NINE MONTHS BEFORE LINE TAKEN OVER

Board of Management Will be Created in Spring After Agreement Ratified.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—It is believed that it will be nine months before the G. T. P. is formally taken over. The shareholders of the company will not meet until some time in February to ratify the agreement of arbitration and, assuming that they do, the arbitration will not begin till the early spring. It is likely to be protracted. However, once the agreement is sanctioned, a board of management will be created and the operation of the Grand Trunk will be conducted with the C. N. R. without waiting for the arbitration.

This board will consist of two appointed by the National railways, two by the Grand Trunk, and a fifth to be agreed upon by the others. Provision will be made in the estimates for the construction of a number of western branch lines already authorized by parliament.

JANUARY BUILDING SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Totalled \$20,330 With 11 Permits Issued — \$11,680 Under Soldiers' Housing.

The building permits taken out at the city building inspector's office in the month of January totalled \$20,330, showing a big increase over last year and, in fact, the last five years. These permits were made up of \$11,680 under the Soldiers' Housing plan and the remaining \$8,650 regular city permits.

In 1919 the permits for January totalled \$1,800 and in 1917 the permits for the same month were \$1,200 so looking at the building situation from any standpoint, the building situation in the city looks most promising. A good deal of building is looked for during the coming year, with the present scarcity of housing in the town. It is likely too that a better class of buildings will be put up.
