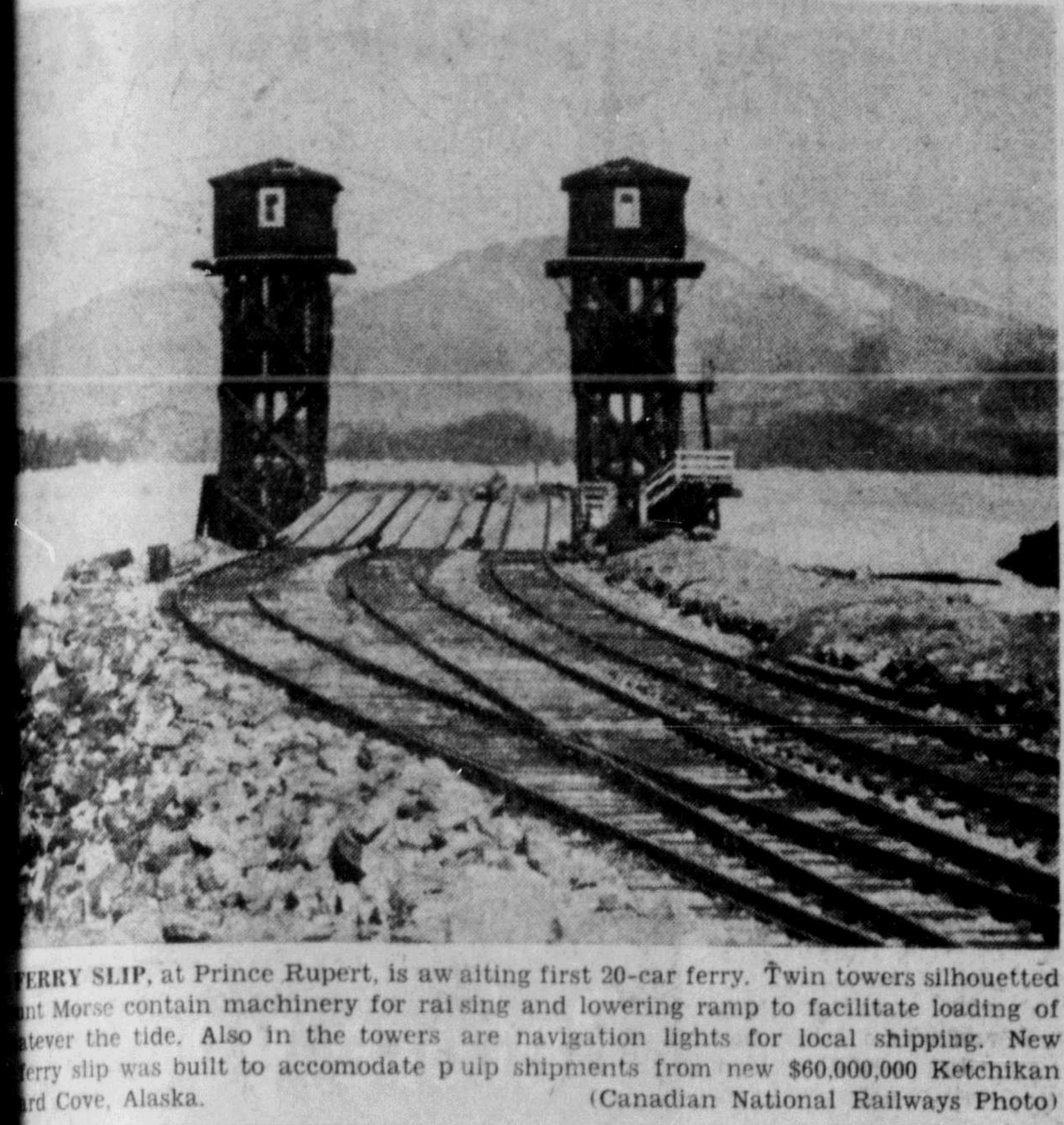

Red Proposal For Unification "Might Work" Says Australia

A-Bomb Aid For French Suggested

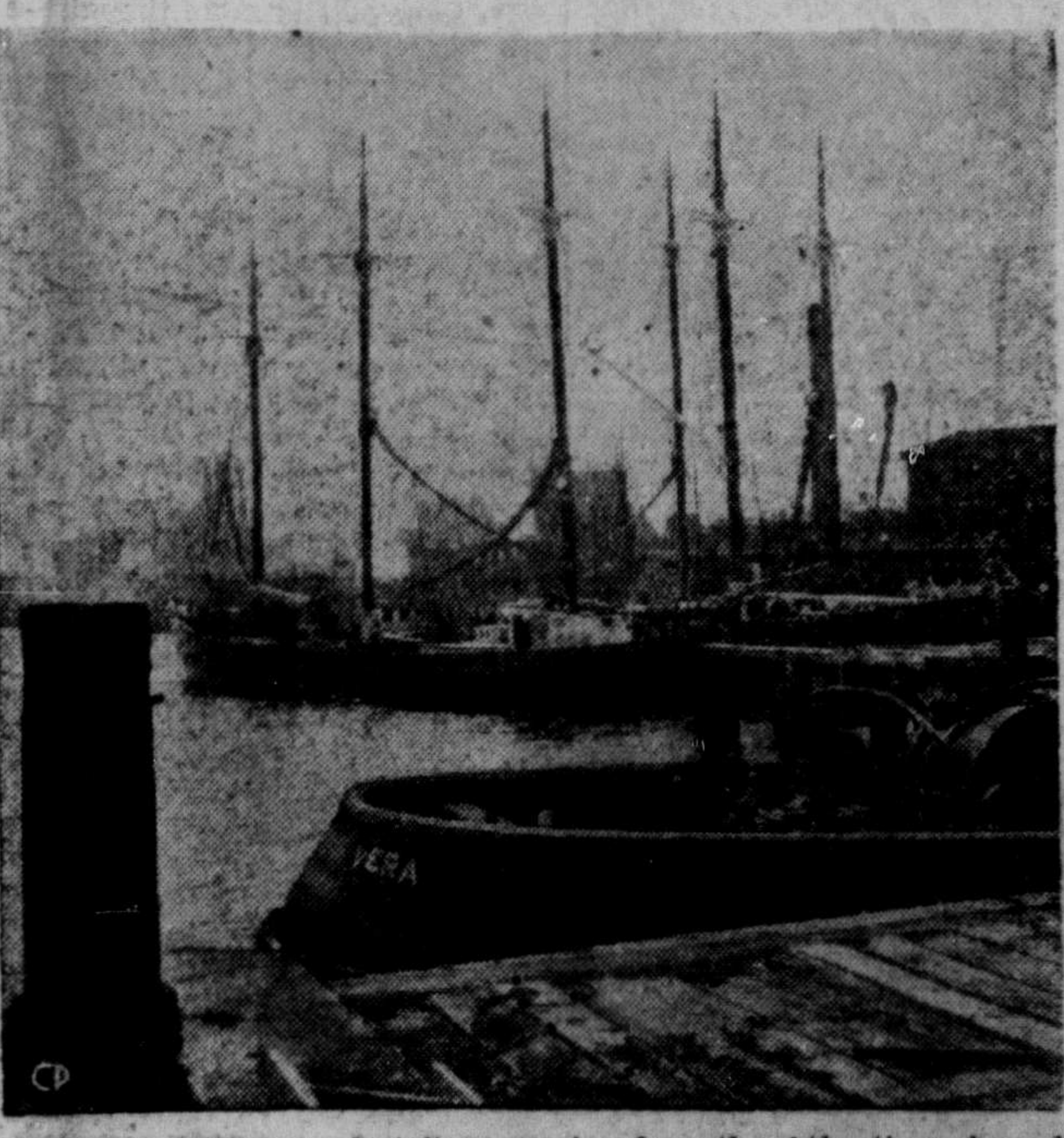
WASHINGTON (AP)—Representative Bob Sikes (Dem.-Fla.) proposed today that the United States supply the French with atomic bombs for use in Indo-China to "get the war won so we won't have to send American boys there."

"We have all kinds and all sizes of A-bombs that have never been tested in conventional warfare," the congressman said in an interview. "Let's see if they work."

He added that the Indo-Chinese war, in which French and native troops have been fighting Communist-led forces for more than seven years, "is becoming serious enough so that we had better use every weapon we've got to win it."

Sikes, a member of the House appropriations sub-committee which handles army funds, said he opposes sending U.S. forces to Indo-China without prior congressional approval, but would back maximum material aid to the French.

Representative John B. Bennett (Rep.-Mich.) meanwhile, prepared for introduction in the House of a resolution aimed at barring U.S. troops from Indo-China "without prior approval and consent of Congress."

U.S. Brands Scheme Puppet Regime Plan

GENEVA (Reuters) — Australia today urged the Far East conference here to give "careful consideration" to North Korea's proposal for re-unifying Korea.

Richard Casey, Australian external affairs minister, also expressed the hope that the South Korean government would accept Korea-wide elections if they were in the interests of final settlement.

State Secretary Dulles of the United States Wednesday called for elections in North Korea only and blasted the North Korean re-unification plan as a means of imposing a "Communist puppet" regime on the entire peninsula.

Gen. Nam Il, North Korean foreign minister, had proposed Tuesday that the North and South Korean legislatures set up a joint commission to arrange and supervise all-Korea elections.

Casey said that if South Korea agreed to all-Korean elections, it "would be a gesture which would not only be in keeping with support of democratic principles, but should, if the other side is sincere in its approach, lead to a peaceful solution of the Korean problem."

Queen Defies Death Threat Of Mau Mau

ENTEBEE, Uganda (AP) — The Queen defied a Mau Mau death threat, flying to Uganda Wednesday on her world tour, and thousands of Baganda tribesmen, ignoring nationalist demands that they stay away, turned out in a tremendous welcome to the young monarch.

The Mau Mau threat came in a letter from Dedan Kimathi, a leader of the anti-white terror society in neighboring Kenya.

Later, Queen Elizabeth opened the new £20,000,000 Owen Falls dam near Jinja at the head waters of the Nile river.

City Board Meeting Launches Park Lawn Projects

City Works Superintendent George Beaton came under fire again at last night's parks commission meeting, when two commissioners complained of slow progress in provision of lawns in the lower part of McClymont Park.

Despite Mr. Beaton's assurance that preparation of the ground prior to sowing of grass seed was proceeding according to his schedule, Commissioners Art Murray and Bob Eby felt that the lawn should be "in" by the end of May, and could see no reason why it shouldn't be.

"You can't get casual labor for that kind of work," Mr. Beaton replied. He told the board that the land there hadn't been utilized for years, and that a great deal of preparation was needed for a good lawn. "Artisans could not be hired for a few days and then let out," he said.

Mr. Eby moved and Mr. Murray seconded that additional men be put on the job to complete the lawn by June.

"SILLY MOTION"

"That's the silliest motion, I've ever heard in my life," Commissioner Charlie Balagno said.

Mr. Beaton said "if you're going to trust us to do the work, then trust us and we'll do it."

"I'm not suggesting the engineer isn't capable," Mr. Eby stated.

"Well I don't think that sufficient effort is being put into the job," Mr. Murray said. "If artisans are needed then get them and let's expedite it."

When a vote on the motion to get the lawn in by June 1 was taken Chairman Pat Forman said it was a tie. Mr. Balagno and Mr. Forman voted against it, Mr. Murray and Mr. Eby voted for it.

Actually the motion passed since Mr. Forman shouldn't have voted unless it was tied without his vote.

Even after the motion was declared defeated, discussion continued.

ABC World Law

IN SOME ways the British Liberal remnant is giving better leadership to the nation than is either of the two main parties.

The Liberals have no hope of coming back to power themselves. They must therefore depend on persuasion rather than force of numbers.

In their Easter conference the British Liberals endorsed pleas for:

- An immediate agreement by the big powers never to use, under any circumstances, atomic hydrogen or other similar weapons of mass and indiscriminate slaughter, and,
- Transformation of UN into a real world government, with power to make actual law to keep peace between nations—such law to be upheld by a UN police force.

I CANNOT agree with the first point proposed by the British Liberals. It seems to me that it is foolish to think that A bombs or H bombs or cobalt or nitrogen bombs will not be used in the event of an outright third world war.

Moreover, it seems to me that there is much less danger of Russian or Chinese aggression, by their immense land armies, because both of those governments know that hours after such aggression was a fact bombs would certainly be falling on their own capitals and key centres.

It seems to me that the British Liberals could attain the objective they have in mind, by a slightly different proposal:

Have all nations solemnly agree that none of them will use A bombs, H bombs or other similar weapons EXCEPT IN RETALIATION FOR AN OPEN AGGRESSION by land, sea or air, and put the responsibility for establishing the fact of such an aggression on some appropriate international body, such as the World Court.

It is a mistake to think that the international agencies which we already have set up are not competent to act in a hurry.

THE BRITISH Liberal party seems to me to be on much more solid ground in its recommendations re UN and world law.

Contrary to what so many people so loosely say there is no mystery about the fundamentals of real world law. It would have to be built up, stage by stage. But its beginning would have to be as follows:

No citizen of any country can take part in an armed attack on any other country. Anybody who orders such an attack, assists such an attack in any way, or takes part in such an attack is guilty of murder, and on conviction for same in World Court shall be punished by the extreme penalty.

No country may occupy any other country, or part of any other country, except by the freely expressed invitation to do so.

It is curious, but common to meet people who do not know anything about David or Nebuchadnezzar, or of Esau. They never heard of Naboths vineyard or the fiery furnace of Daniel. We sometimes wonder what their minds are furnished with. Yet the Bible apparently sells in extraordinary numbers.

WORLD LAW must begin by making it a crime to launch attacks such as were launched by the Kaiser, Hitler and Mussolini. But world law must not end there. It must also spell out such things as how Poland is to get her freedom, whether or not foreign troops are to stay on the Suez canal, and how the black man of Africa can win human rights.

OTTAWA DIARY

In some of the more thoughtful circles of Parliament there isn't too much complacency over the fact that a Canadian delegation is sitting in with the Big Powers at Geneva.

The feeling among the MP's who are uneasy is that we easily may get involved in international affairs beyond our depth—that already we are playing around in water that is dangerously close to our chin.

Theoretically Canada is at Geneva because of the part we played in the fighting in Korea. But other nations who had troops in Korea aren't taking part in the Geneva talks. The Turks, whose fighting forces were rated amongst the best in the field, are one example. True, they didn't have the number in the field that Canada had. But their casualties were relatively heavier. And in cases where blood is spilled as well as treasure, national interest isn't necessarily measured by the size of the army.

For at least some MP's the role of our Geneva delegation would be clearer if the talks were to be exclusively on the Korean armistice and its conversion into a permanent peace.

But the prospect of that being the case appears negligible. It looks now as though the talks would have more to do with the war in Indo-China and may even touch Asiatic foreign policy generally. If the experience of France in that field is to be taken as a criterion—not to mention the experience of Britain in India—there is just no precedent that invites a middle-class Western power like Canada to move in.

The fear that troubles some of the MP's is that Canadian involvement in the major trouble spots of international tension may very soon cost the taxpayers more than they can spare in peacetime dollars, while at the same time draining the nation's economic strength. It is pointed out that right now Canada has two expeditionary forces overseas on two continents. That is something that never happened before even in wartime. In a time of nominal peace it is less unprecedented than incredible.

In the present session of Parliament there has been frequent mention of the danger of Canadian goods pricing themselves out of both export and domestic markets. And a prime factor in the prevailing level of Canadian prices is the level of Canadian exchange rates.

VICTORIA REPORT

VICTORIA—This week George Pearson turns 74!

For 21 years he was a member of the Legislature, all but a few of those years a cabinet minister.

Never was there a harder worker for the public than George Pearson. He made his job his life, until his health broke and he had to retire.

Now he lives in Victoria, and it's good to see him making a physical comeback. He visits the downtown section of the capital nearly every day, though his sight isn't good, and he's impatient of his infirmities.

Because he was no tub-thumping politician, George Pearson is in danger of being forgotten as our political and legislative history is written.

George Pearson, as a matter of fact, didn't like politics; it was always—and still is—a mystery to him how he ever went into politics in the first place, except that it probably seemed the best way he could help his fellow man. All his years in the Legislature, Mr. Pearson was distressed when he saw good men fighting each other for political reasons.

To him, there was always so much work to be done that he thought politics a waste of time, somehow a sordid thing, which, really, politics isn't, or shouldn't be, anyway.

Mr. Pearson was born in England April 27, 1880, and reached Nanaimo, as a youth, with his parents. In Nanaimo he grew up, attending school there, going into the grocery business, and because he worked hard, he did well.

It was in 1928 that he first ran for the Legislature, as a Liberal, and he won. But he found himself sitting in opposition, for it was in 1928 that the Tolmie Conservatives swept to victory. For five years, George Pearson sat in opposition.

When the Liberals won in 1933, Premier T. D. Pattullo picked Pearson for the cabinet—minister of labor. He remained in that portfolio for years, then became Provincial Secretary and Minister of Health and Welfare, as well as labor. Not often can one man be found to carry three such heavy portfolios. As Minister of Health and Welfare, he started hospital insurance, and the worries of putting that giant—that great social reform—on its feet, took their toll.

He served, in all, under three Premiers—T. D. Pattullo, John Hart and Byron Johnson. He won six general elections—no small achievement—1928, 1933, 1937, 1941, 1945, 1949.

It was no mean contribution that George Pearson made to the public welfare of British Columbia, and while he's still with us we should thank him.

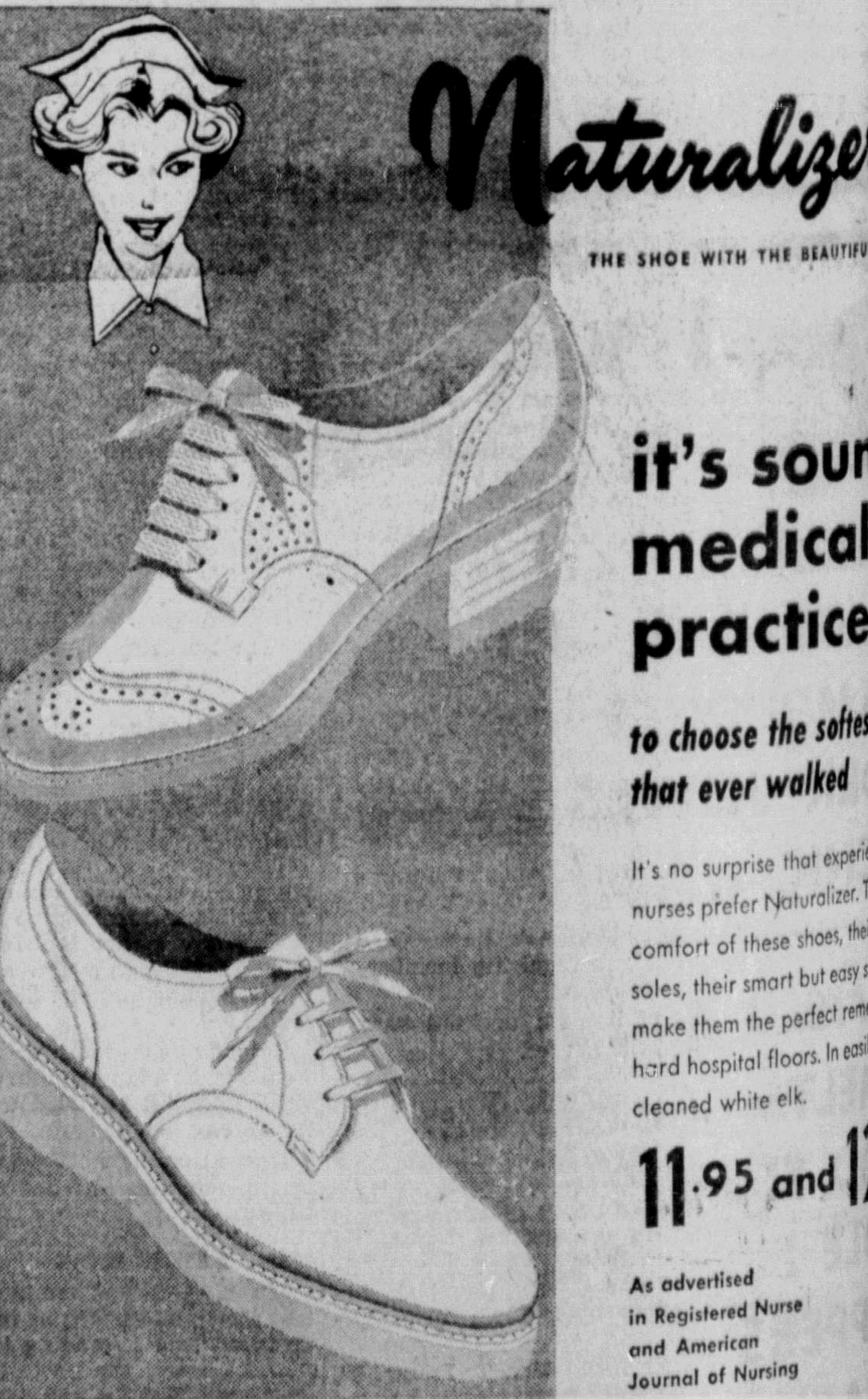

Canadian Youngsters Face Bleak Future Says Ireland

An intellectual Sahara as the inheritance facing today's children was forecast by Willard Ireland, provincial librarian and archivist speaking here last night, as he ribbed Canadians for their smug approach to Canadianism.

Speaking to the Prince Rupert Canadian Club on the topic, "Something to Cherish," he said that Canada was giving its children, through the schools, an appetite for drama, music and art, when it was not prepared to give them those things in adulthood.

He said that Canadians had three main approaches to Canadianism. There was the "tourist" approach of people who cherished the beauty spots of the country, each becoming sentimental over a lake, a mountain, a marsh in his own neighborhood.

There was the intellectual or

"snob" approach of those who cherished the advances of Canadian writers, musicians, painters.

And finally there was the businessman's approach, whose proponents went into raptures over statistics on Canada's production and potential wealth.

There was nothing wrong with any or all of those approaches, said Mr. Ireland, but they left much to be desired in a nation which was defined by St. Augustine as "an association of reasonable beings united in a peaceful sharing of things they cherish."

Defining "cherish" as more than just love, but a willingness to do something for the thing cherished, he said that Canadians failed to cherish their form of government, in their failure to exercise their right to vote.

In international relations Canadians were inclined to be complacent about their reputation abroad, second to no other nation. Instead of cherishing that reputation, they complained about the cost of the Colombo plan which, while helping to prevent communism in backward countries, also bettered Canada's reputation in those countries.

In the field of arts, he said, people were smug about the individual accomplishments but failed to support those arts.

Canada's dominion drama festival would have collapsed if a brewery hadn't underwritten it three years ago. The national art gallery in Ottawa in 1952 had a complete staff, including librarians, of four. The civic art gallery in the city of Toledo, Ohio, had a staff of 26.

Canada's libraries, too, were not cherished. In some provinces, 80 per cent of the people had no library facilities.

Finally, he said, Canada's soul needs some cherishing, and left his audience with the words of Queen Elizabeth when she urged the Commonwealth to go forward with a high courage, an unwavering faith and a quiet heart, with the courage to venture beyond the safeties of the past.

"WIVES SHOULD BE WELL EDUCATED"

MONTREAL (CP)—Higher education for women is the answer to "many of the increasingly serious social problems" of modern Canadian life, a Roman Catholic girls' college said today.

A brief prepared for the Quebec royal commission on constitutional problems said well-educated wives create a "solidarity of family life."

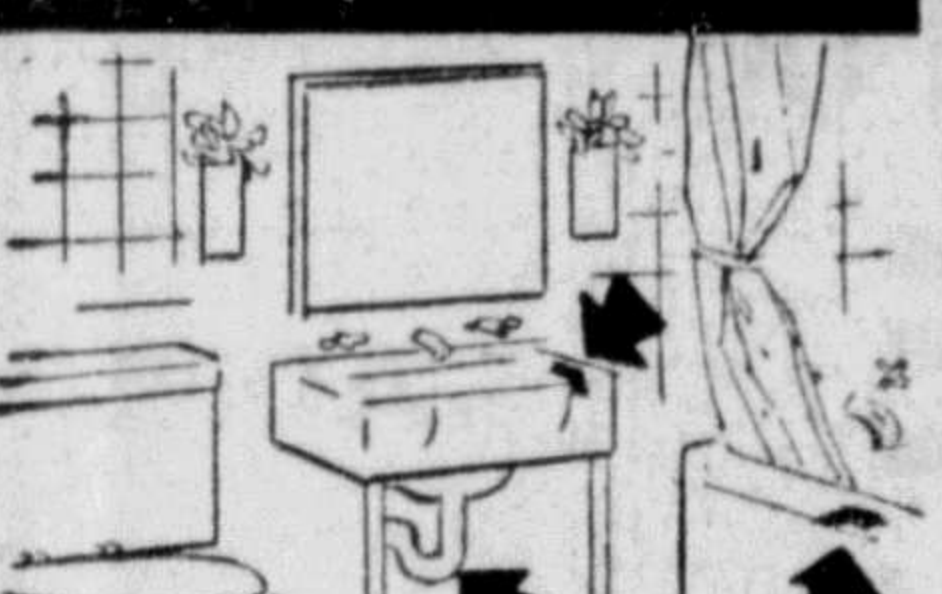

Russians Feel Sorry For Canadians

Content To Do Without in Building For Future

Canadian Press staff just returned to Canada months in the Soviet Union. One of the things that Russians think we are exploited by and "the money they say their system because it has abolished the ability to get rich of someone else's pocket our system enabling men to live fuller lives."

What the Russian regime thinks, as stated by its officials and the controlled Communist press, is less clear-cut. On one hand are repeated professions of friendship for the Canadian people. On the other are expressions of astonishment, verging on annoyance, that our government should participate—contrary to the will of the Canadian people—in American "aggressive preparations aimed at the Soviet Union."

"We always draw a distinction between the people and the ruling circles," one official said.

OFFICIAL LINE
Soviet newspapers carry only occasional articles about Canada. The line at present is that Canada is being sold down the river to the United States and is really an economic vassal of America. The Canadian Tribune, Toronto Communist newspaper, is often quoted.

As I left Moscow, Izvestia, the Red army newspaper, printed a long story by Simeon Scherbatykh, former Tass Russian news agency correspondent in Ottawa who since his return to Moscow has specialized in misrepresenting Canada to his Soviet readers. He said the U.S. is "transforming Canada into a springboard for aggression against the Soviet Union and the countries of people's democracy at an increased tempo."

Soviet newspapers insist the "low standard of living" of many Canadians is due to high taxes needed for the arms race.

FAMILIAR THEME
The working class in Canada is pictured as living in poverty while a few rich men who exploit the workers live in luxury. This, for instance, is part of a long description of life in Montreal published in Trud, the Russian trade-union paper:

"On the slopes of the mountain are aristocratic quarters. Luxurious private residences are buried in the dense verdure of gardens. Comfortable cars of the latest type are at the gates. The owners enjoy all the benefits of life.

"Closer to the port and in the suburbs the picture is completely different. Squalid little houses huddle close against one another. In the dark and narrow streets there are puddles which never dry."

DISTORTED VIEW
Most students I met know where Canada is, but their idea of its status is conditioned by the party line.

"The Dominion of Canada—that means you are a British colony," they say.

Or:
"Canada is a country being exploited by America and exposed to American culture."

"Canada is a NATO country and joining with America in building bases around the Soviet Union for aggression in a new war."

They cannot understand that a free people without aggressive intentions would be in NATO or the European Defence Community. Any suggestion the USSR might have been even in part responsible for their development is stupefying to them.

EFFECT OF PROPAGANDA

On a train trip in Soviet central Asia, I met a lieutenant in the Red army, a university graduate. We talked about Canada and Russia. He said life in Canada sounded good.

"We would have by now all that you describe if there had been no war. And now you want to have another one. Or do the people of Canada and the United States want war?"

"Of course not," I said. "Then it's just your leaders?" "They don't either."

"Then why are you building bases around the Soviet Union? And what about Korea? Why did the Americans attack there?"

"LEADERS KNOW BEST"
Later he said: "Another war would be terrible. There is no need for another war. Nobody wants it. Would Canada use the atom bomb? Our newspapers tell us Canada is an important country in atomic research."

I said Canada is not making atomic weapons; that Canadian research is entirely peaceful.

"Why don't our newspapers tell us that?" he mused. Finally he ended our conversation.

"There must be an answer somewhere," he said. "But our leaders must know best. We Russians are just little people after all. Only the Kremlin knows."

VERNON, B.C. — Western Canada will be represented in the Allan Cup final against Sudbury Wolves by Penticton V's, a team that fought its way through 28 play-off battles for the honor.

The Okanagan club became western Canada amateur champions for the second straight year Wednesday night when they hammered Winnipeg Maroons 5-2 here in the eighth game of a scheduled seven-game series.

V's took the series 3-2, while three games of the nerve-wracking series were fought to a 4-4 stalemate.

Penticton ran away from the Okanagan senior league in the regular season but struggled through 10 playoff games before capturing the league crown.

In the B.C. senior championships, Nelson Maple Leafs, winners of the Western International loop, had V's by the throat until the Warwick brothers, Grant, Bill and Dick, led them to victory in eight games.

Winnipeg Maroons had the V's wrapped up and ready for the heap when the Warwick's sparked their team to another thrilling comeback.

SPARK COMEBACK

The first game was tied 4-4 and Maroons copped the second 3-2. Playing with only 10 men, Penticton surged back into contention with a 7-1 upset sparked by Warwicks.

Winnipeg took a 2-1 edge in games with a crushing 4-0 shut-out. With two games tied, the Maroons needed a single point for the title. They never got it.

Penticton fought for a 3-1 win in the seventh game and set up Wednesday's fracas as a final affair that would have ended in sudden death overtime if necessary.

Maroons, smooth and smart, took a 1-0 first-period edge at 4:44. The visitors added another at 11:53 of the second.

It was then that Penticton caught fire. Jim Fairburn let fly a shot Maroon goalie Don Collins couldn't tag. George McAvoy cut loose with a goal less than three minutes later.

Grant Warwick scored the winning goal two minutes later. McAvoy whipped in his second goal at 12:14 of the third and Jack McDonald screwed the lid down with another at 16:24.

Goalie Ivan McLelland, a standout performer all through the series, was almost unbeatable.

CALGARY (CP)—Calgary Stampeders, building up a full head of steam under the cheers of a home-town crowd, bucked through a stout Vancouver defence Wednesday night to gain a 4-3 decision over the Canucks and square their Western Hockey League best-of-seven series at two games apiece.

It looked like a hopeless task for the Stampeders early in the second period when they were on the short end of a 3-0 score. But they rallied for two second-period goals and two more in the third.

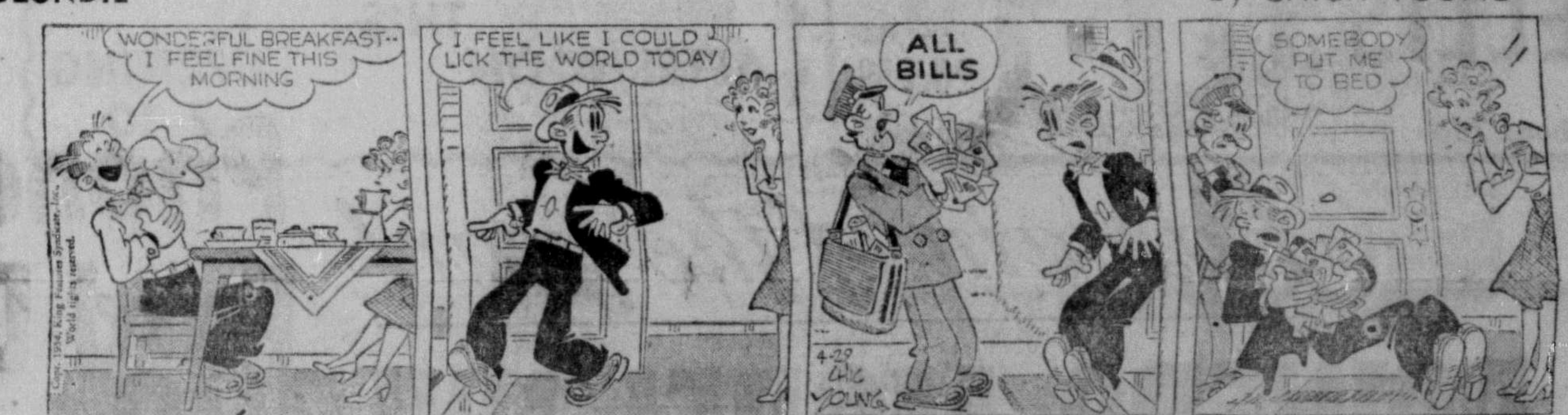

Rain and bad weather caused the other five scheduled major league games to be postponed. Spectacular relief pitching by little Jackie Collum preserved the Cincinnati victory.

Ruben Gomez pitched six shutout innings and drove in the first New York run at Milwaukee before leaving the game with a wrenched back.

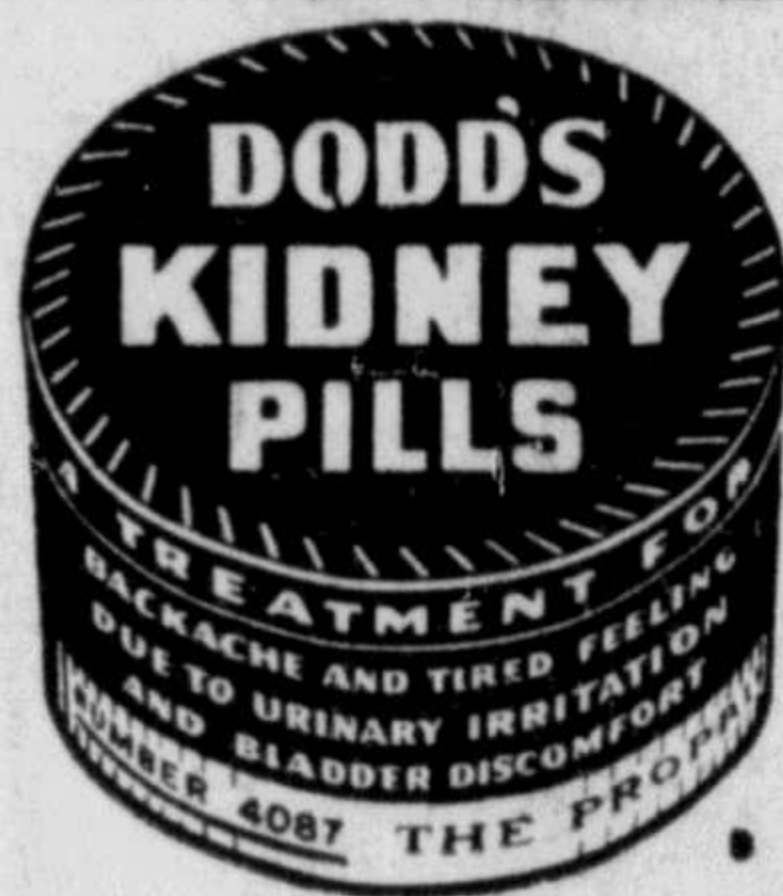
