

# After Other Heads

This is not the first time Lord Atholstan's newspaper, The Montreal Star, has, tried to unhorse a Conservative leader and appoint one of its own choice.

In 1910 it and the elements it represents went after the head of Mr. Borden, then leader of the Conservative opposition at Ottawa-as Mr. Meighen is todayposed to appoint, first, Sir James Whitney, then Premier of Onfario, and, when he rebuffed them, Sir Richard McBride, who also turned them down. Meanwhile, a mutiny was organized in the Conservative ranks in the House of Commons, and Mr. Borden became so disgusted with the intrigue that he was on the verge of resigning. In the end the chief effect of the conspiracy against him was the strengthening of his leadership. The intrigue from the same source against Mr. Meighen ought to have the same result. 

Objects of Association Set Forth in Official Notice of Incorporation

The Topley Farmers' Institute is gazetted this week under the Societies Act, the objects of the organization being set forth a follows:

a To improve conditions of rural life, so that settlement may be permanent and prosper-

(b) To promote the theory and practice of agriculture by lectures, essays, the circulation of information and other educational methods, and to stimulate interest by exhibitions, prizes, and other means:

(c) To arrange on behalf of its members for the purchase, distribution, or sale of commodities. supplies, or products, and generally to act on their behalf in all matters incidental to agricultural pursuits:

(d) To promote social intercourse, mutual helpfulness, and the diffusion of knowledge, and to make new settlers welcome.
