Aircraft Reported Crashed Into Tree

VANCOUVER. — Ground parties moved today into the Oregon wilderness believed skimmed by an RCAF bomber in the last minutes of its flight.

They are checking a reporte that a plane, carrying 10 men, apparently crashed after shearing into the 140-foot trunk of a dead tree at Salmon Mountain, 17 miles east of Port Orford,

In Vancouver, the RCAF released the names of nine of the crew members.

The plane was on a scheduled 1,200-mile flight from Vancouver Island to San Diego when it disappeared after reporting its position off the southern Oregon

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A New Chance For Rupert

ULL and formal entry of the CBC into Prince Rupert through purchase of radio station CFPR is a move of personal interest to almost everyone in the city.

Probably to a greater extent than most communities, we in this part of the country are radio listeners. More particularly, we are CBC listeners. Although other networks can be picked up with varying degrees of certainty, our nationally-owned system is to us the principal radio service. As a comparatively remote member of the Canadian family we depend on it heavily to make the distance seem less.

While no great change is likely to be noticeable at first, since CFPR has been so closely tied in with the CBC in any case, the appointment of a program director is understood to mean there will be increased attention given to organizing local shows. There is an abundance of talent here and a great deal of interest in promoting radio work. The recent series of broadcasts in which schoolchildren quizzed the city councillors is just one example of how effective a local program can be.

Another result expected of the move is that Prince Rupert will take its place in the CBC network as a sending point as well as a receiving one. This will not only give the city greater prominence on the national scene but also afford the rest of the country a better chance to hear the extraordinary story that is unfolding up here. When shipping men in a port the size of Seattle must organize all their resources to meet Prince Rupert competition for the Alaskan trade, for example, there is a narrative in the making that would surely interest the Canadian public.

Since C. H. Insulander started the station in 1936, he and his colleagues have served Prince Rupert faithfully and well on the air. Their continued presence on the staff will be a source of gratification

Now the citizens of Prince Rupert, as shareholders in the CBC, have another kind of interest in CFPR—a proprietory one. To a certain extent, therefore, its success depends on us. We welcome the challenge.





The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation today announced the purchase of radio station CFPR from North-West Broadcast and Service Company, Ltd. The station has been leased by the CBC since 1943.

CFPR Unique

CFPR is unique among Canadian radio stations in that for the greater part of its existence it has been leased to the publicly-owned Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

The station was opened in 1936 by private investors—the North-West Broadcast and Service Company, Ltd. C. H. Insulander, the present manager acted in the same capacity in years ago and has been with the station ever since.

The CBC undertook operation of the station early in 1943 as a part of the war emergency. With the presence of thousands of troops in Prince Rupert about half Americans, there was a demand for programing of a more national character.

The first CBC service to the area was by means of discsrecordings of programs that had been produced in Vancouver. Later, a short-wave circuit was tented from the North-West Telephone Co. and two "live" CDC newscasts a day were broadcast ever CFPR RENT WIRE
