Quiet Times In the City.

Business is a little quiet in the city. In fact business is rather quiet everywhere. The rather unsettled money market, more unsettled than most of us realize, is touching us even in this remote spot. On the whole, however, business conditions are in a healthy state. Local wholesalers have done more business this summer than ever before and the end is not yet. There are developments still going on and local people need not fear as long as they carry on along safe lines.

Many people today have become so tired of paying the increasingly higher prices that they have stopped buying and the result has not been good for business. The storekeepers, too, have in many cases stopped buying and this is hitting the manufacturers and tending to bring prices down.

Will Prices

Go Much Lower?

One of the subjects which is continually discussed in business circles is whether prices will go much lower in the near future or will they go higher? In discussing the matter the Financial Post of Toronto says:

"Both in the United States and Canada official attention is drawn to there being a decline in wholesale prices, but that retail figures are still maintained and the long-suffering retailer is thus charged with profiteering by thoughtless people. They overlook the fact that the retailer is usually carrying stock purchased weeks and perhaps months ago at the higher prices then prevailing. When wholesale prices advance, retailers do not immediately put up their prices, but they continue, as a rule, to sell stock on hand at the lower prices, based on the figures they paid. Equally they should not be expected to reduce prices on any sudden drop, which is often temporary—in wholesale or manufacturing prices."

Silver and Gold

Bricks at Stewart.

A dispatch from Vancouver this morning states that a cyanide mill will be put in at the Premier mine near Stewart. This plant will refine the gold and silver into bars right at the camp and will add much to the permanency of that section as a mining centre and will tend to make the town of Stewart more stable. This development will be one of the important steps in the development of mining in the district to the north of us. It means a great deal and should inspire others with confidence in the future of the district. It is a policy that is likely to be followed and is an important move in the direction of placing the mining of the north coast on a permanent basis.

Hospital Policy Of Government.

The provincial government is investigating the matter of hospitals throughout the province. Dr. Arthur, an expert in that line, is going from place to place and will make a comprehensive report to the government on which they will base a policy to be introduced at the next session of the legislature.

The conduct of a hospital is always difficult. If hospitals are free, as many think they should be, there are so many people who are ready to impose on the hospital authorities in order to secure a few days' rest and free treatment. As it is, many of the hospitals have a number of more or less permanent boarders, people who are unable to help themselves and are incurable. This adds much to the cost of upkeep. Government institutions are usually conducted extravagantly, while charity organizations are usually starved. It is a difficult problem for solution.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbour is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
