
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CELEBRATION OF EMPIRE DAY

Addresses Delivered by Archdeacon Rix, S. E. Parker, and Mrs. A. T. Parkin

"The Westholme Theatre was packed to the doors on Friday afternoon with hundreds of happy, smiling kiddies, the occasion being the annual Empire Day patriotic demonstration held under the auspices of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire. Mrs. A. T. Parkin, regent of municipal chapter, presided, and in opening the proceedings touched upon the nature of the patriotic work carried on by the Daughters of the Empire throughout Canada.

S. E. Parker, chairman of the school board, made an appropriate speech in which he congratulated the Daughters of the Empire on conducting the patriotic demonstration every year and also congratulated the children upon the number of holidays they obtained. He said that no city in the Dominion had teachers who paid more attention to the welfare of their pupils than did Prince Rupert and the looks on their smiling faces bore testimony to the treatment they were receiving. He expressed the necessity for all boys and girls to grow up satisfied with their own town, province and country and thought there was no necessity for them to go far afield later in life to seek a fortune. The speaker said in closing: "Make up your minds that you are going to live here and help to build up your city and your country and you will never regret it."

Archdeacon Rix
In a stirring speech Archdeacon Rix referred to the cosmopolitan make up of the large gathering of children. He referred to the great possibilities that were ahead of them in their future life and impressed the children with the fact that it was in their own hands to do either good or bad. He was quite sure they were going to do something worth while in life and would thereby be doing something for the country in which they lived. He trusted the boys and girls were going to take great care of the wonderful body and mind which God had given to them.

In continuing the speaker likened the colors red, white and blue of the Union Jack to courage, truth and purity. When they thought of their nature they thought of these three characteristics. He impressed upon the children to honor their King, their country and their flag. The way to do it was to combine the characteristics of their flag. "Keep your mind and body clean, having within you courage, purity and truth," said the Archdeacon. He wanted those who were born under the British flag to set such an example to the aliens coming among them that their influence would not affect British standards of life or ideals. Endako to Get New Bridge; Protection Bear River Bridge; Work on Salmon River Road

The following public works appropriations have been authorized for local districts by Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works:
North Atlin — Mining road to

open up properties on Bear River road north of Ward's Pass, \$2,500.

Omineca — New standard pile trestle approach and 60 foot King span bridge to replace Endako bridge No. 1, \$3,000.

Prince Rupert — Continuation of Port Clements-Thell road on Graham Island, \$5,000.

South Atlin—Rock filling and protection work to new bridge at Bear River, \$7,000; work on Salmon River road, \$5,000.
