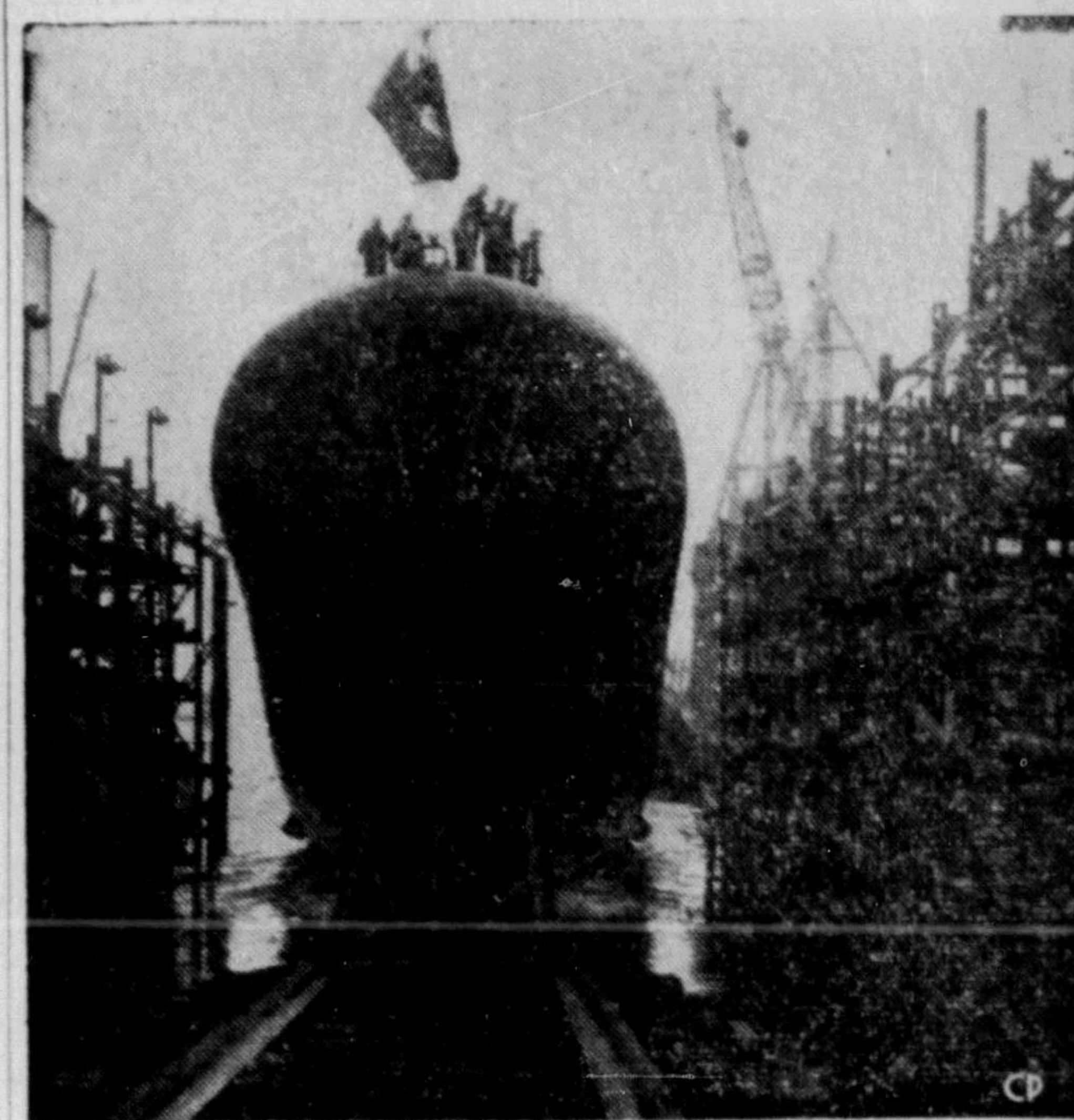

## NATO Promises Gen. Ridgway Additional \$224 Million

PARIS (AP)—The Nato council in a surprise move has promised Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway \$224,000,000 more for 1953 European military construction—money it denied him last December.

Now the council has to figure out which country will pay how much.

Allocation of the additional money—matching the same amount approved at the council meeting last December—was announced by Lord Ismay, British secretary-general of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The new allotment gave Ridgway, NATO's supreme commander, a bonus. In December he said \$428,000,000 was the minimum needed for 1953 construction of air bases, jet fuel pipelines, communications and headquarters installations in western Europe. The council then allocated only \$224,000,000.

Ismay said the council has not solved the important problem as how to split the new allocation among the NATO members. "We are trying to avoid the sordid business of bargaining around the table," he added.

The December economy move drew sharp criticism from Ridgway, who called it a lack of imaginative planning. He said a slackening of the NATO defence effort could not be excused.

With sums previously authorized, \$562,000,000 has now been set aside for the 1953 NATO building program.

## Eden's Destiny 'Fading' In Eyes of 'Back-Benchers'

LONDON (Reuters)—Foreign Secretary Eden's chances of succeeding Winston Churchill as prime minister today ran into withering fire from the Conservative party's extreme right wings.

The weekly newspaper Recorder, voice of ultra-Conservative big business, said party back-benchers in Parliament are "horrified at the way he is following the Socialists in throwing away the Empire."

Earlier this week, Tory back-benchers and Lord Beaverbrook's Empire-minded newspapers expressed dismay over the agreement Eden reached with Egypt for granting Sudanese independence.

Before the Sudan agreement was announced last week, Eden held a delicate private session with party rank-and-filers to allay their fears of a "crumbling" Empire.

### SAME FEARS

Yet, the same fears were brought into the open later by Ralph Assheton, former Conservative minister who once served as chairman of the party's central organization. Assheton asked Eden whether he appreciated that many people felt self-government for the inexperienced and almost illiterate Sudanese

was almost a mockery and abandonment of Britain's trust. Beaverbrook's Daily Express charged Britain had "scuttled" from a sacred trust and said if Eden could not stand up to Egyptian Premier Mohammed Naguib, he should make way for someone who could.

The Recorder said Eden was slipping badly in the race to be the next prime minister. His destiny is fading, it said, "because the back-bench Conservatives are asking if he has in him the stuff for leadership."

The Tory revolt is confined at present to a small but volatile wing of the party. If Eden's star is dimmed, the most likely alternative as Churchill's heir-apparent would be Richard Butler, chancellor of the exchequer. As one of the chief architects of Conservative policy, Butler ranks No. 3 in the party hierarchy.

## Immigration Figures Drop During 1952

OTTAWA (CP)—Immigration to Canada fell 15 per cent during 1952, despite substantial increases in the flow from the United Kingdom and the United States.

The immigration department announced that total immigration from all countries was 164,498, compared with 194,391 during 1951. There was a 13-per cent decrease in the number of potential new citizens from North European countries and a 40 per cent drop from other lands.

English, Irish, Scottish and Welsh immigrants, however, totalled 42,975 compared with 31,370 in 1951—a 36 per cent increase. Influx from the United States increased 20 per cent, to 9,306 from 7,732.

Ontario took 36,059 of the new citizens—by far the largest number. Quebec followed with 33,319, British Columbia 14,937, Alberta 13,050, Manitoba 6,635, Saskatchewan 3,875, Nova Scotia 2,702, New Brunswick 1,920, Newfoundland 503 and Prince Edward Island 309.

The report also showed that 4,707 Canadians returned from the United States in 1952, compared with 3,035 in 1951.

## SC Financial Policy Scored By CCF Leader

VICTORIA (CP)—CCF opposition leader Harold Winch said in the legislature the Social Credit financial policy is one of "false economy."

"They are trying to cut the throats of the people of British Columbia," he charged in opening the budget debate for the opposition.

He based his charge on government cuts in appropriations for such things as local health services, venereal disease control, investigation of pensioners cases, adult education, public library commission, trade commission, reforestation and provincial parks.

Mr. Winch said the Social Credit's "so-called economy with efficiency" program would prove "disastrous" for the province unless many of the estimates for the next fiscal year were increased.

## Pope's Actions 'Dangerous' Tito Charges

BELGRADE (AP)—President Tito has accused both Russia and the Vatican of attempting to divide the world into two "hostile camps."

He called actions of the Pope "dangerous for the peace and freedom of the world."

His assertion came at the opening of the fourth congress of Yugoslavia's People's Front—a war-born organization created with the purpose of uniting Yugoslavia against the Axis invaders.

Bluntly, in his welcoming address to 2,200 delegates, he said present policies of the Kremlin have nothing to do with communism as prescribed by its founders but rather were applied in pursuit of Russia's imperialism and expansionism.

At the same time, he said, the Vatican has been attempting to divide the world into two ideological camps with the same purpose at that of Russia for splitting the world.

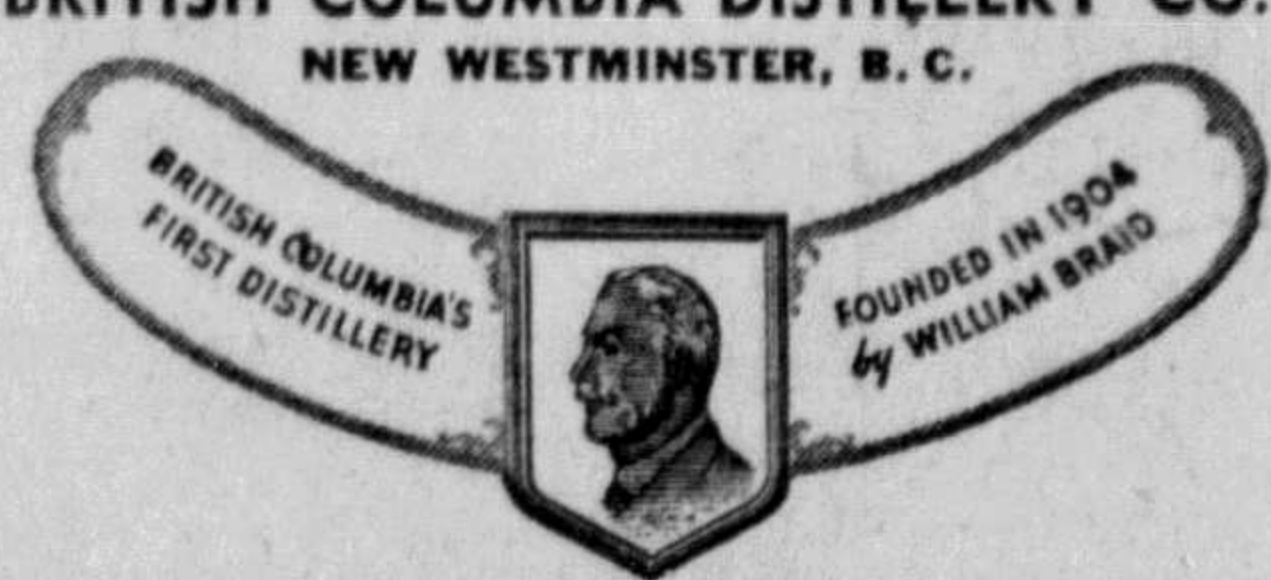
