In the years he has been in the North he has travelled thousands of miles by boat, canoe and rail, visiting Indians and white people in out-ofthe-way settlements and ministering to their needs.

The Indians in the North live and fishing almost all the year round. In mid-summer they usually gather money at the appointed places and at Christmas and New Year they often return to their reservation.

It was not unusual for an Indian woman to carry on her back a load that a white man could hardly lift.

Dr. Larose had heard many stories of tricks the Indians had of getting in their supply of caribou meat. In the spring when the ice was thinning on the lakes and the caribou were starting to move, they often got caught in the lakes and drowned while crossing the treacherous ice.

Quite often, he said, when the caribou were crossing a lake, the Indian would gather in bands and shoot it the ice, breaking it so that the caribou were drowned in large numbers. Then they would rescue as many carcasses as they could, cutting out the tongues and leaving the rest to rot. The tongues were considered a great delicacy by the Indians.
