

The unemployed workmen were to hold a quiet meeting in Trafalgar Square, but besides them and against them there was a monster meeting of roughs, vagabonds, men who had taken for themselves a holiday from their unemployment in the docks and thieves, and this present government, Gladstone, Chil-'ers & Co., gave orders to the police not to interfere, consequently the mob began in St. James St. at the Conservative Clubs and on through Piccadilly, South Audley Street, Oxford Street, smashing every window and looting the jewellers' shops and throwing the poultry and wine bottles that they had seized from the shops. We drove through the beseiged streets on Thursday and it was most distressing to see the damage done, both to small shop people and to private houses. 
