NEW HOTEL: HOT POLITICS: DISASTER IN ENGLAND

KING AND QUEEN AT PITHEAD IN ENGLISH MINE DISASTER

Seventy-Five Dead Brought to the Surface Today After Dreadful Double Explosion---Harrowing Scenes Amongst the Bereaved ---Queen's Sympathy With Widows---King Descended Adjoining Mine Shortly Before the Disaster

Coalsborough, England, July 10.—Following rapidly one after the other two terrible explosions drove through the Cadeby Colliery yesterday, causing the death of nearly a hundred miners. Many are missing, and it is feared the death roll will run up higher yet. Three government mine inspectors were killed in the explosions, which resulted from the ignition by a shot of an immense

volume of gas and dust laden air in the workings. King George and Queen Mary were in the vicinity visiting the collieries when the disaster occurred, and the King had been down an adjoining mine very shortly before the accident. Seventy-five bodies were brought to the surface today, and the King and Queen personally visited the scene, expressing sympathy directly with many of the bereaved. The pithead scenes

were harrowing in the extreme, women fainting and giving way to wild hysterical outbursts of frantic grief. Her Majesty was visibly affected.

PRINCE RUPERT TO HAVE NEW FIRST-CLASS HOTEL

Wire From J. H. Kugler Announces That G. W. Morrow and Associates Will Build Shortly a Substantial Modern Concrete Hotel on Site of Hart Block, Second Avenue and Sixth Street---Fireproof and Modern Throughout

Site.

By wire today from J. H. Kugler ("Uncle Jerry") in Vancouver, Mr. Kugler Jr. was in-

formed of the immediate intention of Mr. G. W. Morrow and his associates to erect in Prince Rupert a large and substantial permanent hotel building on the site of the present Hart Block, "The Big Furniture Store," on Second avenue and Sixth street.

Concrete Building.
The building will be reinforced concrete throughout, and its interior fitting and equipment will be of the most expensive and substantial. This will be in fact the first permanent hotel building in Prince Rupert, fire proof and fully modern. It will be the Premier Hotel, the old pioneer hotel of Prince Rupert taking a new lease of life and within a

stone's throw of its original site on the railway reserve.

Four Storeys High.
Occupying the whole of the ground space available the hotel will be from four to six storeys high. It will have a full series of modern suites of apartments and will be furnished in keeping with modern requirements. The intention is that it shall rank with the first class hotels of Prince Rupert, both present and to be, and the promoters of the new enterprise so soundly based on the success of the earlier one say it is their purpose "to maintain the excellent record of Prince Rupert's pioneer hotel."



SCOTSMEN HERE HONORED DEAD

Funeral of Late Miss Mary Macdonald Held Yesterday Under Auspices of St. Andrew's Society to City's New Cemetery.

With the simple dignity of an old land funeral to the far away kirk yard in the glen, the remains of the late Miss Mary Macdonald were borne yesterday to their resting place in Prince Rupert's new cemetery, still separated by considerable distance from the city's centre. Under the auspices of St. Andrew's Society of Prince Rupert the funeral was conducted, and a beautifully situated lot was secured for the grave. The funeral cortege started from E. L. Fisher's chapel on Second street, where service was held by Rev. Mr. Andrews of the Presbyterian Church. At the end of the as yet unfinished plank roadway to the cemetery the casket was borne on the men's shoulders to the graveside, where further services were held. Many friends of the deceased attended, and pall bearers from amongst leading citizens and members of St. Andrew's Society took the positions of deceased's distant relatives at the graveside. Following were the pall bearers: Alderman George W. Kerr, P. Kerr, George Scott, J. McKechnie, Robert Ross and M. J. McNeil, president of St. Andrew's Society.

HORRIBLE IS HEAT IN EAST

Twenty-six Deaths Yesterday---Heat Crazed Laborer Leaps 100 Feet to Death from Moving Train---No Relief Yet.

Montreal, July 10.—The hot wave continues throughout the east and the terrific heat in the big cities has claimed many more victims. Seven deaths occurred in New York, nine in Chicago and two here, with several in other cities, making a total of the casualties due to heat for the day of twenty-six. No signs of relief yet. Near North Bay, while a heat crazed laborer was being taken to town, he jumped from the train to the river 100 feet below and was drowned.

C. H. SAWLE IN THE CITY

Editor of Omineca Herald Pays Visit to Prince Rupert and Has Good News of the Up River City of Mines and Agriculture.

One of the visitors at present in Prince Rupert is Charles H. Sawle, an old timer of the city's newspaper life and a pioneer of newspaper work in Hazelton, as well as in Prince Rupert. Mr. Sawle, who was formerly city editor and part proprietor of the Optimist (now The Daily News), has established in Hazelton the Omineca Herald, a live newspaper for the great mining district. His accounts of mineral development in the Hazelton district at present are of the rosiest, and undoubtedly big big things will be seen up there when the railway reaches the city, which will be very soon now.

CONNAUGHT AT WINNIPEG

CHURCHILL KISSED THE BLARNEY STONE

London, July 3.—Mr. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, paid a visit of inspection to the Haulbowline dock yard at Cork yesterday, motored afterward to Blarney Castle and kissed the famous Blarney Stone, after ascending a tower 100 feet high to do this. He had to lean over the top of the tower head foremost, while Sir James Long held him by the leg to prevent the hope of British democracy from falling.

ASQUITH FACES A CRISIS

Labor Members Threaten to Withdraw from House and Go on Stump.
London, July 8.—The Asquith government is facing a serious domestic crisis, the first serious rift in the coalition lute that has not been taken place. The Labor party has declared that unless the government candidate is withdrawn in the Hanley bye-election contest they will visit Hanley in body during the whole campaign and thus withdraw forty-three votes in the Commons. It is declared on good authority that the government will persist in its intention to contest Hanley and thus a rupture is assured. It may be only temporary, but the consequences must be permanent.

The present challenge by the Labor party comes as a climax to a long series of incidents which have filled J. Ramsay MacDonald and his colleagues with bitterness. Seeing how narrow have been many of the recent government majorities in the House of Commons, the loss of the Labor vote on a motion of importance would imperil the existence of the cabinet.

BISHOP DEMANDS HELP

Military Protection Required for All Catholic Institutions in Ulster

Belfast, July 8.—The Catholic Lord Bishop of Belfast today telegraphed to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland demanding military protection for all Catholic institutions in Ulster during the coming celebration of the battle of the Boyne. Owing to the Home Rule measure the Orangemen are to celebrate with even more than their accustomed vigor.

GERMANY TRIES SHAM AIRSHIP RAID

Hamburg, July 8.—The Zeppelin dirigible airship, Victoria Louise, started at a quarter past six today on a ten hour over-sea trip with 12 passengers on board. The monster airship flew directly out from this city over the North sea.

It is stated that the purpose of the trip is to demonstrate that an airship raid on England is possible as the vessel's speed of 45 miles an hour and its fuel carrying capacity gives a radius as wide as London from Hamburg and as far as Bristol from Emden.

The Victoria Louise passed over the island of Heligoland at a quarter past nine. Shortly before three o'clock this afternoon, the Victoria Louise was again sighted over Hamburg, where she landed at a quarter past three after a flight lasting nine hours.

BRITISH LIBERAL PARTY HAS A NEW LAND POLICY

IT TAKES AN ADVANCED STAND, AND IS CREATING NO LITTLE INTEREST IN POLITICAL CIRCLES—RECENT BYE-ELECTIONS WERE WON WITH IT THE MAIN PLANK.

The Liberal party in London is contemplating a new departure in politics. An influential section of the younger men, supported by some of the cabinet and led by Mr. Lloyd-George, is now actively advancing a new land policy for England. It aims at compulsory purchasing of large estates, rebuilding of rural homes and resettling the country with small holders.

The authorities have for some time been seriously alarmed at the steady growth of emigration of the English population. Last year half a million thrifty, healthy and industrious people, mostly young, left England for the overseas dominions. Scotland's population is now stationary, owing to the migration to Canada, and the authorities are equally alarmed at the overwhelming rush of population toward the towns, and the depletion in the country.

Political Parties Interested.
 Recently two bye-elections, at Holmfirth and Northwest Norfolk, were won by Liberal candidates, who made the advanced land programme the leading plank in their election policy. This lesson has not been lost on the government. While the government's programme is not yet settled, every influence is being used to make it adopt two main points—taxation of land values and the settlement of small holders as tenants on state owned land. By taxation of land values it is hoped to compel owners of large estates to sell. Settlement of small holders may be undertaken under the direction and instruction of official guides. Both Unionists and Liberals are agreed that there must be a general scheme of rehousing country laborers. The Daily Mail (Unionist) has this week opened a campaign demanding this. The Unionists may bring an opposing scheme for settlement of small holders

in hand, while the Liberals advocate state ownership of land, and settlers being made state tenants. The Unionists prefer that small holders should be enabled to purchase land from the state on a long payment plan.—Toronto Star.

FAST STRIDES TO HAZELTON

Chief Wynn, of the Provincial Police is in town from Hazelton. He is full of enthusiasm and delight for the new train service. That one could leave Hazelton at 10 a.m. in the morning and arrive here at 8 p.m. the same day seems the realization of a dream that is almost too good to be true.

Things are moving all right, and a good deal faster than a whole lot of people imagine. The chief reports that the bridge at Skeena Crossing is completed, and that the work of laying the rails on the bridge will be started today. It will only be a very short time getting to Sealey, and in two or three months that much looked for goal will be reached.

CITY TO HAVE CONDOR

Substitute for Alser Cement is Agreed Upon

The city council has decided to accept the Condor brand of cement to finish the reservoir at Acropolis Hill. M. Albert explained that it was impossible to get the Alser brand. Mr. Mason, the acting city engineer, was well satisfied with the quality of the cement. Some of the aldermen dissented, but the motion, proposed by Ald. Dybhavn that the Condor brand be used, was finally carried.
