## Territory of Georgia Revolt Against Soviet Many Killed or Wounded

GENOA, Sept. 3 .- All of Georgia and Azerbaijan has been in active revolt against the Moscow Soviet regime for the past five days. Half of the territory of Georgia has already been conquered by the insurgents, according to representatives of Georgia here, who have received despatches from that country. The sanguinary struggle is continuing. Fighting is occurring in the streets of Batum.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Despatches received here says that Georgia and Azerbaijan are revolting against the Soviet. Many have been killed and wounded in sanguinary conflicts. Railway and telegraph communication is interrupted.
