**Gunderson  
Resigns  
from Post  
Will Join Talks  
on Investments**

VICTORIA — (CP) — Premier Bennett announced Monday night that Finance Minister Einar Gunderson has submitted his resignation following defeat in the Nov. 21 election here.

Bennett said he had asked Gunderson to continue in post in order to complete budget estimates and join the presentation of B.C.'s financial submission to the federal government. Mr. Bennett, Gunderson and Attorney General Robert Bonner are today to hold talks with Minister St. Laurent and federal cabinet. Dec. 14 and 15 leave for New York. In the city they will hold talks with United States financiers and industrialists.

Mr. Bennett's announcement interpreted to mean Mr. Gunderson will leave the government before the spring session of the legislature. The Premier's statement said, immediately after the Victoria election, the Hon. Einar Gunderson offered his resignation as Minister of Finance but was invited and pressed by the Premier to carry on.

Mr. Gunderson is the last B.C. minister to desire to sit on as minister of finance. He had a seat in the legislature. The minister has followed the government will continue to follow established parliamentary practice.

Bennett declined to return the contents of a brief he presented to the federal cabinet. The government has said it will invest more money in the public investment policy.

The policy Ottawa would use more money in major investments in B.C. Such investments would mean increased taxes for the federal government through taxation.

The 67-year-old statesman, prime minister since Israel became an independent state in 1948, has given "spiritual fatigue" as reason for his retirement. Under the Israeli constitution, his resignation involved the resignation of the whole cabinet, but it remains in force as a caretaker government. Matse Sharet, the present foreign minister, has been named acting prime minister until a new government is formed.

## President Eisenhower Urges Reversal Of Atom Arms Race

### 'Russia Must Aid' Program For Peace

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) — President Eisenhower today called on world atomic powers to reverse "the fearful trend" of the atomic arms race and to set up, under the United Nations, an international atomic energy agency to develop the peaceful potential of atom.

In a dramatic speech made against the background of the Bermuda conference, the president said "the Soviet Union must, of course, be one" of the nations participating in any such project.

The president then declared he is prepared to submit to congress with every expectation of approval any such program as would achieve these four purposes:

"First—Encourage worldwide investigations into most effective peacetime uses of fissionable material.  
"Second—Begin to diminish potential destructive power of world's atomic stockpiles.  
"Third—Allow all peoples of all nations to see that, in this enlightened age, great powers of the earth, those of the east and the west, are interested in human aspirations, first and foremost, rather than in building up the armaments of war."

"Fourth — Open up a new channel for peaceful discussion and initiate at least a new approach to many difficult problems that must be solved in both public and private conferences if the world is to shake off the inertia imposed by fear and make positive progress toward peace."

The months ahead, Eisenhower solemnly told United Nations assembly "will be fraught with fateful decisions." Delegates from both sides of the Iron Curtain applauded the president's address. Eisenhower worked until after midnight last night in Bermuda with Prime Minister Churchill and Foreign Minister Bidault of France.

In his spare time, he worked on his UN address and arrived in New York only 40 minutes before he spoke to the United Nations assembly. Major radio and television networks carried the speech in Canada and the U.S.

In London, Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express claimed today that Prime Minister Churchill tried "with all the eloquence at his command" to talk Eisenhower out of making his speech to the United Nations.

And when Churchill saw his protests in vain, the Express said, "he was left with a sense of helplessness." The mayor traced his service in civic affairs stating that prior to his election in December, 1951, he had served three years as an alderman. Regarding two referendums approved by the electors when he was elected mayor, he said that the request that the B.C. Power commission become power suppliers of Prince Rupert had been launched with the assurance of the Power Company that negotiations were under way. Authorization by the electors for installation of an automatic telephone system would be brought to fulfillment in October 1954 when the system goes into operation.

Another way in which the council had fulfilled its obligations to the electorate was in construction of rental housing and passage of a new traffic by-law.

"Since the new traffic by-law was passed in August, 1952, there has not been one traffic fatality within the city and very few traffic accidents," the mayor said.

Since Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs B. C. Bracewell wrote off charges against the council with his final comment "business is reasonably well conducted and no grounds were disclosed for holding a public inquiry" Mayor Whalen said he felt that members of the council and the city hall staff were completely cleared.

"I am not interested in politics or personalities," the mayor said, "I am interested only in the overall betterment of Prince Rupert. If you want a fine-sitting mayor don't cast your ballot for me."

## Russia Dared To Help In Peace Settlements

TUCKER'S TOWN, Bermuda (AP)—The Big Three challenged the Kremlin today to negotiate peace settlements in Europe and to "solve the stubborn problems" of a world too long in conflict. In a final Bermuda communi-

que which occasionally rang with Churchillian prose, but omitted any concrete solutions for the key problems of Western unity, President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Laniel announced:

● They are sending notes to Russia for an early Big Four foreign ministers' meeting in Berlin which they hope will make progress towards the unification of Germany and independence for Austria.

● They will continue to strive for a Korean political conference which they hope will lead to both a Korean settlement with the Asian Communists and progress in restoring more normal conditions in the Far East and southeast Asia.

● They will continue to struggle for "peace and stability" in Indo-China, where the "valiant forces" of France and the native states are making an important contribution to the "defense of the Free World."

● They hope for a "peaceful" liberation of the Red-ruled east European countries and reject as unjustified "the present division of Europe."

● The three Western powers will "lose no opportunity for easing the tensions that beset the world and for reassuring all nations that they have no cause to fear that the strength of the West will be invoked in any cause of wrongful violence."

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## Reds Reject Final Offer For Parley

PANMUNJOM (AP)—The Allies today made a "final offer" for a Korean peace conference, but the Communists rejected it outright in a scornful propaganda blast which the chief United States delegate termed "garbage."

Coincidentally, the Red action effectively by-passed a potential Allied problem. South Korea's refusal to accept part to the U.S. proposal.

South Korea's delegate refused to attend the meeting as U.S. ambassador Arthur Dean delivered the new plan, which nailed down loose ends of previous Allied proposals and suggestions.

"I told them (the Reds) this was it and we would stand on it," Dean told reporters. "This is our final offer."

Communist spokesmen termed Dean's offering "absurd and ridiculous."

STOPPED NEGOTIATIONS Dean's reaction was: "It is very obvious that they have stopped negotiating."

He said there was an implied time limit to his proposal, but "we will stay here for what we consider a reasonable time." He gave no indication how long that might be. The diplomats meet again Wednesday.

Meanwhile, 30 more South Korean prisoners-of-war refused to return home after talking with officers of their homeland. That made the interview score so far 190 to 0 in favor of Communism.

Terms of the new U.S. proposal said Russia could sit it without being labelled a belligerent or a neutral, but the Allies would insist she vote with the Communist side.

## Vicksburg Disaster Area

VICKSBURG (AP)—Tornado-battered Vicksburg, still burying its dead, dug into a new area of town today in the search for victims of the twister that killed at least 31 persons.

Rescue crews moved shovels into a Negro residential area where the tornado spent its diminishing fury after striking the city three times.

The \$25,000,000 tornado caused President Eisenhower to declare Vicksburg a disaster area, making it eligible for emergency aid from the federal government.

After the Saturday tornado vented its fourth blow against the Negro homes near the military park it moved into the park toppling a row of marble monuments.

## Mayor Urges Citizens To Pass Referendums

Approval of the municipal buildings Algoma park area and Civic Centre referendums and endorsement of the transfer of the Roosevelt Park reserve funds were asked last night by Mayor Harold Whalen, candidate for re-election in Thursday's civic election.

Speaking for a second time over radio station CFPR, Mayor Whalen made it clear that he was asking the electors' support on his record of accomplishments and the fact that the past two years' administration needed no defending.

"We are living on borrowed time as far as our present (municipal) buildings are concerned," the mayor said, "and to spend further money on them would be inconsistent with good business practice." He suggested that anyone who felt "that the present buildings will last quite a while longer," should take a walk around the back of the city hall and look at the foundation or look at the slope of the floors inside the building.

"It is easy to see that large amounts of money would have to be spent to bring the building up to any sort of standard," the mayor said.

The firehall he dismissed as a disgrace and added that passage of the two-mill levy referendum would empower the city council to make a definite start on plans for new civic buildings and place it in a position to have something concrete in 1955 when the city's borrowing power would be restored.

"Since it is apparent that the city subsidize the Civic Centre if it is to continue its work for the whole community, I see no reason why it should not be done on a business like basis instead of haggling each year as to whether or not we should meet their deficit."

"Furthermore," the mayor said, "if they know what they are to get it should follow that they will plan their budget accordingly."

Explanation of the workings of the clinic was given to new members and summaries of work done, submitted to the provincial department of preventive dentistry, were explained.

The group will circulate local organizations, offering speakers to explain the workings of the clinic at meetings of those groups.

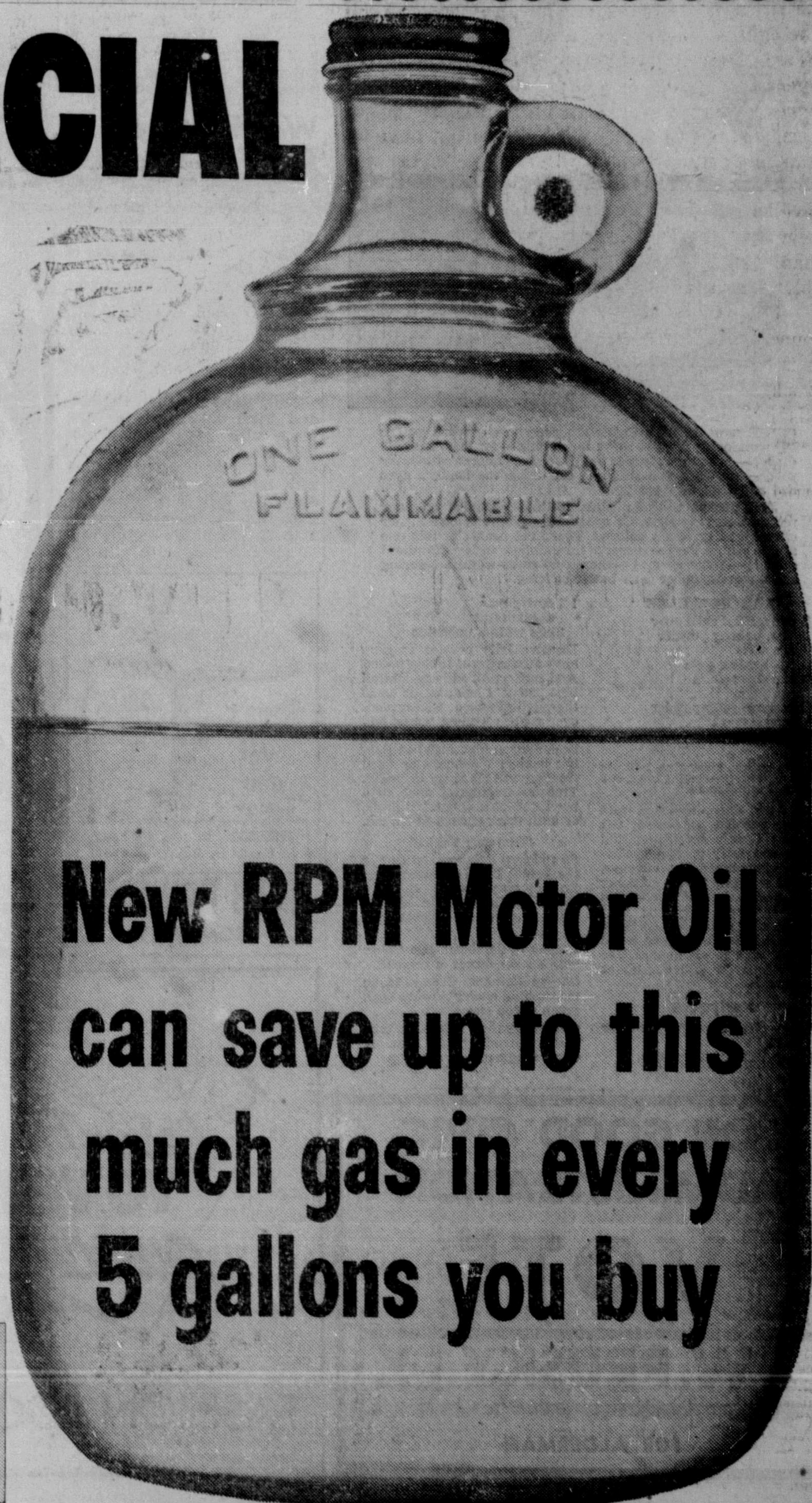

## Soundings Being Taken For New Marpole Bridge

VANCOUVER (CP) — Works Minister P. A. Gagliardi said here Monday night that soundings now are being taken at the foot of Oak Street for a new Marpole bridge.

Mr. Gagliardi said the B.C. gov-

ernment will take the initiative in getting construction underway for a new structure, linking Vancouver to International Airport on Sea Island. He made the statement in an address before the annual meeting of the B.C. Automobile Association, which opened today.

However, Mr. Gagliardi declined to comment on a report circulating here that the government would build the bridge and charge tolls on it. The minister said "I don't know anything about it."

The report was denied also at Victoria by Premier Bennett. The Premier said his government was waiting for a "fair proposal" from the city of Vancouver and the Federal government on sharing cost of a new bridge.

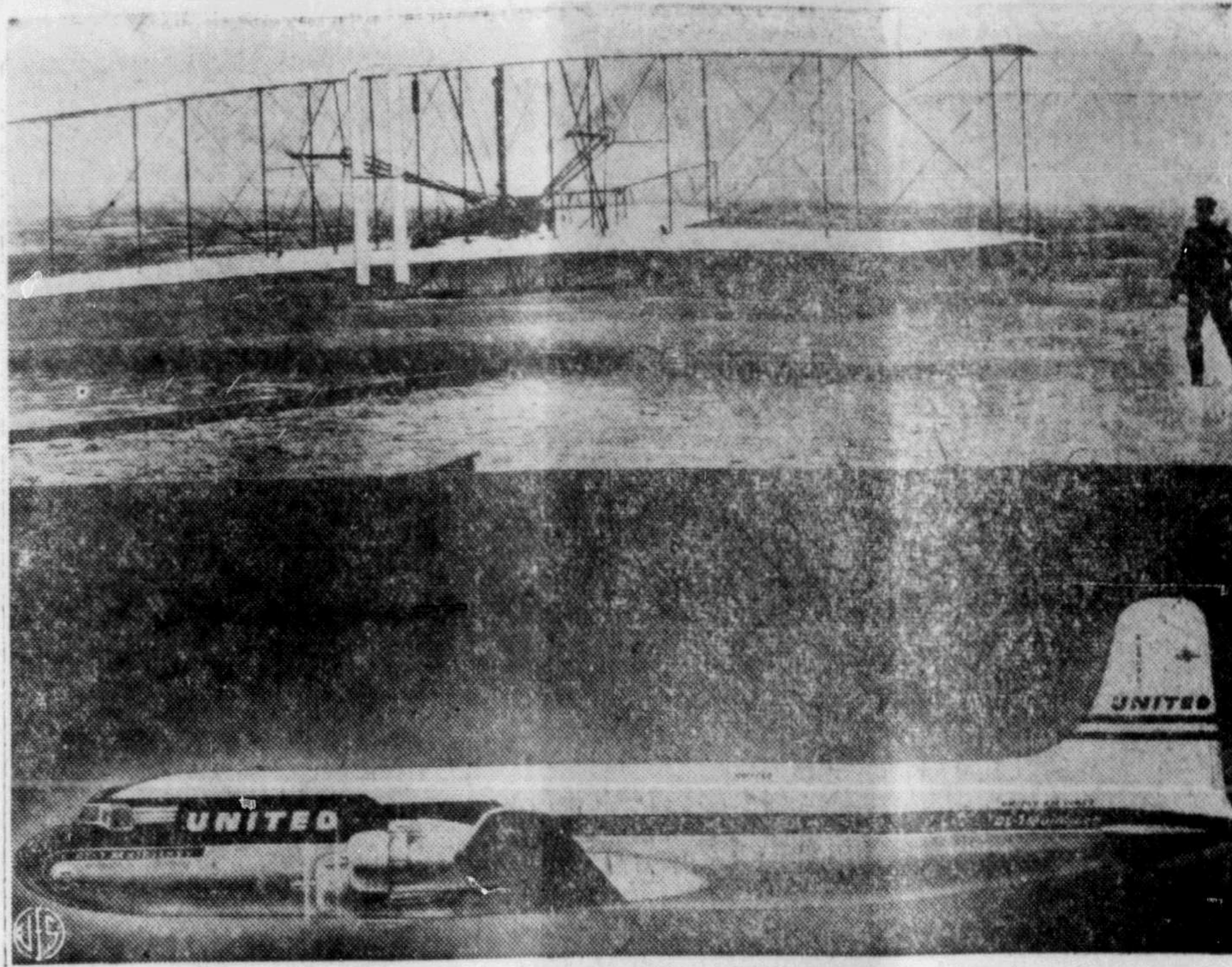
Mr. Gagliardi said Monday night that the government was not delaying action while Ottawa and Vancouver came to a decision on what they would pay toward a new span.

"We are working on the foot of Oak as a site," he said.

He said after a preliminary design for the bridge was received another six or eight months would be required to draw up complete finalized plans. "Then a contract has to be let."

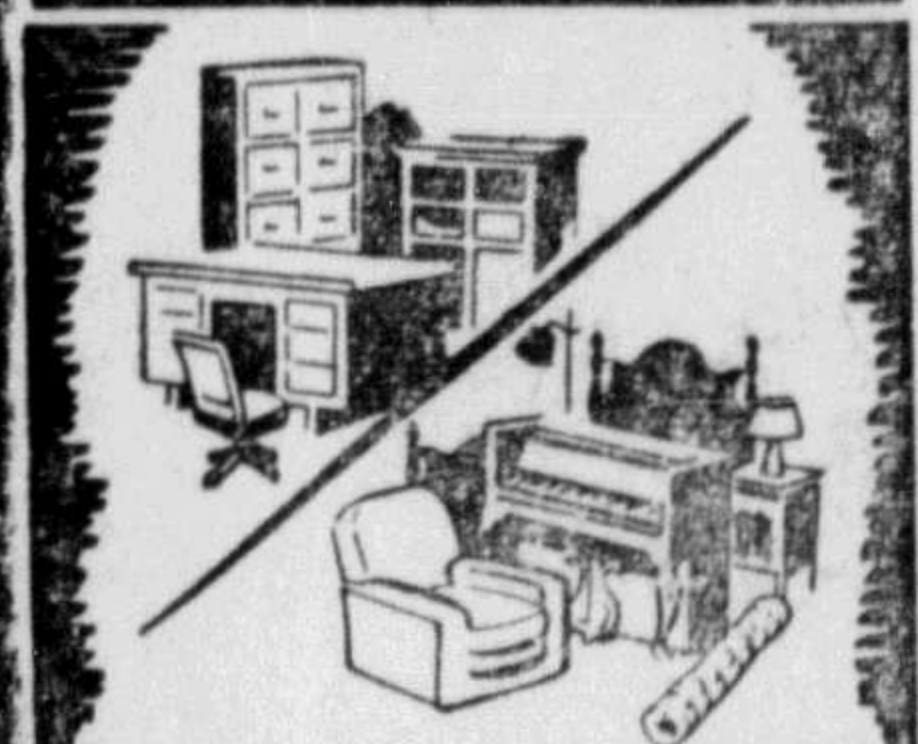

## Safety Belts in Auto's Could Save Many Lives

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE ST. LOUIS (AP)—Safety belts in automobiles could save thousands of lives in highway accidents, an American Medical Association exhibit suggests.

It found that 453 out of 633 persons killed in one year in Indiana probably could have survived by some safety changes.

They were not killed by accordion collapse of their cars. They died from being thrown. Safety belts, crash helmets or safety changes within cars apparently could have given them a new ticket on life.

The exhibit is presented by Sgt. Elmer Paul, head of the auto crash injury research section, Indiana state police, and trooper John B. Klein. It is part of a symposium on prevention of highway deaths at the AMA's mid-winter meeting opening today.

It is not just high speed which kills, Paul said. Two little girls were killed by being flung out the door of the back seat when their car, moving at 20 miles an hour, was hit obliquely by another machine.

Another car skidded, struck a pole, and suffered only \$150 damages. A man slid across the seat and out the opened door. He died when his head hit a pole.

Safety belts, as just one means of saving lives, are being installed now by some car owners, Paul said, and 25 Indiana state

police cars now are equipped with them. A harness-type belt, holding the chest and shoulders back, is better than the airplane seat-belt type, he added.

The right front seat is one of the greatest danger spots. A study of passengers only found that 70 per cent of passengers killed were riding in the right front seat, and 23 per cent in rear seats.

Add flour, alternately with milk, in small amounts; beat smooth after each addition. Bake in two round 9" layer pans, lined on bottoms with paper. Use moderate oven (375° F.); about 25 minutes.

### FROSTING

1/2 pkg. (3 1/2 tbsps.) jelly powder (any flavor)  
1/2 cup VERY HOT water

1 1/4 cups sugar  
Dash of salt  
2 egg whites, unbeaten

Dissolve jelly powder in very hot water in top of double boiler. Add sugar, salt, and egg whites; beat about 1 minute, or until thoroughly mixed. Then place over rapidly boiling water and beat constantly with rotary egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand up in peaks. Transfer frosting at once to a bowl and beat about 1 minute, or until thick enough to spread.

## TO DRAW OR NOT TO DRAW

Article No. 6  
This is the \$64 question where the answers separate the men from the boys. A draw is an offensive thrust calculated to score against your opponent. A hit is definitely a defensive manoeuvre to prevent your opponent from scoring. A draw is a courageous offensive action to take the initiative and score points, whereas a barrage of running or hitting shots is paramount to a rear-guard action protecting a retreat. The greater the weight used in hitting, the more retreat becomes a disorganized route.

Now don't get me wrong, I am not trying to argue that there is no place for hitting in a curling game. There is. But on normally keen ice, quiet hitting with 95 per cent of the teams is more effective because:

1. It is based on a knowledge of draw weight.
2. It allows the player to use a normal rhythmic swing that keeps his eye and rock "on the broom."

Keep your opponent off balance by drawing. Every draw made is a potential scoring point and keeps the opposition on the defensive. If you have to hit, use quiet weight, enough to move the opposing stone through the rings and back to the hack so that your stone remains in the house. If you hit and roll out, which is more than likely, with heavier weight you are still on the defensive.

During the early ends of a match, keep your rink to the quiet game. Any opposing stone behind the tee should be drawn-out and not hit unless playing for a roll. Young players are guilty in this count too often. Here are a few suggestions on when to draw:

- Draw to a stone on the back-rings. It will provide backing for yours.
- Draw to a pocket of enemy stones behind the tee. Ten men and a stick of dynamite will not remove yours then.
- Draw if only the corner of an opposing stone is visible.
- Draw for second shot if lying one. Second shot is the best guard in the world.
- Draw to the shot rock with last stone when there are three or four against you.
- Hit a short guard, but draw around a long guard.
- A skip should prefer a draw. Even if you are six up and your opponents lie three or four, draw for one if the way is open.

## Annual 'Santa Claus' Flights Ready

Special to The Daily News  
OTTAWA—The RCAF's annual "Santa Claus" flights to lonely Arctic weather stations and other government outposts in the far north is due to get underway next week, air force headquarters announced today.

This year four RCAF aircraft—two North Stars and two C-119 transports—from 426 and 433 Transport Squadrons respectively both at Dorval, will fly more than two tons of letters and Christmas mail to Department of Transport weathermen, RCMP personnel, and others located in the Arctic.

The drops will be made at weather stations, including both the joint Canadian-US sites and those operated strictly by Canada, RCMP posts and Department of Transport radio posts.

Air drops will be made at such widely scattered spots as Mould Bay, Iqaluit, Alert Bay, Resolute Bay, Eureka, Arctic Bay, Craig Harbor, and Alexander Fiord in the northern Arctic, and Clyde River, Padioping, Cape Hope's Advance, Resolution Island and Nottingham in the central Arctic.

The most northerly point, the joint weather station at Alert, is more than 2500 miles north of Montreal, just under 600 miles from the North Pole.

Preparations for the Christmas drop began two months ago, when the Department of Transport and other agencies involved advised families concerned that a Christmas delivery was to be made by the RCAF.

Delivery of the mail is dependent upon good weather: the

weather reports that the aircrew use to plan their flights are assembled from the weather detail sent out by the very people who will receive the Christmas parcels.

The exacting job of dropping bundles is a time of excitement for the D of T weathermen and others who have seen no signs of civilization since the supply ship made its yearly visit in August.

## Worker Held In Murder of Six-Year-Old

REGINA (CP)—Joseph Cossette, 27, was held on a murder charge today in connection with the rape-slaying of six-year-old Irene Mooney.

Cossette is a construction worker from Coderre, Sask.

RCMP laid the murder charge against him Monday after he surrendered to a detachment at Radville, about 75 miles south of Regina.

Police said Cossette confessed the brutal slaying. The girl was found throttled and raped Saturday night at Ogema, Sask., 10 miles east of Radville.

Irene, from Edgeworth in the Ogema district, was found in an alley, lying near the carton of ice cream she had gone to buy.

The discovery started what police described as one of the fastest manhunt in the province.

Cossette walked into the RCMP station at Radville just as police were closing in for an arrest.

It was the description furnished by Mrs. Florence Richmond of Ogema which supplied the first clue. She reported a man she saw leave her store Saturday night after Irene went out.

Herb Ass, Fillmore merchant, told police of a conversation of two construction workers who heard a radio description of the suspect and tied it in with a fellow worker who accompanied them to Ogema Saturday night. Police were following up this lead when Cossette surrendered.

## Bank President Predicts Good Year Ahead

A good year ahead was predicted today by James Stewart, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Trends sometimes taken as storm warnings of recession, he indicated, may actually be fair winds towards continued prosperity. Increased competition

and costs of production, however, would require careful consideration.

Mr. Stewart, in an address to the bank's annual meeting, said a decline in commodity prices had corrected the post-Korean influence, and world prices now were back to approximately their 1949 level.

"We should, therefore, take care not to over-emphasize the economic significance of the fall in prices by regarding it as the harbinger of recession."

Mr. Stewart suggested overall consumer demands will continue high in the months ahead.

"In the non-durable goods' field, demand is buoyant and retail sales indicate a relatively stable outlook. Demand in this area is difficult to assess... but there is nothing in the present situation to warrant the belief that any noticeable falling off in demand is ahead of us, though

there will be a levelling off of the peaks recorded in past months."

## Boston Doctor Admits Identity

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Traveler said Monday it has learned Dr. Arthur G. Steinberg, 41, of Newton, Mass., is the "Mr. X" about whom the Senate investigating sub-committee wants to question Igor Gouzenko in Canada.

A geneticist attached to a Boston hospital, Dr. Steinberg, informed of the story, admitted he is the "Mr. X," the paper said. He said he is not a Communist, never had been a Communist, and never gave American secrets to anyone.

## Proposal Set To End Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—Federal mediators today hammered out a proposal for ending a strike against six major New York newspapers, and called in both sides to look the formula over.

The strike is now in its 11th day. Details of the formula were not disclosed, but there were indications it hinged on creation of a fact-finding board.

28 Killed In Tornado

VICKSBURG, Miss. (AP)—Rescue workers in tornado-battered Vicksburg today resumed search for more victims of the death funnel which killed at least 28 persons.  
Dawn brought the noise of steam shovels, bulldozers and shovels after a heatless, shivering night for the 28,000 residents.  
The most serious cases among the 230 injured were crowded into Vicksburg's four main hospitals, warmed by blankets and electric heaters from the city's homes.  
Civil defence and military leaders estimated the damage at \$25,000,000.  
President Eisenhower declared the city a disaster area Sunday night authorizing emergency funds to help rebuild 12 blocks of stores, homes and warehouses.  
One-fifth of the city was without electricity. All of the city was without natural gas, the only heating and cooking fuel for most homes. The temperature dropped to 44 in the city and was near the freezing point in the suburbs.

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## Sitting Mayors Hold Edge in Ontario

TORONTO (CP)—Sitting may-day. Allan A. Lamport on re-elections in Ontario cities Monday for a third term in Toronto, the province's largest city.

Allan J. Rush, a former detective who first entered municipal politics to protest his dismissal from the police force, won a fourth term at London. His previous terms were for one year. The new term is for two years. Sault Ste. Marie re-elected Herbert Smale, a locomotive engineer, who turned back Peter King, a former alderman.

At Sudbury, Dan Jessup went back for a third term. He defeated W. S. Beaton, mayor for 1 year before he was defeated two years ago.

Belleville elected 52-year-old Jack Both, who enters the city council for the first time. He won over Charles L. Hyde, a city alderman for 16 years.

Harry Worton, 32, won his third consecutive term at Guelph over James P. Heffernan, who ran for the post after six years as an alderman.

Peterborough's Mayor Hugh Laddell went down to defeat after two terms in office, beaten by Norman Graham, who was twice elected a city alderman but didn't complete either term. He resigned once over operation of the city garbage collection system. His second resignation came in October to prepare for the mayoralty contest.

## School Boards Must Submit Referendums, Not Bylaws

VICTORIA (CP)—School boards in British Columbia are being required to arrange for referendums rather than by-law votes when their building programs extend over a long period.

This was disclosed today by H. L. Campbell, deputy minister of education, when asked why a referendum was required for the proposed \$3,385,700 bylaw of the Greater Victoria School Board is to be submitted as referendum instead of a straight bylaw.

J. V. Fisher, deputy minister of finance, who handles the merchandizing of school board debentures, explained the two chief reasons:

First a by-law was restrictive inasmuch as it has to specify the date debentures would be issued; being required to arrange for referendums rather than by-law votes when their building programs extend over a long period.

On the other hand, if voters approve of floating a loan through a referendum, the school board is free to use the money as it sees fit. He said the referendum sets the limit of the school board's borrowing power so that control was still in the hands of the property owners.

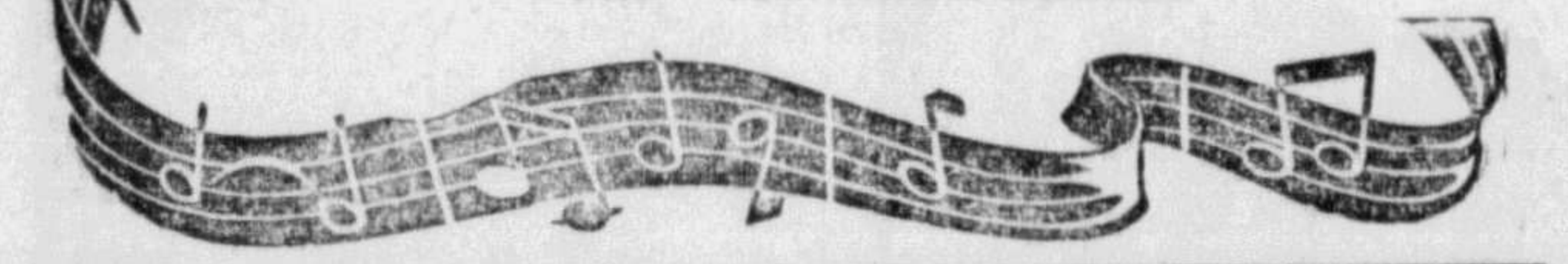

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## BLACKWOOD on BRIDGE

Abel Lost Chance To Set Hand On Diamond Return

As Mr. Champion pointed out recently, Mr. Muzzy is weak only on bidding, dummy play and defense. Of course, Mr. Muzzy plays so much bridge that by the law of averages he is bound to get a good result now and then. And he might get credit for a good bid or a good play if he would only refrain from making any comment after the hand.

Take today's hand for example. He and Miss Brash bid like mad to reach a contract of six hearts. As you see, the defenders held all four kings, a queen and two jacks. I'll leave it up to you to decide whether Mr. Muzzy deserves any credit for the very fine result on the hand.

Mr. Champion opened the jack of diamonds, dummy ducked and Mr. Abel won with the king and made the rather pointless return of another diamond.

Mr. Muzzy won with the queen. He laid down the jack of hearts and let it ride when Mr. Champion did not cover. Next he led a small heart to dummy's ace. Mr. Abel discarding a club.

He now cashed the ace of diamonds on which he pitched a club. This was followed with

a small spade to the ace. All of his remaining hearts were now cashed. On the lead of the trump Mr. Champion was down to the king and queen of clubs and the king of spades.

In dummy were the queen of spades and the ace and jack of clubs. If Mr. Champion discarded his spade, dummy's queen would be good. If he played a club, both of dummy's clubs would win.

His actual discard was the king of spades and Miss Brash had a few agonizing moments as Mr. Muzzy puzzled over what to discard from the board. Finally he played the jack of clubs then led a club to win the last two tricks in dummy.

Mr. Muzzy had executed a Vienna coup and a beautiful squeeze. But he felt called upon to make a comment. "I knew it was hopeless partner," he said, "so all I could do was to run my hearts and hope somebody made a mistake. Champion's play of the king of spades proves that even the best make the wrong discard sometimes."
