Giants Reach Second Place As Hearn Wins Sixth Game

The first National League pitcher to win six games this season is a fellow named Jim

Hearn, the righthander nobody wanted.

He picked up No. 6 Thursday at Milwaukee as New York Giants beat the Braves 3-2 in the only major league game scheduled. That edged Giants

into second place, three percentage points ahead of Chicago Cubs.

It was the fourth complete game for Hearn, who has lost two. Only Milwaukee's Gene Conley and Philadelphia's Robin Roberts have completed five. Braves touched Hearn for 10 hits, but only two went for extra bases, and he left eight stranded. After getting his 3-2 lead, the six-foot-three 200 pounder gave just four hits over the last five innings. In all, he fanned six and walked one.

It was wildness that contributed to Hearn's 1954 disappointment. He was put on the shelf as a starter with the world champs after September 1 by manager Leo Durocher. And at season's end, he was on the

NOBODY WANTED HEARN

But nobody stepped up to get Hearn, one of the stars in Giant's little miracle of 1951. He won 17 that year, including the first game in the pennant playoff with Brooklyn.

Hardly anyone wanted Hearn in 1950, either, when St. Louis let him go to Giants for the waver price. Yet Jim, who came up with the Cards in 1947, led the league in 1950 with a 2.40 earned run average.

Giants head home from the west 7½ games behind Brooklyn. New York is at Pittsburgh tonight to play the Pirates, who have lost seven straight, with Brooklyn at home again trying to snap a three-game losing streak against the Phils, who have lost 15 of their last 16.

St. Louis is at Cincinnati and Chicago at Milwaukee in two other night games.

In the American, also playing under the lights, Cleveland takes its 1½-game lead to Detroit. Runnerup New York is home to Baltimore. Kansas City is at Chicago and Boston at Washington.

Winning pitcher Dunbar allowed two runs on three hits, one walk and two errors by his team mates, while striking out three batters.

Cameron, the loser, had the five runs scored on him on seven hits, three Commercial errors, and two passed balls, while fan-

Mr. Muzzy was kibitzing Mr. Champion on this hand, hoping to catch the great man in an error. Mrs. Keen led the jack of diamonds and it was won on the board with the king.

Looking the hand over, Mr. Champion noted that he had two sure losers in the side suits—one club and one heart. He was willing to lose one trick in spades but planned to take every possible precaution to prevent the loss of two tricks in that suit.

At the second trick he led dummy's king of spades at which Mr. Muzzy snorted and muttered "smart alec stuff." The next play was a small diamond to the ace in the closed hand, followed by a small spade lead toward dummy's jack. Mrs. Keen showed out, the jack was put up and it lost to the queen.

SAVES SUIT

Mr. Champion won the club return with dummy's ace. He then led the four of spades from the board and since he held ace-nine over Miss Brash's ten-seven, he was able to pick up both of her trumps without further loss in the suit.

As you see, this play would have been just as effective if it had been Mrs. Keen who held four spades to the queen-ten. Leading from his hand toward the jack of spades on the second round of the suit would have assured Mr. Champion of winning three of the first four spade tricks.

"Very fancy play in the trump suit," Mr. Muzzy sneered. "But I would have got exactly the same result. I would have led a small spade and finessed dummy's jack on the first round."

THE MUZZY METHOD

"Miss Brash would have won with her queen but as soon as I got in again I would have cashed the king of spades and then I would have had the ace-nine or her ten-seven just like you did."

"So your method is just as good as mine," said Mr. Champion.

Resumption Of Talks Urged After Clashes

JERUSALEM 0 → The United Nations mixed armistice commission called Wednesday night for resumption of Israeli-Egyptian border negotiations. Coincident with the appeal, an Israeli reprisal attack heightened tension along the troubled Gaza strip frontier.

The armistice issued its own ultimatum for Israel to refuse to attend a scheduled border meeting Wednesday. Israeli representatives said the Israeli forces were in protest against a large mine explosion Tuesday in which three Israeli soldiers were killed and two injured.

Israeli troops Wednesday night attacked an Egyptian position near the site of the explosion, an army spokesman announced. He said the force suffered no casualties, adding that the Egyptians and those in an adjacent position fled when the Israeli unit approached.

The mine blast had occurred near the village of Klassar, on the Israeli side of the armistice demarcation line.
