WASHINGTON (A) - Mine union president John L. Lewis may be preparing a bid to become the new labor chief of the turbulent New York waterfront.

It was reliably reported today that Capt. William Bradley, newly-chosen president of the allegedly crimo-ridden International Longshoremen's Association is due here from

New York to visit Lewis. Bradley's visit appears obviously timed for its effect on the balloting Tuesday in a national labor relations board



The reported loan has led to speculation that the old ILA is destined to become part of district 50 of the United Mine Workers (Ind.)



Top logging experts will pool their knowledge in an all-out drive to reduce operating costs in British Columbia's logging industry, at the 11th annual convention of the Truck Loggers' Association in Vancouver January 13-15.

"Success Through Better Planning" has been chosen as the theme of the convention.

In announcing plans for the convention Don Mackenzie, association president, said that in the last year keener competition on the world lumber market had driven down the price of logs.

"In some cases these prices are below the cost of production," he pointed out. "One of the proplems facing the forest industry of this province is how can we reauce costs to meet the lower returns on logs and lumber."

Mackenzie said the Truck Loggers' Association, which has an extensive membership of logging operators within the forest industry of B.C., was tackling one phase of this problem by devoting the forthcoming convention to the pooling of the practical erperience of some of the best logging brains in the province.

Frade Experts Favor Sales Invasion

By The Canadian Press

Canada's trade experts favor an "invasion" of the United States—a trade invasion by a growing army of salesmen and Canadian manufacturers.

The feeling among trade commissioners is that some Canadian producers and exporters are trying to gain U.S. markets by armchair tactics, rather than through personal and persistent scouting of the trade front.

The U.S. is Canada's biggest market. But the puzzler is that though Canada has a population of only 15,000,000, she continually buys far more than she sells to her southern neighbor with a population of 160,000,000.

This Canadian deficit in U.S. trade is growing. It reached about \$600,000.000 in 1952 and likely will rise to more than \$700,000,000 this year.

Canada-U.S. trade has been increasing, but the emphasis is more on the flow of U.S. goods into Canada. Exports to the U.S. are estimated to rise this year to about \$2.500.000.000. up from \$2,300.000,000 in 1952.

But imports from the U.S. are

artimated to rice more than \$3,200,000,000 from \$2,900,000,000 B. C. Butler. Canada's trade commissioner at Detroit, says the poswers are not easy to find, missioners can suggest general categories of goods that might sell, but we rarely have offers

If Canada is to make a successful bid for a larger share of the U.S. market, more Canadian firms must get into the effort Mr. Butler says.


