## FELL INTO HOLD AND WAS KILLED

Harry A. Bruce of Queen Charlotte Islands Met With Fatal Accident.

Word has been received by Mrs. L. Schafer of Lawn Hill, Queen Charlottes, that her son, Harry A. Bruce, was killed on January 22 as a result of a fall. Another son has not yet returned, but has been in France for over three years.

Telling of the accident to Harry Bruce, a Grimsby paper says:

"At the Grimsby Hospital today the Borough Coroner inquired into the circumstances attending the death of H. A. Bruce, an able seaman in the Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, who succumbed to injuries received consequent upon falling into the hold of the s.s. Marguerita.

"In describing the accident, A. B. Charles Redfern, a native of British Columbia, said he was a member of the crew of the vessel. On Wednesday afternoon the vessel was riding at anchor in the Humber, it having previously been damaged by a mine. There was an opening in the deck, which was partly covered by a wooden stage. Witness, together with the deceased, was standing near the opening waiting for the anchor to be hauled up. The deceased, who was standing with his back to the opening, suddenly stepped back and fell to the bottom of the ship. Another member of the crew and witness went to deceased and found him lying on his back bleeding from his head.

"Petty Officer Arthur Hall told the court that the deceased was a native of Queen Charlotte Islands and was 24 years of age.

"Dr. E. C. Burnett, house surgeon at the hospital, stated the deceased died from hemorrhage resulting from a compound comminuted fracture of the skull.

"A verdict of 'accidental death' was returned."

USE AND STORAGE

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption. If he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to allot a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These industrial allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
