Wings Win On Home-Ice

Howe Sparks Detroit To Stanley-Cup Lead

DETROIT (CP)—Gordie Howe, who can break up a hockey game while you're looking for him, slammed in three goals Sunday night and was the dominating figure in Detroit Red Wings' 5-1 spanking of Montreal Canadiens.

The hustling Wings again moved in front in the best-of-seven cup final. Leading 3-2 in

games, they can capture the trophy for the seventh time since Detroit entered the league in 1926 by winning Tuesday in Montreal.

Canadiens hope to regain the speed and drive of their 5-3 win Saturday by Tuesday.

Jean Beliveau put Montreal into an early lead Sunday but the Wings moved in front, and gathered more power as they went along and won easily. Glen Skov and Vic Stashuk scored the other Detroit goals.

In Saturday's game at Montreal, a solid, sham-bang affair, both teams cut loose at full tilt but it was Canadiens' withering drive in the second period that made the difference.

Three unanswered goals counted in that period by Montreal—believed to be a cup series record for unassisted tallies in a single period—and there wasn't a reply from Wings.

Five Montreal goals fell to as many players—Calum MacKay, Boom Boom Geoffrion, Beliveau, Tom Johnson and Floyd Curry.

Reid counted twice and Jim Hay once for the Wings.

Edmonton Could Take Title With Fourth Win Tonight



Indians Picked By Managers To Take American Loop Flag

NEW YORK (AP)—Cleveland Indians will successfully defend their American League championship and will oppose either Milwaukee, New York or Brooklyn in the world series.

This is the consensus of the 16 major league managers in a pre-season canvass by The Associated Press today.

Only one pilot—Al Lopez of Indians—was bold enough to select his own team. Two others—Lou Boudreau of Kansas City and Charlie Dressen of Washington—also named Indians. The others recognized Cleveland's strength but also showed respect for Yankees and White Sox.

No National League manager was willing to go out on the limb but all agreed that Braves, Giants and Dodgers rated the top three spots. Eddie Stanky of St. Louis, Biddle Tebbets of Cincinnati and Mayo Smith of Philadelphia each predicted that their clubs also would be in the thick of the pennant race.


Lopez pulled no punches as he predicted another Indian flag.

"I think we ought to win the pennant again this year," the Cleveland pilot said. "We've got a stronger club than we had last year with the addition of Ralph Kiner and Herb Score. Kiner will give us a little more power and Score will strengthen our pitching. I don't think we'll win 111 games again, however."

Said Casey Stengel, Yankee manager: "I have the best club in the league outside of pitching and should be first or second. 

Howe Sees Little Chance Of New Zealand Imports

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (UPI)—Canada's Trade Minister Howe, on a goodwill visit to Australia and New Zealand, said today during a brief stop here that there is little possibility of Canada importing butter or cheese from New Zealand.

Howe, accompanied by W. F. Bull, deputy trade minister, left immediately for Australia. They will return to New Zealand April 26.

Howe said butter and cheese are two of Canada's most "sensitive" products.

The difficulty is that our dairy products are about the highest priced in the world. That's the penalty we have to pay for trying to farm in a cold climate.

"We can't sell our cheese and butter overseas so we're compelled to use it at home."

SEES NO SOLUTION

"We have faced this problem for many years and frankly, I can't see any way out of it."

Thus there was little hope of Canada taking dairy products from New Zealand, although he realized these were the main items New Zealand wanted to sell to Canada.

Howe said one of the main objects of his mission is to find what other products New Zealand and Australia have to offer.

The New Zealand Herald suggests the possibility of extending meat exports to Canada. In an editorial the Auckland paper says the average Canadian eats only a few pounds of lamb and mutton yearly, and if New Zealand farmers were encouraged by Ottawa they should be capable of stimulating demand.

Trade might be confined to two or three months during the Canadian winter with the emphasis on specialty lines, but even this would be worthwhile, The Herald says.

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
Policeman Runs Amok

MANILA (UPI)—A Manila policeman Saturday killed four persons wounded five others, and then committed suicide over what police said was a love triangle involving his wife. Police said detective Leonardo Marcelo shot three neighbors, wounded another who later died, and wounded five others who tried to stop him. Then he turned his carbine on himself.

Hard to Show Muzzy Value of Safety Plays
Mr. Muzzy is a hard man to convince concerning the value of safety plays. When he loses a trick because of the unfavorable distribution of a suit, he automatically charges it up to bad luck.

Considerable time may be wasted in trying to prove to him that a different line of play would have saved the trick in spite of the bad suit break.

Against today's four spade contract Mrs. Keen quickly won three diamond tricks, then shifted to the ten of hearts. Mr. Masters won in his own hand with the king and laid low the king of spades.

When Mr. Muzzy showed out playing a small heart, the sequence of spades was led and dummy's nine finessed. Mr. Masters then cashed dummy's ace of spades, returned to his hand with the ace of clubs and cashed the queen of spades, picking up Mrs. Keen's jack. Thus he held his losses to three tricks and made his contract.
