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Our Inland Province

AS NORTHERN B.C. goes ahead into its anticipated development, a problem that may grow in size is the lack of access to the sea. Shut off by the Alaska panhandle, the province there is for all practical purposes an inland one and consequently is denied the shipping advantages which its maritime remainder enjoys.

The situation is made worse by the absence of roads and railways. With the exception of what is carried by air, traffic in northern B.C. still moves by river. Besides being a tedious process which is always at the mercy of the seasons, this means that everything going to or from communities on the western slope of the coastal watershed must pass through Alaskan ports.

Anticipating the international difficulties this could present, the B.C. and Yukon Chamber of Mines has recommended that some arrangement be made whereby Canada would have access to the Pacific by way of a number of narrow strips of land or corridors cutting across the Alaska panhandle. Observing that this would permit the Dominion to develop its own northern deepsea ports, the Chamber adds:

"It is felt that establishment of these Canadian ports and subsequent development of hydro-electric, mineral and other resources will bring prosperity to all citizens of Canada and the United States living in those northern areas."

While all that is undoubtedly true, we are inclined to think Alaska would object to having its territory broken up by alien tracts of property. At any rate, the promise of prosperity through international co-operation is a pretty vague inducement.

By far the more profitable form of co-operation for both countries would be the construction of a northern road or railway, in which Americans already have shown an interest. Magnificent though their part has been, Norsemen aircraft pilots and river-boat captains cannot forever be responsible for the future of the north.

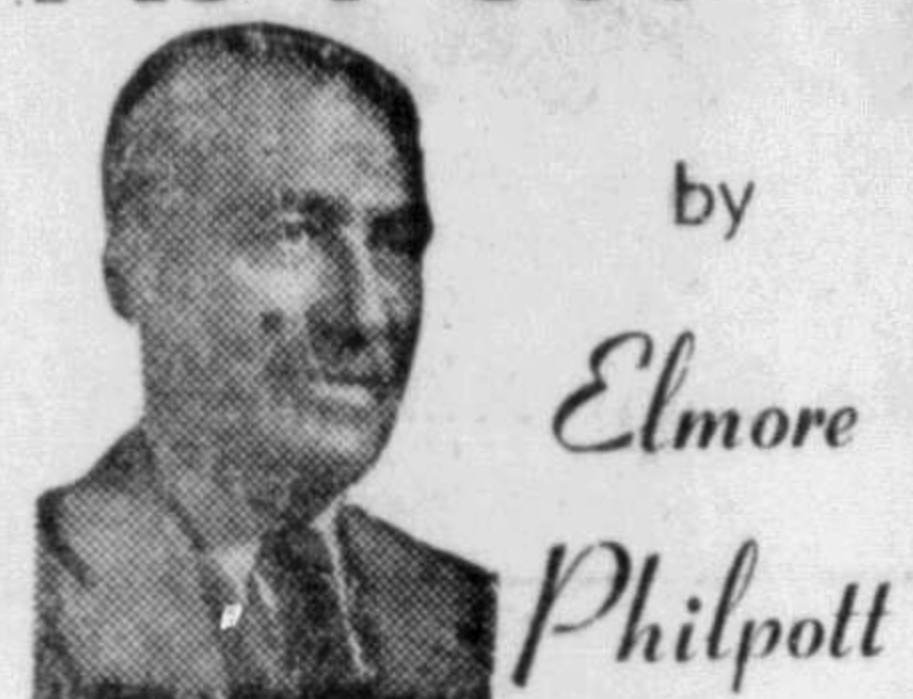

They Come in Pairs

HERE in the parliament of Canada there are some oddly assorted couples in the various parties.

The Liberals have left-wingers like Dave Croft, but they also have some MPs who are so far to the right that they are almost in the Colonel Blimp class.

The Tories have some die-hards who haven't heard yet that Queen Victoria is dead.

But they also have John Diefenbaker who as the whip of Nehru's Congress party said to me out in India is thought by some to be "more liberal than the Liberals."

The CCF has several real socialists, and a real Marxist or two. But the CCF also has Ross Thatcher, who looks, acts and talks exactly what he is—a highly successful and rich hardware merchant. He toes no party line and wears no man's collar.

BUT IT IS the Social Credit party which wins the prize for sheer contradiction.

John Blackmore, the MP for Lethbridge, is an open and even enthusiastic supporter of Senator Joe McCarthy. Instead of seeing McCarthyism as a sort of John-the-Baptist forerunner of fascism, Mr. Blackmore sees Joe McCarthy as a sort of modern Saint Patrick, who is well on the way to chasing the Communists out of America, as the legend says St. Pat chased the snakes out of Ireland.

It is an open question how many of Mr. Blackmore's colleagues share his ideas. But certainly not all of them do.

One who obviously does not is Victor Quelch, who represents the constituency of Acadia.

As I listened to Major Quelch, I felt that his ideas on money were much more in line with those of the late Gerry McGeer than with those of Major Douglas.

You never hear any of the veiled anti-Semitic insinuations when Quelch speaks. Nor do you hear any of the hints that somehow or other the party to which he belongs has a monopoly hold on the Bible, or the inside track for favor of the Almighty.

ONE of the best speeches I ever heard in any parliament was by Colonel Gordon Churchill, a Conservative from Manitoba.

Churchill was himself one of Canada's top tank experts in the Hitler war. He gave convincing facts and figures to show that what he called the "armored personnel carrier" had saved vast numbers of lives.

He cited several battles in which the Canadian infantry had moved from their starting points to their final objectives before they had suffered a single casualty—all because Canada had pioneered in the use of protected infantry carriers. He gave comparisons with American experience and indicated that on this one matter our methods were far ahead of those of the Yanks.

Remembering how the infantry were mowed down by tens of thousands in the earlier war, I surely hope our top people are paying attention to Churchill's point.

GEORGE DREW'S crack that the Liberals have become "silk hat socialists" seemed a bit out of line to me. We did have two great "silk hat socialists" in Canada, though both of them would have denied the tag. One was Sir Adam Beck, the rich Tory who built the so-called Ontario Hydro system. The other was Sir Henry Thornthorpe who put the CNR on its feet for the Liberals.

Getting mechanical service at a neighborhood garage is a waiting game. Garage etiquette demands that the customer stand and watch other work in progress for half an hour first.

As long as the motorist stays in his car, he is the king of a small kingdom on wheels. The garage men run out to fill his gas tank, check his oil and water and wipe the windshield.

The kind-faced man stares sympathetically at him for a moment, and turns to shout at his colleague:

"Ja fix that gurbel-wheel in the Jones car, Jack?"

Saturday Sermon

NOT BY BREAD ONLY

By CANON B. PROCKTER, Rector of St. Andrew's Cathedral

The life of Jesus Christ was dedicated to the proposition a human being needs more than the satisfaction of his physical even his mental hunger. The words, "not by bread only," are from Deuteronomy, do not condemn or discount physical. They imply that it isn't sufficient of itself.

Notwithstanding, the gospels are full of stories which indicate that Christ's life, like yours and mine, was very occupied with ministrations to physical needs. In His case, other people's. In our case, too often, our own.

But suppose you desire to ally your life as closely as possible to the life of God's Son, how are you going to provide that which is more than bread? How can the Word of God be provided in such a way as to make bread more than bread?

The answer is fairly obvious. The physical needs must be ministered to IN THE NAME OF JESUS CHRIST. There is a difference in the thing that is done according to the spirit and motive of the doer. Do it in your own name and you are a nice fellow. There is human warmth about that but no eternal significance. Do it in the name of an organization. That is probably not as good because it is more impersonal. Do it in the name of the community or the government or humanity and it is still "bread only." But when Christian people band themselves together as they always have to work in the Name of Christ and to reach out to every corner of the community and to every corner of the earth to do simple tasks of ministry or service, in this Name, they do minister that which is more than bread for what they do speaks of that which is more than time or history.

That is why what the Church does through its missions is of more significance than what governments and organizations and individuals do on their own

account. That is why the few's mite can still be a mighty and significant piece of currency. The work is the same. The needs are the same. The vital question is IN WHAT NAME is it being done?



Jump Shift After Double
Forcing for One Round



Right or wrong, Mr. Abel decided to double first, then bid his spades on the next round. Mrs. Keen thought a moment about her best action. She had good diamond support and if her partner had a near fit, she had a whale of a hand.

She decided to bid two hearts which, in this situation (after a takeout double), was forcing for one round and one round only.

There was danger of the opponents making a good playing spot in spades and the jump to two hearts would probably keep Mr. Champion out of the bidding.

Mrs. Keen planned to pass if Mr. Abel bid three diamonds. If he bid two no trump, two spades (immediately) or three clubs, she would bid three diamonds and leave it up to him.

As it happened, Mr. Abel liked hearts. His jump to four hearts just two hearts looks a little odd, but he knew his partner's hand was substantial, and she probably would have doubled.

Her heart bid might even be payable, but it so she would probably have a magnificent diamond fit. She could then go to five diamonds over the top. Her heart bid, at any rate, was a good space in and he was determined to make it as hard as possible for them to get into the auction. His plan was successful as Mr. Abel was unwilling to come in at the first level.

She only had to defeat the contract was a trump bid. Mr. Champion had no way to know that he led the four of spades and all the defenders could get was two spades and one club. One of Mrs. Keen's clubs went off on dummy's fourth diamond.

It's impossible to say whether Mr. Abel would have found the four spade spot on less aggressive bidding by his opponents. Certainly he would have been much more likely to find it. He would have been down only one trick at that bid, losing three diamonds and a heart. He could have entered Mr. Champion's hand on a third round of spades and successfully finessed clubs.

Conversion Talks By Allies Fail

PANMUNJOM (AP) — Allied explainers today whipped an apparent manoeuvre by 40 pro-Red war prisoners to disrupt the United Nations command's interview timetable, but failed for the fourth straight day to win back one of the converts to communism.

South Korean Army officers blocked the slowdown tactics by fellow countrymen who refused to return home, and talked with 40 prisoners before the 4:30 p.m. deadline. But their score remained zero with 130 South Koreans interviewed. Another 198 remain to be called.

The Allies probably will start meeting with the 22 reluctant Americans and one Briton in eight or nine days.

Today's defiant Korean prisoners demanded longer explanations and refused to leave interview tents when South Korean officers ended attempts to woo them home.

The explainers solved the attempted slowdown by simply walking out of the tents and moving on to talk with other prisoners.

Left alone, the prisoners walked out the door leading back to Communist rule.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Charles E. Potter (Rep.-Mich.) said today he will seek early senate action on a request for a full-dress United Nations investigation of war crimes and atrocities in Korea.

Potter concluded a three-day United States Senate probe of Red atrocities Friday night with an announcement that he could not "conceal my great disappointment in the resolution of censure and the expression of grave concern" passed by the United Nations.

He referred to the UN General Assembly resolution adopted on Thursday. U.S. delegate Henry Cabot Lodge pushed through the

resolution over opposition of the Soviet bloc.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur ordered the gathering of documentary evidence on war crimes and atrocities in Korea shortly after the Communist invasion began there in 1950, an army colonel testified yesterday.

As a result, he said: "We have evidence, affidavits, eyewitness accounts and photographs of the bodies. No one can raise a question about the pattern and existence of the atrocities."

Col. James M. Hanley, chief of the Korean war crimes section from October, 1950 until May, 1952, was called before the subcommittee.

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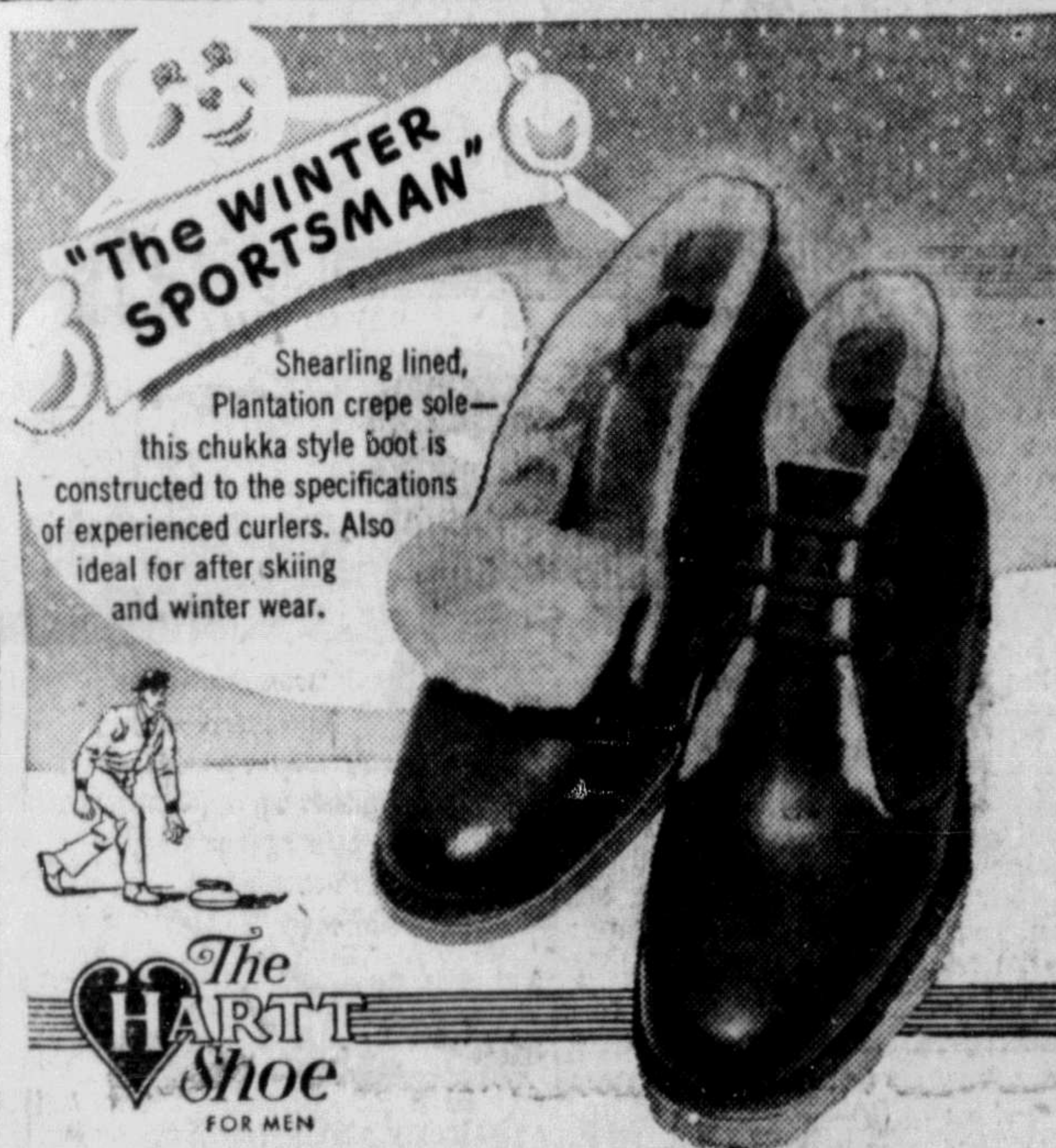
