STORK BUSY IN CITY, OVER 300 BABIES BORN

The stork had a busy year at Prince Rupert General Hospital in 1952 bringing babies into the world at the rate of 13 each day for a grand total of 393 over the 12-month period. This was seven less than the previous year.

There were 30 more boys than girls born to keep nurses and doctors busy.

Peak month was in August when 40 babies were born.

The stork, however gave the medics a rest on Christmas Day and brought no infants.

Donations of \$50 apiece from the Chamber of Commerce and the Gyro Club have raised the Good Citizenship Award fund to \$251 and preparations are now underway for selection of the award's first recipient.

Created in memory of the late Alex Hunter, the award is to be made annually to the citizen, man or woman, who is considered to have contributed most to Prince Rupert's progress and well-being and who by personal example, has had a beneficial influence on the community. The Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the presentation and handling the arrangements.

Choosing of the Good Citizen will be done by popular ballot, the form of which will appear in the Daily News later this month. It is expected that the people's choice for the 1952 award will be announced in February, at which time the presentation will be made at a ceremony to be arranged.

DAWSON CREEK, B.C. (CP)

Dawson Creek business men have voiced opposition to a proposal to link the Pacific Great Eastern Railway with the Northern Alberta Railways at Beaverville, Alta., by a shorter route through Monkman Pass.

It was the second chimney fire answered by the fire department since the cold weather caused citizens to put on extra heat in their homes.

Firemen were called to the home of George Ness, 1725 Fifth Avenue East, at 9:40 p.m. Wednesday night after his chimney caught fire.

Chief Earl Becker warned residents to check chimneys to prevent fires.

Parks Commissioner Art Murray Resigns After His Re-Election

Art Murray, Park Board Commissioner re-elected by acclamation at the last civic election, announced today he is resigning because of pressure of business. A member of the board since its formation in 1950, Mr. Murray has been active in park development and promotion here for many years.

An active sportsman and businessman in the city, he recently purchased a men's clothing store.

Mr. Murray notified Park Board Chairman Pat Forman of his intention last night an hour before the first meeting of this

year was scheduled to take place.

Due to the absence of Commissioner Bob Armstrong because of sickness and a business engagement which kept Commissioner Charlie Balagno away, the meeting was cancelled until 7:30 p.m. this Friday.

Mr. Murray said he will tender his resignation to the city clerk prior to Friday's meeting.

Commenting on the decision, Mr. Forman said his loss will be greatly felt by the park board as he has always been so interested in development of our playgrounds and anything that will provide facilities for the enjoyment of children.

To Visit Canada

ALBERNI, B.C. (CP) — Protest against RCMP's increase in charges for policing cities and municipalities in British Columbia are mounting.

Latest objection came this week from Alberni city council where a move was launched to have a combined protest from all Vancouver Island municipalities.

Council decided at its regular meeting to ask the Vancouver Island branch of the Union of British Columbia municipalities to call a special meeting to discuss the increase.

The increase was announced from Ottawa recently. It raises the annual charge per man to \$2,000 from \$1,400.

Other cities and municipalities have protested the increase, including Prince Rupert.

Probably the biggest loser will be the Municipality of Burnaby which has a 40-man RCMP police force.

A move has been started there to consider establishment of its own force.

Other centres have demanded consideration of re-establishing a provincial force similar to the force that was taken over by the RCMP two years ago.

**Zero Weather
Keeps Plumbers
Thawing Pipes**

Business was brisk again today for the city's plumbers as the temperature dropped to zero overnight and froze the water pipes in many homes.

Official overnight low at the Digby Island weather station was three degrees above zero.

The city's freezing temperature was accompanied for the second straight day by a cold 35-mile-an-hour east wind forcing citizens to dig out earmuffs and fur hats and coats to keep their ears from freezing.



Cook Swiss Steak With Tomato-Soup Sauce



Want to say, "Let's celebrate", to your family! Then put dinner into a celebrating mood with a platter of Swiss steak cooked in a savory tomato-soup sauce.

The tomato soup, plus onion and garlic, gives flavor dash to this dish. And with round and chuck steaks quite plentiful—and sometimes at a special price—it's a good time to be a celebrator.

You can cook the Swiss steak either on top of the stove or in the oven. If you use the oven, have a complete oven meal. Cook in a casserole of scalloped potatoes. And bake dessert too, either a pineapple-upside-down cake or crunchy Cranberry Betty. Time it so all dishes come out of the oven at once. Just let the oven do the work while you go about other business until mealtime.

The recipe for the steak with tomato-soup sauce is as follows:

TOMATO SWISS STEAK

2 to 2½ pounds	1 cup chopped
steak (round or chuck cut 1½ inches thick)	1 onion
½ cup flour	2 large cloves garlic, minced
½ teaspoon salt	2 cups (1½ cups) condensed tomato soup
Dash of pepper	
½ cup shortening,	

Found flour and seasonings into meat with the edge of a heavy saucer until flour is absorbed. Brown steak in hot shortening in an oven-pan or skillet. Add onion and garlic; cook until limp. Blend in soup; cover. Cook over low heat until crisp.

SOUP SCOOPS

Combine Mushroom and Beef Soups: For an extra-rich soup, combine 1 can each of condensed cream of mushroom and beef soups. Stir in 1 can of water or milk. This makes a meaty soup that is sturdy eating. Serve it with toasted crackers spread with cheese.

Use Spaghetti and Dried Beef in Casserole: A can of spaghetti in tomato sauce with cheese adds up to a grand lunch or supper dish when teamed with a little dried beef. Pour spaghetti into a greased casserole; stir in about ¼ cup of chopped dried beef. Dot the top with butter. Bake at 400° F. until hot and slightly brown on top.

Soup Boosts Milk in Family Meals: Condensed soup, prepared with milk, contributes all-round food value to your family meals. And it's wise to serve creamed soups (with milk) often because recent surveys show that calcium—the nutrient most frequently lacking from the average diet—

Use Popcorn for Garnish: Light puff popcorn is a perfect garnish for several soups, unless a bowl of the buttered popcorn is to go with tomato or vegetable soup. Let each one help himself and sprinkle it on soup so it can be eaten while lacking from the average diet.

FLASHES

The crashing sounds of gigantic trees being felled by the sledge-hammered blows of iron-muscular men may be heard at the Capitol Theatre, where the new Technicolor outdoor drama, "The Blazing Forest," opens tonight.

The lusty story unfolds against the soaring background of the rough-and-tumble life of the great Northwest's logging camps. "The Blazing Forest" stars John Payne as the hard-boiled "boss" of a lumber camp who drives his men relentlessly. Payne's iron-hand control over the camp brings dramatic tumult to the various characters over whom he has jurisdiction. These include Agnes Moorehead, as the owner of the affected timberland; Susan Morrow as her orphaned niece; William Demarest as an old-time lumberjack; and Richard Arlen as Payne's black-sheep brother whose transgressions hold the answer to the riddle of Payne's oft-bitter behavior.

Their lives are interwoven in a pattern of love, hate, jealousy and distrust; but personal considerations are set aside when the forest—which is both home and business to all of them—burns into flames and presents them with the mutual task of conquering the roaring inferno.

The atmosphere of the bandit era in Oklahoma Territory is thrillingly captured in "Montana Belle," which opens tomorrow at the Totem.

Jane Russell and George Brent have the stellar roles in the story with Miss Russell cast as Belle Starr, the girl who became an exponent of frontier banditry, and Brent portraying a well-to-do gambler whose chief ambition is to wipe out the Dalton band of outlaws. But when Belle, in disguise, holds up his gambling establishment and subsequently, passing as a wealthy widow, buys a partnership in Eren's business, his interest is intrigued. Three exciting bandit raids and a wealth of action enlivens the fast-paced picture, directed by Allan Dwan.

DWINDLING BANDS

The natives, or aborigines, have been steadily decreasing in recent years. Their total number was estimated at around 200,000 when the white man came to Australia, but there is no accurate count of them at present because some tribes still wander over the whole interior although there is a remnant of the race in each of the states.

The Labor members of Parliament said in their report:

It is recommended that aborigines should get help to run cattle stations and tropical farms, and that mixed blacks should be allowed to learn mining and prospecting and should later get leases. It urged the government to improve water supplies to reserves so that aborigines who wished could live entirely by hunting.

But Michael Sawtell, an aborigines welfare board member who has a wide experience of the aborigines at home, says the answer is not as easy as that.

Aussie Laborites to Make Issue Of Welfare of Aborigine Tribes

SYDNEY, Australia — The Australian Labor party executive has decided that the party should make the welfare of aborigines a matter of political policy.

A report to the executive by four Labor members of Parliament said that a good policy towards aborigines, well outlined,

is the only answer to criticism of Australia's treatment of native peoples.

The Labor party forms the official opposition to the government coalition headed by Prime Minister Robert Menzies, who is supported by a Liberal-Country party amalgamation.

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Frank Moore's Father Dies In Cranbrook

CRANBROOK — Allan Spencer Moore, 68, operator for many years of the oldest store in the Kootenays—the Fort Steele Trading Company—died here Sunday.

The store, still operating in the original log building constructed for it in 1884 by the Galbraith Brothers, was the supply centre for the gold rush nearby Wild Horse Creek.

Besides his widow, he leaves another son, Frank Moore, teacher at Booth Memorial High School in Prince Rupert, who was home for Christmas but turned from the northern city after receiving word of his father's death.

Congress Cool to Sharing Atom Secrets But Eisenhower Government May Relent

Suggestions are mounting in the United States and Britain to swap atomic secrets for their mutual benefit. A survey of congressional sentiment reported below is the last in a series of checks on atomic energy.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new Congress casts a cool eye toward high-level suggestions from both sides of the Atlantic that the United States should drop its secrecy bars and again share atomic information with Britain.

Incoming congressmen willing to take a stand in an Associated Press survey lined up almost 2 to 1 against an open interchange of data with Britain.

But there was a lively argument on the issue, and many lawmakers said they have not made up their minds.

Favorable replies voiced such views as these: "Britain is our best ally;" "the free world will stand or fall together;" "either we're allies or we're not."

And the more numerous negative side sounded these themes: "British security system doubtful, too dangerous;" "in the light of Britain's refusal to aid according to her ability in the Korean War . . . I would not make available to her any information whatever."

Democrat representatives took a generally negative stand by a 29-25 count, with 13 others, saying only they would be very cautious toward any such move; senate Democrats lined up 10 more or less in favor, 24 generally opposed.

Representative Carl T. Durham, Dem., N.C., outgoing chairman of the joint congressional atomic energy committee, said he would have to see just what information is covered in the proposed exchange. But he said Britain's success in exploding an atomic bomb "makes the matter more practical."

SHARE INFORMATION

Prime Minister Churchill said recently he thinks Britain and the U.S. should share information again, after President-elect Eisenhower takes office Jan. 20. Churchill is expected to press this point in talks with Eisenhower in New York this week.

In Washington, the state and defence departments and atomic energy commission are reported to have agreed informally that the 1946 act should be modified at least so the U.S. could give

some information on atomic weapons to its North Atlantic Treaty allies.

Obviously, Eisenhower and his incoming administration hold the key to whether such a program will be recommended to Congress. Eisenhower has yet given no hint of his attitude

Navy Begins Training Assistants to Aid Specialists in Aviation Medical Survey

OTTAWA—The Navy is training medical assistants to help its doctors who are specialized in aviation medicine in making medical examinations of naval aviators, it was announced at Naval Headquarters today.

The new specialists will be known as Technical Assistants Medical and will be trained to

give tests and maintain the medical assistants are taking the special equipment necessary to the rigid, periodic medical check-ups of aircrew members of the RCN's fighter and anti-submarine squadrons.

The Navy plans to train other men in the new category and the Technical Assistants Medical will serve at the RCM Air Station, Dartmouth, N.S., and on board the aircraft carrier HMCS Magnificent.

During the course, the TAM's train in hospitals and naval air stations in Halifax, Dartmouth, N.S., and Pensacola, Fla. They spend a full year in the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic at the RCM Hospital Halifax, followed by six weeks at the RCM air station, Dartmouth, where they work at the hospital and fly in various naval aircraft to familiarize themselves with the mental and physical strains placed on naval aviators in operational and training flights.

At Pensacola, the new specialists get advanced training at the U.S. Navy's School for Aviation Medicine to qualify for medical assessments and treatment of the flyers.

Another important part of the course is the maintenance, repair and operation of such equipment as the electro-cardiograph, decompression chamber, centrifuge and audiometer. To enable the Technical Assistants Medical to understand these machines more fully, a special course has been arranged with the manufacturers.

The RCN has three medical officers who are specialists in aviation medicine and who serve at the RCM Air Station and on board the Magnificent. They are Surg. Lieut.-Cdr. R. F. Hand, of Halifax, Surg. Lieut. H. D. Oliver, of Halifax, and Surg. Lieut. Charles Konoyer, of Toronto. Both Lieuts. Oliver and Konoyer are fully qualified naval pilots.

HOW DO YOU GRIP THE HANDLE?

GRIP FOR OUT-TURN

How do you hold the handle for an in-turn... for an out-turn? If I have been asked these questions once, it has been a thousand times. This subject is the cause of much controversy among curlers. Personally, I do not care how your grip the handle long as you hold it in such a way that it does not encourage poor delivery. In other words, the truest and most accurate delivery in curling is the swing delivery which requires that the stone hang from your fingers during the pendulum-like motion created by swinging the stone backward, then forward.

Bonus Catch

LOWESTOFT, England (CP) — A schoolboy angler in this Suffolk district landed 401 fish in one swoop. He hooked a turbot, and the fish was no sooner in the basket than 400 young turbots appeared.

However, the important thing to remember is the grip itself. To grip the handle lightly with fingers curled around it, so that it rests on a line between first joint of the little finger and the second joint of the index finger. The thumb is placed firmly on the side or upper side of the handle.

The most popular method employs a cross-handle grip for the turn. The handle points to left at about a 60-degree angle. The position of the fingers is similar to that used with an overhand grip, but the thumb is now placed on top of the handle. The thumb method points the handle back to a 30-degree angle. 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
