Government Starts Bill On Rail Loan

Speedy Action Follows Motion

VICTORIA (CP)-The government Wednesday followed legislative approval of the proposed southern extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway with a \$30,000,-000 borrowing bill that would make the extension possible.

Called the Pacific Great Eastern Construction Loan Act, it came just two days after the legislature passed an amended motion that gave approval for the extension.

The bill gives the government or the railway the right to borrow monies up to a maximum of \$30,000,000 for construction reconstruction, improving, maintaining, equipping and operating the line.

Graphic evidence of how much truth it contins is given in the current issue of Life magazine. escribing the work being done in New Jersey in te handling of delinquent boys, the article says: "The major cause is the instability of the maller society which trains them for the worldhe family. A family dominated by prudishness, lcoholism or antagonisms, by overprotectiveness or ndifference, can leave a child with the attitude that ill society is a sham. Because this attitude is notivated subconsciously the child is unable to exlain why he behaves the way he does."

In these circumstances, it is obvious how the stablished forms of punishment are often seriously armful. Since the delinquent does not know what takes him act as he does, he cannot rationally reent. Confinement then seems unjust and proves to m that his attitude towards society was right.

The answer no doubt lies partly in the better lucation of parents but since there can be little al control of the problem through this approach, e state must concern itself more with correction d less with punishment. If more attention is given this point, the day may come when we are making eful citizens of so-called juvenile delinquents stead of criminals.



It has brought out some interesting arguments, especially from MP's interested in the future of coal mines, and coal

The mines have already been hard hit, by the victory of the diesel locomotive over the old steam engine. Now they are faced with further loss of markets, to oil and natural gas.

IT SEEMS to me that the coal mining people have been asleep at the switch too long.

They did nothing, or very little, when the diesel engine was cutting into their business, and taking away huge chunks of it Now-after they have already lost much of their former business, they are making belated efforts to come back. In Canada. for instance, they are waiting for completion of the experi ments being carried out by the National Research Council into steam turbine engines, designed for purposes of railroads. But surely everybody knows that after they are once lost.

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



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

Mrs. St. Laurent watched the prime minister's drawn face anxiously as he told reporters that he had been "in some pretty hot spots and cooler spots." He had never been pessimistic about world peace and he did not expect another world war within his life-time at least.

Protocol flew away with the chill wind sweeping across moonlit Rockcliffe airport as high dignitaries and the public joined in a tumultous welcome. As soon as the prime minister came down the ramp, the crowd of about 1,000 started pushing and shoving to get a chance to wring Mr. St. Laurent's hand.

There were cries of "Hi, Louie" from the crowd and Mr. St. Laurent shook hands warmly with any outstretched hand,

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
