Despite the Prime Minister's repeated statements of personal disinclination towards a spring election, there is still a minority amongst the more cynical MP's of all parties who expect just that little thing to nappen.

Members of this suspicious group say that Mr. St. Laurent is protesting too much. Furthermore, they profess to see other straws in the wind which are swaying violently as a portent of the coming political hurricane.

One such straw is the International Wheat Agreement. Word in the Capital here is that the Canadian delegation currently negotiating at Washington has been instructed to exert all posible pressure to secure a fast deal at something better than the prices prevailing under the contract now expiring. The sug gestion in Ottawa political circles is that the new agreement is wanted urgently for spring election purposes. It and a government commitment to go ahead with the South Saskatchewan power and irrigation scheme are" said to constitute the formula to hold the wavering prairie provinces in the Liberal fold. The expectation of a spring election isn't even widely held here now, whereas a little more than a month ago it was a fairly general opinion. But the narrowed minority who still look for it are stubborn in their belief. A very short time now will tell the tale. If an election is to b held not later than mid-May. which is the latest feasible date in view of the Coronation in June, dissolution of Parliament March 15. That's the absolute deadline for any spring vote.
