



Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP)-Despite the post-Korea expansion of the armed forces, the Canadian Legion's national convention was told today the "very grim" state of Canada's defences still is its No. 1 issue.

Group Capt. Alfred Watts of Vancouver, retiring president, launched five days of business sessions with the statement that the Legion's 1950 call for compulsory training was "a voice crying in the wilderness"-and an indication that the call will probably be sounded again.

The signs are that the delegates will reaffirm the belief that Canadian youth should be given compulsory military education in the reserve forces.

The issue will be hammered out in this great French-speaking city after Defence Minister Claxton has a chance to state the government's case Tuesday when he will probably report the armed forces approaching the 100,000-mark in manpower, well over twice their pre-Korea

> Layte, who won the Military Cross and was twice wounded with Nova Scotia's Highland Brigade in France during the First World War, picked up his early knowledge of radio when he joined the old Royal Flying Corps. He put this knowledge to good use later when he worked in Japan helping another company make his combination radio-phonographs.

When he returned to the U.S. from Japan, he was ready to catch on with a small company that was likely to grow. He went with Purolator, which then had 30 employees. Now it has 1500.

Layte approaches business with the independence of the farmers of Nova Scotia's Annapolis Valley where he grew up. Now he is trying to show that independence makes for success in business.

He is one of a group of industrialists who are trying to teach high school students that business is created and nourished by people. The method is to help the students form miniature businesses, learn about production, costs and sales. The students operate the business which may be turning out plastic gadgets or taffy, and pay all the bills. All they get from the industrialists is guidance.

"It instils in their minds the principles of free enterprise, said Layte. "It gives them some incentive to get on, rather than have the government or their fathers-in-law take care of


