## HAWKER AND GRIEVE ARE RESCUED BY DANISH SHIP; IN WATER HOUR AND A HALF

MACHINE STOPPED BECAUSE OF ENGINE TROUBLE; AVIATORS ON WAY TO LONDON WHERE THEY SHOULD ARRIVE THIS EVENING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, May 27.—The British Admiralty officially announced last night that the Danish steamship Mary had rescued the famous aviators Hawker and Grieve and that they were in perfect health. They were in the water only one hour and thirty minutes.

The machine stopped on account of the water filter in the feed pipe from the radiation being choked. The Mary was not equipped with wireless but she signalled the land station at Butt off the Hebrides. The Admiralty at once dispatched a fast torpedo boat destroyer which overtook the steamer and transferred both men, whom it is expected will reach London at seven o'clock Tuesday evening.

## CIVIL SERVANTS ASK RAISE IN SALARIES

At Meeting Last Night It Was  
Decided to Ask for 25 per  
cent Advance.

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert branch of the Civil Servants Association of British Columbia it was decided not to affiliate with other branches of labor until every other means of securing a raise of salaries had been exhausted. A resolution was passed recommending a raise of 25 per cent for all those whose salaries were less than \$150 a month. It was pointed out that no advances had been received since 1914.

E. S. Woodward, president of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council addressed the gathering on the advantages of affiliation. Mr. J. Ledlie presided and W. S. Fisher was appointed secretary in place of R. Scoble who has been transferred to the forest branch at Victoria.

## MEN LEAVE WORK AT THE SHIPYARD SLIPS

Employees of J. R. Morgan & Co.  
Quit Without Notice and Ask  
More Money.

Yesterday after lunch about 75 men employed by J. R. Morgan & Co. at the drydock left their work demanding an increase of pay from 50c. an hour to 65c. These are the muckers and laborers.

Mr. Morgan told The News that he had received no notice of the intention of the men to leave their work. As soon as they had eaten their lunches yesterday a small group told the foreman that they were not going to work any more unless their wages were increased to 65c. They then left. J. L. Mullen of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., who had let the contract to the Morgan Company, said last night that it would be impossible for them to continue the other work if the construction of the ways was held up. He would have to let out a lot of men almost immediately as it was useless continuing the construction work if they were to be delayed on the slips.

The men in notifying the employers that they were quitting said that they belonged to no organization and that no official action had been taken in connection with their decision.

## RED CROSS LIBRARY TO CLOSE

Unless Steps Taken at once to Provide for its Continuance.

The Red Cross Library is about to go out of business. The Red Cross Society closes its doors this week and there is no provision made for continuing the lending department. Mrs. Backus who has had charge of it will be leaving the city shortly and if the library is to be continued some permanent provision will have to be made.

It will be a great pity if the only library in town is to be closed. This is a town where something of the sort is badly needed for the wet days.

The Society is ready to sell the books. The 300 volumes could be purchased for about \$75 or \$80 and they would make a good nucleus for a city library. Possibly arrangements might be made to continue the use of the hut to house the books.

## REV. W. S. A. CRUX IS LEAVING ON JUNE 8

Place Will be Taken by Rev. T. H. Nuttall of Anyox.

Rev. W. S. A. Crux who arrived home on the last boat from Vancouver after attending the Methodist Conference at New Westminster, says that he will be leaving for the south on Sunday, June 8, and will preach his farewell sermon here on that day. His new field at North Vancouver is a large one and the church numerically strong.

Mr. Crux will be replaced here by Rev. T. H. Nuttall who has been in charge of the church at Anyox for the past two years. He is a graduate of Wesley College, Winnipeg, and for some time was a tutor at the college. He was ordained in Manitoba for special work and was received into full connection in this district.

Mr. Nuttall married Miss Eason a sister of Mrs. Ling and of Miss Josephine Eason of the local teaching staff, so that he comes here among friends.

Dr. Spencer, of Port Simpson, is the new chairman of this district.

There has been considerable unrest around town this morning over the strike situation and it is understood that a few people quit work on orders from their headquarters received last night. Most of the checkers at the dock are out and some of the clerks.

## APPLICATIONS FOR WEIGH CLERK JOB

A Returned Soldier With Wife  
Applies for Position Worth  
\$30 a Month.

Applications were read last night at the meeting of the City Council for the position of weigh clerk at the city scales. The applicants were P. Dawson, H. G. Hillard, P. J. Gibbons, and Henry J. Clerk. The last mentioned explained that he was a returned soldier who had received a gunshot in the leg. He was married and his wife would be here in a few weeks.

Some discussion took place as to whether a married man could live on the pittance allowed for this work. In summer there was hardly anything made over and above the \$30 allowed by the council. In winter the fees for weighing would not equal another \$30. This was not good enough to offer a returned soldier.

It was decided to refer the matter to the Finance Committee who could interview Clerk and explain the situation to him.

## CALGARY AND EDMONTON TIED UP BY A STRIKE IN SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG

UNIONS VOTED LARGE MAJORITIES FOR QUITTING WORK  
IN BOTH CITIES—WORK TO RESUME  
WHEN WINNIPEG TROUBLES  
ARE SETTLED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Edmonton, May 27.—The Labor Unions on Sunday voted three to one in favor of a walk out yesterday unless the Winnipeg strike was settled. As a result at 11 a.m. yesterday the street cars stopped and all business was tied up. Provision was made to continue the police and fire protection and light and water services were maintained.

Thirty-four unions favored the strike, four opposed and some never voted. It was announced by the unions that work would be resumed as soon as the Winnipeg difficulties had been solved.

Returned soldiers individually reported that they were opposed to strike action. They could not see why they should suffer at this critical stage of their re-establishment into civil life.

Calgary, May 27.—The Calgary unions voted four to one in favor of a strike to commence yesterday at 11 a.m. The essential activities such as the provision for police and fire protection and the delivery of milk and bread are being permitted. Hotel restaurants have been requested to remain on duty.

## FISH PRICES HIGHER TODAY

Average Price Paid to Fishermen  
Is 17 Cents per Pound for  
First Class Fish.

The price paid for halibut is still higher. Today seven boats sold their catches at 17.5 cents per pound for the best grade and 11.1 cents per pound for seconds. The catches were:

The Yellowstone with 16,000 lbs., and Alliance, 6,000, to Atlin Fisheries, Ltd. The Brothers with a catch of 22,000 sold to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

The Royal No. 3, 3,000 lbs.; Advance, 10,000; M. M. Christopher, 5,000, and the Viola, 4,000, to Booth Fisheries, Ltd.

Salmon.  
Two salmon catches are in port but up till noon no sales were made. The catches are the Bingo with 650 lbs. and the Fiaber, 500 pounds.

Two catches of halibut were sold yesterday, the Senator with 45,000 lbs. to the Pacific Fisheries at 15.4c and 13.2c per pound, and the Reynold, 2,000, at 14c and 7c to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

## FOUNDATION YARDS MOVING TO FRANCE

Price of Labor Too High in This  
Country to Allow Shipbuilding  
to Continue.

Victoria, May 27.—It is announced officially here that the Foundation shipyard is to be dismantled as soon as the present contracts are completed and that the plant will be removed to France where the ships can be built cheaper than here. There are plenty of men in France needing work and they are willing to accept a reasonable wage.

The same applies to the other western yards of the Foundation Company at Tacoma and Portland where similar conditions obtain to those in this city.
