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OTTAWA DIARY By NORMAN M. MACLEOD

Trade Minister C. D. Howe's longer is to attract a flood of goods into their domestic markets. Instead, it is pretty much the reverse, namely, to preserve their domestic markets for the products of their own industries.

An important factor in the over-all situation is the prosperity which many nation economies are enjoying. Business is good by any normal standards in the United Kingdom, the United States, France and West Germany. And as a result of the prosperity prevailing in these and other countries, their own domestic markets are of more importance to their industries at the moment than any export markets. Domestic purchasing power is high and the urge to buy is also strong. Naturally the governments concerned don't want foreign goods flooding their markets and upsetting the present satisfactory state of affairs.

All this creates a real problem for the GATT delegates, whose function is to facilitate the free flow of international trade. The solution may come in the form of some distinction between foodstuffs and raw materials and manufactured goods for tariff purposes. That would suit Canada, but whether the idea can be expanded into a GATT formula is the question. At any rate Ottawa circles are counting upon the resourceful "C. D." to come up with some way out.

What the GATT delegates are up against in their present meeting is a situation different from any they have faced hitherto. In essence it consists of a strong tide of tariff reaction in most nations, contrasting with the emphasis towards freer international trade which prevailed immediately after the close of the war. The demand for consumers' goods accumulated over the war years has been met in most countries. As a result, the motive of nations generally no

Bannister To Quit Track For Medical Appointment

LONDON (CP)—Rangy Roger Bannister is trading in track suit for a surgeon's scalpel—probably for good.

The phenomenal British athlete made his official thursday

night. Regretfully, he said, he doesn't think he'll be able to go on taking medicine—and racing—as a double dose.

"I don't think I shall be able to continue in international competition," said the first of the four-minute milers, disclosing that he is about to take up a resident appointment at St. Mary's Hospital, in London's Paddington district.

Dr. Bannister made his announcement—"a sad piece of news"—at a sportswriters' dinner in London. He said he had found it "increasingly difficult to combine the strenuous life of a track star with the even more demanding schedule of a budding surgeon."

The tall, fair-haired Oxford graduate, who seven years ago was more interested in rowing than running, thus closed the book on an athletic career that may not be equalled for a long time.

Tributes to Bannister's stature as an athlete flowed freely Thursday night at the annual dinner of the British Sportswriters Association.

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
