Gas Boat Explosion Throws Saw Mill Operator Into Air and Injures Him Severely

James A. Brewn of Ecstall River was on his Boat at Port Essington When Accident Occurred: Now in Hospital

Victim of an explosion at Port Essington last night which virtually wrecked his gasboat and hurled him twenty-five or thirty feet into the air, James A. Brown, well known Ecstall River sawmill operator, is today a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital suffering from severe fractures of both legs as well as burns about the head and face.

It was about 8.45 when the accident occurred. Mr. Brown went down to his boat, which was moored at a float, to see that all was

in order for the night. He carried & lantern and, as soon as he got to the door, the explosion occurred. Mr. Brown SUTTON SCHEME was hurled clear into the air, landing on to his boat again. One of the fractures was at the ankle and the other at the knee. The wheelhouse was blown on to the dock.

Had it not been for the prompt action of Mr. Brown's stepson, S.ewart General Leaves Early Next Month Donaldson, who pulled the victim out of the flames, there might have been much more serious consequences. Mr Brown took it cooly himself, inquiring as to the time immediately after the accident occurred.

Dr. W. T. Kergin was called to the scene by wire immediately and, with his nurse, Miss Dorothy Gillingham R.N., left aboard the B.C. Towage & Lighterage Co.'s powerboat Naas River had come down from Balmoral and took doctor and nurse on to Port Essington.
