No Auctioneer at Fish Auction Here

Only Seven Possible Buyers and each Buyer Records his Bids; very Informal Affair, but Bidding is Keen.

When it is mentioned that several car loads of fish were sold by auction, most people picture a man standing on a stool with a crowd of eager buyers around him, bidding against each other as the auctioneer extols the value of the fish and urges them to go higher. The fish auction is nothing like that. There are at this port now just seven buyers, representing seven fish exporting firms. They are J. E. Davie, representing the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.; W. J. Gash, Booth Fisheries; C. E. Starr, Pacific Fisheries; J. Lee, Atlin Fisheries; John Dybhavn, Royal Fisheries; S. Antonsen, National Fisheries, and J. Sinclair, Pacific Sea Products, Ltd.

The buyers and sellers gather in the little Fish Exchange on the Fish Dock between ten and twelve o'clock three or four days of the week and there the fish is listed on a blackboard, the description including the name of the boat, quantity and class of fish, and when and where caught.

Boats Grouped.
Before the auction commences the boats are, by mutual agreement among the buyers, grouped in such a way as to make them easy to handle in car load lots. Then the bidding commences.

Yesterday there were five boats in port with their catches. Some of the buyers were not present at the usual time of opening so the others waited until all had arrived before completing the sales. There was no auctioneer and all the lots were put up at the same time, each buyer keeping a complete record of all bids on all four of the lots. Bidding commenced at 12c for first grade and 7c for seconds and the lots were eventually sold as follows:—Mable A., 25,000 lbs., 14c and 7c; Anna J., 26,000 lbs., 13.8c and 7c; North, 8,000, and Fortuna, 18,000, at 13.6c and 7c. Evolution, 13,000 lbs., at 13.4c and 7c. The fish was finally sold after all the buyers said that they were satisfied.

The second class fish are the large or whale halibut, the small or chicken halibut, and the grey halibut which do not look as nice as the others. The first class fish are of medium size and clear white.

Age of Fish.
As mentioned before, the master of the boats report the age of the fish or in other words the time that has elapsed since the first were caught. While most fishermen are extremely honest there is occasionally one that misreports the age of the fish. The buyers, however, usually know when the boat left port and about how old the fish should be. If they get stung once, however, the master of the boat is a marked man and allowance is always made when he lists his fish. As in all other businesses "honesty is the best policy." It never pays to be blacklisted.

While there is keen rivalry among the buyers, as a rule a spirit of camaraderie prevails. They joke and laugh and jolly each other, and make the work as pleasant as possible. No one really conducts the auction but all help.
