THE SALE of a huge stand of Tongass National , forest timber to the Georgia-Pacific Co. last week was one of the most important events in the history of Juneau. The company's successful bid promises Devon the blue-eyed hotel; tremendous progress for this area. Georgia-Pacific undoubtedly will begin increasing the population of Juneau immediately.

By the time the pulp plant is in operation in Jameau some 2,000 additional persons should be living in this area.

Possibly a greater development than the proposed Georgia-Pacific plant is the one announced by Northwest Power Industries, Ltd., a subsidiary of the giant Frobisher, Ltd., Canadian development corporation. The Yukon hydro-electric project envisions the investment of \$750,000,000.

For the people of this area, the significant news is that this project calls for the construction of smelters and refineries to treat raw ores and concentrates near Tulsequah, B.C. on the Taku river. This industrial site, which calls for the expenditure of \$57,200,-000 would be connected to the deepwater port of Taku, Alaska, south of Juneau.

This development likely would add another 2,000 people to Juneau. It also points up the necessity of a highway from Juneau up Taku Inlet!

Both the Georgia-Pacific and the Canadian power project will be visible because engineering activity will start soon. This will bring people to Juneau in rather large numbers next spring.

This is why action leading to the construction of a highway up the Taku should begin now. Such a highway will give people access to Juneau by road, which presently is only accessible by air and water. When all this construction activity starts Juneau will be the hub of this progress.

Therefore, it is up to the territory and the fedctal government to take the lead in getting this highway built. The highway is critically important to the the growth and progress of this city.

Progress feeds on progress — and the future looks even better and proportionately greater than it did at first. —Daily Alaska Empire.


DWINDLING PNE ATTENDANCE BLAMED ON LOTTERY ORDER

At the end of the fourth day, Saturday, attendance was down 12,000 from last year's fair.


