



# IMPORTANT

All Trades, Businesses and Professions must be registered before April 30th.

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to sub-section (3) of Section 52B of the Taxation Act, every person who engages in, carries on, or practices any Trade, Business or Profession within the Province is required to obtain from the Commis sioner of Income Tax a Certificate of Registration before April 30th, 1927. Application should be made to any Provincial Assessor, from whom full information may be obtained. Certificates will be issued without the payment of any fee therefor.

Default in complying with the provisions of this section renders the person liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of \$10.00 for each day during which his default continues.

Application forms may be obtained from any Provincial Assessor, Government Agent, Provincial Police Officer, or from the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria, B.C.
