#### Helpful Service Offered By Many Citizens.

During the first days of the epidemic, when many were fearful of the contagion, the noble and willing service freely offered by many of the citizens is worthy of the greatest commendation. Tre Borden Street Hospital was manned by volunteer help, and equipped at the beginning for the reception of the first cases, too, by those who had the necessary articles to lend. Beds. blankets, sheets, thermometers, and all the other requisites a hospital were freely offered in the emergency. Housewives who the 24th day of November, 1917, of ALI had their own families to attend to and could not assist personally sent in gallon after gallon of nourishing soups to relieve the pressure on the emergency kitchen staff. The volunteer nurses in many cases themselves developed influenza, and their willing assistance is directly responsible for the saving of many lives.


