There were 30 more boys than girls born to keep nurses and doctors busy.

Peak month was in August when 40 babies were born.

The stork, however gave the medics a rest on Christmas Day and brought no infants.

Alex Hunter Award Fund Reaches \$251

Donations of \$50 apiece from the Chamber of Commerce and the Gryo Club have raised the Good Citizenship Award fund to \$251 and preparations are now underway for selection of the award's first recipient.

Created in memory of the late Alex Hunter, the award is to be made annually to the citizen, man or woman, who is considered to have contributed most to Prince Rupert's progress and well-being and who by personal example, has had a beneficial influence on the community. The Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the presentation and handling the arrangements.

Choosing of the Good Citizen will be done by popular ballot, the form of which will appear in the Daily News later this month. It is expected that the people's choice for the 1952 award will be announced in February, at which time the presentation will be made at a ceremony to be arranged.

Contributions received since the last announcement were made on the status of the fund also include one for \$3 from W. C. Little, of Smithers.

Fire in Home Prevented From Spreading

Fire, believed to have started from an overheated stove, late yesterday caused minor damage to some shelves in the apartment occupied by P. Dimitron above the Pioneer Laundry plant, 142 Third Avenue East.

Firemen were on the scene quickly and prevented flames from spreading.

In the only other blaze yesterday, the chimney at the home of K. Rudsavik on Sixth Avenue East caught fire but was brought under control before it caused any damage.

It was the second chimney fire answered by the fire department since the cold weather caused citizens to put on extra heat in their homes.

Firemen were called to the home of George Ness, 1725 Fifth Avenue East, at 9:40 p.m. Wednesday night after his chimney caught fire.

Chief Earl Becker warned residents to check chimneys to prevent fires.

Parks Commissioner Art Murray Resigns After His Re-Election

Art Murray, Park Board Commissioner re-elected by acclamation at the last civic election, announced today he is resigning because of pressure of business.

A member of the board since its formation in 1950, Mr. Murray has been active in park development and promotion here for many years.

An active sportsman and businessman in the city, he recently purchased a men's clothing store.

Mr. Murray notified Park Board Chairman Pat Forman of his intention last night an hour before the first meeting of this

year was scheduled to take place. Due to the absence of Commissioner Bob Armstrong because of sickness and a business engagement which kept Commissioner Charlie Balagno away, the meeting was cancelled until 7:30 p.m. this Friday.

Mr. Murray said he will tender his resignation to the city clerk prior to Friday's meeting.

Commenting on the decision, Mr. Forman said his loss will be greatly felt by the park board "as he has always been so interested in development of our playgrounds and anything that will provide facilities for the enjoyment of children."

7 Dead, 40 Missing In Airplane Crashes

SEATTLE.—At least seven persons are dead and 40 are missing following two separate plane disasters yesterday.

Dawson Creek Strikes at Rail Proposal

DAWSON CREEK, B.C. (CP)—Dawson Creek business men have voiced opposition to a proposal to link the Pacific Great Eastern Railway with the Northern Alberta Railways at Beaver Lodge, Alta., by a shorter route through Monkman Pass.

Dawson Creek Chamber of Commerce said if it sponsored the Monkman route, the B.C. government would be selling out to Alberta.

CCF organizer Ronald Dahlen in a broadcast statement said the B.C. Social Credit government is catering to the oil interests and the Alberta government.

Off course and afire in a storm, a commercial airliner from California carried seven persons to flaming death at the foot of a mountain 15 miles east of here last night.

Two of the victims were children and two were women. Three men aboard were crew members.

The four-engine DC4 wandered about in one of winter's worst storms, apparently seeking Boeing Field here.

At Montpelier, Idaho, a sheriff's posse and airplanes from three states today searched the rugged area where Idaho, Wyoming and Utah join for a twin-engine "troop special" plane that vanished yesterday with 40 persons aboard.

The craft carried 37 veterans of the Korean war and a crew of three.

The veterans aboard the ill-fated plane were among 3,169 troops who arrived at Seattle Tuesday.

B.C. Cities Protest RCMP Rate Increase

ALBERNI, B. C. (CP)—Protests against RCMP's increase in charges for policing cities and municipalities in British Columbia are mounting.

Latest objection came this week from Alberni city council where a move was launched to have a combined protest from all Vancouver Island municipalities. Council decided, at its regular meeting to ask the Vancouver Island branch of the Union of British Columbia municipalities to call a special meeting to discuss the increase.

The increase was announced from Ottawa recently. It raises the annual charge per man to \$2,000 from \$1,400.

Other cities and municipalities have protested the increase, including Prince Rupert.

Probably the biggest loser will be the Municipality of Burnaby which has a 40-man RCMP police force.

A move has been started there to consider establishment of its own force.

Other centres have demanded consideration of re-establishing a provincial force similar to the force that was taken over by the RCMP two years ago.

Zero Weather Keeps Plumbers Thawing Pipes

Business was brisk again today for the city's plumbers as the temperature dropped to zero overnight and froze the water pipes in many homes.

Official overnight low at the Digby Island weather station was three degrees above zero.

The city's freezing temperature was accompanied for the second straight day by a cold 35-mile-an-hour east wind forcing citizens to dig out earmuffs and fur hats and coats to keep their ears from freezing.

The weatherman sees a little warmer weather approaching but a gale warning remains in effect. Snow may fall over the city tomorrow but it is expected to be driven by a strong southeasterly wind.

Tanker Sinks In Heavy Pacific Storm

SAN FRANCISCO (CP)—A Swedish tanker with a crew of 40 broke in half and three cargo vessels were in distress as 50-to-70-mile-an-hour winds whipped the normally calm Pacific into fury.

The Swedish tanker S.S. Avanti sent an SOS reporting crisply.

"Ship broke in two. Eleven men on back part saved. Eight men on front part and 21 men on lifeboat still drifting. If any ships nearby please give help."

A British freighter King Edgar and a Panamanian freighter Santadespo both reported out of control and drifting helplessly in north-central Pacific.

A coastal lumber schooner, Cynthia Olson, jettisoned her deck cargo off Oregon and slowly made for San Francisco.

The Avanti gave her position as 240 miles northeast of Okinawa and about 100 miles south of Kyushu, southernmost Japanese main island.

Canada's Enemy No. 2 Arrested In Eastern City

TORONTO.—Walter Pavlukoff, 38, No. 2 on the RCMP list of Canada's most wanted men, was arrested today in suburban North York township.

He has been sought since August, 1947, in connection with the fatal shooting of a Vancouver bank manager, Sydney Petrie.

Petrie was killed in the Kitsilano district branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce when he resisted an attempted holdup by a lone gunman.

The gunman escaped without any loot.

Pavlukoff offered no resistance when police took him into custody on a street corner today. The Doukhobor ex-convict had been working in the Toronto district as a carpenter.

Shortly after the arrest Police Chief Walter Mulligan in Vancouver said detectives would leave for Toronto to bring Pavlukoff back to the coast.

MAN HUNT

His arrest recalls one of the greatest manhunts in history in British Columbia's lower mainland.

Following the shooting in the bank, at 3 p.m., Aug. 25, 1947, the entire police force was called into action and although they scoured the Kitsilano district throughout the afternoon and evening of the attempted holdup the suspect was not sighted.

However, for several weeks afterwards, citizens in the Fraser Valley reported spotting the wanted man and on several occasions squads of police converged in the Surrey district.

Armed with machine-guns and rifles, police from New Westminster, Vancouver, and members of the now-defunct B.C. Police force covered miles of territory in their unfruitful search.

The WEATHERMAN Says

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An Expensive Folly

IN ITS DETERMINATION to build some kind of railway from Prince George into the Peace River country, no matter where it goes or what its purpose, the provincial government is betraying a one-track mind in every meaning of the phrase.

Its latest idea of having mileage and money by routing the Pacific Great Eastern over a short-cut to its connection with the Northern Alberta Railways is further evidence of this.

Gone are previous fine notions of serving main centres like Dawson Creek and Fort St. John. The main thought now is to get into Alberta as quickly as possible. If the line happens to cross land of present or potential value, so much the better. But the absence of such possibilities is not a deterrent. The slogan now is to make it cheap and easy.

If the great railway-makers of Canada had been governed by no other precepts, it is doubtful they would have yet found their way to the Pacific coast. The effort of crossing the Rockies would not have seemed worth it. It is even unlikely they would have ventured across the rough Pre-Cambrian shield stretching across the country's middle. Western Canada, in short, would have been left untouched.

Construction of a railway into the Peace River country is not such a different proposition as the government seems to suppose. As in the early days, here again is an untapped land, rich in its promise of development. Some of it has been populated and cultivated but most of its potential has been barely looked at.

Here is where the government goes astray in its thinking. While obsessed with the thought of building a railway, it is apparently giving scant attention to what such a railway should properly accomplish. Although it may save money under its present abbreviated plan of construction, it will fail utterly in the development of the Peace River country and will have on its hands a railway that goes nowhere and does nothing.

With some slight consideration of the future, it can be seen that by far the most practical and promising entrance into our north country lies further to the west as proposed by our Chamber of Commerce and by others who have made a close study of the matter. By this approach, the line would commence at Hazelton, move north through the valley, then swing east across country rich in mineral resources.

Eventually the line could tie in with the Northern Alberta Railways to form a complete link across the Peace River block which would have a close outlet to shipping at Prince Rupert. At this port the whole vista of trans-Pacific trade is opened up.

Whether the PGE gets its northern extension or not, one day the line from Hazelton will almost certainly be built. It is only by this means that the rich northwest corner of the province can be adequately served and profitably developed. Anything else is merely a short-cut through a corner of the corner which, far removed from any port, does not even have a short-cut's basic virtue of saving time.

It would be a cheap railway but an expensive folly.

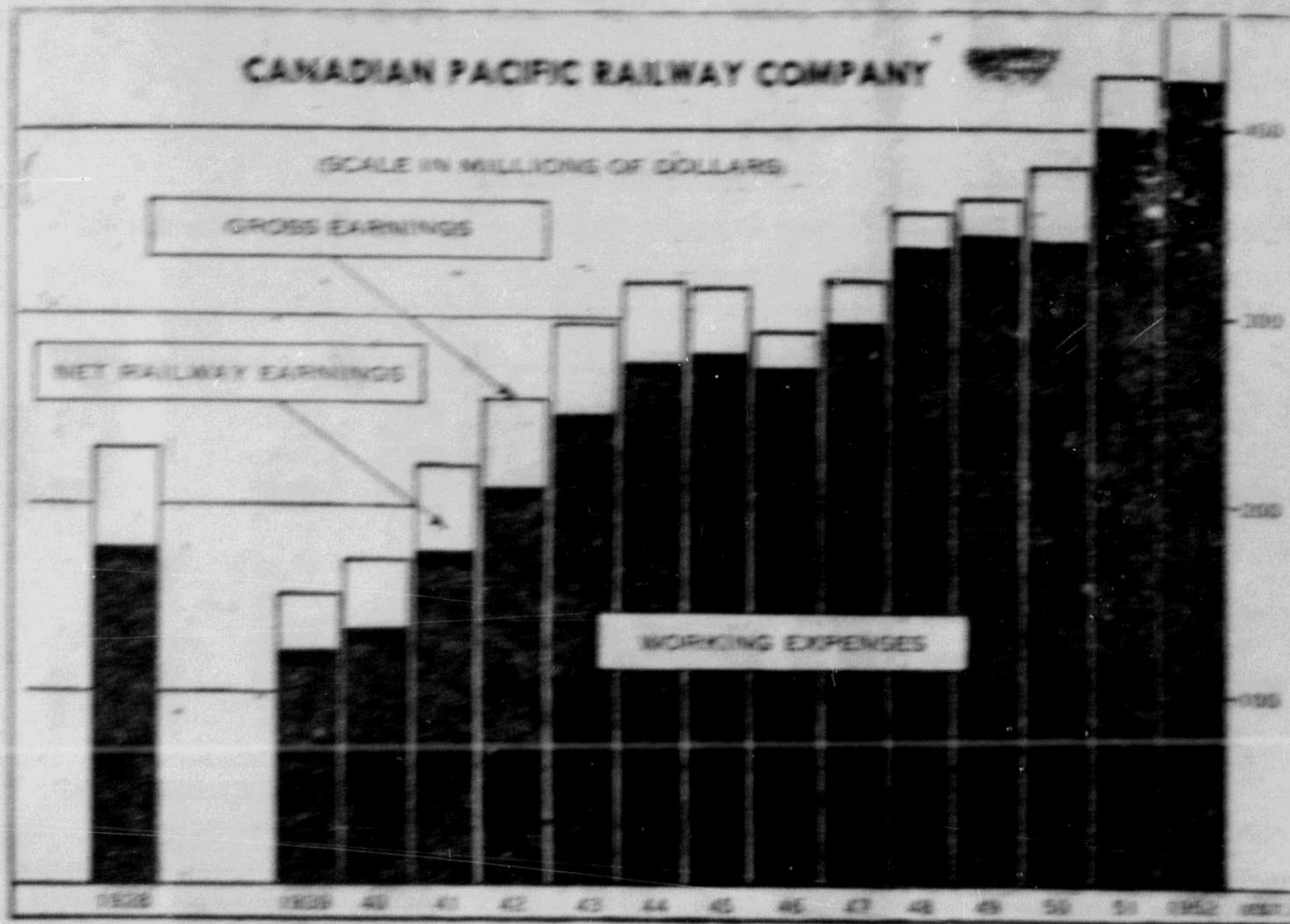

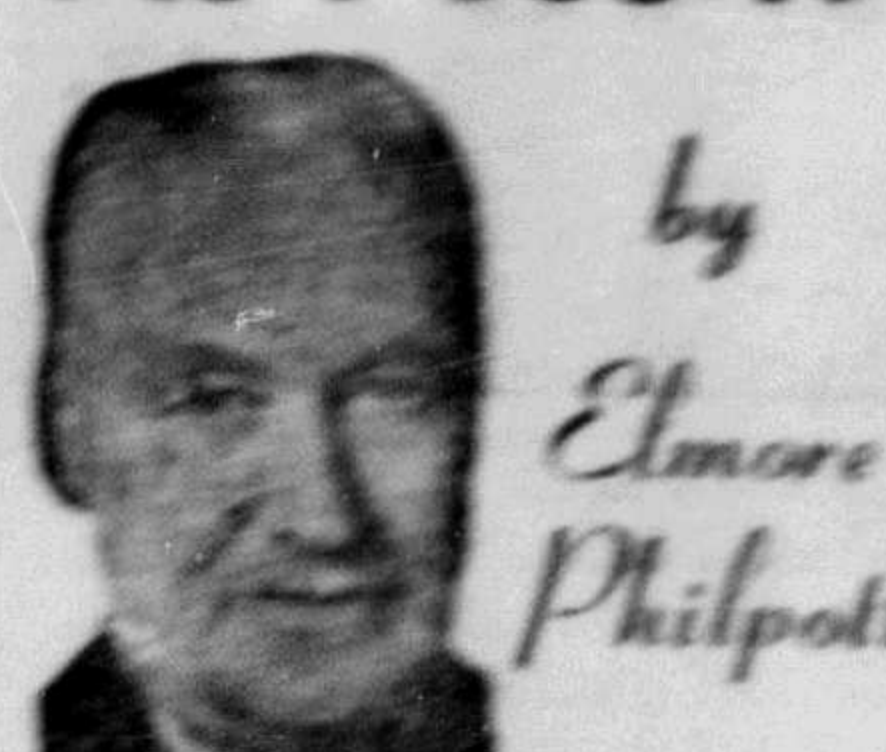

Will Two Spies Die?

TWO American citizens, who betrayed their own country and spied for Russia, are due to die in the electric chair at Sing Sing on January 12.

The highest court has heard the final appeal. There remains only the possibility of intervention by the President. Will the retiring President, in the very last days of his historic term of office, temper justice with mercy?

THE ROSENBERG case has been complicated because the convicted couple are first, Communists, and second, Jews.

In the present state of semi-hysteria in the U.S.A. it is difficult to get impartial justice for Communists or suspected Communists. It is instructive to compare the sentences given by the courts of three countries to traitors all convicted of the same crimes. In Canada Fred Rose, M.P., was convicted of the same kind of betrayal as were the Rosenbergs in U.S.A. He has served his prison term, is now free, even to run again for parliament. In Britain a top scientist who deliberately gave atom secrets to Russia has also served his term. He too is free again, and unrepentant.

The death penalty inflicted upon the Rosenbergs is quite out of line with sentences for similar offences in other democratic countries. It is also in startling contrast with the clemency shown by President Truman's regime to German, Italian and Japanese war criminals, and even to American citizens who deliberately betrayed their own country in the Hitler war.

THE CAUSE of the Rosenbergs has been injured by the way that the Communists, and Communist fronts, have misused the fact that the Rosenbergs are Jews. They have deliberately whipped up racism-in-reverse—agitation to suggest that the Rosenbergs were convicted because they are Jews, and not because they are traitors.

This is, of course, a total lie. The judge who heard the case and who passed the sentence was himself a Hebrew, as were the prosecutors and some jurors. The campaign put up by the Communists in U.S. is all the more disgusting as those self-same papers are meanwhile whitewashing the flagrant, calculated anti-Semitism of the Red purge in Czechoslovakia.

BUT FOR ALL THAT, if I were President Truman I would reduce the death sentence on the Rosenbergs to life imprisonment. I would do this, not because traitors do not deserve to die, and certainly not because they are Jews, but because they are human beings.

The Rosenbergs dead in the electric chair, after a sentence which tens of millions of people consider too harsh for their crime, will add the very cause for which they betrayed their country.

The Rosenbergs allowed to live would prove that the U.S.A. is still big enough to be merciful. Whenever there is a possible choice between mercy and no mercy, I would choose mercy, which is the bedrock virtue of Christian civilization.

Londoners Toast Tootsies, Grumble Over Pea-Soupers

LONDON (AP)—Every winter evening Londoners sit toasting their feet in front of the cosy open fires so beloved by Britons.

And every winter Londoners spend some of those evenings grumbling because their trains and buses have been bogged down by fog.

At last it's beginning to dawn on them that those cosy fires have a lot to do with the smoggy fogs—but so far this doesn't seem much that can be done about it.

Twice recently large chunks of British life were brought to an abrupt standstill by the worst fog in 30 years, with airlines grounded, trains running hours late and automobiles and buses jammed head to tail along main roads.

The total cost hasn't been totted up yet, but it's bound to run into millions of dollars—not counting the extra laundry bills Londoners had to pay to get the dirt and grease washed out.

AIRLINES SUFFER

Airlines were the biggest sufferers financially during fog shutdowns. More than a dozen international lines had to postpone flights for as long as 48 hours.

British Overseas Airlines, for instance, postponed 19 of its long distance flights during one week-end—and it costs BOAC \$2,000 every time one of its trans-Atlantic planes is held up. It cost a lot in frayed tempers, too, and got Britons asking "How can we stop it?"

The chemists and scientists applied "Nothing—yet."

There's little the chemists and scientists don't know about fog—except how to stop it easily.

CAUSES KNOWN
They know it's caused by what the experts call "a combination of moisture always present in the atmosphere."

Shake this up with a few hundred tons of assorted grit, dust and specks of coal and you've got the famous London "pea-souper."

It clings in your hair and on your clothes. It sticks in your lungs. People shuffle past in it like shapes in a nightmare.

At the Greenwich fuel research station to investigate air pollution they think they've got the problem nearly licked as far as industry is concerned.

But the householder still sits in front of his fire and doesn't bother about half his fuel bill going up the chimney in smoke.

Dr. E. T. Wilkins, of the research station, said there were about eight tons of smoke per cubic mile hovering over Greenwich during the last fog.

Britain's nationalized coal industry is busy on the problem at its research station and there are hopes that within a few years the smoke menace may be eliminated.

De Gaullists Support New French Premier

PARIS — G. — Rene Mayer, France's new right-of-centre premier, set about forming his country's 18th post-war cabinet Wednesday with initial backing of one of the largest parliamentary majorities accorded a French government chief since the end of the Second World War.

De Gaullists swung 24 of their 25 National Assembly votes behind Mayer early today to clinch his confirmation as premier.

I have stated before the belief of this organization, backed by the opinions of professional engineers, that Upper Campbell Lake, not Battle Lake, should be dammed for the additional power the Commission needs.

Upper Campbell is already ruined by logging, whereas Battle remains a sportsman's paradise; it is not at all certain that the proposed dam site on Battle would stand up; and in any case Strathcona Park was set up by an act of the 1911 Legislature.

Surely even the Power Commission can scarcely hope that an act of the Legislature can be set aside by a mere administrative body.

Thus we thoroughly approve Premier Bennett's move in proposing to set up a commission of inquiry.

OTTAWA DIARY

A ripple of considerably more than routine interest has spread over federal political circles as a result of the recent resignation from the Conservative Front government in Ontario of veteran Agriculture Minister "Tom" Kennedy.

There has been no elaboration in these parts of the cryptic statement from Queen's Park that Kennedy was resigning in order to help PC chief James George Dwyer in the coming federal election. But imaginations have been busy in the capital picturing the assistance which the Ontario agriculture minister would bring. It is recognized that it is a good deal better than just the adjective "considerable" or "substantial" could describe. In the Ontario theatre it might even be decisive. And it could be important elsewhere.

POWERFUL FIGURE

For "Tom" Kennedy has been not so much a provincial Minister of Agriculture as an institution in the eastern Canadian farm industry. A veteran of World War I, in which he commanded the First Cavalry Brigade, he entered the Ontario legislature almost 35 years ago and occupied the portfolio of agriculture minister for almost 15 of those years. Never a contentious figure, he was looked upon more as a farmer than as an aggressive party man. When he became a caretaker premier upon George Dwyer's removal to Ottawa, the farmers of Ontario considered that their prestige had been raised to its highest point.

It is a simple fact that, as a result of his 35 years in politics "Tom" Kennedy has become the best known and most widely trusted figure up and down the back concession roads of rural Ontario. In addition, his prestige spreads over into Quebec. Ontario and Quebec agriculture have many problems in common; in essence, a common economic underlies their operation. Kennedy's ability to talk the economic language of the farmers in the Eastern Townships of Quebec shouldn't be underestimated—even though he will have to do it in the English tongue.

KEY THEATRE

In brief, the recruitment of Kennedy is being recognized in federal political circles as one of the ten-strikes that the Drive Conservative leadership has achieved. And it is also regarded as pointing up the key importance which the Ontario field is assuming increasingly as the time of the coming election approaches. It is the one area of vast size in terms of potential seats (22) which is as yet uncommitted. That's the largest area of real fighting ground anywhere on the electoral map, and a prize worth fighting for by any political party.

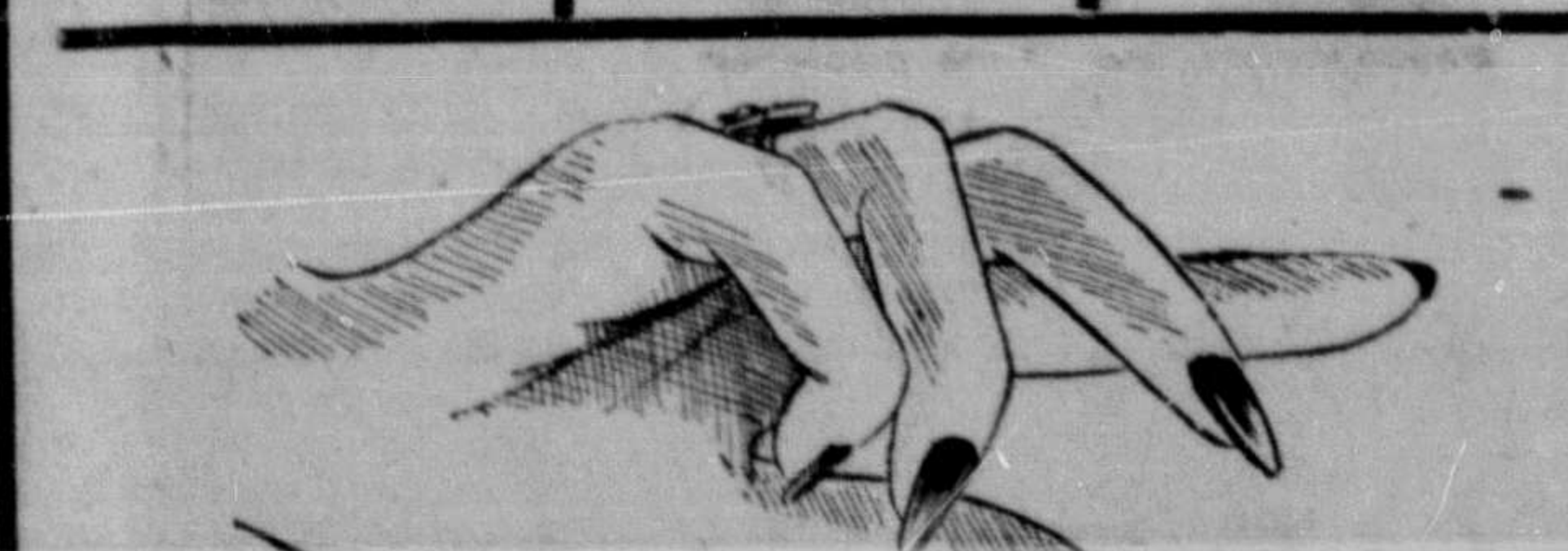

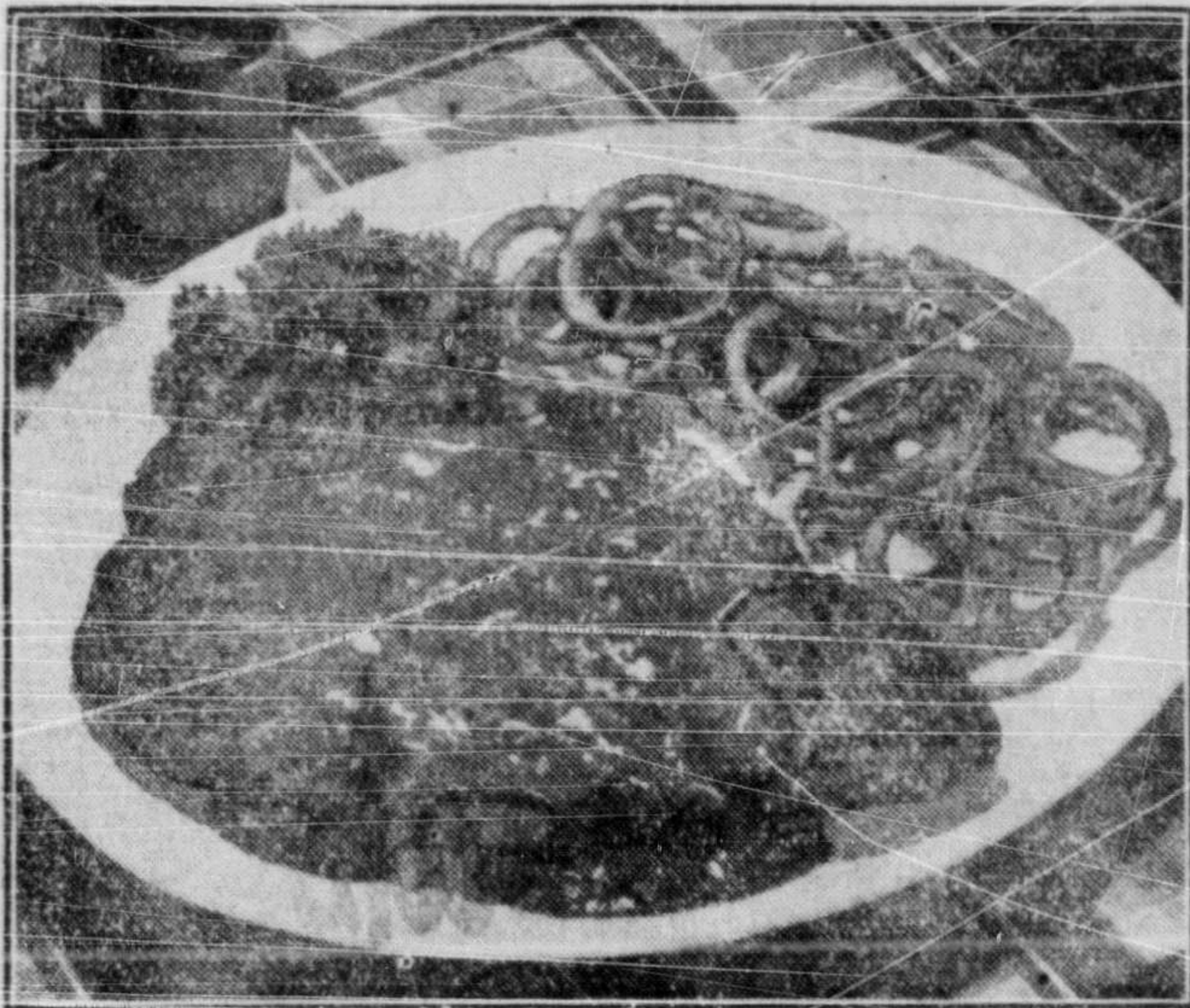

Cook Swiss Steak With Tomato-Soup Sauce



Want to say, "Let's celebrate," to your family? Then put dinner into a celebratory mood with a platter of Swiss steak cooked in a savory tomato-soup sauce.

The tomato soup, plus onion and garlic, gives flavor dash to this dish. And with round and chunk steaks quite plentiful—and sometimes at a special price—it's a good time to feature this meat.

You can cook the Swiss steak either on top of the stove or in the oven. If you use the oven, have a complete oven meal. Tuck in a casserole of scalloped potatoes. And bake dessert too, either a pineapple-upside-down cake or crunchy Cranberry Betty. Time it so all dishes come out of the oven at once. Just let the oven do the work while you go about other business until meal-time.

The recipe for the steak with tomato-soup sauce is as follows:

Tomato-Soup Steak
2 to 2½ pounds steak (round or chuck cut 1½ inches thick)
2 cups flour
½ teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
¼ cup shortening, melted

1 cup chopped onion
2 large cloves garlic, minced
2 cups (½ cup) condensed tomato soup

Pound flour and seasonings into meat with the edge of a heavy saucer until flour is absorbed. Brown steak in hot shortening in an oven-pan or skillet. Add onion and garlic; cook until limp. Blend in soup; cover. Cook over low heat

or in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 1½ hours, or until meat is tender. Serves 6.

SOUP SCOOPS

Combine Mushroom and Beef Soups: For an extra-rich soup, combine 1 can each of condensed cream of mushroom and beef soups. Stir in 1 can of water or milk. This makes a meaty soup that is sturdy eating. Serve it with toasted crackers spread with cheese.

Use Spaghetti and Dried Beef in Casserole: A can of spaghetti in tomato sauce with cheese adds up to a grand lunch or supper dish when teamed with a little dried beef. Pour spaghetti into a greased casserole; stir in about ¼ cup of chopped dried beef. Dot the top with butter. Bake at 400° F. until hot and slightly brown on top.

Soup Soaks Milk in Family Meals: Condensed soup, prepared with milk, contributes all-round food value to your family meals. And it's wise to serve creamed soups (with milk) often because recent surveys show that calcium is the nutrient most frequently lacking from the average diet.

Use Popcorn for Garnish: Light puffy popcorn is a perfect garnish for several soups. Pass a bowl of the buttered popcorn to get with tomato or vegetable soup. Let each one help himself and sprinkle it on soup so it can be eaten while crisp.

Aussie Laborites to Make Issue Of Welfare of Aborigine Tribes

SYDNEY, Australia (C)—The Australian Labor party executive has decided that the party should make the welfare of aborigines a matter of political policy.

A report to the executive by four Labor members of Parliament said that a good policy towards aborigines, well outlined, is the only answer to criticism of Australia's treatment of native peoples.

The Labor party forms the official opposition to the government coalition headed by Prime Minister Robert Menzies, who is supported by a Liberal-Country party amalgamation.

DWINDLING BANDS

The natives, or aborigines, have been steadily decreasing in recent years. Their total number was estimated at around 200,000 when the white man came to Australia, but there is no accurate count of them at present because some tribes still wander over the whole interior although there is a remnant of the race in each of the states.

The Labor members of Parliament said in their report:

"We should recognize that we can be represented throughout Asia in a manner inimical to our good standing. We should recognize that far more basic rights have yet to be accorded aborigines."

It recommended that aborigines should get help to run cattle stations and tropical farms, and that mixed bloods should be encouraged to learn mining and prospecting and should later get leases. It urged the government to improve water supplies to reserves so that aborigines who wished could live entirely by hunting.

WONDERFUL PEOPLE

But Michael Sawtell, an aborigine welfare board member who has a wide experience of the aborigines at home, says the answer is not as easy as that. "Full-blooded aborigines in

tribal states are a wonderful people for whom I have affection and admiration," he says.

"When you know them it makes you wonder what we really mean by calling them a 'primitive' people. A conference of leading anthropologists, psychologists and sociologists could not devise a system of tribal organization as wise as the aborigines have made for themselves. But tribalize, christianize and civilize tribal aborigines and you at once create an impossible problem."

"At any mission station in North Australia—missionaries will tell you with pride that if the aboriginal mothers are well fed and kept from contacts with whites their numbers will actually increase. But segregation is no solution."

Congress Cool to Sharing Atom Secrets But Eisenhower Government May Relent

(S)uggestions are mounting that the United States and Britain swap atomic secrets for their mutual benefit. A survey of congressional sentiment reported by the House of Representatives is the latest in a series of studies on atomic energy.)

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new Congress casts a cool eye toward high-level suggestions that the United States should swap its secret atomic information with Britain.

Incoming congressmen willing to take a stand in an Associated Press survey lined up almost 2 to 1 against an open interchange of data with Britain.

But there was a lively argument on the issue, and many lawmakers said they have not made up their minds.

Favorable replies voiced such views as these: "Britain is our best ally," "the free world will stand or fall together," "either we're allies or we're not."

And the more numerous negative side sounded these themes: "British security system doubtful, too dangerous," "in the light of Britain's refusal to aid according to her ability in the Korean War," "I would not make available to her any information whatsoever."

Democrat opponents took a generally negative stand by a 29-25 count, with 13 others, saying only they would be very cautious toward any such move; senate Democrats lined up 10 more or less in favor, 21 generally opposed.

Representative Carl T. Durham, Dem. N.C., outgoing chairman of the joint congressional atomic energy committee, said he would have to see just what information is covered in the proposed exchange. But he said Britain's success in exploding an atomic bomb "makes the matter more practical."

SHARE INFORMATION

Prime Minister Churchill said recently he thinks Britain and the U.S. should share information again, after President-elect Eisenhower takes office Jan. 20. Churchill is expected to press this point in talks with Eisenhower in New York this week.

In Washington, the state and defence departments and atomic energy commission are reported to have agreed informally that the 1946 act should be modified at least so the U.S. could give

some information on atomic weapons to its North Atlantic Treaty allies.

Obviously, Eisenhower and his incoming administration hold the key to whether such a program will be recommended to Congress. Eisenhower has yet given no hint of his attitude.

Prayer Stays Execution

HUNTSVILLE, Tex.—A young convicted murderer who turned to God in the death house had his prayers answered when he was granted a stay of execution only 25 minutes before he was scheduled to die in the electric chair.

HOW DO YOU GRIP THE HANDLE?



GRIP FOR IN-TURN



GRIP FOR OUT-TURN

How do you hold the handle for an in-turn? ... for an out-turn? If I have been asked these questions once, it has been a hundred times. This subject is the cause of much controversy among curlers. Personally, I do not care how your grip the handle as long as you hold it in such a way that it does not encourage a wobble in delivery. In other words, the truest and most accurate delivery in curling is the swing delivery which requires that the stone hang from your fingers during the pendulum-like motion created by swinging the stone backward, then forward.

Hold a tight grip if you want to. Otherwise you will find yourself missing the broom by swinging or turning the handle the stone as you release it.

Grip For An In-Turn

The practice most commonly used by better curlers is to start an in-turn with handle pointing towards the player or in the cases such as my own, the handle points back and slightly to the right.

However, the important thing to remember is the grip itself. Grip the handle lightly with your fingers curled around it, so that it rests on a line between the first joint of the little finger and the second joint of the index finger. The thumb is placed lightly on the side or upper side of the handle.

Grip For An Out-Turn

The most popular method employed is a cross-handle grip for the out-turn. The handle points to the left at about a 60-degree angle. The position of the fingers is similar to that used with an in-turn, but the thumb is now placed on top of the handle. The second method points the handle back to a 30-degree angle. Myself, Grant, and Leo Johnson, former dominion champion, use the latter grip. Select the most comfortable to you, but your fingers only and keep palm and the heel of your hand out of the grip.

LONDON (Reuters)—London is rapidly losing ground to New York as the world's largest city, the Daily Telegraph says today.

During recent parades, Gilpin Sons displayed banners proclaiming "Toil and peaceful life," "Sons of Freedom cannot be slaves of corruption," and "The life of one child is equal to that of the world."

A few Sons from Krestova, Thrums and Glade have been drawn to Gilpin and Grand Forks and several community houses contain up to 17 families who share toil, food and other possessions. A community kitchen is being constructed.

A Christmas message from Stefan S. Sorokin, spiritual leader of the Sons, urged them to lead peaceful lives and to co-operate with the authorities.

Sorokin is in San Francisco and his letter came from there. Some Freedomites are continuing to seek passports in preparation for a possible move to South America. Sorokin is reported to be investigating resettlement possibilities.
