One Man and One Lady Appointed at Meeting of School Board Last Night

Two new teachers were appointed to the staffs of the local schools at the meeting of the school board last night. Bertha Rogers of Carberry, Manitoba, was appointed to the domestic science department at a salary of \$1,500 a year. She was recommended by Miss McLennan.

George H. Stocks, B.A. of the University of B.C., was appointed to the High School.

Miss Margaret Palmer, who is already on the staff, will take Miss Scott's room as receiving teacher at Borden Street, Miss Scott having recently resigned.

Several teachers applied for positions at the High School in connection with the matriculation class but the applications were held until others expected had arrived.

PROPOSAL TO OPEN SCHOOL

Westview Resident Submits Names of 21 Pupils Who Would Attend There

The school board last night had before it a proposal to re-open Westview School. There was an application from one of the residents asking for it and giving the names of 21 pupils who would attend.

It was pointed out by Trustee Gilchrist that to do so would save rent and the cost of transportation of the pupils. The property would be better looked after if used.

Chairman Rochester stated that they would want more information. There should be a petition from the parents. Also they should know something about the ages of the pupils and the classes they have been attending.

The matter was laid over for further consideration.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Aug. 12.—A small unpretentious house in Calle Victoria, Bucharest's main street, has suddenly thrust into its shadow the golden palaces of the King and Queen on the lower part of the same street. It is the home of Princess Helen, mother of the five-year old boy whom fate virtually has made ruler over sixteen million people.

The little house is just like any Canadian brick and plaster home. Inside, in the kitchen, is the beautiful Helen, "a slim grey princess," wearing a check-

ed, white apron. She is bending over the cook stove cooking a new dish.

Tugging at the apron strings of the Princess, or sitting in his high chair, is the baby king, Michael, begging her in perfect English for another helping of oatmeal. He is monarch not only of all he surveys in the kitchen but of millions of Rumanians, but he seems bent only on getting enough bread, jam, cookies and other sweet things dear to every child's heart and tummy.
