

The next day, as political commentator Blair Fraser recalls it a curious sequence of events took place. First Attorney - General Lucien Maynard made a long speech, arguing that the Liberal charge was preposterous. Then Premier Manning got up to say the "preposterous" charge was so grave as to warrant an immediate appeal to the people, by a government not yet three years away from its last election.

Mr. Fraser suggests there are three possible explanations of the government's action. One, which he terms the "least convincing," is that the government simply meant what it said. However, if the Social Crediters were really concerned about the legality of their legislation, the way to test the question would be to appeal to the courts, not to the people.

A second possible reason is that Social Credit MLAs may be uneasy about their personal liability. The Alberta Legislative Assembly Act provides that any person who sits or votes in the legislature when 'he is not eligible to do so shall forfeit \$200 for every day he so sits and votes. This penalty may be recovered by "any person who sues for the same." The Social Crediters may regard the election as an opportunity to clear all personal records.

A third possible explanation of the snap election —and apparently Liberals and Conservatives hope this is the true one—is that the government wants a quick new lease of life before any more questions are asked in the Public Accounts Committee. Last session this committee turned the spotlight on several questionable land deals, and it may be there are others still to be examined. If this is the case, a vote of confidence now would come in handy.

As the only other province with a Social Credit government, B.C. will watch the election with particular interest.



The International Olympic Committee was scheduled to meet in its final session with the selection of the site for the

winter competition No. 1 item on the agenda. The candidates are Squaw Valley, Calif., Innsbruck, Austria; Garmish-Partenkirchen, Germany, and St. Moritz,

Switzerland, Innsbruck apparently has lost some of its earlier support but a rugged voting session was in prospect as the 50 committee members cast their ballots.

Austrian ski officials have received permission to organize the 1958 world skiing championships at Badgastein providing gel his sixth flag in seven tries Innsbruck fails to get the Olympics.

If Innsbruck is awarded the Olympics, however, then the world skiing will be held in Banff.
