Mining Will Help Whole North Country.

The South is looking for the North for its mining development; that is clear from everything one reads and hears. There is a decided impetus toward development of mining properties. The success of a number of mines is having an encouraging effect and before long it would seem as if there would be enough custom work to keep the Anyox smelter going a good deal of the time. Continuity is what is needed and that is what seems likely. Prince Rupert is now surrounded by producing mines. To the north are Anyox, Alice Arm and Stewart, to the east Hudson Bay Mountain and possibly Hazelton, to the south Drum Lummon, and to the west Surf Inlet. All these mines are holding their own and in some cases there is a steady improvement. The Premier mine, for instance, has not yet reached its maximum and it is expected that the Dolly Varden and allied properties will do better than ever when it reopens. Hudson Bay Mountain is scarcely touched and Dome Mountain is simply a rich prospect.

Possibly the greatest immediate development is likely to take place at Stewart. There a number of properties will ship very soon in addition to the Premier, judging from all the reports that come out.

Build New Church For Presbyterians.

There are two religious denominations here that need new church buildings—the Anglicans and the Presbyterians. At a meeting last night steps were taken to get a building campaign under way for the Presbyterians. A committee to prepare data is to be formed and it is very likely that a new building will be erected in the near future. The church will undoubtedly have the sympathy and support of the whole community in their work.

France And Germany Today.

In his book, "The Decadence of Europe," Signor Nitti, former Premier of Italy, recently published, says:

Europe is already seething with fresh wars; and the almost feverish preparation of aeroplanes, of asphyxiating and poisonous gases, and of submarines can arouse nothing but anxiety. Is not the solidarity of the victors at an end even now?

France has less than two-thirds of the population of Germany. In thirty years—a short period in the life of nations—she will probably have less than half that of Germany, which, even though humiliated, plundered, and violated, is still the most compact ethnic organism in Europe.

The Germans have twice won great wars with France—all 1815 and in 1870. They have never tried to destroy the national unity of France, or to kill her economically. The acts of France since 1919 do not correspond to her traditions, and her representatives have only isolated the noble country which we loved, and which we still love as the centre of civilisation and light. France has had long periods of trepidation and anxiety. She has seen an unmerited peril pass over the head of her sons. She has not yet serenity of judgment. But when she feels the spiritual isolation which she goes to meet every day, when she sees that her resources cannot be developed unless there is peace, and that her greatest strength is to be found by returning to her past traditions, then this lamentable period will be forgotten. In the interests of France, which has a noble mission in European civilisation, we want Frenchmen to know the whole truth. We want France to return to those ideals which were not only her greatness but also her salvation. The men who speak a different language are not the heirs of the great French tradition, but rather its destroyers.

Great Britain—and it will be her glory—after great efforts in the war, has made the greatest efforts for peace. She had declared herself ready to make every renunciation, provided that Europe is reconstructed and that there is an end to the work of destruction, which is poisoning the life of the world. France will perceive, sooner or later, that her greatest glory will be to follow Britain on the same path. But, as long as the present distress lasts, it is the powerful voice of the United States alone that will be able to bring the real word of peace.

TRAINING ENGLISH WOMEN FOR SERVICE

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Graduating from offices, laundries, fashion salons and factories, 150 women, after 13 weeks training, are shortly to enter domestic service.

This is being made possible by a course of intensive tuition under the auspices of the Central Committee on Women's Training in an attempt to solve the servant problem. The training is undertaken at a few centers, and the women will start out on the new venture with smart uniforms under the guidance of their instructresses at the various centres.

ITALY'S WAR DEBT

Immense Sum Due Britain and United States

ROME, Jan. 17.—After Mussolini's proposal for a joint discussion of the Reparation question of the Inter-Allied Debts, the following figures showing the exact position of Italy in the question were made public.

On April 30, 1922, Italy owed five hundred million sterling to Great Britain, one billion six hundred and sixty million dollars to the United States, and seven million dollars to Brazil, making a total of twenty-one and a half billions of lire in gold.

Germany owes Italy as reparations thirteen billion gold marks, the equivalent of sixteen billion lire in gold.
