Warren Rink Wins City Curling Title

Warren had the last rock and maneuvered it beautifully, curving it around a well-placed guard rock with enough speed to send Collinson rocks out of the house and retain a point for himself.

He will get the championship Rupert Motors trophy when the awards will be made following the bonspiel.

Warning by St. Laurent

West Could Be Deleled by Complacency, Declares Prime Minister

TORONTO—Prime Minister L. S. St. Laurent warned the west last night against over-confidence that its growing military might has frightened Russia and assured peace.

Western people will have to make more sacrifices and continue to build up armed forces, the Prime Minister told a graduating class at the centenary celebration of St. Michael's College.

"Foundations of combined strength we have already laid in the free world have given us a greater sense of security and grounds for hope that war-decimated people dread can be prevented," Mr. St. Laurent said.

"It is easy to forget why we feel more secure and so easy to forget to pay premiums on insurance or even ask ourselves whether we still need it. I am convinced that, if we are not to lose the security now coming within our grasp, we must be ready to keep up the insurance much as we hope we may never have a fire."

British Ship In Distress

Freighter Darton Loses Propeller 400 Miles off Vancouver Island

VICTORIA—Two ships—a United States Coast-guard vessel and the salvage steamer Salvage King—were hurrying today to a disabled British freighter, the Darton, which is drifting helplessly 420 miles southwest of Vancouver Island. The vessel has lost her propeller.

The Coastguard cutter should reach the scene today and the Salyake King, steaming at 12 miles per hour, is due tomorrow afternoon.

The Darton was on her way from Japan to Portland. Although storms are raging elsewhere in the Pacific it is so far calm around the Darton.

Disease Is Fatal To Canadians

OTTAWA—Two Canadian soldiers have died in Korea from a disease which is spread by a small rodent, it was announced at week-end. Others have become ill. It is the first time the maldy has struck Canadian troops although Korean and American soldiers have had it.

William Oates In Spy Trial

PRAGUE—William Oates, imprisoned American correspondent, appeared as a witness here in the trial of twelve Czechs charged with espionage. One of the accused was sentenced to death, another to life imprisonment and the ten others to terms ranging from ten to 24 years.

TWO NATIVE CHILDREN PERISH AS FIRE VISITS KITKATLA VILLAGE

Down-Coast Community Menaced During Storm

Two small native children—Pearl and Katie Hill, daughters of Robert and Mamie Hill—were burned to death about 9 o'clock Sunday night when fire visited the native village of Kitkatla.

The fire started in the home of John Vickers, where the two children were staying while the father and mother were visiting Prince Rupert.

Flames, with a 60-mile south-east gale raging, menaced other homes of the community but these were saved.

Unable to proceed Sunday night by boat to the scene owing to the storm, Indian Superintendent F. E. Anfield, Coroner E. D. Forward and Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers left by aircraft this morning for Kitkatla. Full details of the tragedy and the extent of the conflagration were brought to the city, with their return early this afternoon.

Early reports of the fire were radiophoned into the Indian Superintendent by Mrs. John Vickers, the field matron at Kitkatla.

John Vickers sustained burns in trying to rescue the Hill children but they are not believed serious.

The villagers were attending church Sunday evening when the two children lost their lives in the fire which destroyed a three-family home. Nineteen others are homeless and destitute.

The sudden blaze burned unquelled because of frozen water supply.

Fire is believed to have started in the bedroom of the two children who may have been playing with matches, said Mr. Anfield. Five other children of the Vickers family were rescued by their father when he saw the Hill children were doomed.

Parents of the Hill children were in Prince Rupert at time of fire. Mrs. John Vickers was in Prince Rupert General Hospital at the same time.

Others made homeless were Henry and Kathleen Vickers and six children; Mason Brown; Hector and Pauline Ridley and one child.

Mr. Anfield said all the household adults were attending evening service at the village church when the fire started. Volunteer firemen were helpless when they found the water system frozen. Although the village is near the beach, the tide was low and a bucket brigade was ineffectual in trying to have the building.

Three other nearby homes, however, were saved as the whole village joined in the brigade.

Big Fire at Qualicum

QUALICUM, Vancouver Island—Damage, reaching possibly \$300,000, was caused early Sunday at this Vancouver Island community when fire broke out in a grocery store and Qualicum's fire truck broke down.

Four buildings were destroyed and a fifth damaged. Occupants fled into the street when fire damaged one wall of a boarding house owned by Mrs. Isa Apoll after destroying grocery store, shoe store, hardware store and real estate and insurance office.

The first alarm was turned in at 4:15 a.m. but the village's only fire truck broke down and equipment from Parksville, six miles away, was unable to reach the scene until later.

Woman Held In Robbery

FLAGSTAFF, Arizona—A 26-year-old brunette was held in jail today as a possible "finger woman" of the \$1,500,000 Redfield burglary in Reno.

Federal Bureau of Investigation agents said she was arrested with \$50,000 of the stolen cash, 28 pieces of jewelry which might have come from the Laverne Redfield's safe and a large package of securities.

Jewelry and securities are being checked to see if they belong to an eccentric Reno stockbroker.

The woman, Mrs. Marie Jeanne Michaud, had been Redfield's guest so frequently. He said he was "shocked and greatly upset" by the arrest. "Why, I trusted her implicitly," he said.

The blue-eyed French-Canadian writer-artist was the sixth person arrested in connection with the burglary on February 29. Four are men and two women.

Small American Yacht Missing in This Area

Check of Canadian customs here today indicated that, contrary to southern news dispatches, the 25-foot American pleasure craft Reva, missing while on the way from Port Townsend to Vank Island in southern Alaska, did not call last week at Prince Rupert.

United States Coastguard today began a search of northern British Columbia coastal waters for the Reva.

It had been said in wireless reports that the Reva called here last Wednesday but this could not be confirmed with authorities here. Collector of Customs Oscar Smith said the vessel had not cleared or entered here. It was possible, he suggested, that she might have been at Butedale or some other port.

The number of persons aboard the Reva was not immediately known.

All ships in the area have been asked to be on the look-out for the green-hulled vessel which carries no radio.

Says Korean War Draining Russia

TOKYO—General Van Fleet, commander of United Nations forces in Korea, said that Russian industrial resources are being bled white in efforts to keep Chinese Communist and North Korean forces supplied for the war against South Korea and the United States. The Russians are beginning to feel very keenly the pinch of the Korean war.

Knife Killer To Be Hanged

NANAIMO—Albert Fairweather was convicted at the Supreme Court Assizes here late Saturday of murder in the killing of Raymond Boyce and was sentenced by Mr. Justice J. V. Clyne to be hanged June 12.

The charge arose out of knifing in a drinking bout in a logging camp on the Island Highway near Duncan September 20.

Boy Killed in Mountain Fall

BANFF—A twelve-year-old Calgary boy was killed yesterday while a 16-year-old companion escaped serious injury in a 500-foot fall from the top of Tunnel Mountain, near this resort town.

Young Pat DeMulder died in a long fall down the side of a cliff on the mountain.

Billy Corrigal suffered a badly gashed knee and bruises to the head and body. He is resting in hospital at Banff.

Mine Roof Collapses; 60 Killed

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa—Three Europeans and possibly sixty native workers were killed Sunday when the roof of a gold mine tunnel collapsed more than a mile underground.

Bodies of six natives have already been brought to the surface at Freddie's North Gold Mine at Odendaalsust.

Attempt is being made to shore up the ceiling—5,970 feet beneath the earth—in the slender hope that some survivors may be found.

80-Year-Old Man Blasts Himself

ALDERGROVE (CP)—An 80-year-old man killed himself here Saturday night by exploding a stick of dynamite, police reported.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police found the body of Fred Peterson in his blast-torn one-room shack.

They said he apparently got out of bed, put a match to a fuse and clasped the dynamite to his chest.

Monopoly In Boxing

International Boxing Clubs Charged in United States Federal Court

NEW YORK (CP)—International Boxing Clubs of New York and Illinois were charged today with conspiring to monopolize professional championship boxing business in the United States.

A Department of Justice complaint was made in a civil action in federal court.

Price Control Option Rejected

OTTAWA—Parliament Friday rejected 102 to 20 a CCF motion which would have controlled meat prices following the restrictions due to foot and mouth disease. Progressive Conservatives joined the government in voting against the motion as they oppose price controls.

**Mr. Meek Makes Hay With Some Spades**

Usually, it's your rebid, not your opening, that shows the full strength of your hand. When you open with one of a suit and partner responds with one no trump, you know game is unlikely unless you have opened a very strong hand.

If you have nothing extra and a balanced hand, you pass. If your hand is unbalanced you either make a simple rebid of your first suit or bid two in some biddable suit lower in rank than your first suit.

However, if you have considerably more than the requirements for an opening, you should take more vigorous action. Mr. Meek had a fine hand in today's deal. He had no second suit to bid and his hand was not suited to no trump play. But he had an excellent spade suit and decided that chances for game were good if Mrs. Keen had more than just a minimum no trump.

He therefore jumped to three spades which told Mrs. Keen a story as outlined with a "top range" no trump bid. Mrs. Keen went to game.

Mr. Abel opened the queen of clubs which was taken with dummy's ace. Here Mr. Meek went into a huddle. This irritated Mr. Muzzy, who was kibitzing the game. "What are you waiting for?" he whispered fiercely. "You've got 10 cold tricks. Let's get the rubber over."

"I'm trying to see what could go wrong," replied Mr. Meek with typical caution and pessimism.

Finally he decided he could not be beaten unless one opponent held all five outstanding trumps.

At trick two he led a small club and ruffed it. He laid down the king of spades and actually seemed happy when his worst fear was realized. He went to dummy with the ace of spades and ruffed another club.

Then he took his side tricks. When they got by without be-

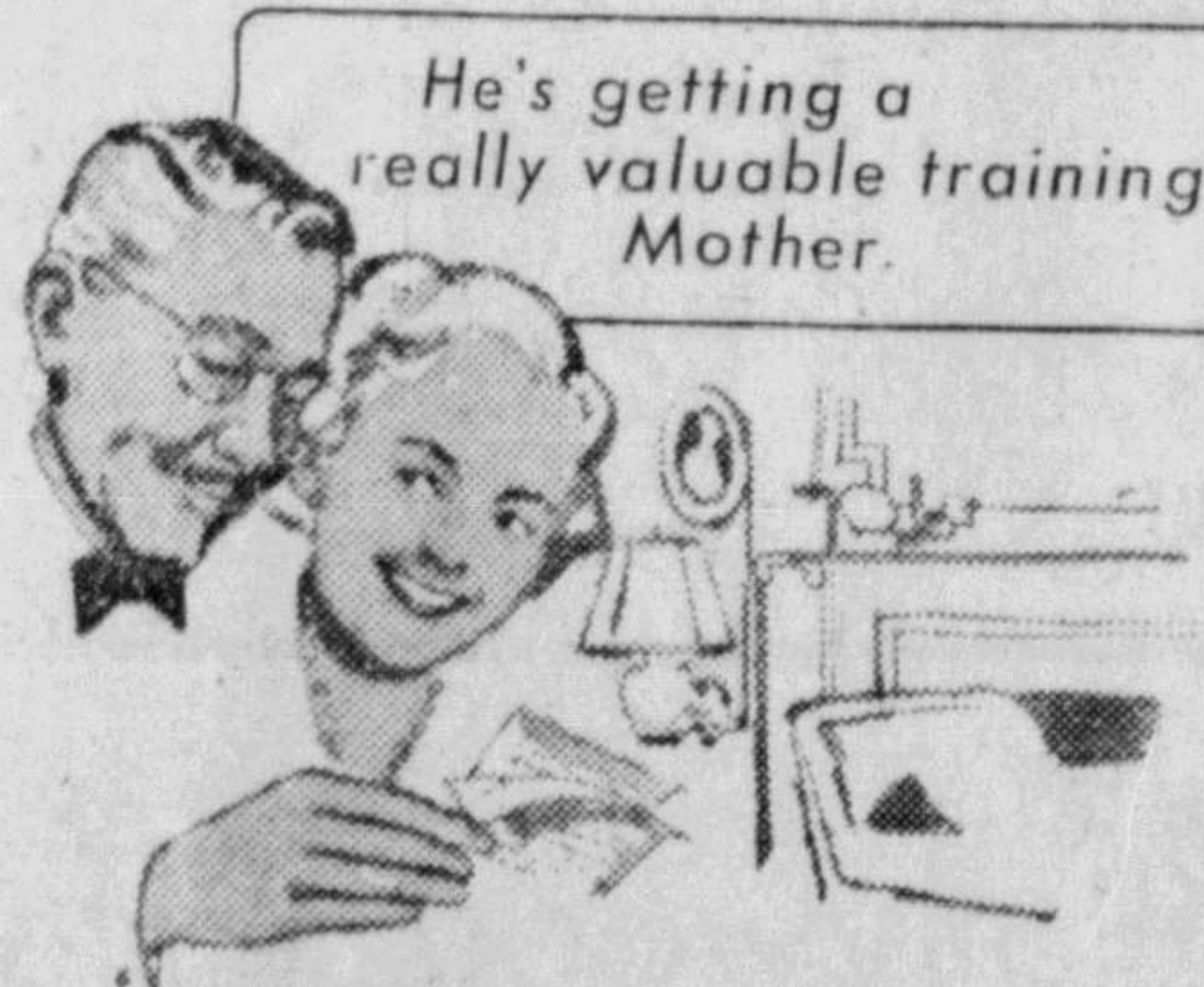
