



MEXT to the fact that salmon fishermen were free to go after their eatch, the most encouraging IN THE old days when feature of the price agreement reached over the week-end in the fishing industry was the proposal that it be made effective for two years.

While this, if accepted, will not answer the bigger question of how to ensure for all time that fish- jers who said the things ing will start on schedule each season, it will at least extend the period in which operations can proceed without interruption.

It is by now quite evident that a strike in the fishing industry is not the same kind of weapon that it is in other trades. In the first place, its duration must be limited by the length of season, not by the wish of those who are conducting it unless they decide to call it off before the season is over. After that negotiations for the following year must start again frm 'scratch since fishing experiences far greater fluctuations than the manufacturing trades which usually enjoy more stable marketing conditions.

In the second place, there is the danger that greater hardship will be inflicted on both sides than was bargained for. If one year's crop of fish is lost, there is no return to work until the next season comes around.

In other words, a strike in the fishing industry is apt to be beyond the control of those who are hoping to gain from it. In addition to the companies they are striking against, they have seasonal and extremely variable marketing conditions to contend with. Consequently, for them a strike may be a far more costly and much less effective weapon than it is elsewhere.

While the value of a strike as an instrument of protest in the fishing industry must never be underestimated, the price may often be out of all proportion to the results achieved. In a seasonal operation such as fishing, the need is greater than ever that agreements be reached without resort to this tricky weapon. It is a fact which the companies must, and undoubtedly do, appreciate as much as the fisher-

Two-year agreements will serve to prolong the period during which the threat of a strike can be avoided. It is hoped that as time goes on further steps will be taken in this direction to the benefit of both sides.


