

J. C. BRADY, M.P. FOR SKEENA, URGES ONE FOR THIS DISTRICT IN DIS-CUSSION AT OTTAWA

"Before this item passes I would like draw the attention of the minister to the great importance and the great need of cotinuing to add to the experimental farms of Canada," said J. C. Brady, M.P. for Skeena, in the House of Commons at Ottawa last week when an appropriation of \$1,600,600 to the Department of Agriculture for experimental farms was under discussion.

"I think the minister has said that the increase in these farms has practically ceased since 1920, and the time has now come for the Department of Agriculture to consider the advisability if establishing another experimental arm in northern British Columbia. As the minister well knows, in Northern British Columbia we have a great new country which claims the right of conderation. The experimental farms at Agassiz and Summerland are serving parts of British Columbia which ar absolutely different in climate and in other conditions from other parts British Columbia. The minister knows that' the area to which I refer has become very prominent lately because of the fact that at the Chicago exhibition the first prize for timothy seed for the whole of the North American continent was won by a farmer of that district; furthermore, at the Victoria agricultural how in 1926 this district took most of the prizes for root crops.

The Cup has never been won by a Welsh team, though Cardiff reached the final in 1924-25 only to be defeated by Sheffield United. The Arsenal have never been able to engrave their name on the ancient silverware, though they have twice reached the semi-finals, the second time 20 years ago.

Should Arsenal win it will be the first time the Cup has come to the metropolis for a temporary home since 1920-21, when it was won by Tottenham
