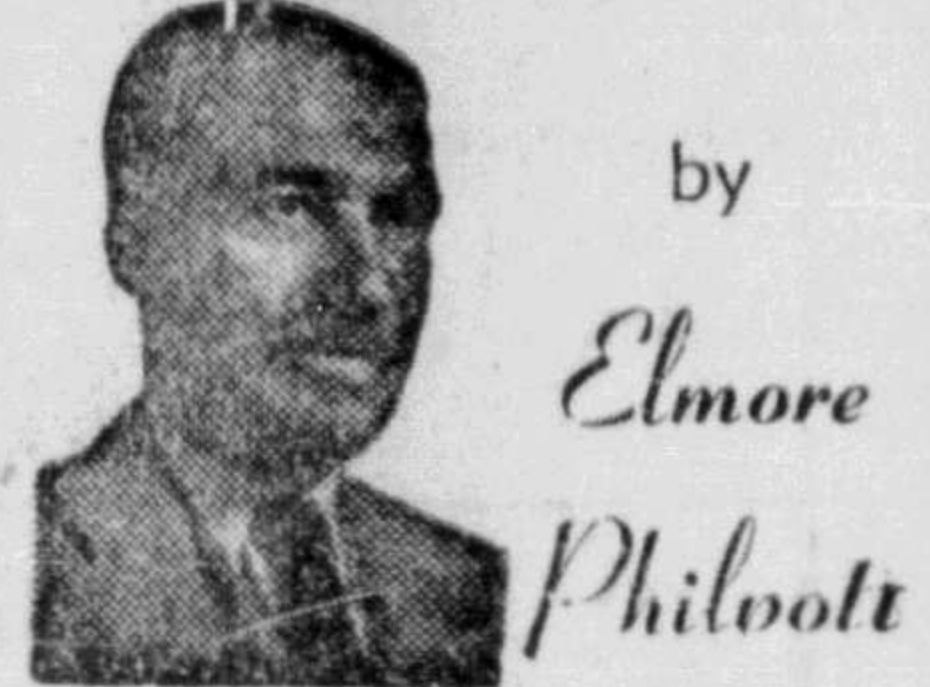

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As I See It



Old King Coal

THERE is a private member's bill before the House of Commons these days to permit the importation of U.S. natural gas into Ontario.

It has brought out some interesting arguments, especially from MP's interested in the future of coal mines, and coal miners.

The mines have already been hard hit, by the victory of the diesel locomotive over the old steam engine. Now they are faced with further loss of markets, to oil and natural gas.

IT SEEMS to me that the coal mining people have been asleep at the switch too long.

They did nothing, or very little, when the diesel engine was cutting into their business, and taking away huge chunks of it. Now—after they have already lost much of their former business, they are making belated efforts to come back. In Canada, for instance, they are waiting for completion of the experiments being carried out by the National Research Council into steam turbine engines, designed for purposes of railroads. But surely everybody knows that it is harder to get back markets after they are once lost.

IT MAY be true, as claimed, that the new style coal-burner will turn out to be an even better engine than the wonderful diesels now in use. But given another few years, coal would have no chance for a comeback anyway—for the railroads would have abandoned facilities for handling it on some lines, at least.

SURELY there is only one way that Old King Coal can fight back to hold the markets based on heating homes and public buildings.

Why not get busy in various towns, cities and villages, and sell heat, piped from central heating plants?

Such plants have been in operation in some parts of America. I remember one, I think, at Lockport, New York, another smaller one in Kitchener, Ontario, and a more ambitious project in central Winnipeg. Why not everywhere?

PEOPLE do not install oil furnaces, or gas furnaces, because they are cheaper. We have used artificial gas, for instance, in our own Vancouver home for twelve years. We find the price about the same as oil—that is, far higher than for coal or sawdust. But the extra convenience is worth it.

Why do not the coal interests set out to heat whole cities, under public franchise? They could pipe the heat, through steam or hot water pipes, and sell it by the BTU—British Thermal Unit.

There is only one reason why coal cannot compete with either natural gas or oil in the homes. That is because Old King Coal is asleep—the champion Rip Van Winkle of all time.

Problem Parents

THERE is no such thing as problem children. There are only problem parents.

While this assumption may be a little too broad for practical application, child psychologists are inclined to regard it as a fairly reasonable one all the time.

Graphic evidence of how much truth it contains is given in the current issue of Life magazine, describing the work being done in New Jersey in the handling of delinquent boys, the article says: "The major cause is the instability of the nuclear family which trains them for the world—the family. A family dominated by prudishness, alcoholism or antagonisms, by overprotectiveness or indifference, can leave a child with the attitude that all society is a sham. Because this attitude is motivated subconsciously the child is unable to explain why he behaves the way he does."

In these circumstances, it is obvious how the established forms of punishment are often seriously harmful. Since the delinquent does not know what makes him act as he does, he cannot rationally repent. Confinement then seems unjust and proves to him that his attitude towards society was right.

The answer no doubt lies partly in the better education of parents but since there can be little control of the problem through this approach, the state must concern itself more with correction and less with punishment. If more attention is given to this point, the day may come when we are making useful citizens of so-called juvenile delinquents instead of criminals.

May I state the facts, Brother Adams, from what I have experienced, since I became one of the executive members of this northern interior Skeena district, and over five years ago that, whenever our own Native members are involved in any particular problem no one from any other organization, or any other race, makes an offer to assist.

That is why I say very proudly it is only through the great efforts of our organization that our Indian people are protected, along with gains that have been made to the benefit and welfare of our people and children.

Criticism is nothing new to me. The harder the ball is thrown at me, the tougher I feel, to stand firmly for the protection of our people and children, because I know that there is no other race to share with us.

I feel I put it as plainly as I could in The Daily News of March 8, when I said it is felt by all our people that great dangers lie ahead of us and our children if the fishing industry in area 4 is not protected for our interests.

Therefore, we have every right to demand protection to the fullest measure or the natives of the Skeena River district will be almost completely starved out of the salmon fishing industry in area 4 because of overcrowded conditions.

I say we are working hard for our native people.

OTTAWA DIARY

Some fairly startling figures just made available to Parliament Hill indicate that Canada's great fishing industry is running unhappily true to form.

Traditionally it has earned the reputation of being the industry which recession hits first and hardest, but to which prosperity comes last and least lavishly in boom times. It is also the industry which, amongst the pressure groups in the land, is least successful in engaging the attention of Parliament.

And that, apparently, is very much the story of the industry right at the present time.

Here are the present facts of the fishing industry as the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has just issued them:

During the month of January (the last month for which the figures are available) the industry landed 91,000,000 pounds of fish worth \$2,500,000, as compared with 44,000,000 pounds of fish worth \$2,600,000 in January of last year.

In other words, in spite of the fact that the catch was greater by exactly 107.2 per cent, its value actually was lower by 3.6 per cent. And since the labor involved in fishing is fairly proportionate to the size of the catch, that means that Canada's fishermen have been working almost twice as hard as a year ago for wages that are slightly lower. In no other situation in Canada does a similar situation obtain.

The industry's January figures are really worse than they appear on the surface. For a year ago herring seining on the Pacific Coast was practically at a standstill due to strike action. To arrive at a true comparison between the two years, therefore, at least \$675,000 worth of herring seined on the Pacific Coast should be deducted from the January, 1954 totals. That would make this January's catch worth only \$1,800,000 as against \$2,600,000 a year ago. That is a revenue drop to the fishermen of 30 per cent.

One of the odd features of the fishing industry is its general failure, despite its unenviable record of depression, to operate successfully as a pressure group

in Parliament. It affects the economy of all provinces except the three on the Prairies and Ontario. Yet the western wheat growers, who draw their support only from the Prairie provinces, and the textile industry, which has its major roots in Ontario and Quebec, are many times more effective in gaining the ear of Parliament for their troubles. This is something that impartially-minded MP's don't fully understand. They think it is time the Commons directed itself to a solution of the really urgent economic situation which the fishing industry is facing. There may be a debate on the issue before the Easter adjournment.

U.N., Israel Start Probe Of Bus Ambush

BEERSHEBA, Israel (Reuters)—An official inquiry began today into a roadside ambush in which 11 Israeli bus passengers perished on Wednesday under a hail of Arab machine-gun fire.

Officials of the United Nations and the Israeli government arrived here to visit the scene in lonely Scorpion Pass, 12½ miles from the Jordan border, where the massacre took place.

They interviewed five survivors, including a Dutch woman who pretended to be dead when the assailants methodically shot those who escaped the first fusillade.

Aid From Norway

NEW DELHI (CP)—A Norwegian motor vessel brought a consignment of nearly 400 tons of equipment for the development of fisheries in Travancore-Cochin state. The shipment, including motorboat engines, fishing tackle and medical equipment, came under Norway's program of aid to India.

VICTORIA REPORT

VICTORIA — The combined opposition is evidently ganging up to vote against the five per cent sales tax, in an effort to defeat the government on the floor of the House.

But, if Social Crediters hold firm, as undoubtedly they will, the government will be safe. Without Mr. Speaker, the government has an overall majority of seven.

So important, so vital a matter as the five per cent sales tax would never have reached the Legislature unless it had been well argued out behind the locked, guarded doors of the S.C. caucus room.

Governments never take a chance on a defeat on the floor of the House. The defeat of the government last year came only because there were more MLAs against the government than supporting it.

So, it's quite safe to say, at this moment, that the government will not be defeated this session.

It was interesting to watch, and listen to Premier Bennett, as Minister of Finance presenting to the House, B.C.'s biggest budget. What tricks the fates of politics play! There stood that remarkable politician, W. A. C. Bennett, now B.C.'s top dog; yes, there he stood in the seat of B.C.'s mightiest, and it seemed but yesterday he sat in opposition to the Coalition government which he once supported.

Looking at his record of the last 12 years, Mr. Bennett's political enemies say that the Premier can't possibly know his own mind, what with all the jumping around he has done; still, no one can deny he got to the very top in a quite breath-taking fashion.

There are no Social Credit financial theories in the first Bennett budget. Oppositionists now want to know—how come? Surely, they say, if this is a Social Credit Government, surely there should be some S.C.

financial theories included. But no, it's a quite orthodox budget, say the orthodox financiers, quite as orthodox as John Hart or Herb Ansoncomb themselves would have presented. Mr. Hart, of course, would never have had anything to do with a sales tax, and Mr. Ansoncomb would never have reduced taxes. But, other than those small items, it was quite an ordinary budget—though a big and fat one.

While Social Crediters know full well there aren't any Social Credit financial theories in the budget, they'll say there are Social Credit dividends in it. They'll call the wiping out of the sales tax on children's clothing and shoes a sales tax dividend; a nother dividend, they'll say, is the cut in the amusement tax.

It was Mrs. Lydia Arsens who started this style of finding Social Credit dividends floating about all over the place. She said one day that family allowances are really a Social Credit dividend; that the Liberals stole the idea of family allowance from Social Credit. This so astonished the Liberals they couldn't think of a thing to say.

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Delegates Leave For UFAWU Convention

Representatives of the United Fishermen's and Allied Workers' Union will be leaving for Vancouver for the annual convention of the UFAWU, opening March 22.

The Women's Auxiliary will be leaving for Vancouver on the evening of March 21.

The local resolution points out that in the past two years, Japanese fishing in the Bering Sea had increased their annual catch from 2,500,000 to 8,000,000 and had announced their intention of taking at least double that amount this season.

Meanwhile, it says, western biologists are tagging fish in the Bering Sea in an effort to determine their destination. Until such time as they can indicate

whether those fish are bound for the Canadian coast or the Asian coast, the union wants the Japanese limited to an annual catch of 5,000,000.

Another resolution asks that the number of fishing licences issued in B.C. be limited for a period of one to two years and that a commission be set up to study the fish potential during that period. Union members felt that in many areas the fishing field was already overcrowded and that no more licences should be issued.

Other resolutions ask for: Extension of the past year's policy on barter trade between Canada and Britain or any other sterling country prepared to enter such contracts;

Control of the pink salmon fishery on the Fraser River on the same basis as sockeye controls, with an equal division between American and Canadian fleets;

International control (between the United States and Canada) on "bottom" fisheries, that is cod, sole and shell fish, including extension of territorial waters to protect the Hecla Straits and the west coast of Vancouver Island.

Pakistan People Show Admiration For Canada

The history of Pakistan and its present struggle through the growing pains of independence was outlined for members of the Prince Rupert Canadian Club last night by M. O. Baig, Pakistan high commissioner to Canada.

Noting that his country was extremely Canada-conscious, he drew a parallel between Canada-United States relations of many years ago and Pakistan-India relations at present.

He said that loss of the predominantly Moslem state of Kashmir to Moslem India would be to Pakistan what loss of British Columbia to the United States in the days of the international border "54-40 or fight" struggle would have meant to Canada.

The present dispute between Pakistan and India over water rights, with regard to three main rivers, which rise in India but supply a major part of Pakistan's irrigation, he compared to the old problem in the Canadian prairies over rivers rising in Montana.

Despite these disputes, he said, Pakistan must stay on friendly terms with India, for her own protection, just as Canada must remain friendly with the United States.

He termed his people a proud race, but said they had lost much of their pride and spirit under British rule, and now were struggling to regain that national spirit.

Comparing the economies of Canada and Pakistan, he said Pakistan was about the size of British Columbia but had a population of 80 million. Average income was about \$50 per annum compared to Canada's \$1,500 per annum and life expectancy was about 29 years compared to Canadians' 60 to 70 years.

Pakistan's internal policies, since gaining independence had been concentrated on education, since only 15 per cent of the population was literate. The major portions of internal expenditures were on education and defence measures.

However, the country planned to develop more industry in its predominantly agricultural domain. Since little or no private capital was available, the government was establishing industrial concerns which would be sold to private enterprise as soon as possible.

Mr. Baig stressed the great benefits received by Pakistan through the Colombo plan and praised Canada for its assistance which far out-weighed aid from any other country.

Canada was building a cement plant, an irrigation system and other projects, as well as conducting an aerial survey of the country to discover where oil and mineral ores might be found.

Another major Canadian contribution was technical advice on many projects and training in Canada of many Pakistanian youth.

Mr. Baig also outlined religious problems, the position of women, who had the same political advantages as women in Canada and other facets of Pakistanian life, predicting a bright future for his country.

Introduced by Canadian Club President Mrs. Shelford Darton, the high commissioner was thanked for his address by F. E. Anfield on behalf of the club.

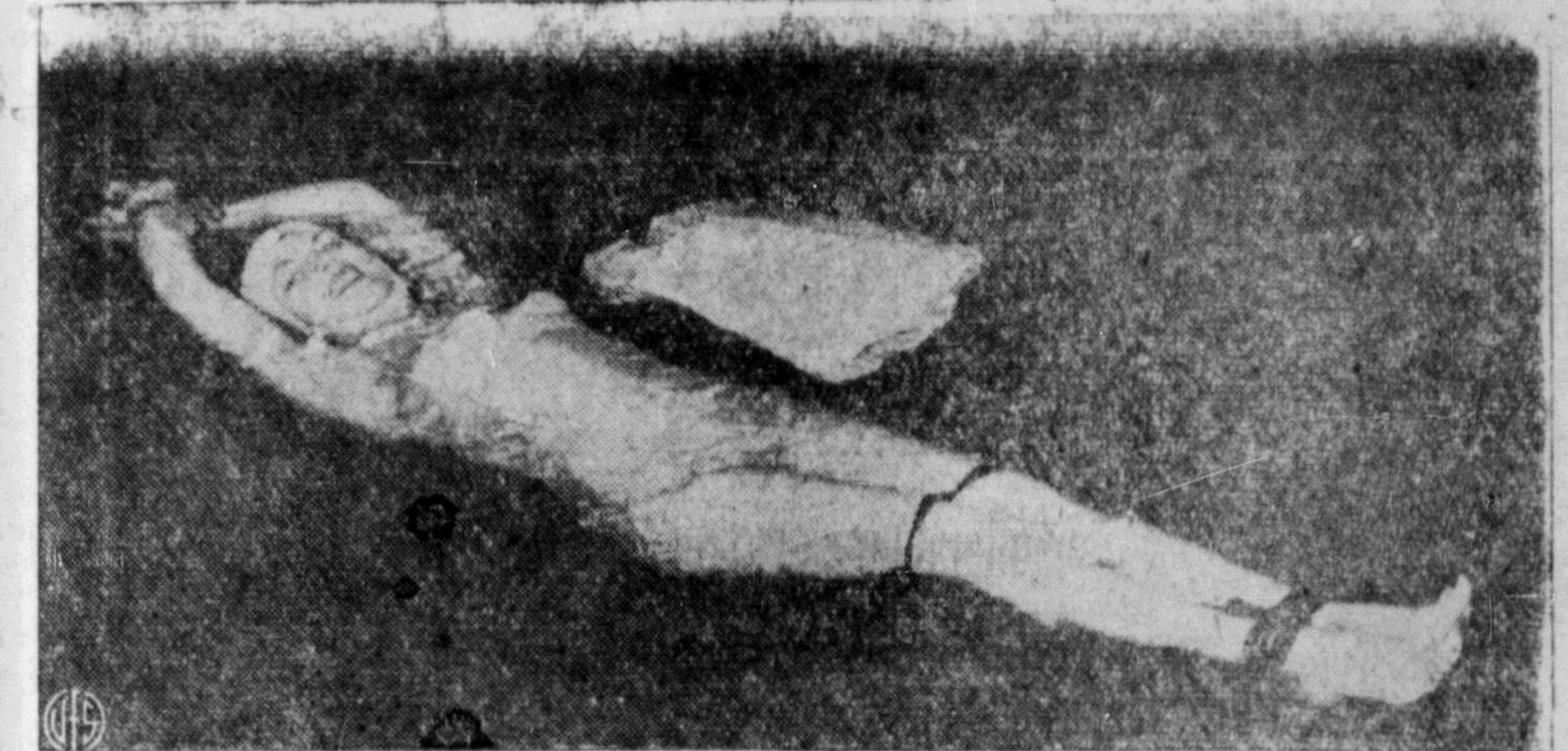

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St. Laurent Confident "Cold War" Not Going to Become Open Conflict

OTTAWA (CP)—A weary Prime Minister St. Laurent came home from his world tour Wednesday night with encouraging words. He told a press conference soon after his arrival that he has "more confidence that the cold war is not going to be converted into a hot war."

Mrs. St. Laurent watched the prime minister's drawn face anxiously as he told reporters that he had been "in some pretty hot spots and cooler spots." He had never been pessimistic about world peace and he did not expect another world war within his life-time at least.

Protocol flew away with the chill wind sweeping across moonlit Rockcliffe airport as high dignitaries and the public joined in a tumultuous welcome. As soon as the prime minister came down the ramp, the crowd of about 1,000 started pushing and shoving to get a chance to wring Mr. St. Laurent's hand.

There were cries of "Hi, Louie!" from the crowd and Mr. St. Laurent shook hands warmly with any outstretched hand.

whether it belonged to cabinet minister, diplomat, clerk or a cute stenographer.

GREETINGS WIFE

Obviously moved by the welcome, the 72-year-old prime minister stood at the top of the ramp as the RCAF band played "O Canada." Then he came down the ramp, kissed Mrs. St. Laurent and draped an Hawaiian lei around her neck. The band swung into "The Girl I Left Behind Me."

Trade Minister Howe was the official greeter. But his words weren't heard by the throng. Opposition Leader Drew had the same fate.

When he had a chance to catch his breath, Mr. St. Laurent, standing before television

cameras and radio microphones, said he was happier than ever to be a Canadian. "We have not much to envy about the other nations," he said, speaking in French.

With the formalities, or informality over, the prime minister went into the airport terminal to talk to newspaper men.

One of the first things he did was to pay tribute to the "magnificent" RCAF crew which flew him 35,000 miles to 11 world capitals in Europe and Asia.

He is scheduled to be in the Commons today to make a preliminary report on his trip, but he said it will take him some time to collect his thoughts before he can make a thorough report to the House.

IWA POLICY ON BENEFITS MAY NOT SET PATTERN

VANCOUVER (CP)—Two top B.C. labor leaders doubt a province-wide pattern will be set by the decision of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO-CCL) not to seek direct wage increases this year.

R. K. Gervin, secretary of the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, said Wednesday the decision would "definitely not" set a pattern throughout the B.C. industry.

"Other unions," he said, "will have to decide what has happened to their standard of living and act accordingly."

George Home, secretary of the B.C. Federation of Labor, said "contract proposals of each union will depend on the individual circumstances."

U.K. Daily Lauds Speech By Pearson

LONDON (CP)—The Daily Mail says today in a front-page editorial that External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson performed an invaluable service in his speech this week at a press club dinner in Washington. The Canadian minister called for full agreement among NATO allies on moves to answer an atomic attack.

The Daily Mail says that the Atlantic alliance might have been expected to establish beyond all doubt what procedure to follow in event of an atomic attack on a member of the alliance.

"Yet astonishingly enough there seems to have been no detailed agreement on this so important matter. If there had been, Mr. Lester Pearson, the foreign minister of Canada, would not have had to speak of the lack of it. By doing so he has performed an invaluable service to the Atlantic alliance. He has induced Mr. Dulles, the U.S. Secretary of State, to be more specific than any statesman so far."

LONDON (CP)—Dr. Hans Ueko, musician and conductor who came from Berlin in the early 1920's, is assembling a doctors' orchestra here for the medical profession's social and charitable functions. Men and women doctors who can play most wind and string instruments have joined.

Quarter Drive on Reds Pledged by McCarthy

MINNAPOLIS (CP)—Senator McCarthy challenged critics of his anti-Communist methods, saying he would "quarter drive" on Communists.

McCarthy also carried on his flaming controversy with Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens.

Referring to Stevens, the senator said "I didn't start the fight, but I think maybe I'll have to finish it."

McCarthy also quoted from what he called the "main report" to the national conference of the American Communist party last September, saying it urged Communists to promote fights between him and Eisenhower in the hope of destroying both.

Calls it Quits

LONDON (AP)—McDonald Bailey, one of the greatest sprinters of modern times, has announced he is hanging up his track shoes for good.

"My position is not an easy one because I think I still have at least two years of good running in me," Bailey said in a statement. "I am concentrating on a future for my family."

Bailey, joint holder of the world 100-metre record, rocked the British amateur athletic world last summer by becoming a professional rugby player. But he quit the professional sport last Feb. 7 after only one game.

Conservative MP N.D. Nault Dies

OTTAWA (CP)—N. D. Nault, Progressive Conservative member of the Ontario legislature for Russell since 1943, died early today. He was 65.

His death cut Progressive Conservative strength in the 90-seat Ontario House of Assembly to 77. There are six Liberals, two CCF, one Liberal-Labor and one Communist Labor-Progressive. Three seats are vacant.

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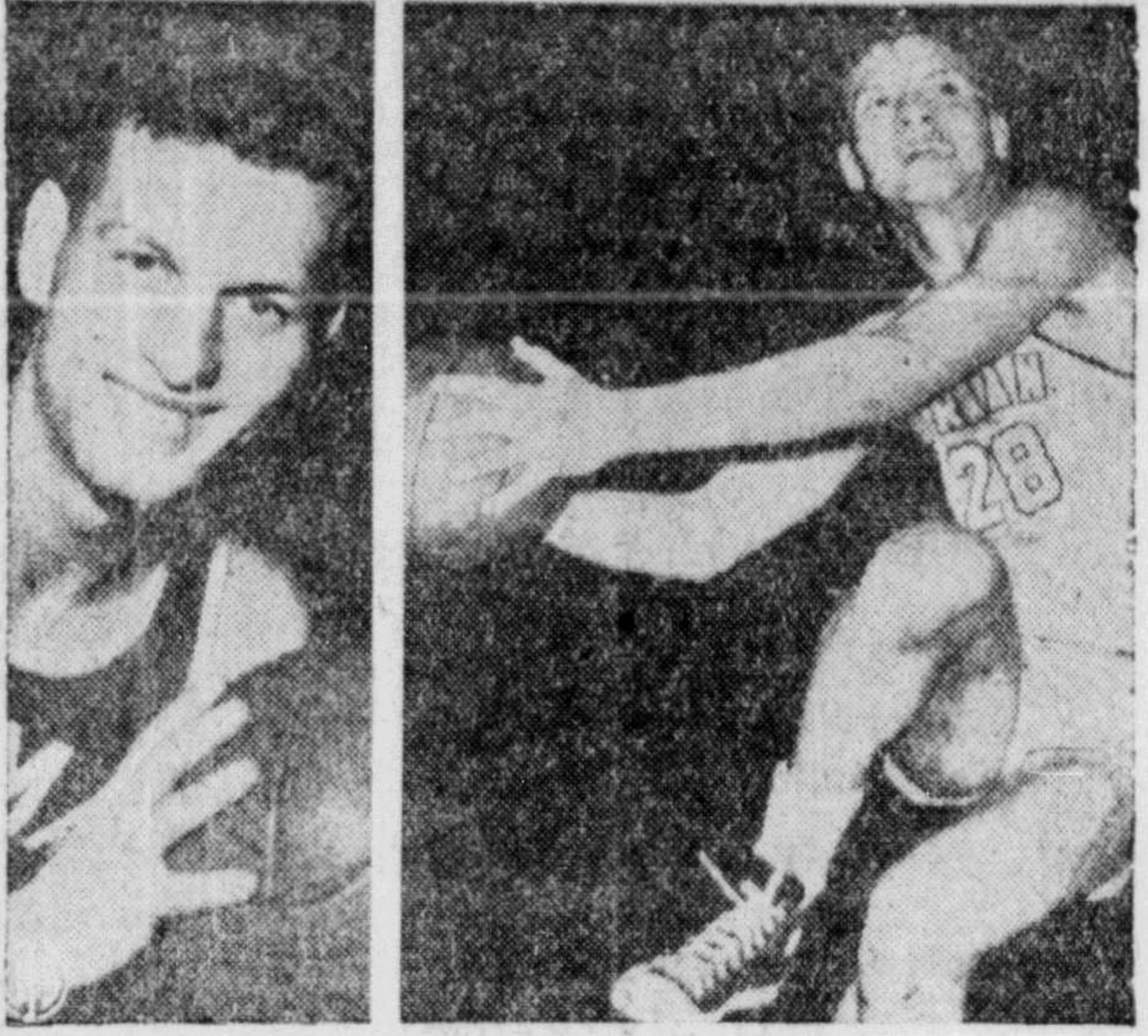

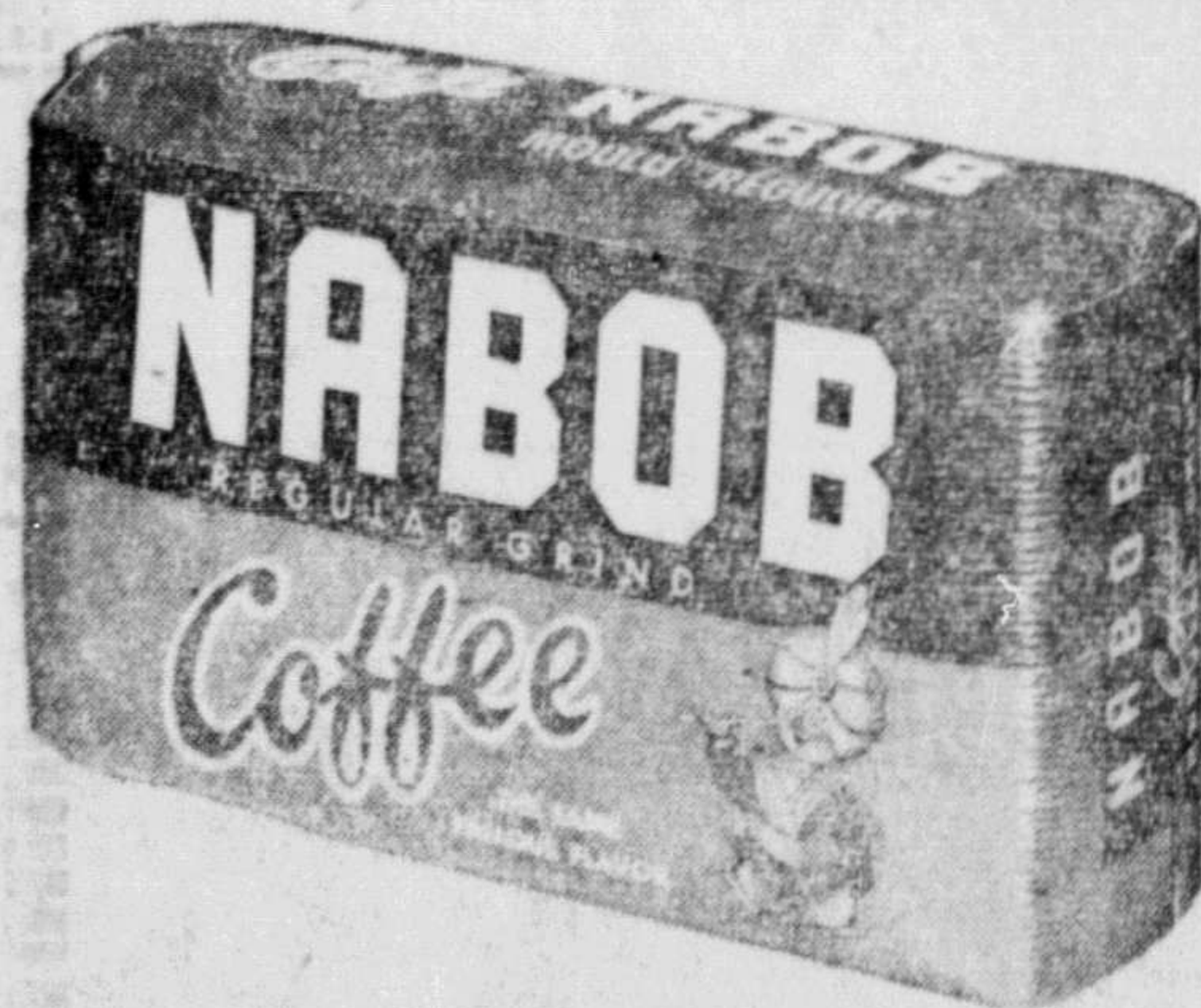

KNUCKLES, GLOVES — Many questions have made the rounds from time to time in regard to gloves and bare knuckle fighters. It will be interesting to note that John L. Sullivan was the last champion under London Prize Ring rules with knuckles and the first under the revised rules and Marquis of Queensberry rules with gloves.

John L. Sullivan, better known in by-gone days as "The Boston Strong Boy", was born in Boston, Mass., Oct. 15, 1853 and was just short of one and a half inch from the six-foot height mark and four pounds less from the 200-pound weight.

During his brilliant career John L. engaged in 39 bouts and won twenty of them, credited with 12 KOs, one no-decision, 3 draws, 2 exhibitions and was knocked out once. The great fighter died on Feb. 8, 1918, at Abington, Mass.

BILLIARDS A MYSTERY — In your poor or billiard or pool-room you'll play several assortment of games on the tables, at the modern style. Lou don't see much of old style, four-ball carom, 18.1 balkline, 18.2 balkline, three cushion and pocket billiard now days.

The first billiard championship match (old style) played in the U.S.A., was in 1859. Games were played on a 6 x 12 four-pocket table, with four balls, pushing and crocheting allowed, 2,000 points caroms. The first champ was M. Phelan, 1859 to 1862.

Billiards is another sport of mysterious and greatly disputed origin, with France, England, Ireland, Spain, Germany, Italy, China and a few other countries putting in a claim. Historians cast a vote for Egypt, and admit that the Greeks had a sport like billiards popular about 400 BC.

Frenchmen feel that the real origin of modern billiards was in France; and England claimed it too. The Irish scoff at both these countries and pointed to the fact that when Cathke More (Conn Cetchathach), King of Ireland in the second century, died, he left 50 billiard balls made of brass, and cues also made of brass. All in all, billiards remains a mystery.

We learn that in the earliest eras, billiards was played on the floor. The lads shooting the ball around the room. Later four railings were built to confine play to a limited space, and eventually the game uplifted and became a table pastime.

The Spanish, we are also told, introduced the game into the U.S.A. in 1565.

LOVED HIS BASEBALL — One evening last week an enthusiastic Prince Rupert sportsman wanted to know what sport book best recommended to the junior athlete. We came right back with "The Babe Ruth Story". This pocket-size book was quite popular over a year ago in both U.S. and Canada and most likely sold out at all bookstores.

This story, by the late great sportsman, is without a doubt the finest book a sport lover of all ages can read. It is the only authentic story of his life, was sincerely dedicated to the junior sportsman of America and to his great following in Canada.

The book tells of the beginning of Babe Ruth's first start in baseball, then to his illness. The great baseball player, during illness, said he wished to stick around a long, long time. For, above everything else, he wanted to be a part of and help the development of the great game (in his own words) "God ever saw fit to let man invent—baseball."

George Herman "Babe" Ruth was born on Feb. 6, 1895; died Aug. 16, 1948.

We're sure these books are not destroyed and on many bookshelves in number of homes in Prince Rupert. We like to see them donated to junior athletic clubs. Its a story worth one's while to read.

BLACKWOOD or BRIDGE

"Passing The Buck" Is A Well-Known Bridge Trick

If a good defensive play is overlooked, Mr. Heinsite always refers to it in the same way. That is, if he is the one who missed it, he calls it an impossible play to make. If his partner misses it, he unflinchingly calls it an obvious play.

See if you think his criticism in today's deal was reasonable.

Against the four spade contract Mr. Abel took the first two tricks with the king and queen of clubs. He then shifted to the four of spades and Mr. Masters won with the eight spot.

AVOID LOSS OF TRICKS

The problems for Mr. Masters was to avoid the loss of two diamond tricks. Since Mr. Abel had put in a double, it was probable that he held the king of diamonds and as the defenders also had jack and 10 of the suit, it seemed unlikely that a straight finesse or series of finesses would be the winning line of play.

Mr. Masters decided his best bet was to try for an end play on Mr. Abel. At trick three he led a heart and finessed dummy's queen. When this held, he cashed the ace of hearts and discarded the deuce of diamonds.

MISTAKE RECOGNIZED

Next he led dummy's last club and ruffed it. Now he entered dummy with a spade to the king. He returned a heart and instead of ruffing, discarded the nine of diamonds. Mr. Abel was in with the king of hearts and had no safe return. Clearly, a club lead would enable Mr. Masters to get rid of still another diamond, while ruffing in dummy. So the return was a low diamond which went into the ace-queen and gave Mr. Masters his contract.

After some thought even he didn't see it at first! Mr. Heinsite said Mr. Abel should have played the 10 on the first heart lead and the king of hearts under the ace. That way it would be the high heart left and Mr. Abel could not be thrown in the lead. What do you think — was it an "obvious" play for Mr. Abel to make?
