

**COMMITTED SUICIDE
RATHER THAN FIGHT**

Auburn, Wash., Aug. 22.—Rather than go back to Austria and fight in the present European war, Frank Groeger, until ten days ago an employee of George Krouse, butcher, of Auburn, drowned himself in the White River. Such was the remarkable discovery made yesterday following the identification of Groeger's body by Auburn citizens.

What the call for Austrian reservists was made, Groeger became afflicted with melancholia and then suddenly disappeared.

**TENNESSEE'S GOLD
RUSHED TO LONDON**

Falmouth, England, August 22.—The United States cruiser Tennessee, with a large sum of money for the succor of American citizens stranded in Europe arrived here this week. The sum of \$415,000 was removed from the vessel and sent to London. The gold was in small kegs, which were enveloped in a sail fastened securely and dropped by a large derrick into a sailing vessel, which was at once towed to a wharf.

The operation was watched by a large number of residents of Falmouth. After the gold had been landed, it was placed on a wagon by American sailors and taken to the railroad station, where it was stacked in a special steel bullion car, which was securely locked with two keys, one of which was kept by the railroad company and the other by the American Express Company.

**ROBERT DROUET,
ACTOR, IS DEAD**

New York, August 22.—Robert Drouet, actor and playwright, was found dead in his bed in an up-town hotel. Heart disease caused his death.

Drouet, 44 years old, had played leading parts in Broadway productions for nearly twenty-six years, one of the latest productions in which he appeared being "Madame X."

**CANADIAN BANK NOTES
ARE AS GOOD AS GOLD**

To prevent any uneasiness or unnecessary trouble on the part of those not familiar with financial matters, and with the strength of our Canadian banking system, the Minister of Finance has issued a timely and reassuring statement. He outlines the effective steps which the Government is taking to ensure an abundant supply of currency during the war, and authorizes payments in bank notes instead of in Dominion notes or gold. That is to say, the familiar \$5, \$10 and \$20 bills, and those of higher denominations, issued by our Canadian chartered banks have now exactly the same value as gold. Railways, express companies, merchants, everybody in Canada will continue to receive and make payments in bank notes. Our Canadian banks are in splendid position to meet any demands which may be made upon them, as their reserves are exceptionally strong.

**READY FOR WAR—
ARRESTED AS SPIES**

Gananoque, Ont., August 24.—While at the railway office inquiring as to time of departure of trains to Ottawa, four Germans, only one of whom apparently could speak English, were arrested today on suspicion of being spies.

They said they were from Clayton, N.Y., and came across the river in a small boat, using paddles made out of pieces of board.

When arrested they had two modern rifles, two revolvers and one shotgun, besides a quantity of ammunition and a box of antiseptic cotton. In the bottom of the box there was a quantity of fuse. They had a supply of drugs, among which were poisons. They also had cooking utensils and other camp supplies.
