Now that the month of September is here, local nimrods will be taking down their arms and getting them into trim in anticipation of the opening of the hunting season which is now less than two weeks off. The usual rush on the government's agent for shooting licenses will co-incidentally commence. The deer season in this district will open on September 13 and will close on November 30 (both dates inclusive). The bag limit, as already announced, has been reduced from three to two animals and, of course, only bucks may be taken. The season for geese, ducks and brant will open on September 15 and continue until December 30. It might again be pointed out that Kain Island is a preserve for all game and the shooting of deer on the Queen Charlotte Islands is not permitted.

Owing to the drawing in of the autumn evenings, the Prince Rupert Gun Club has found it necessary to discontinue its shoots on Friday evenings. For the balance of the season, the meetings will be held Thursday afternoons or Sundays as weather permits. The local marksmen are continuing their practices in anticipation of the competitions that are being staged with outside teams during Fair Week.

With the Sons of Canada needing only one more victory to cinch the Stuart football shield and a tie to assure at least a post-season play off, the Great War Veterans team is the only other one that now stands a chance to win the trophy. And their chances are mighty slim for they would have to win all three games in the second half while the Canucks are losing all theirs. In view of the way things have been going so far this season, this seems a little too much to expect. The Callies dropped the last chance they had when the Canucks beat them last week in the opening game of the second half and that victory for the Canadians also sent glimmering the indeed small chance of the Englishmen to get into a post-season play-off. The second game of the second half of the schedule will take place tomorrow evening between the Great War Veterans and Sons of England, weather, of course, permitting.
