He predicted it would be 1956 before such legislation would be brought in and by that time many municipalities would be bankrupt. Municipalities could not afford to spend any more money on education. Vincent Segur (CCF-Revelstoke) supported the southern and northern extensions of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. Faith Not Required

IT MAY TURN out to be a very important coincidence that the date which the federal government has set for closure of our drydock and shipyards is just about the same as that for Alcan to get fully underway in the first stage of its operations at Kitimat.

While nothing official has been announced, it is expected that Alcan will have its first two potlines in operation by mid-September. The federal government plans to rid itself of the drydock and shipyards approximately two weeks later.

It will make quite a picture. At one point on the coast we will witness deepsea vessels starting to steam in almost daily to a booming new industry, while just a few miles north a once-great shipping plant will be formally entering its final period of decay.

If this happens, the unpleasant irony of the situation will be brought into still sharper relief. As the ships loaded with alumina surge northwards they will pass a file of tugs towing relics of our drydock, headed south. In a grim sort of way, it would make the picture of the year, or possibly of the century.

If a sale is made to someone with more faith in the north than the demolition squad in New Westminster, the tragic scene need never be enacted. That faith, of course, does not necessarily have to take the form of ship building and repair.

As things stand, however, the government is not holding out for faith. It will settle for a quick dollar, no questions asked.

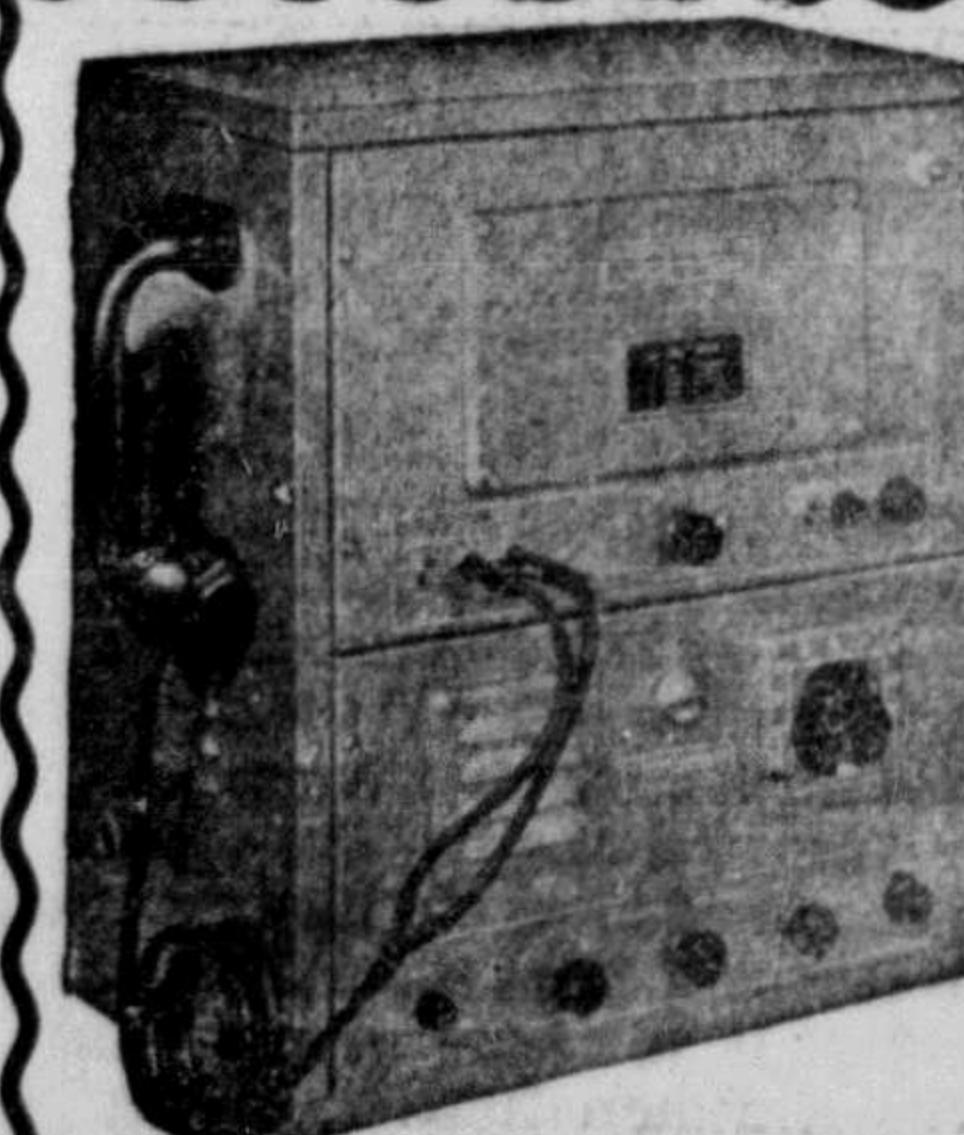

War Race On

WHILE our Prime Minister was telling the people of India that "we want to do our small part to bring about more sanity in international relations" two army generals were making speeches, thousands of miles away from him and from each other.

These three speeches, read together, show the crisscross nature of the present world situation. On one level, there is the latest, and most deadly competitive armament race in the entire history of mankind.

OF THE TWO generals one was American and one was Russian.

The American, General Ridgway, was telling a New Mexico audience that "a handful of evil men" in Moscow posed a threat to the United States which could mean, all-out war.

The eastern Canadian newspapers, perhaps with their editorial tongues in their cheeks, reported another general's speech on the same page. They were so much alike it was a joke.

I HAVE made a long and careful study of the way that international power politics works. I am convinced that one thing the generals, in all countries, must always have is that next war." No army can survive without a potential enemy.

Before the war of 1914 both sides talked and even bet, privately, about its coming. Before the war of 1939 we saw the same condition—only in more open form.

France Raises Minimum Wage

PARIS (AP)—The French government Thursday gave agricultural workers a 15 per cent increase in minimum wages. It was the second 15 per cent wage boost given to non-government workers this month.

Like the first, given to industrial workers, the rise was aimed at compensating non-governmental workers for the 15% raise granted last August to government employees.

OTTAWA DIARY

No feature of present-day House of Commons debate is deplored more frequently than its normally pedestrian dullness. At times—and for long bleak intervals—it seems as if brilliance of repartee was a lost art in the Chamber.

But every now and then there are flash-backs to the wit of the old days. For instance, Hon. Earl Rowe, Deputy P.C. House Leader, recently applauded a CCF speaker in the debate on unemployment for a particularly effective anti-government statement.

"You had better shut up," the Liberal MP warned Rowe. "You don't know what he (the CCF speaker) may say next."

While in many ways including the field of wit, it may be that Parliaments of the past surpassed their predecessor of the present, there are other respects in which the practices of today earn the title of "the good new days."

For example, there is the softening of party lines between the MP's in their social relations. In the old days a Liberal only entertained fellow Liberals; a Conservative only entertained fellow Conservatives.

It was a far cry from this state of affairs to the spectacle on a recent night of Liberal House of Commons Speaker, Hon. Rene Beaudoin, entertaining in honor of P.C. Leader George Drew. The First Commoner had as his dinner guests as many of the veteran members of the P.C. group as his limited dining room accommodation would admit.

### Saturday Sermon

#### "And the Disciples Were Called Christians"

By REV. L. A. THORPE, of the Regular Baptist Church

The name "Christian" seems to be the most popular in the world. And so it ought to be, because to those who rightfully adopt it, belong all the riches and resources of Heaven.

These, God tells us, guarantee us a greatly improved life on earth, and a perfect life in the future with Him. To Christians only, God offers real peace (Rom. 5:1). His most intimate companionship (Jn. 14:23), sweet assurance (Rom. 8:16), cleansing from stain of sin (Titus 3:7) and the supply of all their needs (Phil. 4:19) among many other precious things.

Perhaps then we should look at this name "Christian" and see what God has to say about these privileged people. The word is only used three times in the Word of God, so will not be drawn out investigation. The first mention of it is in Acts 16:26 where we read of Paul's and Barnabas' ministry in the church at Antioch. This was a particularly fine church, with great zeal for the Lord Jesus Christ and much missionary endeavor. The disciples who were the first to be called Christians were first "added unto the Lord" (verse 24) then happily served the Lord in their local Church.

The second time the word is used in Scripture is in Acts 26:28 where Paul is before King Agrippa, his life at stake. As usual, Paul turned this hearing into an opportunity to witness to what the Lord meant to him and Agrippa was thoroughly impressed. He replied, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." By this reply we see that he had heard of the disciples' new name; but what is of greater importance, it shows us that to become a "Christian" necessitates a decision. Agrippa was almost persuaded in taking that decisive step. This decision, to renounce the world and to accept Christ, was that same step that those in Antioch took when they were "added unto the Lord."

Peter is the only other Scripture writer that uses this interesting word. In his first epistle he writes: "Yet if any man suffer as a Christian..." He tells us what he means by the name two verses later where he says: "... And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" Peter obviously describes the Christian as "righteous" in contrast to "ungodly" and "sinner." Let us then conclude that all true Christians have been made righteous, not of works lest any man should boast, but by the precious blood of the Lamb of God.

There is a fountain filled with blood,  
 Drawn from Immanuel's veins,  
 And sinners plunged within that flood,  
 Lose all their guilty stains.

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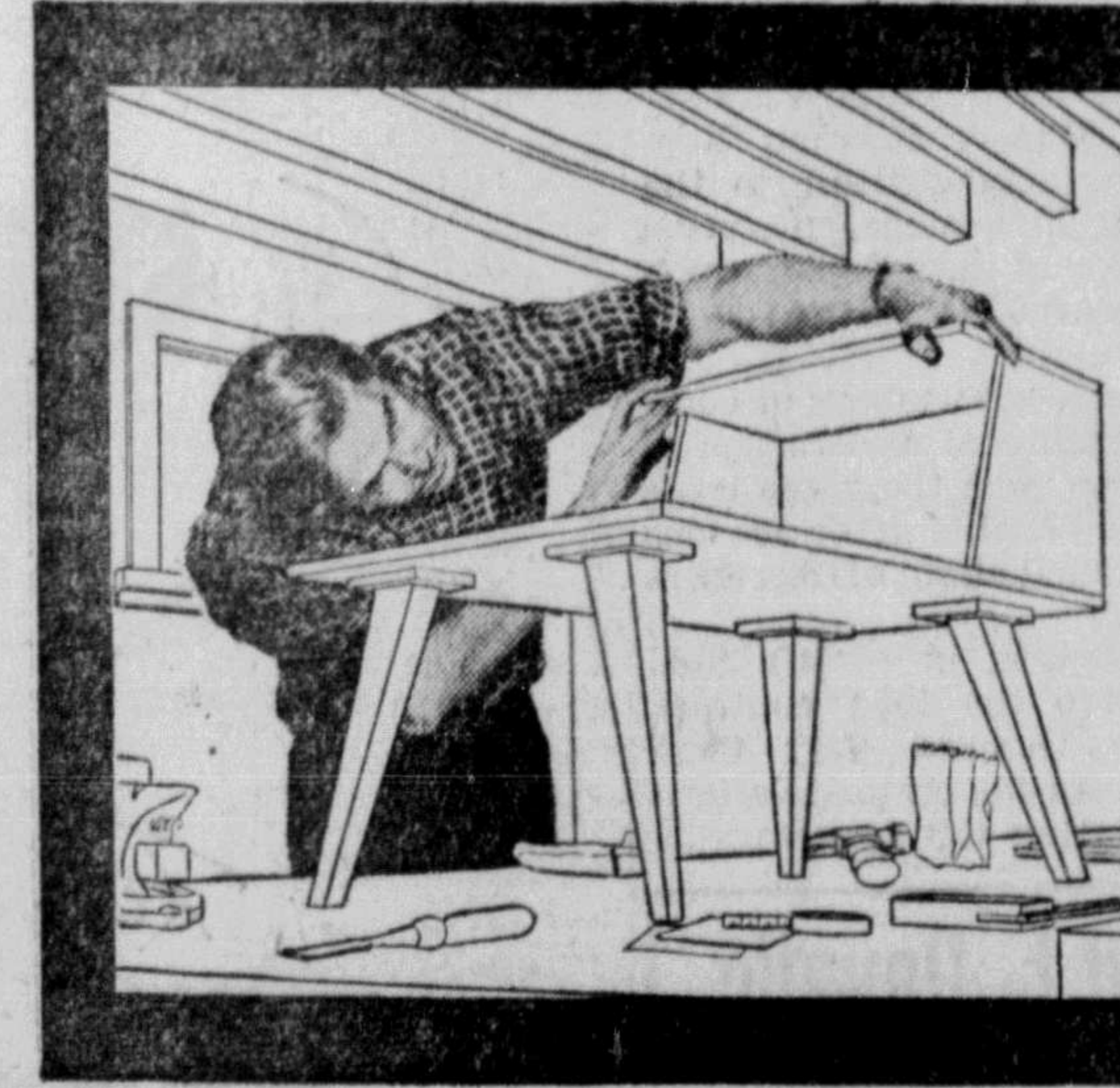
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## Talent Scouts of Film Board Seeking Charwoman With Hidden Acting Talent

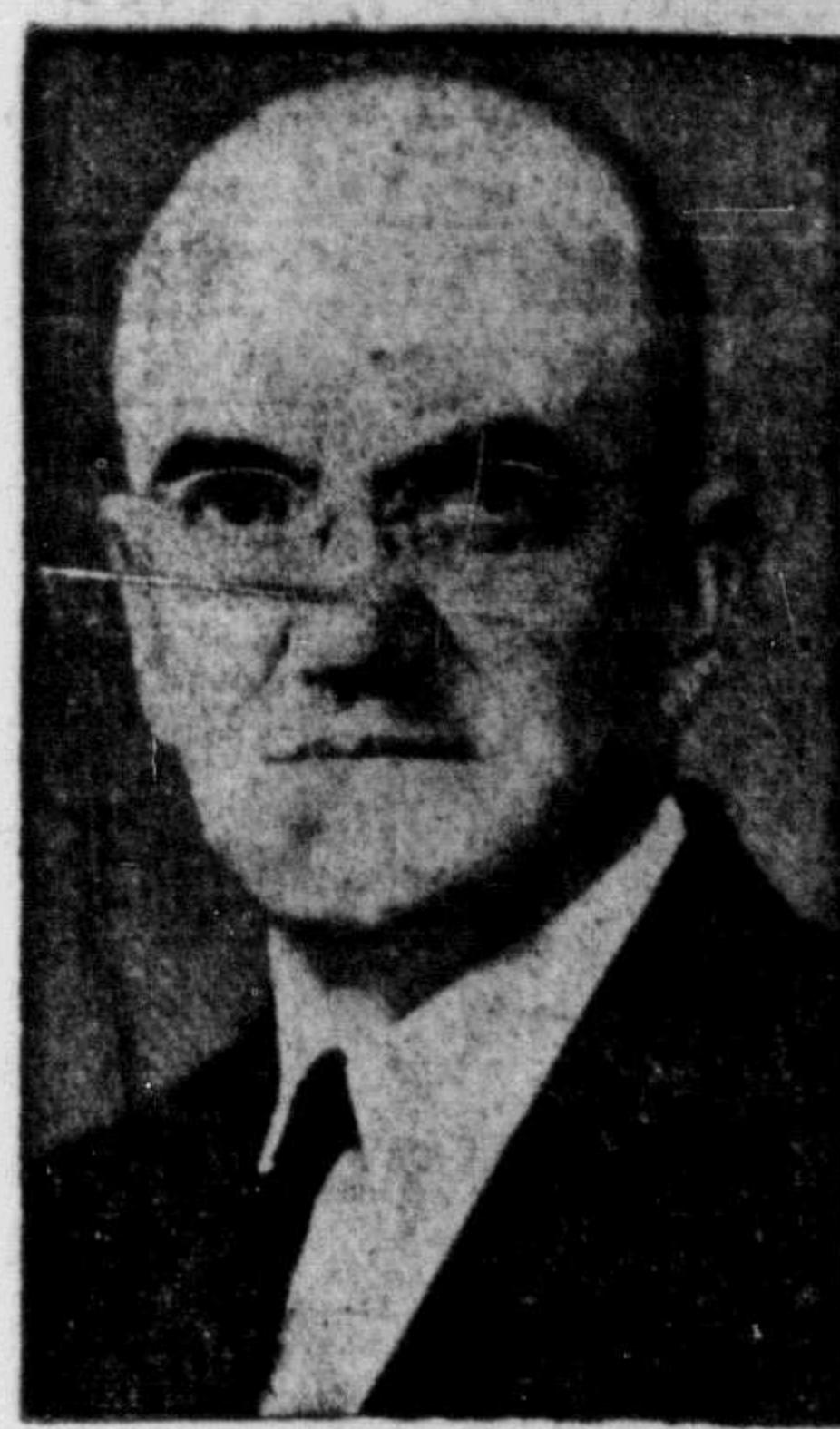

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## Cheating Time Clock Offence in Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — Cheating the factory time clock will continue to be an offence under Canada's Criminal Code.

The Commons Friday night defeated by 67 to 13 a CCF bid to remove it from federal crimes.

Colin Cameron (CCF-Nanaimo) said it should not be the court's business to arrest a workman because he "sneaked off five, 10 or 15 minutes ahead of time."

Mr. Cameron, a west coast shipyard worker before his election to the Commons last summer, said if the law had been enforced against himself "I would have been before the magistrate almost every day of the week."

Justice Minister Garson said the practice "is really obtaining wages under false pretences."

Mr. Cameron moved an amendment to a section in the new revision of the Criminal Code which states that a person who falsifies an employment record or punches a time clock with intent to deceive is guilty of a crime.

He proposed deletion of the reference to time clocks. Later the Commons approved an alternative amendment by Davie Fulton (PC-Kamloops) stating it is a crime to falsify employment records "by any means, including punching of a time clock."

Both Mr. Fulton and Mr. Garson said the false punching of a time clock is simply one way to falsify employment records.

Mr. Cameron said employers should enforce their own rules instead of asking the courts to do it.

Mr. Garson said the law applies to both employers and employees.

## Premier Urged to Adopt 'Store' Policy

VICTORIA (CP)—Premier Bennett was asked Friday to drop the government's "pay-as-you-go" policy and take up the policy of his own hardware business.

Vincent Segur (CCF—Revelstoke), speaking on the Trans-Canada highway during the throne speech debate in the legislature, urged several circulars in the Bennett hardware stores in the Okanagan.

Mr. Segur termed the merchandising "one class which said "no money" and only \$2.50 a week" and the premier to follow his policy in government.

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
