KING AND QUEEN AT PITHEAD IN ENGLISH MINE DISASTER

Seventy-Five Dead Brought to the Surface Today After Dreadful Double Explosion --- Harrowing Scenes Amongst the Bereaved --- Queen's Sympathy With Widows---King Descended Adjoining Mine Shortly Before the Disaster

Special to Daily News Coinsborough, England, July 10 .- Following rapidly one after the other two terrible explosions drove through the Cadeby Colliery yesterday, causing the death of nearly a hundred miners. 
