## RETIRING EDITOR OF LONDON PAPER GETS BIG PENSION

John Evans Given \$50,000 in Cash Also By Evening News.

TORONTO, May 10.—A Mail and Empire London cable says: "Lord Northcliffe, speaking at a luncheon of the directors, editors and higher employees of the Daily Mail, Evening News and associated newspapers, gave his audience some interesting views of the conduct of newspapers. The occasion was the retirement of Walter John Evans, for many years editor-in-chief of the Evening News.

"After Lord Northcliffe had presented him with a gold watch as a personal gift, it was announced that the Evening News company was giving him £10,000 down and a pension of £2,500 for ten years and £1,000 thereafter.

"Commenting on Mr. Evans' good work, Lord Northcliffe described the evening paper as 'that horrible machine which gives opportunities six times a day for making blunders, for being late and for getting left.'

## WHO'S WHO IN THE CHINESE WAR

General Chang Tso-Lin, Governor of Manchuria, and a former bandit, was the chief opponent of the recent administration of President Hsu-Shih Chang. He is very wealthy and has been manoeuvring for what he termed a more representative government in China.

General Sun Yat Sen is the founder of the South China Republic, which he set up.

General Wu Pei-Fu has been in control of the provinces of Honan and Hupeh in Central China, and has been the guardian of the present administration, although only lukewarm toward the president.

Generals Chang and Sun Yat Sen recently held a conference at Mukden to thrash out China's difficulties. It was agreed that Sun was to be made president of China and Chang vice-president.

Sun went back to Canton, and Chang began sending troops through Mukden, and eventually seized Peking and one of the main railroads leading into the city.

Wu Pei-Fu then demanded that President Hsu immediately force the evacuation of Peking by Chang or he would attack. He charged that Chang was setting up a dictatorship. This demand was refused, and Chang launched an attack upon the forces of Wu Pei-Fu.

Gen. Sun recently announced that, in view of the agreement at the Mukden conference, he would start troops north to join forces with General Chang.

## MOVIE STARS UNITE TO PROTECT NAMES FROM ILL-REPUTE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 10.—Mary Pickford has been chosen president of a club of motion picture actresses, the primary purpose of which is to protect the good names of its members. Miss Helen Ferguson, organizer, stated none would be admitted who were not "credits to the industry."

A small vein of high grade ruby and brittle silver ore was uncovered last week in a quarry being operated by the provincial government in connection with the extension to the Kitsault River wing dam. The property is owned by John Stark who intends to develop it and ship the ore to the smelter at Anxov.
