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LIBERALS WIN OUT WELL OVER SASKATCHEWAN

SASKATCHEWAN ELECTIONS; TIDE SETS FOR LIBERALISM

LARGE PROPORTION OF SEATS CAPTURED FROM CONSERVATIVES AT PROVINCIAL BATTLE OF POLITICS JUST CONCLUDED—NO RIOTING OR ILL FEELING RECORDED.

Regina, July 12.—(12:30 a. m.)—In the elections in Saskatchewan yesterday the following were elected:
South Qu'Appelle — Railton, Liberal, conceded the election by 50 of a majority, with three polls to hear from.
Estevan — Eight polls give George Bell, Liberal, 22 of a majority.
Arm River—Nine polls give G. A. Scott, Liberal, 189 majority, with 24 polls to hear from.
Moose Mountain—Fifteen polls give Magee, Liberal, 31 of a majority, with fourteen polls to hear from.
As far as heard from other centres results are as follows:
Conservatives elected — Wiloughby, Moose Jaw; Bradshaw, Prince Albert; McDonald, North Qu'Appelle; Wylie, Maple Creek; Laycock, Eagle Creek.
Liberals elected—Bole, Regina; McNab, Saskatoon; Railton, South Qu'Appelle; Bell, Estevan; Magee, Moose Mountain; Premier Scott, Swift Current; Cunningham, Pheasant Hills; Scott, Arm River; Cawthorpe, Biggar.

TIDE PLAYS TRICKS WITH TWO LAUNCHES

This morning the owners of two gasoline launches moored at the Davis wharf, which is leased by the Standard Fish Products Co. of Paofo, were annoyed to find their boats in trouble owing to the tide's retreat during the night. One boat, a nameless dark green one of fair size, belonging to an Indian, was submerged, having tilted as the tide fell and failed to right herself as it rose again. The boat will be fairly badly out of order inside. The other one was the sensationally shaped little speeder belonging to Mr. Rorvig of the Standard Fish Co. She got hung up in the air between the wharf piles and the rough grade. Her delicately poised propeller shaft and wheel became her partial support, probably much to their disarrangement. The boats were floated at high tide.

MR. SAUNDERS' NEW ASSISTANT KILLED TODAY

Captain Saunders, who arrived in the city a few days ago, and who is going to take up his residence at the Marine Station at Digby Island immediately, expects to be joined by his wife and family in a fortnight's time. Captain Saunders today received news of a most distressing nature. A gentleman of the name of Mr. William Clarke, who was to have arrived here as his chief assistant, has met his death in an automobile accident near New Westminster. Further particulars are not available up to the time of going to press.

LIVE LIBERALISM.

"The Liberals will be returned again. Liberalism is not dead, as some people think. It is getting to be more alive than ever." This was the expression of the Hon. George P. Graham, M. P. for South Renfrew, ex-minister of railways and canals, in explaining why he believes a general election is inevitable within two years. "It may be soon after next session of Parliament, by the look of things just now," he ventured. "Mr. Borden has promised to take his policy on the navy to the people, and must make good on his promise. So it looks, then, as if the naval question will precipitate an election soon after next session."

SEVERE SCALDS CAUSE DEATH OF JAPANESE

Unisuje Kakid, the Japanese who was brought over from Naden Harbor the day before yesterday suffering from severe scalds, the result of falling into a vat of boiling water, succumbed to his injuries last evening at the General Hospital. LATEST FROM HAZELTON, RAILS NEAR, MINES RIGHT

IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENTS MAY BE EXPECTED IN A VERY SHORT TIME FROM MINES CLOSE TO THE UP RIVER CITY, WHICH HAS BEEN PREPARING FOR COMING OF STEEL.

That there are possibilities untold in the mining properties about Hazelton becomes more and more evident as development of these tremendously rich mountain masses of ore proceeds. With the railway now within a few miles of Hazelton there will be something of a boom before long, when the mines begin to ship ore. A talk with C. H. Sawie, who has visited almost every mine in the Hazelton district in independent investigation, reveals an interesting stage of Hazelton's progress in sight.

Much Ore Ready.
On the Nine Mile mountain, which is practically a mass of different ore veins, some of the famous mines, such as the Harris claims and the Silver Standard group, have carried development so far on that they have ore piled ready for shipment as soon as transportation means reach reasonable distance. At the Silver Standard mine you can walk over piled ore in cribs to the value of \$60,000, while what remains below the surface simply surpasses imagination. The ore taken out is only that which had to be taken out anyway from a shaft being sunk to reach deeper development works.

Rocher de Boule Good.
Great things are expected of Rocher de Boule group in the near future. It is known definitely that a very large ore body has been found in the course of development of that property, and the ore unearthed in large quantities and in regular vein is of marvelously high grade. There is chalcopryite ore and the gray copper ore, with which much silver is associated, and indications are that a regular mass of the very finest mineral is available, measurable by the thousand in tons.
Hazelton's Other Aspects.
In many other aspects Hazelton prospers exceedingly. There is the rapid work on the railway, which will be in New Hazelton very soon now. There is the development of the district agriculturally, a very important aspect. There are the coal and water power prospects, too vast to be set forth in small space. Hazelton is talking mines, manufactures and agriculture in strong, practical style today, and Hazelton men declare that Hazelton can deliver the goods when the time comes. The time is almost at hand today.

FIVE NEEDED FOR A QUORUM LAST NIGHT SAW BUT FOUR

Over a Mysterious Financial Proposition the Mayor and His Municipal Advisers Fall Out---Considerable Differences of Opinion Exist and There is a Demand for Information ---After Much Futile Talk, Two Abandon Board and Affairs End in a Sad Fizzle

In response to an announcement that an offer had been received for the treasury certificates still undisposed of by the city, a special meeting of the City Council somewhat unwillingly assembled in the city hall last night, and a desultory sort of discussion, full of disagreement, was held. The meeting finally fizzled out as two members, Alderman Montgomery and Alderman Maitland, felt so thoroughly at variance with the others and with the Mayor that they left the board. Ignoring their departure, the remaining four continued to debate, still beating the air, but by and by Alderman Douglas suddenly woke up to the fact that there was no quorum present and the four faithful faded away. Nothing definite was done. Nothing could be done.

Problem Before Them.
Close on \$400,000 worth of treasury paper remained to be covered and there is of that \$415,000 due to the Provincial government. The offer made by

the Mayor was for the purchase of the stock at 98 without the three-quarter commission. The Bank of Montreal did not particularly welcome the proposition. The Council talked it over. First of all a lengthy discourse on the situation was contributed by His Worship the Mayor, who said he had been informed that the certificates could be sold for 98, but was not allowed to mention names. He himself thought the offer a good one. Other members thought much otherwise and wanted information, names, facts, details. Alderman Morrissey demanded the whole proposition in writing.

Let the Bank Act.
The Mayor was not inclined to follow Alderman Morrissey's suggestion. He declared there were good reasons against the giving out of details, and the person

making the proposition did not wish his name to appear. The Mayor thought the Council should find this acceptable. But the Council did not apparently find it acceptable. Alderman Maitland wanted the proposition to come through the bank in business manner. If the bank approved it then there might be reason for accepting it. But the Mayor could not say that the bank approved the proposition.

Talk ran to and fro across the council board until both Alderman Montgomery and Alderman Maitland tired of the futile discussion and left. Still the faithful four—the Mayor, Alderman Douglas, Alderman Dybhavn and Alderman Morrissey—stayed with it. The did not constitute a quorum, so what they did didn't count, but as a matter of fact they did nothing. When Alderman Douglas noticed that they had no quorum the four dispersed themselves, folding their tents like the Arabs and silently stealing away.

REV. F. W. KERR HAS BECOME A BENEDICT

A very pretty wedding took place at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Grady, Miami, Missouri, on the evening of Wednesday, June 26th, when their daughter Mamie was united in marriage to Rev. F. W. Kerr of Prince Rupert, B. C. Miss Grady is a graduate of the State University of Missouri, and was attended by seven girl graduates of her year. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. Dr. Black, president of Missouri Valley College. In Chicago the bridal couple were met by friends of the groom and escorted to the Triangle Club, where a marriage banquet was prepared. The hosts were: Prof. Shirley Jackson Case, of the University of Chicago; Rev. Charles W. Gilkey, pastor of Hyde Park Baptist Church, Chicago, and Mr. George Dahl, lecturer of Knox College ('08), winning the past graduate traveling scholarship, afterward studied in Glasgow and Marburg Universities; also was one of a party of four students chosen to tour and study Palestine under the guidance of Prof. Charles F. Kent of Yale. Mr. and Mrs. Kerr are visiting the groom's parents in Berlin, and will return in a couple of weeks to take up their work in Prince Rupert.—Toronto Globe.

PIPE CUTTING COMPETITION ON AT WHARF

Over the contract for the cutting of the cast iron pipes for the Woodworth water scheme which were found cracked at the end there has been an interesting rivalry in efficiency of the men doing the work. At first the Rupert Marine Iron Works was asked to employ at 45 cents an hour men for whom the city officials desired to find work, and a few men tried out the job. But to cut iron pipe requires quite a knack, and several of the men found the job too tough. They quit and others took their places. Today a different system prevails with the contract. Skilled iron chippers, mostly Germans with training in their own land's great iron works, are making good on the job at a dollar a pipe, and there is a regular race between the men. One man who is employed all day in the iron works gets up early, chips two pipes, does his day's work and puts in overtime on two more pipes at night. So far the record is six pipes cut in one day.

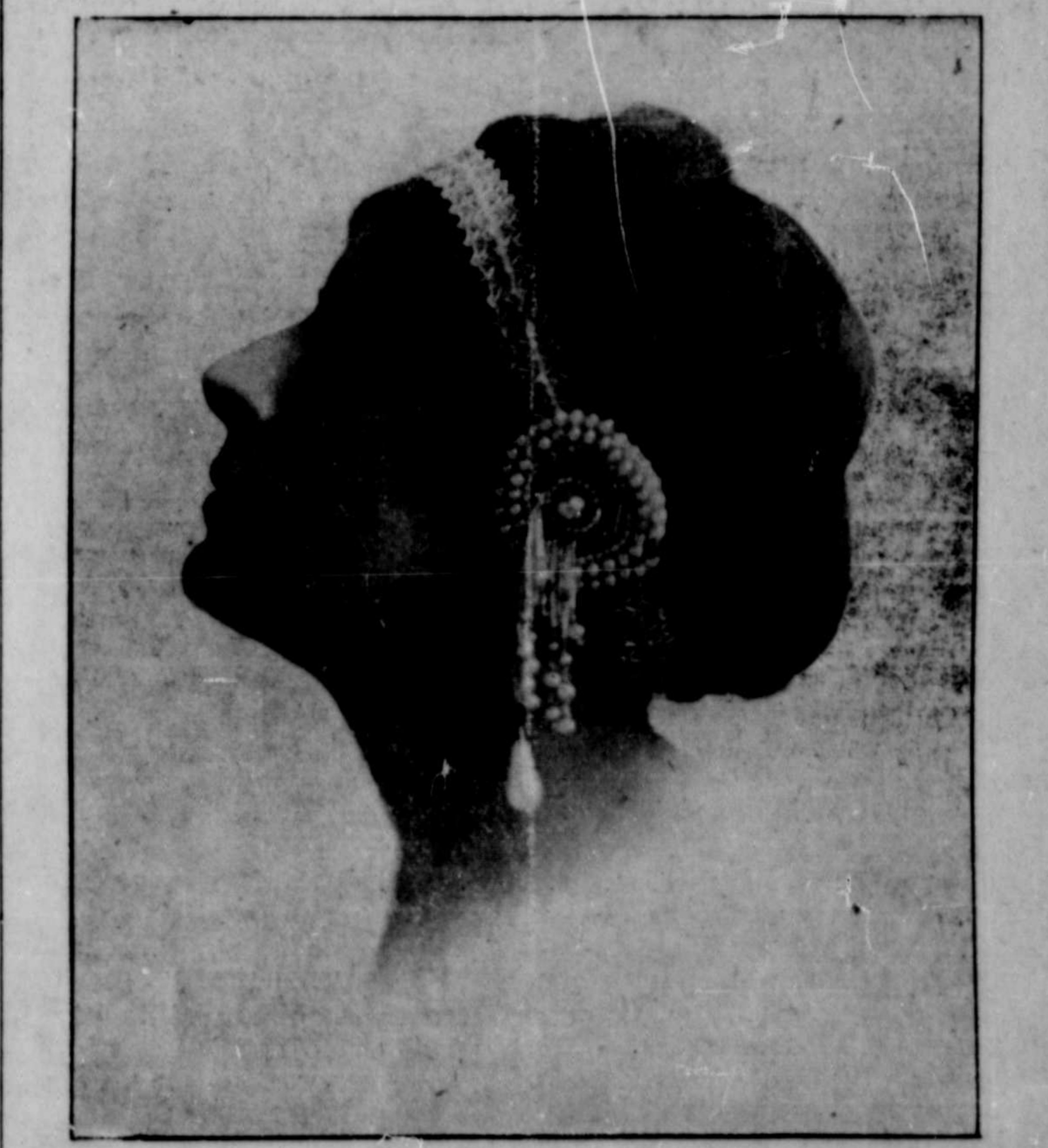

THE RESULTS IN SASKATCHEWAN.

Protest was made by the Conservatives against the assertion by the farmers of Saskatchewan of the very obvious fact that a vote for "Borden and Haultain" is a vote for the forces that defeated reciprocity.

From the point of view of the supporters of the government it is unfortunate that the farmers of Saskatchewan possess so much intelligence as to have still an eye to the solid diet which was refused them in September last. A sufficient length of time has elapsed since September to reveal to the people of Saskatchewan, as well as to others in the west, the extent of the loss which they sustained by the defeat of reciprocity, and their resentment is being unmistakably manifested.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR MAYORS.

At the recent conference of chief magistrates of the cities in one of the Middle Western States, the suggestion was made that a training school be established for mayors so that the cities over whose affairs they preside may be saved the expense of some of their costly blunders.

Prince Rupert cannot as yet fairly charge any of her mayors with having been guilty of making tremendously costly blunders, and yet it is difficult to estimate the amount of the numerous far-called items of loss that a city suffers through the effect upon its municipal life of an inefficient executive. While even a well intentioned amateur mayor is puzzling out problems of administration a young city may be losing time, losing prestige, and losing money. A training school for mayors would be a good thing. At present the only training schools for mayors are the cities themselves which need the mayors' services, and the process of training is expensive to the cities.

SOUND SENSE FROM SEAWARD.

It is the bane of every small community that the people find fault with the government, officials, one another and things in general, if things do not turn out just as they want them. Everybody appears to know everybody else's business and this thing and that is considered wrong. In the large centres, where men are busy all the live long day attending to their own business, and work overtime to make both ends meet, there is little bickering and the next door neighbor does not know what is going on, and cares less. Let all work together for the general good. Bickerings and backbiting never obtained anything that could be considered beneficial. Let the petty grievances take care of themselves, and work with a will to advance the community, which also means the advancement of the individual.—Queen Charlotte Islander.

PREMIER R. L. BORDEN MAKES NOTABLE ORATION IN LONDON

ENUNCIATES WITH MARKED ELOQUENCE THE EVIDENT SPIRIT OF THE GOVERNMENT'S NAVAL POLICY AND RISES TO UNWONTED HEIGHTS OF RHETORIC.

Following are further details of R. L. Borden's epoch making speech in London at the Colonial Institute:

"We have the mandate of the Canadian people to discuss matters of great imperial concern. In advance of discussion it is not to be expected that I should make any announcement as to our co-operation in naval defense. It is a trite saying that the naval supremacy of the empire is the very breath of its life and without which it cannot possibly endure. It also seemed to us that this supremacy can only be maintained by one united navy. Our ideal is one king, one flag, one empire, one navy powerful in days of stress or peril to vindicate the flag and maintain the empire's existence.

Two Considerations.

"There are two considerations before us. The first touches possible immediate gravity under existing conditions. The other touches the more difficult and more complex question of co-operation in the empire's defense upon the high seas. The second of these considerations raises in concrete form the question of the future constitution of the organization of the empire. **Canada Not Adjunct.**

"It is of sufficient moment to emphasize our view that any great dominion undertaking to share upon any permanent basis in the

sea defense of the empire must have some voice in the policy which shapes the issues of war or peace. Canada does not propose to be merely an adjunct even to the British Empire; she faces the future today with a proud spirit, conscious of her problems but equally conscious of her ability to solve them.

Mistress in Her Own.

"Watchful and patient of her resources, she is determined they shall be developed in the interest of her people. Mindful of her opportunities and responsibilities, she is resolved to play her full part in maintaining the unity of empire in promoting its influence for the cause of civilization and of humanity and for peace among nations."

Referring to Canadian French loyalty, Borden said that there are no better, worthier or more loyal subjects of His Majesty than those who are represented by his colleague, Mr. Pelletier.

**'DEVIL' APPO DIES INSANE
 LIKE HIS MURDEROUS SON
 TERROR OF NEW YORK SLUMS**

New York, July 9.—Quimbo Appo, Chinese killer, died in the State Hospital for the Criminal Insane at Matteawan, N. Y., on Monday, ninety years of age. No Chinese who ever came to this country had such a record for crime as Quimbo. That name means "devil." Three killings he frankly admitted, and he was convicted of a fourth he did not confess. These included the murder of one white wife. He just failed to murder his second wife, also a white woman.

Devil Appo passed more than thirty-seven years of the ninety years of his life in prison. He was sentenced to be hung once and escaped from the consequence of another crime by enlisting on a United States warship as cook.

One son was born to Quimbo and his first wife. This son was George, whose criminal career began at the age of ten, when he became an expert pickpocket. He served six or seven prison terms, and stabbed several men. He, too, died in an asylum for the criminal insane.

Brought Here by Diplomat.
 Quimbo, a man of strong intellect, cultivated and well educated, was brought to this country in 1844, when he was twenty-two years old, by the retiring American minister to China. He went to California in the gold craze of '49. He and a Mexican staked out a claim and started work. He killed his partner, who, he said, had attempted to rob him, escaped and for three years cooked on a warship.

Next he was heard of in New York City. He made a success as a tea merchant. Sober, he was a charming companion, but, drunk, a desire for blood seemed to be predominant. He married a white woman of the slums, murdered her shortly after the birth of their son and was sentenced to be hung. He claimed self defense in an appeal for a pardon, and his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment. Finally he "confessed religion" and after five years was pardoned.

In all his murders and attempted ones he pleaded self defense, and so shrewdly were his pleas made that, with the one exception, he was never convicted of murder in the first degree.

In 1875 he killed a prize fighter named Kelley, and was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment. His health was rapidly breaking down. The excitement of his life and the heavy drinking he had done in later years had wrecked his nervous system. Quimbo was sent to the Matteawan hospital. He was no longer the savage Quimbo—only a good natured maudlin old Chinaman who dreamed pleasant dreams and lived amid illusions, chief of which was that he controlled the world.

He often talked of the army of 1,000,000 men he had entrenched at Newburgh, also of the vast flotilla of fighting ships awaiting his orders at anchor in the Hudson.

Admired Thaw Greatly.
 Appo had read much about Harry Thaw, and when the slayer of Stanford White was admitted to the asylum the Chinese took a great fancy to him. Much to Thaw's disgust, Quimbo insisted upon sleeping in an adjoining cot. There could be no doubt of his great affection and great admiration for the young man.

He promptly made Thaw commander-in-chief of all "my powerful armies, with which you will sweep the world." The next day he honored him with the appointment of admiral commanding his fleet.

For days he gave Thaw little rest, but talked to him incessantly arranging plans to conquer the world. Finally Thaw had to appeal to the hospital authorities for relief.

Appo was the leader of Chinatown in its early days. He was high in Chinese Masonry, and only a short time ago a leading Masonic organization appealed for his release, offering to raise a sum of money, if the petition was granted, to furnish surety that he would be sent back to China with enough money to keep his in comfort for the rest of his life.

CHINESE CONSUL'S MISSION TO FOSTER BETTER TRADE

DR. CHANG KANG JEN, DURING HIS RECENT VISIT TO PRINCE RUPERT, REVEALS VAST POSSIBILITIES IN HER RELATIONS WITH THE ORIENT.

Dr. Chang Kang Jen, the Chinese consul at Vancouver, who has just paid his first visit to this city, and who addressed the Canadian Club at the luncheon given in his honor at the G. T. P. Inn yesterday afternoon, spent a pleasant day making a tour of the harbor in a gasoline launch. He was accompanied by his wife, Judge Young, Dr. Kergin, William Manson, M.P.P., and others.

The trip extended from the Dominion Government marine station on Digby Island, to the big Cold Storage plant at Seal Cove. Especial interest was evinced in the future shown by eastern and British capitalists.

Trade With China

The Consul's mission to this country is largely one of fostering trade relations, and he realizes that in the future commerce of the Pacific, Prince Rupert will occupy a very prominent place. In this regard China will have much to offer us; and it is the intention of the Doctor, both in his private and official position, to do all in his power to further these good relations to the fullest extent.
