Give CAA a Chance

ALTHOUGH the Civic Affairs Association has not aroused the kind of public interest that was hoped for when it was started two years ago, it was good that it was not allowed to die at its disappointing annual meeting Monday night.

There is a real need for an organization of this - bet. Apart from its role in studying the qualificaaions of election candidates and offering its recommendations to the electorate, the CAA theoretically is intended to keep a running watch on city council. affairs. The fact that it has failed to carry out the second part of its function to any marked degree does not provide a reason for abandoning the effort.

It could, in fact, be more persuasively argued that it should discontinue its plans to screen election candidates. There is admittedly some question althout the fairness of boosting certain candidates in preference to others. There is also the possibility that candidates who have not filed their nomination papers will decide not to run if they fail to receive the CAA's endorsement.

However, these considerations do not really outweigh the fact that it is in the power of an organization like the CAA to build up interest in civic elecumns and to give the public some guide in its thinking. It is a known fact that voters will frequently choose acandidate merely because they like the sound of his Same or because he occupies a place at the top of the Lallot sheet. The CAA is in a position to prevent Buch haphazard voting and to ensure that the results are a reasonably intelligent expression of public opinion.

Critics of the scheme might further argue that The association gould fall into the hands of a clique Which would select only those candidates of its own Etripe. This is a danger that cannot be taken lightly, But there are safeguards which should be more than Emple. One is that the CAA is not a secret society. Admission to it is simple and inexpensive, so that if no clique climas into power, it will only be because Ither groups through indifference and apathy have 3Howed it.

The other safeguard is that if the CAA becomes Too marrow in its choice, it probably will not survive Imagin any case. The public is not so hadly informed that it will fail to see what is happening, particularly In a town of this size where the lines of partisanship can be distinctly drawn. The result would be that the association would lose the broad base of appeal is high is essential to success.

It appears that from the discouraging circumstances of Monday's meeting a vigorous and fairpainded organization may have emerged which will Earry out the Morthwhile aims of the CAA as originally planned. It is best that the public at least be prepared to give it a chance. The anemic quality of pre-election interest so far indicates that some kind of tonic is needed, and this may be it.
